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

### DEVELOP LIVE STOCK INDUSTRY OF WEST

#### IS PURPOSE OF J. S. DENNIS

Promotes Meeting in Winnipeg, Which is Attended by Many Experts

Headed by Stimulate Interest in Mixed Farming in the West

Dr. Rutherford, Dominion Government Expert, Will Head New Department

Will Have His Headquarters in Calgary and Take Up His Duties at Once

RELATIVE to the meeting of those interested in the development of the live stock industry in the West at Winnipeg on Monday, it is now learned that the meeting was promoted by J. S. Dennis, assistant to the present C.P.R. and that present committee of the Dominion Department of Agriculture, the departments of agriculture of the four Western provinces, the Canadian Pacific, Canadian Northern, Grand Trunk Pacific and packing interests in the West.

Interviewed regarding this meeting, Mr. Dennis, who returned to Calgary yesterday, said: "The meeting will bring together practically all the four Western provinces, the total number of some sheep and hogs show an alarming decrease, and as is well known, a very large portion of our food requirements have to be supplied from outside points, resulting in the shipment of beef, pork and bacon from the east and south, and that large quantities of our food are imported from the United States.

Western Canada affords profitable conditions for the growth of the stock as any other section of the world, but owing to the fact that the greater portion of the very large number of people who have been coming to the west and taking up land are devoting their energies entirely to the growing of grain, our interest in live stock and interest in its production is being stimulated in this important industry to keep pace with the rapid development which is occurring in the west and taking up land.

The meeting was called by the Dominion Department of the C.P.R. for the purpose of discussing its subject and endeavoring to lay down a program through which the departments of agriculture and the other interests in the west could assist in their own production of live stock and in the possible way further this very important industry.

The representatives attending the meeting were entertained at the Royal Alexander Hotel by the C.P.R. and as a result of the meeting a scheme is being worked out under which a foundation may be laid for the live supply of live stock required for the rapidly developing market.

### WHAT THE GREAT WEST DID YESTERDAY

### ALBERTA'S CROPS FINE, BUT HOW ABOUT CARS?


H. C. Forrest of Chicago is Enthusiastic About the Conditions





canal. Converted into money it represents enough to build a couple of Dreadnoughts. But back to the republic's electoral figures: The vote of the country at the presidential election in 1888 was 11,381,408; in 1892, 12,043,603; in 1896, 13,813,233; in 1900, 13,964,518; in 1904, 13,523,119; in 1908, 14,887,133.

It will be noticed that there was a decline in the popular vote in 1904, the vote of that year being less than in either 1896 or 1900, in spite of the growth of the country and the increase in population. The decline can only be attributed to a failure to arouse general interest in the Parker-Roosevelt campaign of that year.

The last government census shows a total population of the United States of 90,000,000, which would indicate a voting population of 18,000,000. There is, however, always a shrinkage from the voting strength, and it is considered unlikely that the vote will reach 16,000,000, although it seems probable that a great deal of interest will be aroused in this year's election, more than in several previous campaigns.

The vote of the Republican party in the whole country has advanced from 5,444,337 in 1888 to 7,679,006 in 1908. The Democratic vote has advanced from 5,540,050 in 1888 to 6,409,106 in 1908. In only one year did the total Democratic vote exceed the total Republican vote. That was in 1892, when the Republican vote was 5,190,802, showing a decline from 1888, while the Democratic vote in 1892 was 5,554,046. The largest vote cast by the Democrats was in 1896, when Bryan ran the first time. The Democratic vote that year was 6,479,946, and that point was not reached by Parker or by Bryan in his two subsequent candidacies.

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GIRL ATTACKS SOLDIERS; IS COURT MARTIALED

Vienna, Aug. 1.—Frau Hirt, the daughter of a colonel in the Austrian army, has been put on trial for 'insulting' her superior officer, Lieutenant Field Marshal Borevic, the commander of an army corps. The affair has caused much sensation, as it brings into sharp relief some of the evils of the Austrian military regulations under which inferior officers are forbidden to marry unless the bride can deposit the prescribed dowry, which varies from \$10,000 for a lieutenant's wife to \$2,750 for that of a major.

MOTHER IS SUED FOR HER DAUGHTER'S SERVICES

Gleesa, August 1.—The Woman's Rights League is just now keenly interesting itself in a somewhat extraordinary episcopal obiter dictum of Bishop Antonius of Volhynia. This pronouncement practically creates an additional house upon which an orthodox Russian may base a plea for divorce from his non-orthodox wife. Names are not mentioned, but it appears that a couple of years ago an orthodox resident in the government of Volhynia, in virtue of the 'freedom of religious confession' clause in the Russian manifesto of October 20, 1905, recanted his faith and joined the Roman catholic church. He subsequently married a Polish lady, recanted his 'apostasy' and 'conversion' he again recanted, and was readmitted a member of the State church. He sought to persuade his wife to become a protestant (orthodox), but she firmly refused. On this ground he now seeks a divorce, and Bishop Antonius ex officio supports his suit, formerly publicly declaring that the cause assigned is legitimate and valid. The Woman's Rights League is indignant at this, and has already before the Senate and will also have it laid before the Holy Synod. As, however, divorce procedure in this country is ecclesiastical authority, it is not at all improbable that the Holy Synod will uphold the action of Bishop Antonius. The State church, however, is averse to the position of the 'freedom of religious confession' promulgated in the Imperial Ukase referred to. It was formerly a ruling in all offenses of a Russian to abandon his faith, and was punishable by imprisonment or banishment.

ORTHODOX MARRIAGE IS THE CAUSE OF PROTEST

Calcutta, Aug. 1.—The 'Times of India' gives a special of special to a case which came before the Bombay High Court. A woman was convicted of cheating in respect of a marriage ceremony which she had received in advance as a part of the hire agreed upon for letting her daughter for darning to a person named Anand. She was fined Rs. 100, and the position of her daughter to the man, who thereupon prosecuted her for cheating before Sirdar Vinchurkar, of Nasik. This fine was collected, the woman and sentenced her to four months' imprisonment. The sessions Judge referred the case to the High Court, as he was of opinion that the agreement was of an immoral character, the real purpose of the arrangement being concubinage. The High Court upheld the view of the sessions judge and set aside the conviction and sentence.

In connection with the case Harold H. Mann, of the Society for the Protection of Children, called attention to the peculiarly helpless position in which girls above the age of thirteen are at the present moment. Apart from the fact that they are, in any way you please, their parents, or anyone who has them in charge, may bargain with their 'counters.' They may sell them as dancing girls, which always means an immoral life. They may sell them as concubines, or in other words, into prostitution in a few weeks, months, or years—but which almost becomes prostitution in the end. In our large cities, like London, the regular trade in little girls is carried on. Children are bought when babies for a trifle, or obtained for nothing, and the prostitutes who take charge of them bring them to the streets and sell them at a price of \$1000 and more. And if they are ever purchased as dancing girls, or are obtained as concubines, there is no hope for them. If such a change did not affect the question of marriage it would have the support of practically all Indian opinion in the Bombay Presidency, which counts in the matter. The government have obtained a few opinions adverse to such a change, but there is a vast majority in its favor.

LONDON SCIENTISTS USING DETECTIVE METHODS

Sherlock Holmes' Systems Are Favored in Destruction of Bacteria Track Deadly Bugs to Their Lair in Fight to Save Lives

London, Aug. 1.—Science has discovered a new outlet for the Sherlock Holmes instinct. Doctors are now engaged upon tracking the wily and criminal microbe to its lair. The medical man who takes up the latest methods in the treatment of diseases attributable to microbes becomes, in effect, a skilled detective. This special medical police work is known by the somewhat forbidding title of 'Vaccine Therapy,' the development of which Sir Almroth Wright and his staff are pursuing with much success in the inoculation departments of St. Mary's hospital, Paddington. This remarkable war on microbes, in which the dead are used to help in the destruction of the living, is described in a paper read by the department, and it makes fascinating reading. Having found the central abode of the criminal microbe, the doctor hands over the administration of capital punishment to microbes of his own class, for one of the principles in vaccine therapy is that of killing living microbes by the use of dead ones of their own variety. By inoculating a patient suffering with inflammation with a suitable number of dead microbes of the same variety as those found to be causing the inflammation, the natural opponents of microbe life in the blood are stimulated into action and assist the cure. So remarkable have been the cures obtained at St. Mary's hospital—this 'Treatment Yard' of the microbe world—that the number of patients under treatment now runs into thousands. During the past two years some 2,000 patients have been dealt with, and 900 are still under treatment. Two men who made pilgrimages from Russia and Hungary respectively, in the hope of deliverance from their microbial oppressors, and another who had a limb without playing the last card to save it. The routine work, together with some special investigations, has created during the two years the examination of some 20,000 specimens of blood. Experiments on those lines, with the aid of a patient specially introduced into England by Mr. Gauvain, medical superintendent to the Lord Mayor Troland Cripples' hospital at Acton, have suggested the possibility of even more startling developments in the near future. Already consumption of the glands, bone and skin is yielding to the treatment. 'It is not too much to hope,' says the governing

body in their report, 'that when treatment along these lines is generally adopted, the hunchback and high-bowed cripple, as a result of tubercular disease, will disappear from our streets. It is very satisfactory to record, in connection with this form of tuberculosis, that of eighty-seven patients treated during these two years, only two have eventually suffered the loss of a limb despite our efforts to save it, and that with both these men we were heavily handicapped by the circumstance that the disease had already existed for several months and involved most of the bones about the neck, before they came under treatment.' Certain forms of heart disease and child-bed fever have been beneficially treated by inoculation, and here again eventually complete success is anticipated by the operators. In describing the cure of toothache by the injection of dead microbes, the report says:

'There is a girl in our ward with hip disease who had been most troubled by neuralgia of long standing. Removal of the worst teeth did not suffice to cure the neuralgia, which was due, we supposed, to microbe activity in other teeth not yet so grossly decayed as to warrant their removal. A microbe obtained from inside one of the removed teeth was used for the preparation of a vaccine, to inoculation of which the neuralgia at once showed itself so amenable that in a week or two it had entirely gone.'
