

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Raised By "Bobs"

Roberts Sends Congratulations for Mounted Rifles Splendid Stand.

West Will Furnish a Thousand Men for the New Contingent.

Regiments Will Be Recruited and Will Sail from Halifax.

April 7.—The Governor-General received the following telegram from Lord Roberts:

"I have telegraphed my congratulations to the men who did so well at Rensselaers on March 31, but I would like to see the Canadian government of which I appreciate the splendid machinery of the Militia department set in motion today for enlisting and outfitting a contingent of 2,000 men for South Africa."

It is understood that the contingent will likely be made up of three regiments, which will be recruited one-half from Western Ontario, the North-West Territories, and the other half from Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

The conditions of the enlistment will be the same as last contingent, and will receive rearmament pay, and officers Imperial Cavalry pay. The regular War office will supply transport, arms, ammunition, and transp.

The contingent will be equipped by the Canadian government, Great Britain to pay the arms, and shipped at intervals of two weeks in order that the necessary accommodations may not be overburdened.

Several new recruiting parties will be sent to Western Canada. The contingent will be recruited in the following manner:

1. 1,000 men from Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

2. 500 men from the North-West Territories and the Yukon.

3. 500 men from the Dominion of Wales.

4. 500 men from the Dominion of Ireland.

5. 500 men from the Dominion of Scotland.

6. 500 men from the Dominion of England.

7. 500 men from the Dominion of France.

8. 500 men from the Dominion of Germany.

9. 500 men from the Dominion of Italy.

10. 500 men from the Dominion of Spain.

11. 500 men from the Dominion of Portugal.

12. 500 men from the Dominion of Greece.

13. 500 men from the Dominion of Russia.

14. 500 men from the Dominion of Austria.

15. 500 men from the Dominion of Prussia.

16. 500 men from the Dominion of Saxony.

17. 500 men from the Dominion of Bavaria.
