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

OFFENSIVE OPERATIONS

LIEBLY TO COMMENCE BETWEEN FRANCE AND CHINA.

PARIS, Nov. 19-The premier and minister of marine to-day informed the committee of the chamber of deputies that offensive operations would be instituted at Tonquin if they had not already commenced.

It is stated that negotiations between France and China on the Tonquin question have been resumed. The deputies are debat-

The impression prevails at Paris that the government recently received bad news from Tonquin.

COWARDICE OF EGYPTIAN SOLDIERS.

CAIRO, Nov. 19.—The governor of Suakim has telegraphed the khedive that although the bedouins were numerically inferior to the Egyptian troops the latter attempted no stand, but divested themselves of their arms and clothes and rushed naked into the sea, forsaking the Turkish officers commanding them, who were killed. The sead reinforcements.

The wildest rumors are again rife concerning Hicks Pasha owing to the defeat of the Egyptians at Toka. His force, however, and the force slaughtered at Toka was entirely disconnected.

The latest official account of the fighting at Toka states the Egyptians lost 11 officers and 142 men be ides six Turks and several Greeks. They also lost one gun and 300 rifles. About 340 of them regained teeir ship. The Egyptians during the fight formed a hollow square when a small rumber of the enemy locked their shields together and rushed through the Egyptian line. An immediate panic among the Egyptians ensued. It is doubt-

among the Egyptians ensued. It is doubtful if black troops can be spared from Massowah, which is in the same critical position as Suakim. The British gunboat Ranger has been ordered from Aden to Suakim.

When the Western Union had secured sufficient stock of the opposing ompany to control its actions an agreement was entered into by which the stockholders of the opposing company should have Western Union stock issued to them in place of their own. To accomplish this the Western Union company increased its capitalstock, but instead of making the new issue just enough to take up the stock of the opposition company, it added about fifteen million dollars in excess of what was actually needed, and this was divided pro rala
