WHERE ARE THE STOCK BOOKS?

THE CANADIAN BOOKS PUT THROUGH THEIR CARBON.

Enable to Answer Questions Submitted by Members of the Executive, Their Application is Filed—The Avenue-road Electric Car Question Referred Back—Will Not Purchase a Steam Fire Engine.

Emerson Coatsworth, M.P., J. D. Edgar, M.P., and the man of photographs who were down to the City Hall yesterday convinced that as the representatives of the Toronto Electric Car and Power Acquisition Company they were about to take the Executive Committee by storm, even as they had captured the Board of Works.

The result of the meeting proved that they had built their hopes on shifting sand. Instead of accepting calmly the persuasive arguments of the company's spokesmen, the guardians of the public purse brought their guns into play so effectively that the M.P.'s were defeated and had to retreat feigning dejection, disappointed and disgusted.

Ald. Lamb was in place after his vacation in the west and with Ald. McMurrich took an active part in the discussion. Chairman Shaw presided.

Where is the stock book?
Mr. Coatsworth opened the attack, but he was not heard. He said: "We appear before you to-day, with the charter."
Ald. Lamb: Have you the stock book?
Mr. Coatsworth: I have not the stock book.

How much is the subscribed stock?
Ald. Lamb: Have you any objection to letting the shareholders see the stock book? I think we should see the institution.

Where is the stock book?
Ald. Lamb: I have not the stock book.
Mr. Coatsworth: I think there has never been raised before. I think there will be an objection. Surely the guarantee we offer is sufficient without the private business of the company being inquired into. The names of the promoters are in the Act of Parliament.

Ald. Lamb: Who are the subscribers together?
Mr. Coatsworth: How much stock is subscribed?
Ald. Lamb: I am not in a position to state the amount.

Ald. Lamb: Who are the subscribers?
Mr. Coatsworth: I am not prepared to answer that, either.
Ald. Lamb: Have you ever seen the stock book?
Mr. Coatsworth: No.

The spokesman then continued for a few minutes but when he had finished the \$100,000 had been paid in the cross-examination was resumed. Ald. Lamb asked: "By whom?"

Mr. Coatsworth: We have the certificate of the Government that the money has been paid in.

What was the consideration?
Ald. McMurrich: Has the stock been paid for in hard cash or in notes? In that it has been given away. Is that true?

Mr. Coatsworth: One of the gentlemen in connection with the company has assured me that none of the stock has been given away.
Ald. McMurrich: And that everybody who is a stockholder has paid cash?
Mr. Coatsworth: I am not sure whether paid cash or are responsible for the same.

"The act of Parliament is a very stringent one," went on the spokesman, "and the company with a good deal of opposition. It was only after satisfying the Government as to the boundaries of the undertaking that we were permitted to add a clause to the agreement, stating that the power is to be brought from Georgian Bay."

When he got to expatiating on the cheapness of the undertaking, Ald. Lamb was again on his track.
"Are you aware," said he, "that the last tender of the Toronto Electric Light Company, after deducting the expenses of Mr. Edger, is only one cent per horse-power per hour?"

Mr. Coatsworth: I have not seen any analysis.
The spokesman finished his remarks by saying: "We shall be pleased to give any further information that is required by the committee."

Ald. Lamb: Then you will furnish the stock book and tell us how the money was raised.
Mr. Edger is heeded.

Then Mr. Edger arose and he had a warm time as his colleague. The first question fired at him was: "How much of the \$100,000 is deposited by the provisional directors and the stockholders of the company?"

Mr. Edger: Every dollar of that \$100,000 was deposited by the provisional and permanent directors.
Ald. Lamb: How is it raised?
Mr. Edger: I want to state that the president of the company, Mr. Edger, is able to pay twenty times \$100,000.

Ald. Lamb: Did he in this case?
Mr. Edger: He and the other shareholders.
Ald. Lamb: Did he?
Mr. Edger: I don't know whether he did or didn't.

Ald. McMurrich: We want to know what is the standing of the company. How much stock has Mr. Coatsworth got?
Mr. Edger: I don't know.

Ald. McMurrich: A hand.
Ald. McMurrich: How many shares have the present directors paid up for yet?
Mr. Edger: I don't know. It has been said here that paid up stock has been distributed. I want to say that if I believed or understood that any paid up stock of this undertaking had been used to influence directly or indirectly any alderman, any journalist, or any member of the Legislature, both Mr. Coatsworth and I would throw up my arms.

Ald. McMurrich: Or private individual.
Mr. Edger: I don't think so, and I don't know it.
Proceeding, Mr. Edger said that one cent per horse power included everything, but Ald. Lamb pointed out that the agreement did not say so.
Ald. McMurrich: You are aware that a lot of bonds have been issued?
Mr. Edger: I am not sure if I think they have not and could not be issued.

The Bonds are Valuable.
Ald. McMurrich: If any bonds have been issued they are valuable.
Mr. Edger: Certainly; they could not be issued under the powers of the company.

At the conclusion of Mr. Edger's cross-examination, Ald. McMurrich moved that the matter be left on the table till after the question of establishing a municipal plant had been settled. Mr. Edger will take off the fringe of his resolution I will vote for it. Let the matter lie on the table.

SWINDLED BY TELEPHONE

WHOLESALE DRUGGISTS VICTIMS OF AN INGENIOUS SCAMP.

Ordered Goods in the Names of Retailers After the Last Delivery of the Day Has Been Made, and Had Them Sent to Convenient Points, Where a Confederate Called for Them.

A new swindle was unearthed yesterday, the victims being the wholesale druggists. Thus far two firms are known to have been defrauded, but it is believed the swindler has worked the same game with all the wholesale druggists in the city, and possibly with other wholesalers as well.

SECRECY AS TO THE BONDS.

LET US HAVE THE NAMES

ALLEGED HOODLING CHARGES STILL BEING DISCUSSED.

The Tender for Electric Lighting Will Not Be Awarded Until Such Times as the County Judge Investigates the Rumors of Crookedness in the City Council.

The aldermen of the city of Toronto are all on their dignity these days. The grave charges that have been made against certain of them have hurt their personal feelings. Whether these specific charges are true or not, they will have a good effect, for it is almost a settled rule, an investigation which will be far-reaching in character.

Rumors of crookedness in the council have been afloat for some time past, and the names of many ratapans who have been charged with them are not altogether without foundation.

The chief mover in this action. He will, on Monday, present his resolution to the council for an enquiry and suggest, Judge McDougall as the president. He does not propose that the council shall enquire into the matter of the electric lighting tenders only, but into everything and anything where suspicion can be shown to have taken place.

The rumor that money was paid to the contractor for the lighting of the city to secure their franchise will also be investigated.

The chairman is assiduously searching after evidence, and from what could be gathered in an interview with the contractor, it would seem that he has already in his possession information of a startling character. He refused to tell what he knew on the ground that it was not prepared to take the responsibility upon his own shoulders, but when the judge sets down to enquiry under oath it is anticipated there will be some sensational disclosures.

When the report of the Fire and Light Committee came up at the meeting of the council last night, Ald. Frankland moved that it be referred back until after the proposed investigation taken place.

Ald. McMurrich did not think that the awarding of the contract should depend upon anything that might come before the County Judge. It was a pure matter of business. They had to decide whether the offer from the Toronto Electric Light Company was more advantageous than that offered by the other bidders.

Ald. Frankland said he felt that the Toronto Electric Light Company were in a position to give him the names of those who approached them with respect to receiving a bribe in order to secure the contract. He would not, under the circumstances, support the Toronto Electric Light Company, and reported that the lighting of the streets. They were the ones that started the rumor.

He was an active member of the Law Society, and in 1888 was appointed its treasurer.

In the celebrated Bribery Case he was one of the counsel for the Mowat Government.

He was a gentleman of scrupulous honor and integrity and leaves a large circle of friends to mourn his loss.

Deceased, although rather feeble, had been enjoying apparently very good health during his sojourn at the island. He had just completed arrangements to spend the winter with his son, who is taking place to-morrow.

Mr. Meredith was seen at his residence in Rosedale last night, and was smoking his pipe with a more contented face than he has worn for years.

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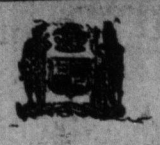

7. I think of the galaxy of names that adorn the pages of the history of our church. Calvin, Knox, Melville, Chandler, Candlish, Guthrie and our own Dr. Cook of Belfast...
