FORMER RESIDENT OF WATFORD PASSES AWAY

After an illness of only a few weeks, one of the former residents of Watford passed away in the person of Robert Logan.

The deceased was born in the Township of Malahide, County of Elgin on Aug. 1, 1862, and was a son of the late Thomas Logan, when a young man, the family moved to Brooke and on March 12, 1890, he was married to Mary Marchbank, of Bothwell, and was a resident of Watford for nineteen years. A year ago the family moved to Sarnia where the deceased was employed in the John Goodison Thresher Co.

The funeral was held from the family residence, 236 S. Christina St., on Sunday, Feb. 13th, interment taking place in Lakeview cemetery. The service was conducted by Rev. J. J. Patterson, of St. Andrews church.

### DEATH OF BROOKE PIONEER

Probably the oldest and one of the most esteemed residents of Brooke township passed peacefully to his reward early last Thursday morning, Feb. 10th, 1921, when Mr. Andrew Lucas died in his 97th year, on the farm where he had spent the best part of his earthly career.

Mr. Lucas was born in Lanark county in the year 1824, and moved to Brooke about 70 years ago. On January 26th, 1853, he was married to Miss Mary Acton by the late Rev. Canon Mockridge, then rector of Warwick. Mr. and Mrs. Lucas celebrated their diamond wedding in 1913 when a large and happy gathering of relatives assembled at their home to congratulate the aged pair His life-partner predeceased him July 24th, 1917. He is survived by four sons and two daughters, Wellington and Richard of Brooke, Sanford of Alvinston, Wesley of Ark ona, Mrs. D. McLean and Mrs. D. Whitehead of Brooke, also by 45 grandchildren and a large number of great-grandchildren. Deceased was a great home lover,

very industrious and self-sacrificing, intelligent and liberal minded and in his prime kept well informed and conversant with all subjects of local and general interest. He was an ardent lover of country life and advocated and supported whatever he considered to be in the interests of the township and country. He was a member of the Church of England and a life-long Conservative and was a loyal subject of five sovereigns.

The funeral took place on Saturday, Feb. 12th, from his late residence, lot 12, con. 12, to St. James church cemetery, and was very largely attended. Service was held in Sanford Lucas, Jr.



#### LAMBTON'S GOOD ROADS SUPERINTENDENT

Lambton County's genial Superintendent of Roads, is a practical, selfeducated, dved-in-the-wool "good roads booster." He is a man that understands the needs of the rural districts and is delivering "value received" for every dollar expended.

Mr. McCallum spent over fifteen years in contract work for towns ships and county and has been in charge of county work for the past three years.

He has under his supervision near ly 400 miles of road, sixty miles of which is Provincial County road. The appropriations for good reads the first year Mr. McCallum was in charge totalled \$40,000. Last year the appropriations totalled nearly \$120,000, and this year's estimates call for sums that will aggregate

nearly \$140,000

Perhaps the greatest economical achievement in the good roads programs for this county was the working out of a scheme of laying down gravel at a price several hundred per cent. lower than the lowest pre-war price. Mr. McCallum was the father of this scheme of utilizing motor trucks and trailers. In one instance gravel was hauled twelve miles and spread at a net cost of less than 70

cents per yard. Mr. McCullum is a native of Middlesex county; at present living at Alvinston. He is 58 years of age and going stronger than ever.


