TYPES OF BIBLE TRUTH.

What if every part of your house should begin to repeat the truths which have been committed to its symbolism? The lowest stone would say, in silence of night, "Other foundation can no man lay." The corner-stone would catch the word "Christ is the corner-stone." The door would add, "I am the door." The taper burning by your bedside, would stream up a moment to tell you, "Christ is the light of the world." Go forth to your labour, and what thing can you see that has not its message? The ground is full of sympathy: the flowers have been painted with teaching. The trees, that only seem to shake their leaves in sport, are forming divine sentences; the birds tell of heaven with their love warblings in the green twilight; the sparrow is a preacher of truth; the hen clucks and broods her chickens, unconscious that to the end of the world she is part and parcel of a revelation of God to man. The sheep that bleat from the pastures, the hungry wolves that blink in the forest, the serpent that glides noiselessly in the grass, the raven that flies heavily across the field, the lily over which his shadow passes, the plough, the sickle, the wain, the barn, the flail, the threshing-floor—all of them are consecrated priests, unrobed teachers, revelators that see no visions themselves, but that bring to us thoughts of truth, contentment, hope, and love, all the ministers of God. REPORT OF THE REV. W. BROOKMAN, AGENT.

To the Directors of the U. C. Bible Society.

LONDON, Ont., April, 1870.

DEAR SIRS,—Again, with an expression of thankfulness to Almighty God for the mercies vouchsafed to your Agent during his labours of the past year, I present my usual Report. May His blessing continue to rest upon us all, and upon our labours. It is a great work in which we are engaged, and in these days of manifest opposition, upon the part of many, to the Word of God, it behoves the lovers of, and believers in the Truth, to be up and doing, for all the errors extant in Christendom may be traced either to the additions of some, who thereby make “*The Word of none effect through their traditions,*” or to the rationalistic views of others, who “*know not the Scriptures, nor the power of God.*” In exposing the errors of these two classes, who are increasingly represented at this time, our Lord deals with them solely on the written word, and so gives His Church a guile whereby to direct her in the warfare against error in her midst. And when we regard the labours in which we have been permitted to participate by assisting the circulation of the Word among the heathen, through the Parent Society, we find ourselves again committed solely to the influence of that Word, which through the power of the Holy Ghost upon their darkened mind, can alone dispel the darkness,—as it is written, “*the entrance of thy Word giveth light.*” Blessed indeed will he be in “*that day*” who has sown most of that living Word! “*The seed is the Word of God,*” so said the Great Sower who sent forth men to reap that which he had sown: and we shall find in “*that day,*” so looked for and longed for by St. PAUL, that every plant which our Heavenly Father hath planted, nourished, watered, pruned, and transplanted to bloom forever in His courts of glory, sprang from “*the seed which is the Word of God.*” What cheer indeed then for its sowers!

I commenced my summer tour with *Seaforth*, a feeble branch at present. *Lucknow* is of a similar character, and was next visited. *Tiverton* had as usual displayed much energy. Their collections amounted to \$85. During the past year they have employed a colporteur in Bruce County, who has been most successful, having sold over \$900 worth of various kinds of Bibles. A wet night and small meeting at *Kincardine*. They had endeavoured to produce more interest in the work by holding county meetings, yet there was a falling off in the funds, though \$90 had been raised. After attending our Diocesan Synod, I returned north to *Saugeen*, which is in a better state than it was; and from thence I proceeded to *Owen Sound*. This branch at present is sadly behind. *Paisley* had not collected, as it should have done, in the winter, so we lost our usual subscriptions. I addressed a small audience at *Balaclava* with the hope of forming a branch there. They have promised to consider the matter. We had a large meeting at *Walkerton* on Sunday evening, to hear a missionary sermon from your agent. The next day I passed on to *Hanover* and found it languishing, although there are five Protestant churches in this small village. *Durham* gave us a poor meeting and a small collection of \$20. *Piaceville* is doing better. I formed a branch at *Cornabus* in the place of the *Flesherton* branch which has never been sustained since it was formed. *Eugenia* was reached next, and their report was good. I formed a new branch also at *Maxwell* under favourable auspices. This branch will take the place of *Feversham*. My letters did not reach *Thornbury* and the meeting was not announced therefore. The steamboat on which I was about to start for *Meaford* broke down. I telegraphed for a suppl., to take my place. This is a good branch, it is also the best in the County of Grey. *Collingwood* gave us a better audience, but as regards funds it is feebly supported at present. My next tour was through the County of Simcoe, commencing with *Barrie*, which manifests indications of growth, and intends to look after the interests of the lumbermen in the district. About \$75 had been collected. I went on by steamer to *Orillia*. A thunder-storm at the hour of meeting prevented our usual good audience. Their collections now do not come up to those in by-gone years, although the village is a growing and thriving one, yet they are ahead of the last year's gathering; \$76 had been collected. *Oro* had very small returns in spite of the Secretary's energy. *Innisfil* had done well, having forwarded \$45. *Thornton* is languishing. Nothing has been done for two years; they however have promised to revive the work. A good meeting rewarded me at *West-Essa*, which is a prosperous branch. *Bradford* is backsliding in funds and audiences. They could give no cause for it, save that many declined to contribute because they could not afford it! A good audience and a fair sum at *Tottenham*. *Bondhead* is the best branch in this county. Their collections were nearly \$100. After the harvest and autumn rest, and some delay through the change of district, I commenced afresh at *Newmarket*. Here our meeting was a failure, owing to the rainy evening. *Lloydton* postponed its anniversary. *Schomberg*'s report not got ready. *Aurora* had done well, as it always does—collections over \$107. This branch has sustained a great loss in the removal of its secretary, Dr. Geikie, to Toronto. I failed to reach *Laskey* through a break-down, but as this part of the work came now into Rev. Mr. Goldsmith's hands, he promised to give them a meeting. The five meetings of the next week were now taken up by him, and I returned to arrange for the new work east of Hamilton, as soon as the Exhibition week was past. *Paris*, postponed. *St. George*, an excellent branch. They had adopted the system of paying a good collector a percentage, and it turned out a success. They collected over \$120, against their usual \$60. In making my report of a tour principally in the district east of Hamilton, I remark it was my first visit, and I had expected in such an old settled country to have found a more lively interest than usual. I did my best however, with my scanty audiences, to arouse them at least to more activity. There are branches named in this month's report that are doing well, and my

hearty desire is that next year may witness a renewal of former interest, and find all doing well. *Dundas* was my starting point, but their meeting was postponed. They were not ready. *Copetown*—much falling away from former days—their collections were not all in. *Kirkwall* was, as it has always been to me, a pleasure to attend—a very good meeting and good collections. When all the returns are made, they will probably be ahead of last year, as two collectors had not reported, and their funds were over \$70, nearly their usual amount. *Lynden*—the Secretary had left, and the Treasurer had died since their last gathering, and their places had not been filled. *Jerseyville* postponed their meeting. *Strabane*—I had purposed holding a meeting here to make up for non-attendance formerly alluded to, but they were afraid that the notice (all I could give them) was not in sufficient time to gather a meeting, though it might have been circulated through the schools, and so the meeting was not held. *Ancaster*—some mishap attended the notices here, and but a few only were present. Collectors go out in winter. I walked out to Ancaster from Hamilton the next week, and from thence took horse to *Glanford*. Nothing had been done last year. We re-organized in hopes of better times. *Binbrook* postponed their meeting on account of the Township Fair. *Caistorville* had collected \$16 for last year. Nothing done yet for this year. *Smithville* had collected \$5, but expected more. They needed more collectors and promised to appoint more. Drove on to *St. Catharines* to confer with the Secretary about another meeting, as they had postponed the one I had previously appointed for this time, and then returned by train to *Beamsville*, where I found that little had been done. The Committee could not even be got together on the receipt of my notice to make the needed arrangements. At *Winona* we had the best meeting I have seen in this district to reward me, after a ride of 150 miles; but their money transactions were small. \$25 were reported for last year, and their collectors were soon to go out for this year. At *Grimsby* I addressed a dozen persons, all told, in a large church. The excellent pastor was very much grieved at it. Another local and occasional meeting, for a good purpose, was being held at the same time—this hindered ours. Next day I took the train for *Chippewa*. The Treasurer and Secretary were no longer living, and the President had gone away. We had no meeting. Afterwards I went with a person who had been Secretary years ago, to see the only member in the place. They were both anxious to keep up the work, if possible, but seemed rather hopeless about it. They promised to let me know the result of any effort they might endeavour to make. I walked over with a friend the next evening to *Drummondville*. Usually they have good meetings here; but from some cause it was small this evening. However their money matters revealed a better state of things than did their personal attendance. Nearly \$100 had been collected, which was an increase. Their sales were also good. I found here the best spirit I had yet seen in this part of the country. I was well supported also by the resident ministers, which is a boon not always accorded to the agent of the Bible Society. *Queenston* had collected \$6, and sold Scriptures to the amount of \$11. They debated the subject of sustaining a branch at all. I persuaded them to “try again,” and get it into better order, as there were surely persons who would sustain such a work from principle. *Port Dalhousie*.—We had no meeting here. The collectors had been delayed as the President informed me, through the late disastrous fire. I returned home from this point unwell, having caught chill and fever from waiting about at the *Queenston* platform (there being no station) in a storm of snow and cold, and having only summer clothing on. I missed *Niagara* and *Bertie* therefore. On Friday I started for *Thorold*, but was obliged to return, as the fever had left me much depressed in spirit. I heard from them. Their sales and collections amounted to about \$100. I understand that *Thorold* is a well worked branch, and presents a good example to the surrounding branches.

November was a trying month, with its snow and mud alternately, and I arranged some meetings by train, which failed on my part through mis-haps by rail. *Port Robinson, Welland, Fonthill, and South Cayuga* were thus missed during the month. After a twenty-two miles drive, at the rate of three miles an hour, through mud, snow, and storm, I reached *Dunnville* to find the meeting a failure, through want of notice upon the part of the Committee. *St. Catharines*, after a previous postponement, was now taken. We had a poor gathering. *Cayuga* is prospering. Excellent collections at *Caledonia*—\$111. *Hagersville* meeting failed, through the stormy night. So also *Selkirk* and *Nanticoke*. *Brantford*, in spite of the heavy snow-storm, gave us a capital audience, and surpassed all former years in its work. Their collections amounted to \$885. *Oncida*—A small meeting after a weary and muddy ride—but they had collected \$63 which was a good sum for them. *Jarvis* collectors not yet out. A good meeting at *Port Dover*—collections \$48, but the country around had not been canvassed. *Waterford* postponed its meeting. *Vittoria* had not completed its report. *Delhi* had done nothing. I preached at *Simcoe* and went on to *Lynedoch*. The rain prevented a good meeting. The Secretary here is the sustaining power of this branch. May others catch his spirit! I was caught here in the mud with a cutter and failed to reach *St. Williams* and *Port Roritan*. Both of these branches are doing a little for us. *Simcoe* gave us a good meeting, but they have fallen away in the matter of successful collections. The reason of this appears to be that the Ladies' Association has, by some means, been broken up. The amount collected was \$70; I have known it to be double that sum under their management. *Scotland* postponed. *Mount Pleasant*.—A fair meeting and a good collection—\$46. *Burford*—A good branch. *New Durham*.—Meeting a failure—and collections not in. *Norwich*.—Collectors not out yet. *Otterville* is doing fairly. A good spirit shown at *East Oxford*. *Beachville* has been low for some time past, but promises better times now. *Tilsonburg*.—Prevented by heavy rain storms all day from getting there. *Culloden* gave us a good meeting, and had doubled its collections—the amount was \$69. *Ingersoll*—In capital order as usual. Their nine months' work brought in \$155. They collect quarterly. *Lakeside* had done well: \$42 against \$34 last year, and two collections to be returned yet. *Embro*?—An unusually good gathering was seen here. The collections came to \$105—a good sum for this branch. *Paris* meeting was small, but they had excellent collections—\$180. *Dundas* again postponed its meeting. From this I returned home for a Christmas rest, and in January held the *Woodstock* meeting. I found this branch much improved since I visited it last, some four years ago. \$109 collected. I spoke here with a severe hoarseness, and I was so much the worse that I abstained from speaking for three days. *Chesterfield, Inverkip* and *Princeton* were taken for me by local aid. When better, I went to *Dundas*, and addressed a good meeting. They had collected \$98. They were going to ascertain to what degree their community was supplied with the Bible. *Washington* collections small—\$27. *Galt* gave us a capital meeting, and it has well sustained its good spirit. *Preston*.—We had only a Committee meeting, and it was resolved to unite with Galt. *Berlin* postponed its anniversary. *Hamilton*.—A cold evening prevented a good attendance, but our report was excellent. Instead of a paid collector, the committee canvassed the city and obtained \$734—an increase of 75 per cent. over their usual receipts. *Shakespeare* gave us a favourable reception. *Mitchell* is at present very low. *Fullerton* was reached through snow-drifts; but I was warmly received. Collectors delayed by reason of the bad drifts. This is a very good branch. *Kirkton*.—Postponed. *Elimsville* had done pretty well. *Crediton*.—Meeting a failure, through local causes. *Exeter*.—Meeting good, so were the collections—\$85—some had yet to be made. *Egmontville*.—As usual a small meeting and a good purse; a little heavier than last year's; it contained \$34. *Seaford* is struggling to overcome its lethargy, and I trust will succeed.

On the 1st Feb. I was at Clinton, and from thence I went to Goderich. At Clinton, only nine or ten persons present. Goderich is in a similar condition. I addressed the few present as Christians who were interested in the circulation of the Scripture and the honour of their Lord and Master. A resolution was unanimously passed to the effect, that announcements from the pulpits should be made, and every endeavor used to convene a meeting to ascertain the views of the Christian public, at a gathering sufficiently large really to represent them. I found things going on well at *Brucefield*; they had collected over \$60. *Bayfield*, *Manchester*, and *Londesborough* always do well. *Blyth* presents always one of our best audiences. They were a little behind in their collections, owing, as it was specially said, to the poor crops and poor prices, and not to decreasing interest. *Dungannon*—Improved every way. *St. Helen's* is in a fair state. *Lucknow* had done little. *Teeswater* shows an excellent spirit; they had collected \$45. They select auditors to inspect the accounts and see that all is ready for the meeting. I only wish all the branches would do so; it would save many an audience from being tired out before the Agent's address commenced. I preached in the morning at Wingham for the incumbent, and in the afternoon for the Society, and then went on to *Bluevale*, where I addressed a large audience on the work. Both places had not yet sent out their collectors, but were about to do so. *Gorrie*—Somewhat better. *Fordwich*—Much improved. *Harriston* and *Mount Forest*—Not very brisk at present. *Listovell*—In good order; and *Stratford* also. They had collected \$221. *Milbank*—Prospering. *Rothsay* and *Hollen* had to be abandoned, on account of the snow-drifts. *Berlin* is a strong branch. Collections always increasing; though it is hard to get together an audience or a Committee meeting. We are much indebted to our Secretary here. *Winterbourne*—flourishing. *Glenallan*—improving. Plunged through heavy snow-drifts to *Drayton*, and had a good meeting there. *Fergus*—as usual, with a capital report. Collections \$180. *Eden Mills*—doing well. *Ermosa* had held its meeting thinking that some branches would have to arrange for themselves, since there were but two Agents in the field. Over \$100 had been raised. *Hillsburg* had held its meeting also, under similar ideas. *Everton* gave us a fair meeting. *Rockwood* was well up with an audience, and doubtless will make its usual excellent returns. *Kirkton* had not finished its collections. Here the great snow storm set in, and I was blocked up for two days, and at last reached Guelph, only to find that I could not proceed north to *Garafraza* and *Erin*. I heard from them that no meetings were held on account of the roads. *Orangeville*—I was obliged to return without reaching it; the roads were too heavily drifted. The next week, with some difficulty, I reached *Elmira*. They had done well for a new branch, having collected \$45. *Hawkesville* will report when their funds are all in. Two days travelling brought me to London, and thus my work for the fall and winter ended. To the gracious One who hath enabled me to do it, be praise and thanksgiving. May we remember His word, “THE NIGHT is far spent, and THE DAY is at hand,” and as we look up rejoicing and watch for his coming, may we all receive grace to love and work better than heretofore.

REPORT OF REV. J. GEMLEY, SECRETARY.

To the Directors of the Upper Canada Bible Society:—

BIBLE HOUSE, TORONTO,

July 20, 1870.

GENTLEMEN,—Having been instructed by you to visit some of the Branches of our Society, and having also been invited to take part in the Annual Meetings of others, I beg to furnish yo' with an account of the results; and to detail, in brief, some of the incidents connected therewith.

My first visit was to Wellington Square. Here I preached on Sabbath, 14th November, and attended the public meeting in the Town Hall on the following evening. The Rev. T. Green, LL.D., Rector, occupied the chair in the absence of Mr. J. Triller, President, who was sick and unable to be present, which he much regretted. The Venerable Doctor introduced the business of the meeting by an admirable and eminently catholic address. The Rev. Mr. Jeffery also rendered valuable aid. The Committee was reorganized—the congregation was considered large, and the meeting interesting and satisfactory. Proceeds from this Branch \$60.71.

Next day, my friend, the Rev. Mr. Jeffery, drove me over to Nairn—better known as Strabane. He had scarcely turned homeward, until a furious snow-storm set in. I feared we would have no audience; but it was large for such an evening. The Venerable President, Mr. Stewart, was in his place. We were aided by the large-hearted pastor, the Rev. A. McLean, M.A., and I received from this rural and flourishing Branch a handsome sum. Total to our Society, \$48.93, including \$10.00 special for Eromanga. My kind host, Mr. Bain, the Secretary of the Society, took me in his carriage next day to Guelph, 16 miles. The severity of the day rendered the act the more worthy. By train, I reached Georgetown in time for their meeting. It was held in the C. Presbyterian Church—the much-loved pastor, the Rev. R. Ewing, was unable, through severe indisposition, to be with us. All the other ministers of the town were present. Their speeches were superior, and the meeting most successful—the Rev. J. Unsworth, President, in the chair. Collection and subscriptions, \$132.50. After enjoying the hospitality of Mr. McKay, Secretary of the Branch, I returned next morning to Toronto, to resume the more drudging labour of desk-work. My next visit was to Port Hope, the scene of my first ministerial duties after my ordination. I preached in my old church on Sabbath evening, the 28th November. The anniversary took place the following evening. My friends encouraged me by an unusually large audience in the town hall—the collection exceeded, and the ministers of all the churches sustained the meeting nobly. Receipts, \$132.50. The chair was sustained by the President, H. H. Meredith. The oft-repeated hospitality of Mayor Benish was once more enjoyed.

December 16th found me in the crowded Town Hall of the flourishing town of Guelph. The Co. Treasurer, President of the Branch, Mr. James Hough, filled the chair. I was well sustained by able men of the churches, warm friends of the Bible Society. The meeting was enthusiastic. Total received at the Depository from Guelph, \$585.92, which includes \$25.00 from one friend for Italy.

Newmarket was visited on the 19th and 20th December. I preached to a large congregation in the Rev. Mr. Smith's church on the Sabbath evening, and addressed those assembled in the Christian Church, on the Monday evening. Mr. Smith was the only minister of the village present—reasons were given for the non-attendance of the others. R. W. Smith, President, in the chair. It was a remarkable meeting. It closed most interestingly. One of my colleagues was prevented, owing to a terrific storm, from holding a meeting in the fall—hence my visit at this time. Total from Newmarket, \$211.17.

1870, January 5th.—By request I attended a meeting in St. George, it was held in the Baptist Church, and presided over by Mr. B. Bell, President of the Society. The ministers of this Town are cordial supporters of the Bible Society, hence the prosperity enjoyed here. Proceeds from this Branch \$240.00. St. Mary's Branch was visited on the 13th January, it was raining when I left Toronto, and the deep snow at St. Mary's made us unpleasantly anxious in reference to the meeting; but a house full in the Town Hall banished our fears, and the enthusiasm of the audience, the excellence of speeches from brethren, the animating influence of the presence of the St. Mary's Presbytery of the Canada Presbyterian Church, the

geniality and ability of the President, the Rev. D. Smith, and the cheering financial results made all end well. Receipts, \$65.51. We had much pleasure in spending a night under the roof of the Rev. Dr. Waters, with whom in former years we had enjoyed some of the pleasures of intellectual toil.

On the 18th January, I attended the anniversary of the Kingston auxiliary. Of this pleasing meeting notice was given in the *Recorder* for January. Being under engagement to attend the annual meeting of the Ottawa Auxiliary, on Thursday, the 20th instant, I was obliged to secure the soft side of a plank, during part of the night, at the Kingston station in order to reach the metropolis in due time. This delightful anniversary which was fully reported in the Ottawa papers, was also briefly noticed in our little journal for January. In order to meet the wishes of my Kingston friends, I returned to the venerable city on the Friday, and arrived just in time to take part in the anniversary of the French Canadian Missionary Society. Sunday and Monday, the 23rd and 24th found me in Cobourg, I preached on the Sabbath evening in the Church of the Rev. Mr. Pollard, to a large congregation, and on Monday evening attended the anniversary of the Society in the Church of the Rev. Mr. Laing. There was a full house—an able report from the Secretary, Mr. H. Hough, and a meeting of the most interesting character. Dr. Beatty the President presided. Remittance from Cobourg, \$273.89.

Belleville, where I spent three of the most useful years of my ministry, was visited on the 22nd February. I left Toronto by early train that day—a day memorable among the coldest days of a Canadian winter. Notwithstanding the severity of the weather, we had in the Town Hall, an unusually large congregation and it was well sustained by resident ministers. Amount received at the Depository, \$309.67. The Report which was prepared and read by the Secretary, Mr. J. Flint, a young barrister of the Town, was a very able one. Talent cannot be employed in a better cause than the advocacy of the Bible Society. The President, Mr. McAnnany, conducted the business of the meeting. The irregularity of the trains robbed me of a night's rest. After some two hours' sleep, a gentle call from my considerate host, Mr. McAnnany, aroused me in time to catch a western-bound train, so I reached home the following day in time to resume office work.

March 2nd found me, as the result of an urgent request, at Elora. This Branch is second to none in its liberal givings. The meeting was held in the church of the Rev. Jas. Middlemiss, the President, who ably filled the chair. The meeting had also the countenance and advocacy of the resident ministers. The weather was against us, yet the congregation was good and appreciative, and the tone and results of the services very gratifying. One noticeable feature, of a very pleasing character, was associated with this evening. The anniversary was the 25th of the Elora Branch, and also the 25th anniversary of the uninterrupted services of its faithful and beloved Secretary, Mr. Joseph Carder. More than one of the speakers made graceful allusion to this fact, which was evidently well received by the assembled audience. May God long preserve this true friend of the Bible Society. I cannot speak too highly of the kind attentions of Mr. and Mrs. Middlemiss in their comfortable manse, one of the most comfortable I have seen, and which is a credit to his congregation. Financial results, \$240.88.

Claremont Branch.—The severity of the weather prevented one of my colleagues from visiting, at the date intended, this Branch. I ventured, the day after that stormy Sabbath, to meet a request, and try to get there. I succeeded in reaching the village, but found that such was the effect of the storm on the previous day, the 13th March, that little hope of an audience was entertained. In some of the churches, *not one* was found on the Sabbath. However, friends circulated the appointment, and the Baptist Church was nearly filled. The tried friend of the Society, President Bennet, was in his place. The resident ministers gave good speeches; the people gave a good collection. This is a noble branch, and well sustained its reputation. Contributions, \$95.81. To this we have to add the gratifying fact that an

anonymous friend has since forwarded a donation of \$100, thus making the receipts from Claremont Branch \$195.81. I was here favoured with the cordial hospitality of Mr. Eldon, the interested Secretary of the Branch.

On the 22nd March I had the pleasure of attending the excellent anniversary of the London Auxiliary. Our readers will find a notice of this meeting in the *Bible Recorder* for March.

The last meeting, connected with the current Bible year, in which I had the privilege of taking part, was at Scarboro', on the 8th April. Severe weather on two former occasions, compelled a postponement of the anniversary of this Branch. The following facts will show that you need not travel far for variety of climate in "this Canada of ours." The stage forgot to call for me on the afternoon of the foregoing day. Just in time, I got on board a waggon that was starting for Scarboro'. When we left the city, the dust was flying in the streets. Nine miles of rough locomotion brought us to "Scarboro' Heights," where we found *not dust, but four feet of snow*. Here our waggon was exchanged for the owner's sleigh. Five miles brought us to cross roads, at which my friend must proceed in a straight course; I must take the road to the right, and a mile or more would bring me to the Presbyterian Church, in which the meeting was being held. At 8 P.M., I received this information; he further informing me that the flood had carried away the bridge, or he would drive me up to the Church.

I turned to the right, as directed, and in a few moments saw—by the light of the moon—that the bridge was completely gone, and a broad and rapid stream occupied its place. Some rails, which had floated down, were arrested by blocks of ice grounded in the stream. I could see the lights in the church, and was determined to get there if possible. I was alone. I could swim. I prayed, and then made the effort to cross. I selected the best rail I could find. Placing this on two pieces of ice, I made my way over to the ice on the further end of my rail. Having accomplished this, and then pulled my frail bridge after me, and extending it to the next piece of grounded ice, I got along. But alas, my *fragile abutments* at last gave way, and I was plunged into the deepest part of the stream, nearly up to my waist. I waded out, walked briskly to the church, was welcomed, made a speech, went home with the Rev. Mr. Fletcher, who promptly furnished me with a change of raiment; was treated to an invigorating cup of tea by his very kind sister; slept soundly in a comfortable bed in the manse; and returned by rail from Scarboro' station the next day, only a little the worse for my adventure, but still firm in my principle that nothing but an impossibility should prevent a minister from meeting an engagement. Donations from Scarboro', \$130.00.

The total amount furnished by these Branches, as nearly as I can ascertain, including the Cities of Kingston and London, irrespective of their Branches, but not including Ottawa, which is beyond the limits of the Upper Canada Bible Society, is in excess of \$3000.00.

Some of the collections at the public meetings exhibited handsome advance. Georgetown and St. Mary's trebled. Port Hope nearly quadrupled; and all, with scarcely an exception, presented improvement. I think we should attach importance to the financial results of the public meetings.

Many reflections arise in connection with my first experience in this department of duty. But I have not space to impress them. I may, however, say—1. The people are true to the great Bible cause.

2. That the times demand fidelity to it, and greater exertion, in order to the world-wide dissemination of God's own word.

3. The wars of the old world should stimulate the new world to give the Book to all, that in it they may learn that the great message of its pages is "On Earth Peace."

4. The Union of the Churches is to be accomplished by the Bible and Bible Societies.
