

present our readers with a valuable issue. It contains a catalogue of the most important. Cana-

dian books in print. These are not all printed in Canada, many being published by houses in the United States and some in Great Britain. But all the books contained in the list are worthy of being in every public and private library in Canada.

Every volume is written by a Canadian author or is of especial interest to Canadian readers. We do not claim the list to be complete. It was impossible to make it entirely accurate on account of the variety of sources from which the information had to be gleaned, no such record having ever been published before. But in spite of the labor required to make this record, we feel that the appreciation of our readers will be a full recompense. We shall be glad to receive additions regularly from any publishing

house, and every new book will be recorded in these columns. We shall be pleased also to receive notice of omissions, and these shall be willingly published. In this way a fuller and more complete catalogue may be issued at some future day.

It was thought advisable to omit all minor educational works, music books, and law books. Some of the regular Look houses, such as the Toronto News Co., and The Methodist Book and Publishing House, publish numerous musle books of interest to the trade. Several firms in Toronto, Montreal, and elsewhere have large catalogues of purely educational works, but of these the bookseller can easily procure information. On this account they were omitted, and also because most of these works were of Provincial rather than Dominion interest. The Carswell Co. of this city publish a long list of books by eminent Canadian lawyers and jurists, and each province has a publisher of its law Looks, reports, etc. In some cases these are indiented, but all such lists were omitted because of their provincial character.

In the list we publish this month will be found a large number of books marked with an asterisk. These were taken from the extensive catalogue of American books issued by Robert Clarke & Co., Cincinnati, U.S.A. These by no means compose all the books concerning Canada procurable from this firm. They have a large number of books which are hard to procure, but only the latest publications have been mentioned. Their catalogue can be procured for fifty cents.

There is no reason for any Canadian to feel ashamed of the list of books which have been produced by our numerous writers of poetry, fiction, history, science and religion. The past has been worthy and there is no valid reason why the future of Canadian books should not be a brilliant one. But the bookseller should attempt to increase the demand for patriotic and national literature. The book reading public is much like an infant-it takes the food that others give it. If the booksellers offer the reading public Canadian books and point out their merit, the latter will be Lought and read. Alded by numerous broad-minded men in this city and elsewhere we have done what we could to bring Canadian literature to the front-a place it has not occupied up to the present. We now leave the matter in the hands of the Canadian booksellers.

### ON THE LOOK OUT.

The success'ul merchant is always on the look-out for-for what? For everything. There are hundreds of chances for extending business and increasing sales which never come to the man who stands behind the counter with h's arms folded walting for customers. These only come to the live man who hustles for trade everywhere, anywhere, and at all times. As the sallor in the rigging, with his eyes looking far out over the sea, he watches for coming chances and opportunities which give advantages. A steady eye, a concentrated attention, a cool head-all these are necessary to discern the future and to profit by it.

Then when a storm is brewing, and the weather grows hard, the captain from a good position is on the lookout. He is watching the breakers, their direction and their force. He furls his sails, and he sees that his good ship goes slowly, and all risks are avoided. So with the merchant. When trade becomes depressed through no fault of his, he must slacken speed. He must retreach must slacken speed. He must retrench in various ways, avoid taking risks, and conserve his resources. When the storm strikes he must be prepared for it, and he will not then be thrown on his beamends.

Even on a smooth, glassy sea, the captain never ceases to watch for danger. The merchant who goes on expanding his trade and increasing his business in various ways should never cease to look for signs which warn of coming thunder clouds. He should take full advantage of present prosperity, but never he fulled to sleep by smooth gliding, surface-deep prosperity.

### THE MONTH OF MAY,

The merry month of May will be a quiet one in regard to school books, stationery, and fancy goods. But the live retailer will bring his fishing tackle well to the front, and the small boy and the big man will take due notice thereof. He will show a huge array of marbles, allies, tops, firecrackers, and miniature fireworks for the small boy's beneflt, and the climax of the demand will be reached on the 24th of May. He will look well after his stock of summer novels, for the drovey air will soon be having its effect, and the dog days, when hammocking, yachting, and skiff gliding will be indulged in, are not far distant.

### TO THE INSURANCE COMPANIES.

O time can be mentioned when merchant is in a worse condition and more in need of kindly attention than just after he has lost a few thousand dollars by fire. Very few men carry an insurance equal to more than half their stock, and when the whole stock is destroyed they are in exceedingly straitened circumstances. The insurance seldom if ever covers the entire loss. This is such a well-recognized fact that when a retail merchant loses by fire, his creditors at once want a statement of his affairs, and immediately begin to press him for prompt payment. And It is just here that an insurance company can render him kindly aid by prompt payment of the money to which he is entitled on their policy. Old debts must be paid and new and larger ones contracted, and the merchant needs the cash and that at once. The insurance company which uses every pretext to delay payment is doing perhaps a greater injury than it imagines. A delay of serious length may mean a destruction of his business, by preventing him from holding his trade by a prompt replacement of his stock. A man's goodwill, if interrupted for two months, is much deteriorated in value, and this deficit is hard to supply, or re-create. Of course, the insurance company has a right to satisfy itself that no suspicious circumstances exist, and to have time to do this In. But it should hasten matters as much as possible, as their want of promptness may cause some of the evils mentioned. It is said that some insurance companies delay payments as long as possible to gain the slight interest that will thus accrue in thirty or sixty days. But a gain of this proportion to them may mean a loss of a hundred times as much to the merchant. Insurance companies should consider these facts and make payments as promptly as possible consistent with the circumstances of the case.

### MONTREAL NEWS

THE month is an interim one in the fancy goods and stationery trade, but all the houses will have their new lines in stock during the course of the next month, and they anticipate a good trade from present indications. In toilet articles, etc., some entirely new ideas are to be exploited, and promise to meet with great favor. Sporting goods naturally meet with a brisk call in anticipation of the ensuing season, in fact this is the only line which shows any actual activity at present.

The Sabiston Company have—secured the contracts for fully 90 per cent, of the canned goods and other labels of a similar nature to be turned out in Canada during the next fail.

The Montreat I mying card Co, are now engaged on their new lines of goods, and

will offer to the wholesalers during June their samples of new goods.

Hollier & Hecker, dealers in lines of lancy hardware, specialties, etc., have moved from their old premises in the Bourn block in St. James street to 750 Craig street.

Mr. P. Kelly, the well-known music music dealer, has moved from his old premises, 154 St. Antoine street, to a new and larger store at the corner of St. Antoine and Inspector streets. His greatest lift this month is Jim Thornton's latest song, "The Man Who Brought Columbus Over Here," which is having a very large run.

Cadien & Derome, stationers, on Notre Dame street, are gradually getting their premises into shape after the fire which visited them on the 21st of the month. They have been clearing out a lot of their damaged stock at a considerable reduction.

Cameron, Currie & Co. are offering a lot of novelties this spring. A patent envelope opener which is bound to obviate a lot of profanity and annoyance to merchants who adopt the new idea is one of the intest. It consists of a simple triangular card which is inserted in each envelope, one of the points protruding. All that is required to open the envelope is simply to grasp this point and pull out the eard. It can be utilized also as an advertisement, as anything could be printed on the eard if so desired.

TL Reinhart Manufacturing Company will offer for this fall's trade an entirely new line of goods. Instead of the plush which has been so popular of late, celluloid, felt, and finished oak are to be the range for toilet receptacles, etc. They are running also extensively in solid leather goods for travelling cases. The celluloid felt or oak as the case may be is drawn over wood, and is stamped or colored to suit all tastes. The goods finished in felt, besides being very handsome, are likely to become great favorites owing to the comparative cheapness of the stock from which they are made. celluloid lines conce a little higher than those finished in plush, but this fact is not likely to check the demand in the estimation of fancy goods dealers. other high-priced and attractive line consists of goods made up from embossed or morrocco leather, with solid metal sides. Some of these of chased or engraved silver are really handsome, and are sure to become popular, owing to their rich look. Of course plush goods are not entirely done away with, for several novelties made from Rtock kind will be on the market also. The Reinhart Company are now taking orders from wholesalers, and the latter will likely have the new goods on the market in the course of a month or so.

Porter, Tesker & Co. report a rushing demand for fishing tackle and other lines of sporting goods. They have had great success this spring with their line of paper mache dolls, which are practically unbreakable and therefore economical. The mould in which the doll is pressed requires a pressure of ten tons.

John Lovell & Co. commenced work on their Montreal city directory on the 1st of May, and hope to have it out by the end of the month.

A new line of samples which have been attracting considerable attention are those of John W. Lovell, of New York, late vice-president of the United States Book Company. They comprise twolve or more books, and are really high examples of the bookbinders' art.

Cameron, Currie & Co. are putting on the market a new and striking line of eard stock which is sure to attract attention. It consists of thin sheets of ordinary maple wood, the fine growth of which, after proper pollshing, looks for all the world like grained silk. Business cards, etc., made from this should be strikingly handsome in appearance. Another line of similar goods is made of transparent rice gelatine, on which fine rice powder is blown, the border having a fine luce-like tracery. This is sure to turn out some delicate looking cards, Another feature is a line of embossed society cards, the firm carrying a complete assortment with the crests of every society, secret or otherwise, in stock.

According to Mr. Brophy, of the Montreal News Company, the goods of the National Publishing Company, of Toronto are one of the best selling lines on the market. The complete selection of authors which they offer is the great attraction in their case.

Samples of calendar chromos and wood cuts for 1894 are being received already by many of the stationery houses. Cameron, Currie & Co. have already a complete list on hand, and some of the dedesigns are artistic to a degree.

The Montreal News Company have had a representative of theirs on a tour through the Maritime Provinces recently. He has just returned, and reports that trade prospects down there are fairly encouraging to western news dealers and publishers generally. New England firms have in the past largely controlled the trade, but their monopoly is to have a serious attack during the coming year.

Mr. Currie, of Cameron, Currie & Co., returned from England during the month. He visited all the leading centres, and has made arrangements for a lot of the latest notions which have been tickling the fancy of the public over there of late.

Messrs. J. C. Wilson & Co. are offering some entirely new lines of paper lags to the trade just now. They have already on the market a line of "standard" square bags, which they claim are more easily filled, and make as neat a package as anything on the market. The popular lines appear to be the "Automatic Standard," "Automatic Eclipse," and "Automatic Mikado," self-opening paper bags. The first is made from No. I bleached manilla stock, the second from No. I manilla, and the third in fancy colored striped manilla paper. They are all done up in packages of 500,

### CURRENT) READING.

HE Cosmopolitan is leading with its most exquisite halftone engravings. A magazine with such delicate and artistle illustrations must necessarily grow popular. The May number of this popular magazine contains lis usual quota of high class articles. A short story of adventure by Gilbert Parker will interest Canadians. A foot-note in the magazine gives the following particulars concerning this talented writer. Mr. Gilbert Parker is a Canadian by birth, but he has visited, in pursuit of material for his admirable short stories. most of the recondite portions of the globe-the Hawailan Islands, New Zealand, the South Sea Islands, and Aus tralia. In the last named country he was associate editor of the Sydney Morning Heraid and The Times. As might have been expected from his constant travels, his tales breathe a vigorous out-of-door atmosphere of freedom and adventure. His latest and probably most successful field has been the Hudson Bay lands, the picturesque life and history of which have given him a fresh and fertile ground work for the volume of short stories, "Pierre and His People." He has published three other books of fiction and travel, and is a constant contributor to the English periodicals. Mr. Parker has just left New York for his present home in England after a stay which has brought him many friends and well-wish-

The St. John's College Magazine, Winnipeg, does not seem to be receiving the encouragement it should. tI is well edited, nevertheless.

The Arcadia was a good magazine; but it was Canadian, and hence had to die. The good die young.

Hamlin Garland's article on "The Future of Fiction," in the April Arena, was worthy of him.

E. Pauline Johnson, Canada's Indian poetess, is a contributor to the May Outing. She talks of fresh air. Grace E. Denison, another well-known Canadian writer, continues her story, "Through Erla Awheel."

Godey's Magazine for May contains a beautiful water-color portrait of Mrs. Potter Palmer. 'The Home' department is conducted by Mrs. Henry Ward Beecher.

The Review of Reviews for May will be found as strikingly original and individual in its character as any previous issues of this enterprising periodical. It strikes out into a fresh field with Mr. Stead's magnificent character sketch of Frederick Selous, the great African traveller and hunter—the greatest Nimrod, in fact, that this world has ever produced. Mr. Stead makes a marvellously interesting chapter of exploits with ilons, elephants, and other large game in the

heart of Africa, and also shows in his own peculiar virile and fascinating way how vitally the work of a great hunter like Scious may associate itself with the advance of civilization, and with the enlightenment of the Dark Continent.

A number of interesting engravings relating to the art department of the Columbian Exposition, appear in The Art Interchange for May. Among them is a portrait of the handsome director, Mr. Halsey C. Ives. The other Illustrations include decorative designs relating to all the applied arts-china painting, embroidery, and oil and water color painting. Among these "A Convention of Frogs" for jardinlere, some charming forget-me-not designs for sugar bowl, conventional designs for china service. sketches of furniture and houses, are most conspicuous for their originality and beauty. Among the paintings in color which accompany this issue are two which are likely to attract attention. "A Perilous Plight," showing a capital study of pug dogs, and "An Afternoon Call," a very protty figure sketch. The text includes two extremely clever things, a very bright story by Polly King, and a London Letter. The issue is replete with articles and 11lustrations which appeal to amateur artists and to those who are interested in beautifying the home. The May issue, with its three colored supplements, can be had of all newsdealers, at 35 cents.

A notable feature of Outing for May is the first of a series of articles upon the giants of the American equine world, under the title of "Queens of the Trotting Track." From the days of fames Lady Suffolk down to the reign of peerless Nancy Hanks, all record-breaking performances and other bits of horse-lore are cleverly woven into a clear and instructive article.

### THE UNITED STATES BOOK CO'Y.

HARLES W. Gould, receiver for the United States Book Company, who, at a special term of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, held March 30, was empowered by order of Judge A. R. Lawrence to "conduct and carry on all the business of the United States Book Company and its subsidiary companies," has just issued the following circular:

"As receiver of the United States Book Company and its subsidiary companies, I have been ordered by the Supreme Court of the State of New York to continue the business of publishing and selling books. I shall have the assistance of John M. Forbes, Erq., Vice-President and General Manager of United States Book Company, and of the managers of the different departments and the sabsidiary companies.

"The stock on hand is ample; the lines are complete and will be kept so. Prices and discounts will remain as here-tolore.

"The reports which have been spread abroad regarding the selling of large quantities of books at rulnous prices are erroncous. While quantities have been sold, they have been in the nature of job lots only. New catalogues are in preparation and will shortly be sent to the trade. New books will be announced from time to time.

"Lovell, Coryell & Co. will have the line of gilt top presentation sets and various other new books. Hovendon Co. will have a number of popular sets and various new two-volume sets like those which proved so salable last year; also a new and very attractive line of gilt top 12mos. The grade of work will be sustained and improved throughout the lines.

"On May 1 the offices and selesrooms of all the subsidiary companies will be removed to Nos. 5 and 7 East 18th street, the present offices of the United States Book Company, where samples will be kept, while the stock of goods will be removed to Williamsburg, L. I., corner North 11th and Berry streets. All shipping will be done from Williamsburg, and all goods returned must be sent there as also all packages for enclosure.

"On May 1 the retail, jobbing and publishing departments of the United States Book Company will be discontinued. Its publications will be issued in future by Lovell, Coryell & Co. and Hovendon Co., as shown in their respective catalogues. All orders for these books should be addressed to the company publishing them. The organization and business of the subsidiary companies will be preserved, and after May 1 all orders should be addressed to the individual companies at 5 and 7 East 16th street.

William Briggs has just based a work, "Affoat for Eternity," a Pligrim's Progress for the Times, by Rev. J. B. Kennedy. The author is a Baptist minister at Norwich, Ont., and is said to be a deep thinker and to wield a versatile pen.

Messrs, Drysdale & Co., of Montreal, are putting several new and interesting works on the market this month. Among the more notable is "Lambs in the Fold," a new theological work by the Rev. Dr. Thompson, o Sarnia.

Two readable books to be published in May by the National Publishing Co. are "The Last Tenant," by B. L. Fargeon, and "Baron Montex," by A. C. Gunter. The latter author is especially well known and appreciated in Canada.

In about two weeks the Methodist Book Room will issue II, R. Young's latest book. "Stories from Indian Wigwams and Northern Compiless." It has been published quite resently in England and the United States. The book is well illustrated, and will no doubt take well, considering this and the success which the former works of this Canadian author have had. They also control the cloth edition of Robert Louis Stevenson's latest book, "Island Night's Entertainments." The book is having a good sale, but the author seems to have trusted too much to his reputation with regard to this book.

Divines and theologians generally are devoting considerable attention to a collection of writings entitled "Sunday Alternoon Addresses," which are now on the market here. They have been delivered at Queen's college by some of the leading theologians of Canada, the doctrines and teachings laid down are in many instances of a breezy kind, occasioning both favorable and adverse comment. It is evident from these that the last has not been heard of the collection in question. It is for safe at all book stores, Messes, Drysdale & Co., Montreal, being the agents.

The recent issues by The National Publishing Co. are worthy of inspection. They are: "Wolfenberg," by William Black, paper, 75c.; "The Sorceress," by Mrs. Ollphant, paper, 50c.; "The Last Sentence," by Maxwell Grey, author of "The Slience of Dean Maltland," paper, 50c.; "Kitty's Father," by Frank Barrett, paper, 50c.; "Dearest," by Mrs. Forrester, paper, 50c.; "Orlole's Daughter," by Jessie Fothergill, author of "The First Violin."

John Lovell & Co. will bring out in June two new novels by Canadian authoresses. One of them, "When Love was Young," is by Miss Marjorle MacMurchy, of Toronto, and the other, "Love's Divine Alchemey," by Miss E. Augusta McLennen. This firm have a decided novelty in the bookbinding line which is turned out by John D. Lovelt of New York. It is the work of a ma-

chine entitled, "A perfect binder," which will turn out a book bound without the use of either wire or thread. It is not of a flimsy character either, for the leaves cannot be pulled out and the book can be folded back without straining the cover in any way. The contrivance is a patent of Mr. Charles II. Lovell, the son of Mr. John Lovell of Montreal.

" Helen Frances Peachey, daughter of a clergyman in Canbury, Wilts, England, met young Browne, of Pellington, Scott & Co., of Calcutta, at a tennis tournament. A year later Miss Peachly was consigned to India, under proper escort, and shortly after her arrival she became Mrs. Browne. This is the prelude, as it were, of Sara Jeanette Duncan's new story. 

SSORTING orders are quiet with booksellers and goods dealers. Stationers' sundries are more active, but movement, though general, is not extensive. Orders for fall delivery in almost every class of goods are very promising. One traveller who carried Bibles and such like goods took orders amounting to over \$10,000 in four weeks. Fancy goods for tall delivery are also as active as Bibles, Christmas cards and booklets. Payments are only fair, as the country trade seems to be slower than usual, and retailers experience difficulty in meeting their bills promptly.

The stationery contract for the corporation of Toronto has been awarded to the Copp. Chirk Co.

Buntin, Gillies & Co., Hamilton, advertise Stephens' Ink, of which they have received a large shipment per SS. Brazilian.

Bibles are being pushed by the Copp, Ciark Co. They carry the Oxford, Collins', Eyre & Sportiswoode's and Walker's.

The Middleton paper fasteners seem to have found considerable favor with the trade. Dealers who have tried them report them satisfactory.

The Union Jack in tissue paper is a novelty handled by the Copp, Clark Co. As a decoration they cannot be excelled and the cost but't worth mentioning.

Declers who use advertising cuts should correspond with Cooper's Electro Agency in this city. They have some cuts especially suitable to the stationery and fancy goods trade.

It is rumored that a change in one of Toronto's large book firms will soon be announced. It will be a merely nominal change.

An Ink Erosing Electrosine Pencil, which croses ink in two seconds, is sold by the Monroe Eraser Mig. Co., at its Canadian agency, 222 Division street, Kingston.

W. J. Gage & Co have just finished stock taking, and will issue at once a list of clearances. The five dealer who desires snaps will virte for this list, Only a few buyers can be favored with these chances.

The Endeavor Herald Co., of 18 and 20 Bay street, publish Hunt's Sunday School Record, a book for recording the attendance, offerings, etc., of each class in the Sunday school. It has 320 pages, and sells for \$2,50

C M Taylor & Co. are showing a beau titul line of Japanese antimony—goods and lienares brass goods. The Benares goods include trays, vases, bells, etc. The Japanese goods include pin trays, pen trays, card trays, salvers, etc. These are very showy goods, and the prices are quite reasonable. The designs are very chaste, and the finish is indicative of first-class workmanship. They are also showing a nice line of glass perfume bottles with sliver network coverings. These are excellent goods.

Rubler stamp ink pads and automatic shading pens and inks are new lines shown by The Brown Bros. The pens are carried in eight sizes. No live retail merchant can get along without a set of these.

Flags are being sold by them at prices which cause a certain amount of ency in their competitors.

Castell Bros., of London, Eng., publish a natty line of booklets and toy looks for this season's trade. The Copp. Ciark Co. will show samples this month. Their calendars and booklets are much superior in design to those shown in previous seasons. Some booklets in roan and calf are exceedingly artistic and desirable. The toy books are novel.



All orders for stocking trade with be filled prompting. Samples of new linen goods of various kinds are to hand, and some very new ideas and patterns are shown.

To state that a wholesale bookseller had struck a new idea would be to injure the reputation possessed by this journal for veracity. But a new line of bookbindings shown by W. J. Gage & Co. has such a delicious freshness that it seems like a new idea. They are showing a line of presentation books in beautiful bindings, in a great and surprising variety, and at prices which are start line. An 18mo, line includes bindings in brocade cloth, French morocco, balf and full polished morocco, and Person calf. The line can be bought at less than 50 cents per volume, and includes such well

known series as Patterson's Midget Library, Canterbury Series, Douglas' American authors, Routledge's Pocket Library, Patterson's New England Series, Dickens' Christmas Stories, etc. In 12mo. size the same variety of exquisite bindings are shown, and includes the following series: Camelot Classics, Autocrat Series (Oliver Wendell Holmes' works), Hawthorne's works, Will Carleton's Poems, Wilson's Tales of the Border, etc. These books are put up in sets of two in a neatly covered box. His fellow employees evinced their warm irlendship on the evo of his marriage by presenting him with a handsome secretary. Mr. Taylor presented his pretty bride with n sliver tea set in token of the high esteem in which Mr. Bell is held by his ememplovers.

Duties upon raw materials higher than the duty upon their manufactured product was the complaint of the bookbinders, publishers and printers when they met Hon. Mackenzie Bowell and Hon. G. E. Foster in the Toronto Board of Trade on the 4th lnst. They asked relief from the high duties upon marble paper, certain fine leathers, mill board, cloth and other articles entering into book-making and which are not manufactured in Canada. They say the tariff takes as much from them as it gives to them. They do not complain about the duty on white paper, because they explain that industry in Canada gives employment to a great many men. To illustrate the effect of the tariff upon Canadian book-making it was said yesterday by one of the deputation that books can be sent to England, bound there, and returned, paying the duty, and cost less than it would cost to bind them in Canada. The deputation was composed of W. W. Copp. R. A. Brown, G. M. Rose, W. J. Gage, J. F. Lills, A. F. Rutter, D. A. Rose, W. A. Sheppard, James Murray and H. C. Me. LIND.

Other articles are numerous and well worthy of perusal. Now that The Lake has disappeared dealers can devote their time to pushing the remaining Canadian magazines. Perhaps some day the people of Canada will take a notion to patronize home productions with the same vigor as they now patronize those of Engiand and the United States.

GERFAUT is the latest French novel from the press of Laird & Lee, Chicago. The author is the well-known Charles De Barnard. The book is illustrated with eight half tones from the original etchings, and this adds much to the appearance of this well-printed paper-bound

volume. The story is a somewhat dramatic tale of France in 1882. The tale is interesting, the characters simple but clear, the details abounding in scattmental episodes, and the interest well sustained. The translator has done his work well. Paper, 50c.

THE MASTER OF ST. BENEDICT'S, by Alan St. Aubyn, was published some time ago by Rand, McNally & Co.. Around the old colleges of Merrie England have been enacted many thrilling struggles for life, fame, yea, even love. Out of these old tales and historic events have been woven manny stories which have pleased and stirred many an English and many a foreign heart. Anthony Rae began life on a bleak Yorkshire moor, following the plow over his father's fields. His course upwards was the well-known yet difficult route-grammar school, university, poverty through long years, but at last reward. The Master of St. Benedict's, with his bitter-sweet experience, is a prominent figure in this assemblage of characters, which nevertheless contains a number of younger and more hopeful personages. It is a tale of life, bright, cheerlui and pleasing. Globe Library; paper, 25 cents.

THE CHILD OF THE PARISH, by Marie Von Ebner-Eschenbach. Translated from the German by Mary A. Robinson. The author of this novel stands in the highest rank of living woman writers in Germany. Her works are very popular, and have earned the highest praise of critical readers. The Child of the Parish is a power-ul original story, strong in delineation of character, healthy in tone, and artistic in local coloring, somewhat in the style of "Oliver Twist," by Charles Dickens, and "No Relations," by Hector Malot. The scene is laid in a Moravian village, and both the scenery and the inhabitants are drawn with the fidelity of an old Dutch picture. The hero, who grows up under the worst influences, unjustly treated, despised and trodden under foot by all except the eccentric old schoolmaster, by sheer force of character and through love of his sister develops into a strong, capable, honorable man. MISTRESS BRANICAN is a new novel by that famous man, Jules Verne. The Rose Publishing Co. have a paper edition, with a very neat cover, to retail at 50 cents. It is translated by A. Estoclet, and is accompanied by many illustrations by L. Bennett. John Branican was a captain, whose good ship, Franklin, left in 1875 the port of San Diego in California, for a cruise across the northern seas of the Pacific. This noble sailor lest behind him a wife and a babe nine months of age. Within a few weeks after his departure the babe was drowned, and the mother lost her reason. Complications follow. John becomes a wanderer on the face of the earth, and his

wife soon afterwards regains her reason and begins to search for him. The tale is full of thrilling incidents, readered doubly striking by the admirable illustrations.

KITTY'S FATHER, by Frank Barrett, author of "The Admiral Lady Biddy Fane," is published in paper, 50 cents, by the National Publishing Co. Mr. Barreit's new story is distinguished by the characteristic excellencies which render his wor kot extraordinary interest. There is an exciting narrative, continually worked up into strong and original situations; there is an absorbing mystery, which from time to time becomes entaugled in new and unexpected complications, and the story ends in a startling and powerful denouement. The frequency of strong situations, and the original developments of the mystery, stamp the story as one that cannot fail to arouse an intense interest on the part of every novel render.

DEAREST is one of the new publications of the National Publishing Co., and is by Mrs. Forrester, author of "Viva," "Of the World, Worldly," etc. Dearest is a novel in Mrs. Forrester's earlier and better manner. The story, which is simply and naturally told, narrates the experfences of a young girl in subjection to an obnoxious governess, and to a mother who favors her elder daughters and treats the deliant one harshly. The young girl's cause is taken up by, a ctep-brother whom the mother fears, and a new governess comes upon the scene to make interesting complications in the family circle, and change the situation of the once haplens hat now 'triumphant Cinderella. "Dearest" is one of the most charming novels of the day and is sure to win its way to succens.

THE SORCERESS by Mrs. Oliphant, is a charming tale of domestic life. Passionate love and passionate sorrow with the Sorcerens, who was only a woman, between. Careless man, jealous woman and the conventionalities of society are woven in with the love and sorrow of life's experiences, until the sympathy of the most indifferent reader is drawn out to the full. The scene opens with a famlly at a mineral spring resort in Germany, but the tale is cosentially Faglish, and closes in that world of society -London. The author is often sarcastic, nearly always critical. That Canada is forty times the size of England, Scotland, and Wales, and fifteen times the size of the German Empire, may not startle any native Britlsher, but it should lead him to reflect as to the possibilities of this young country. THE LAST SENTENCE is a new work by Maxwell Grey, the author of "The Silence of Dean Maitland," and will, naturally enough, excite considerable interest in the world of novel readers. "The Last Sentence" is an exceedingly interesting story, eleverly told, with many evidences of feminine taste and culture, as well as wide reading on the part of the author. The scene is laid chiefly in Britting, and the picturesque surroundings of the Breton coast are sketched in a fascinating manner which cannot fall to arrest the attention and chain the fancy. The Last Sentence was a Judgment pronounced by an English judge on his own daughter, and he became raving and because compelled by the exigencies of the present legal system to condemn a person whom he knew to be innocent, merely because twelve British citizens of ordinary mental capacity and as absolutely untrained in the laws of evidence as they are little versed in the study of human nature, considered her guilty. She was accused of killing the child to which she had given life. and the man who could clear her was in New Zealand. The situation at the close is of intense and thrilling interest. and even a fortunate ending cannot remove the distrust created concerning even the excellence of man's most perfeet court of justice. ### TRADE CHAT.

T has been decided by the Toronto banks to accept United States silver certificates only at a discount. For the present the discount has been fixed at one per cent. The step has been taken as a protection to Canadian business interests, which certainly would suffer severely were the country to become flooded with depreciated American currency. Toronto's example will undoubtedly be followed throughout the Dominion, but the discount being so slight no serious loss will be entailed for the present. "There are not many silver certificates in circulation in Canada at this time of the year," said one banking man, "but when the summer travel commences there will be many more. The banks here take the ordinary American bills at par from their customers, but will not accept them at all from strangers."

Toronto's comic paper, "Grip," is advertised for sale.

C. F. May, books and stationery, Oshawa, Ont., has been succeeded by F. Warren.

Bernard A. Lapoine has been registered proprietor of the book business of Leprohon & Co., Montreal.

T. N. Hibben & Co., Victoria, B. C., write that they publish "Chinook Jargon." This is a book by a learned Canadian linguist and scholar, Horatio Hale, who resides at Clinton, Ont.

There are 27 miles of store front in Toronto as compared with 13 in Buffalo. Toronto has more than the combined cities of Detroit, Buffalo and Rochester. The competition is something terrific in Toronto.

A tawny orange is the latest thing in ultra fashionable note paper. It is called "Indian gold," and thereon those who would lead the march write in green ink, fastening their envelopes with green scaling wax to maintain the harmony.

E. G. Colbrooke Harvey, poet and journailst, died suddenly at Kingston on April 10th. He came there about ten years ago from Wexford, Ireland, and was the second son of Major Harvey, of Bargey Castle.

The latest novels in the Dollar Series, published by McMillans and sold by The Copp. Clark Co., are "The Marplot," by Sydney Royse Lysaght; "The Real Thing," by Henry James; "A Mere Cypher," by Mary Angela Dickens; "The Last Touches," by Mrs. W. K. Clifford; "A Born Player," by Mary West.

Belden Bros., who ran the business known as the Home Knowledge Association, in this city, falled some time ago. The statement of assets presented to the creditors shows a small surplus over liabilities. The chief creditors are the banks. Outside of these there is only about \$7,000 owing, which is to the local

trade. At a meeting of the creditors, R. G. Beckwith was appointed receiver, and the business will go on as usual. But it is doubtful if it will be continued for any length of time. They attempted to carry on trade in books in ways other than experience pointed out, and hence the natural result—failure.

On the 17th the creditors of Roper, Roper & Co., Nanaimo, mat, and were offered 100 cents on the dollar, with interest at 5 per cent, until paid. It was unanimously agreed to accept the offer. The assets were between \$4 000 and \$5,000; the liabilities \$3,500. Dull times made their creditors urgent.

Considerable dissatis action exists concerning the way the estate of W. McAllister, bookseller and stationer, London, Ont., was disposed of. The assets amounted to \$1,989, and were sold for 27 cents on the dollar, while some claim that it could have brought 70 cents, cents. There is some probability of a law-suit concerning this. What about a National Insolvency Bill?

Johnston Bros & Co., stationers, near the corner of King and Yonge streets, have assigned to John W. Winnett for the benefit of their creditors. They found the business was not paying, and so decided to shut down. The liabilities will be about \$3,000 and the assets about \$2,500. Want of capital was the cause of failure.

The sale of the business of J. K. Cranston, Galt, Ont., has failed through on account of the intending purchaser being disappointed in securing sme moneys. Mr. Cranston is disappointed, as he had almost completed arrangements for entering a new business venture in Toronto. But he has accepted his fate, and is hustling business as usual. He has just issued two new catalogues, one of sporting goods, and the other of school maps, etc.

Winnipeg is to have an important addition to its book and stationery establishments. The new firm will be knows as Hart & McPherson, the principals of which will be Mr. J. A. Hart, inte of Ferguson & Co., of that city, and Mr. Mc-Pherson, who has been for some years the Canadian representative of Wm. Collins, Sons & Co., o. Glasgow. The premises formerly occupied by Furner's millinery establishment on Main street. south of Portage avenue, have been secured by Messrs. Hart & McPherson. A new front has been put in the store and it is now being fitted up in first-class style, to be ready for opening about the middle of May. Mr. Hart, who is a nepheu of Rev. Prof. Hart, is well known to the people of Winnipeg, having for years been connected with the book and stationery business here. His father is widely known as one of the leading stationers in Eastern Canada. Mr. McPherson is also well and favorably known to many Winnineg business houses.

### HOW TO KEEP A STOCK OF MUSIC.

#HE amount of detail and system required to keep and arrange a large sto-k music is understood by but few people dealing in music, and not even imagined outside of the music trade. The nature of the stock creates man'fold difficulties. Almost every work of music that has stood the test of time and become classic and all the inclodles of the day and hour are brought out in almost innumerable styles. BeetLoven's sonatus and symphonies are arranged for four hands and eight bands, for one, two, and four planes, for almost every instrumentation, for beginners, and more advanced scholare and renowned artists. Sheet-music be a very delicate article, easily creased, soiled and shop-worn, and the problem of classifying and shelving it is compilcated by considerations of time, space, popularity, competency of the salesmen, ets. In our day, when music has become so general a study, and the vast musical public keeps itself so thoroughly posted as to new composers and their works. the amount of stock that must be kept on hand is simply appalling.

The old way of shelving foreign musle is to put the same in follos, consisting of two paste-boards, joined with linen strings, one at the bottom, the other at the top. The back of the follo is of linen, which can be enlarged or diminished in size. The follo is filled with music about six to eight inches in height, tied tightly, and placed on the shelf. On the back of each follo hangs a label indicating the contents of the same.

The newer and more universally adopted method of shelving foreign music is to arrange the same in bundles eight to ten inches in height, with a pasteboard at the botton, another on top, hanging over it in from about three inches, upon which the contents are written. The latter manner of shelving music is now more generally in use, because it is simpler and requires less tabor, and also because the music can be taken from the bundles without lifting them to the counter. The old way is merely neater, because when the packages are in the shelves they are more uniform, and give the store a tidler look.

The essential object in arranging music, which is always largely foreign. is to have the system as a mile as posrble and to keep the various arrangements of the same work on a plan that can easily be mastered by any willing and intelligent salesman.

The foreign music is invariably arrang ed according to the composer's name. (An exception to this rule may be the vo al compositions published in England. these are some, mes arranged according to the name of the compositions. The compositions of each individual composet are arranged according to the opus number; if no opus number then in alphabetical order. On nearly every musical composition is printed op. 1, 2, 3, etc. This means such and such a work. Som? composers have reached nearly onus 900. but fortunately not a great many. With composers like Beethoven, Mozart, and others, the sountag are nut together, the variations together, the various compositions together, etc.

This is the plan in which a stock of fore'gn music is generally kept.

The packages in the store contain from one to two copies of each composition, the balance of the stock is kept on the same plan in duplicate in the storeroom. The persons selecting the orders must look in these duplicate bundles; what is not there can be taken from the storeroom, and a sharp lookout must by kept as to when compositions zun out; it happ no very frequently that through the negligence of someone the most satisfile pieces run out. One or two persons are continually kept busy

assorting, arranging, and replacing the music that has been taken out of the bundles and not bought by the customer. It requires an experience of a great many years to be sure that you have a good knowledge of atork. It changes constantly. Every year thousands of compositions are published, and must naturally be kept track of. Another reason why it is difficult to acquire a thorough knowledge of a foreign stock is because the titles of the pieces are in the various languages -- German, French, Italian, etc. -and in a great many instances the titles of the same plezes are very different, the translations being more catchy than literal. Besides, a clerk in a music store must know what he is selling-he must have some idea of music-and music dealers would find it impossible to get along with the indifferent help found even in some of our large book-stores.

American music is arranged on an entirely different plan. Nearly all American music is arranged according to the name of the composition; the composer's name is secondary. It is put away and shelved in follos about four inches high, with the contents marked on the back of each. Though it is much simpler and does not so severely tax the memory of the perions handling it, this way of shelving the music has its drawbacks. For instance, it somebody wishes to see the compositions various of one poser it would be troublesome to show them, because they would be in various places according to alphabet, and would taken good deal of time to get together.

Every music publisher has his own ldea, and in some points a different arrangement of his won publications. These are generally kept separate from other publications. A certain number of copies are put up in packages in shelves, the bulk packed up and marked on the outside with the plate number and put as!de. As soon as the last number is taken from the package it is at once replaced so that it can always be found when looked for. All collections are kept separately, the vocal together, the in-strumental together, all alphabetically All octavo publications are arranged. kept according to the numbers on the title. The person handling these has an alphabetical list, so that when any piece is demanded he can consult his list and number at once.-Publishers' find th-Weekly.

### A FAMILY OF STATIONERS.

The Brown Brothers, Limited, is the new title of the stationery establishment of Brown Brothers, which has been one of the most favorably known institutions of the kind in Canada, and which has now been incorporated into a joint

stock company at their premises, No. 64 66 and 68 King street east, Toronto. This firm does a large business as stationers, bookbinders, manufacturers of

account books and fancy leather goods and publishers o' diaries.

The Brown Brichers come of a family of stationers and bookbinders, their paternal ancestors having been in this business for over a century in the North of

The England. Counder who called the father of the trade, was admitted to the Stationers' in 1774. The Toronto house was lounded by Thomas Brown, the father and grandfather of the members of the new firm, in the year 1846, in the building next door to the one now occupled by the new company. In May, 1856, he was succeeded by his sons. Thomas, John and Richard, practical bookbinders and stationers, whose name and style of "Brown Bros." soon became a verlinb'e trade mark. Thomas Brown, the senior of the three brothers, dled in 1867 at the early age of 39 years, and John, better known as Major Brown of the Queen's Own, who was one of the most popular officers in the militia, died in 1882. Mr. Richard Brown commenced his business career in 1848 with Mr. Maclear, bookseller and stationer, Yonge street, who upon the death of Mr. Scoble in 1854 purchased that business and removed his whole concern to the stand later occupled by Scoble, now W. A. Murray, King street.

For over a century this family has been well known instationery circles-English circles until 1846, and after that date Canadian stationery circles. But besides the mere name and lineage, the present representatives of this historic family possess the staunch busines characteristics which seem to be inherited with the name. The new firm will undoubtedly preserve the trade and honor of the family for another generation. The composition of the new firm was given last month. Richard Brown is President: Robert S. Brown, vice-president; John T. Hornibrook is secretary-treasurer, and H. J. Brown and T. A. Brown are directors. Richard S. Brown, a son of Major Brown s, is manager of the shipping de partment in this huge warehouse. Mr. Hornibrook is an employee of the f'rm's who has spent 26 years in their office.

The premises occupied are four stories in height, as shown by the accompanying illustration, and have a frontage of 56 feet on King street, with a depth extending through the block to Court street.

The upper stories are devoted to manufacturing purposes, and are splendidly equipped with improved machines and appliances run by steam power.

The principal departments of the ware house are paper, stationery, account books, leather goods, dia les, binders' and printers' supplies.

In 1862 they commenced the publication of office and pocket diaries, the business of which has steadily increased and are used from one end of the Dominion to the other.

Brown Bros. have always displayed an enterprising spirit by exhibiting at the various exhibitions, and whenever they have done so they have gained first prizes, diplomas and medals. They still have the books in their possession which

took the first prize at the first exhibition held in Toronto in 1846. They also gained prizes at the Paris Exposition in 1867, Dublin 1865, Centennial 1876, Indian and Colonial 1886, and took a gold medal at the last exhibition held in Toronto in 1892. They have just sent off their splendid exhibit to the World's Fair, Chicago,





### AUTOMATIC INKSTANDS.


There are patent inkstands which are worse than useless; but others again are very useful. The great aim has been to get up an inkstand which would prevent the evaporation of the ink, keep out the dust, and at the same time be simple and inexpensive. In the United States one of the newest and most widely known line of inkstands is made by a firm in Philadelphia, and are now being put on this market through the jobbers by Cooper & Co., 75 Yonge street, who are the Canadian selling agents.

Experts who have examined these inkstands declare them to be models of perfection, and at the same time they are said to be cheaper than most of the other automatic inkstands on the market. ### WOOD PULP.

The production of wood pulp, says the New York Commercial ublictin, for paper-making is a steadily growing industry. When the manufacture of pulp in this country was in its infancy the material was obtained principally from New York State, but as supplies became reduced, and more difficult to reach, manufacturers have sought other fields. Within the past few years the spruce forests of Maine have been drawn upon liberally, and during the past season a syndicate

of manufacturers have made large purchases of timber lands in Canada along the American border for the purpose of cutting the wood and reducing it to pulp. The extensive character of this business has a material influence upon the cost of timber and lumber for commercial purposes, especially as pulp manufacturers have commenced to discover that the best logs serve their purposes more readily than poor stu f. Considerable foreign stock is still imported but the domestic production, it is thought, will soon satisty all demands. Norway is one of the most important pulp-producing countries, and a recent communication gives some idea of the output: The exports of what is called "mechanical wood pulp" were 115,000 tons in 1880, but for last year they were 210,000 tons. Restriction of production was attempted last year, and concurrently there was a decrease of 20,000 tons in the exports, and the trade is now growing in other parts. In addition to the mechanical wood pulp there is also a considerable export of chemical wood pulp from Norway, which is stated as about 28,500 tons for the year.




