

## NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842. Its objects are:

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to strug-

gling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the crection of Churches and parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid struggling congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the Clergy.
 A Pension Fund for aged and infirm Clergy.

5. To provide bibles, prayer books and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-Committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy licensed within the Diocese, the Church-Wardens, and others elected by the Society, being Members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land, the

Investment, and Education Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Bishopric Endowment Fund; (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the Clergy Reserves, and (c) the Endowment Funds of the several missions and congregations.

3. By the Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the

Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of the Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, (e) the interest of the Sustentation Fund.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of congregations should be addressed to the Rev. A. A. Von Iffland, the Secretary, or to Mr. John Hamilton, the Honorary Treasurer of the Diocesan Board.

All other letters and contributions should be addressed to the Rev. M. M. Fothergill, the Secretary, or to Commissary General Irvine, C.B., C.M.G, Quebec, the Honorary Treasurer of the Church Society.

#### ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting was held on Wednesday afternoon, 4th February, in the National School.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese in the chair.

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After prayers the minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Lord Bishop referred to the death of the Rev. Armine W. Mountain, M.A., late Rector of St. Michael's, Quebec, when it was moved by W. G. Wurtele, Esq., seconded by Dr. Montizambert:

"That the members of the Church Society, having recently heard of the death of Rev. Armine W. Mountain, desire to express their unfeigned sorrow, and to place upon record their sense of the great services which Mr. Mountain, formerly the able and active Secretary of the Society, for many years rendered to the Diocese; and the members of the Church Society desire to convey to Mrs. Mountain their sympathy with her in her affliction."—Carried unanimously.

The reports of the Central Board, Diocesan Board and Clergy Trust Committee were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed. The accounts of the Clergy Trust Fund, Local Endowment Fund, the Bishopric Endowment Fund, the Church Society and the Diocesan Board were adopted and ordered to be printed.

A report received from the St. Francis District Association was read by the Secretary and ordered to be printed in the Annual Report.

The Vice-Presidents were re-elected with addition of the name of J. B. Forsyth, Esq., and the omission of the names

of the late Hon. G. Okill Stuart, H. N. Jones and Rev. A. W. Mountain.

One Life Member and four Members of Corporation were elected.

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Notice was given of the following resolutions:

(1.) To amend Art. XIV of the By-laws—"That from and after the first day of January, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five, the scale of payments to the Clergy serving under the Diocesan Board shall be, viz.:—

\$600 per annum for first five years.

700 " ten "
750 " fifteen "
800 " twenty "

- (2.) That from the 1st January, 1885, the Stipends of the Clergy serving under the Diocesan Board be in accordance with the scale proposed by Central Board.
- (3.) That Art. XIV be amended by adding the following words after the sentence not less than \$600 per annum:—
  "Provided, nevertheless, that in the case of Missions possessing Local Endowment Funds, the scale of payments to the Missionary shall be reduced in each instance by the amount of the available revenue of such Endowment Funds; provided, also, that this clause shall not be held to apply to those Missionaries who were in receipt of the revenue of any such Local Endowment Funds at the time of the enactment of this proviso; or of Missionaries in charge of Missions whose Endowment Funds shall have been brought up from \$1,800 or less, to the sum which yields \$200 per annum interest."
- (4.) That Clause 4, Art. XV, be amended by adding the following words thereto:
  - "The present S. P. C. K. Immigrant Chaplain at Levis

shall also be entitled to the benefits conferred by this Bylaw on making the usual payments."

The following resolution was adopted unanimously:
Moved by W. G. Wurtele, Esq., seconded by Rev. A. A.
Von Iffland:

"That in view of the approaching departure of the Reverend Charles Hamilton, M.A., to fill the high and holy office of a Bishop in the Church of God—this Society do place on record its profound sense of the value of the services so assiduously and conscientiously rendered by him in furthering its best interests, and which have so materially aided during the last quarter of a century in promoting its prosperity.

That the Society, while rejoicing for the sake of the Church at large in the wise discernment which has called him to the discharge of duties of wider scope and more extended influence, is keenly sensible of the loss it sustains in being deprived of counsel and assistance ever rendered with unfailing courtesy, yet unbroken firmness.

That the Society desires to unite with this resolution of acknowledgment its earnest prayer for his personal happiness and for the Divine blessing on his future labours."

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# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1884.

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Presented to the Church Society, February 4th, 1885.

The Central Board in presenting their 43rd Annual Report, desires to record with satisfaction the result of the notice in the last report, concerning the various officers of the Society, but very little difficulty has occurred during the year, in consequence of the Clergy and others addressing the proper officers of the various funds of the Society.

The following is a comparative statement of the receipts for the five funds:

#### GENERAL FUND.

(To aid in the erection of Churches and Parsonages, in the support of Schools; in the Education of the children of the Clergy; in the Formation of Local Endowments, and for the general expenses of the management of the Society.)

All the grants during the past year have been paid; also those made during 1883, viz: \$100 to Cookshire Parsonage, and \$100 to the Church at lit's Gaspe; \$778 have been paid towards maintaining schools in various districts, and \$100 have been granted in outlits to two Clergymen.

It is with regret that your Board have to announce a falling off in this year's subscriptions for the General Fund to the amount of \$46.20, and that again was a falling off of the previous year of \$11.86.

EDUCATION OF CHILDREN OF CLERGY FUND.

One hundred dollars has been received from the General Fund in addition to the annual subscriptions. The grants without Mr. Hamilton's generous aid would be quite insufficient to render any efficient aid to the Clergy. A good education being of such importance, the Society would venture to hope that the amount to be voted during the year 1884, be increased.

#### MISSION FUND.

(For the payment of Stipends of the Missionaries in conjunction with the annual grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, Assessments from the Rural Congregations, and a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, the interest of the invested capital of the Sustentation Fund administered by the Diocesan Board.)

A full statement of the Missionary operations, &c., in the Diocese will be found in the report of the Diocesan Board.

It is much to be desired that the Stipends of the Missionary Clergy be increased as speedily as possible, and to aid this desirable object a scheme will be presented for your favourable consideration by which the Stipends of the Missionary Clergy, commencing at six hundred dollars, will from the first of January, be increased fifty dollars per annum every five years, until they reach eight hundred dollars a year.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

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The receipts for the year show an increase of \$3,536.84, but this large increase your Board must remark is due to the handsome Legacy of four thousand dollars, bequeathed to the Fund by the late Mrs. Nairne; otherwise the receipts would show a decrease of \$416.16.

No change has taken place in the number of participants in this Fund, during the past year.

Your board has to report the munificent bequest of Four Thousand Dollars, left for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, by the late Mrs. Nairne, which was paid over by the executor of her will with a promptness which merits the hearty acknowledgments of the Board.

#### RESIGNATION.

Your Board regrets to state, that owing to the pressure of busines engagements, J. B. Forsyth, Esq., the worthy and

esteemed Honorary Treasurer of the Church Society, and Walton Smith, Esq., the equally worthy and esteemed Honorary Treasurer of the Church Book Depository have been compelled to discontinue the valuable help they have each given to the Society for the last two years past.

#### OBITUARY.

Your Board has to deplore the loss of the Hon. Geo. Okill Stuart—late one of the Honorary Counsel of the Society and a Vice-President. Mr. Stuart took an active interest for many years in the work of the Church in the Diocese.

Your Board also regrets to record the loss by death of the Rev. P. H. Mansbridge, for a short time Incumbent of Brompton and Windsor, and who, although he had only lived amongst us for the period of a few months, yet in that short time, had made himself respected and beloved by all with whom he came in contact.

It is also with deep regret that your Board has to record the death of Mr. H. N. Jones, who was a liberal subscriber to the Society's Funds, a Vice-President and a life-member, and for many years Treasurer of the Society. Mr. Jones always took a warm interest in the affairs of the Church generally.

Your board also reports with regret the death of Mrs. Nairne, a regular subscriber to the Society's Funds, and who was ever ready to assist in furthering the Missionary work of the Church.

It is with sorrow that your Board has also to record the death of Mr. J. Pye, for many years a life-member of the Society.

# Diocesan Board of Missions

TO THE

#### CHURCH SOCIETY FOR YEAR 1884.

The following is the abstract of the Revenue Account of the Diocesan Board for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1884:—

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From the above statement, it will be seen that your Board has been enabled for another year to carry on the Missionary work of the Diocese, without calling upon the Clergy Trust Fund for any assistance. The balance in hand at the beginning of 1884, was however almost entirely expended, which shows that the present staff of Clergy can no longer be maintained without drawing upon that fund to the full extent authorized by the By-Law.

The proposal which is to be brought before the Church Society to-day, for an improvement in the scale of payments, will, if adopted, involve an additional outlay. But this much needed increase to the stipends of the Clergy, will, it is hoped, be almost entirely met by the increase in the assessments and the withdrawal of aid from the Missions which have become self-supporting.

These are Stanstead, Durham and Coaticooke, which have ceased to receive any assistance from your Board since the close of the year.

The attainment of an independent position on the part of these Missions is an event upon which the Church is to be congratulated.

Irrespective of the relief thus afforded to the resources of the Board, which can be applied in other directions, it argues the accomplishment of much earnest work by the Clergy who have had charge of those Missions, and at the same time speaks well for the increasing love of the Church's ministrations thus manifested by the people among whom they have labored. It evidences also a feeling of honorable independence in the members of the Church, a determination to assume responsibilities which properly belong to them, a tone of manly christianity upon which your Board feels justified in building the brightest hopes of future success.

Let us wish them all God-speed and a prosperous career, and as we believe that He has guided them thus far on their way, so do we pray that they may continue to be blessed with his fostering care and protection.

These three Missions have elected to remain in connection with the Diocesan Board, in accordance with the terms of the last clause of Canon VII.

The greater independence of the Clergyman as regards financial matters, and the security of efficient ministrations assured to the people, by the maintenance of their connection with the Board, are advantages which we must all be glad to see so highly valued.

Cookshire will become independent on 1st July next—and Bury—which it was hoped would have assumed the

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payments, this much will, it is entire cost of the Church's ministrations, owing to special circumstances, of great weight in the judgment of the Board, will continue to receive aid till 1st Jan., 1886.

Your Board has been engaged, for some time past, in reassessing the congregations in the Diocese for the three years ending 31st Dec., 1887.

A large number have signed the new agreements for increased amounts, and there is every prospect that a considerable addition to the Missionary funds of the Diocese will result from the re-assessment.

Your Board has much pleasure in drawing attention to the fact that a larger amount of assessments has been paid in for 1884, than at the corresponding date for 1883. This improvement, which is only a further advance in a direction, of which more than one step has been previously noticed with satisfaction, exhibits unmistakably the ever increasing faithfulness of the congregations to their engagements, and may also be taken as a proof of the value set upon the labors of the Clergy.

And that these labors deserve to be appreciated, no one will fail to admit, who reads the details of quiet, unostentatious work presented in the reports hereunto appended. To these reports, your Board desires to refer the Society for accounts—more or less full and interesting—of the condition and prospects of the various Missions of the Diocese.

Of the three Missions mentioned as being vacant in the last Report to your Society, Labrador and St. John's, Melbourne, are still without a resident Clergyman. The latter, however, continues to receive what pastoral care the Rector of Melbourne can afford to give, and the former enjoys the services of a catechist appointed by the Bishop.

The following appointments have been made during the past year:—

The Rev. T. L. Ball to the Mission of Brompton and Windsor, rendered vacant by the death of the Rev. II. Mansto special the Board,

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npton and . II. Mansbridge, who, during the one short year he was in charge, earned the love and respect of the people by earnestness and fidelity in the discharge of his sacred duties.

The Rev. R. J. Hewton to the Mission of New Ireland. The Rev. W. C. Bernard to the Mission of Bury, and The Rev. Alfred Taylor to the Mission of St. Sylvester.

The attention of the Church Society is respectfully drawn to the discrepancy existing between Canon VII of the Diocesan Synod and Art. XIII By-Laws of the Church Society, in respect to the application of local endowments. In consequence, your Board regrets to be obliged to report that it is without the necessary power to carry out the terms of the Canon in regard to this matter.

#### REPORT

OF THE SAINT FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIATION OF THE CHURCH SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF QUEBEC.

PRESENTED TO THE ANNIVERSARY MEETING HELD AT SHERBROOKE, 10th
DECEMBER, 1884.

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It is with much pleasure that your Committee has to report a large increase in the amount of money raised for Church objects within the District over that of previous years. An increase of more than \$8,000 over the year 1883, and of more than \$12,000 over that of 1882. The total amount raised reaches the sum of \$31,472.30, of this sum \$27,625.87 was for parochial objects, \$2,804.39 for Diocesan, and \$1,042.04 for Domestic and Foreign Missions and for objects outside of the Diocese.

Comparing this with last year's contributions the total amount raised is \$8,462.66 more than last year. For parochial objects an increase of \$6,857.31, and for objects extra-

parochial of \$1,605.59.

Some result for this large increase in subscriptions for parochial objects may be seen in the erection of new Churches at Dixville, Richmond and Randboro'. The Church at Dixville—being free from debt—has been recently consecrated. The Incumbent of Cookshire reports that the Church at Randboro' will soon be ready for consecration. For the new St. Ann's at Richmond so far subscriptions to no less than \$6,067.53 have been paid.

At Cookshire a new and excellent parsonage has been built, one is in course of erection at Magog, and but trifling debts now remain on the parsonages at Coaticooke and

Hatley.

Owing to the generosity of a good friend the Mission of Stanstead is reported freed from all debt. As the Mission is to become next year a self-sustaining parish, the gift was most opportune. The debt on the College Chapel at Lennoxville has also been removed.

A further sign of progress is seen in the addition, during the year, of a new Mission—Westbury & Ascot Corner—to the list of Parishes and Missions of the District. The only vacant Mission is that of Melbourne Ridge, which for the present is under the charge of the Rector of Melbourne.

There are of course discouraging as well as encouraging features to report of the year's work. The state of the Church Schools in the district as reported is certainly not very encouraging. While thankful to receive the favorable accounts of the schools in the Missions of Dudswell and Stanstead, it is yet very discouraging to hear of the clasing of Compton Ladies' College, (though this be only temporary, it is hoped,) and to read that the Church School in another Mission is struggling for existence, and the future prospect of keeping children under the Church's influence uncer-The Church Schools in two important parishes have been now for some years abandoned. The future of a third is uncertain, and the College at Compton is closed. impossible to over-estimate the benefit to the Church and community of well conducted Church Schools, and it is certainly a matter of deep regret that their importance seems to be so little realized. As regards Compton College, it is the intention of the Corporation to re-open the Institution in September next, and your Committee would urge all Church members in the District and in the Diocese to do all that lie in their power to make its re-opening and continuance a

Next year no less than four Missions in this District are to become self-sustaining. The Missions are Coaticooke, Cookshire, Durham and Stanstead. The addition of these four will double the number of self-supporting parishes now to be found within the Deanery of St. Fráncis. It will be noticed that those of the Clergy who allude in their reports to the impending change do so in a true spirit of faith and courage, and certainly the history of the past of their Missions may well inspire them with confident hope for the future.

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On April the 1st of this year, my connection with the Diocese of Montreal, as regarding the congregations of Upton and Roxton Falls, ceased, and my ministrations are now restricted to Acton, Danby and Wickham West, which three stations make up at present the Mission of Acton. Services are held twice on Sunday in St. Mark's Church, once in Danby, while in Wickham, once every second Monday evening in a private house.

The attendance at the services has been very satisfactory

indeed.

It is with feelings of thankfulness to Almighty God that the Incumbent can state he has been allowed, on the 25th of last September, to complete a quarter of a century of service in the Church, being in as good health and strength as ever he was. When, in 1859, he commenced as travelling missionary, Acton was one of the posts visited in its turn by him; and it has ever been under his charge up to the present time, with the exception of thirteen months.

To demonstrate the changeable character of that part of the Mission, which consists of the two congregations, Acton and Wickham West, it might be mentioned that of all the old residents of ten years ago, only ten families now remain, the rest having gone elsewhere. Many others also have come and gone, whilst some have taken up their residence

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Assistance has kindly been given by Mr. William Unwin, one of our Church-Wardens, who has read the service for me when, on account of the state of the roads, I could not return from Danby in time for service. Two years ago he came to reside among us from St. Hyacinthe, where he had for many years acted as lay-reader under the appointment of the Bishop of Montreal, and twelve times he took my place.

This past year the number of my services is 203—of which 103 were held in St. Mark's Church, 48 in Danby, 25 in Wickham, and the balance in Upton and Roxton

Falls previous to April 1st.

The Church received from Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Unwin a gift of a handsome Offertory plate, on which is the inscription: Easter, 1884, St. Mark's Church, Actonvale.

Baptisms, 12; Confirmed, 4; Marriages, 6; Burials, 3. Assessment to Board, \$289; Church Society, \$20.50; Insurance, \$16.50; Interest on Parsonage Loan, \$72; Other purposes, \$38.95.—Total, \$436.95.

#### BARFORD.

The Rev. C. B. Washer reports:—

I begin my report with a deep sense of gratitude. long looked for Church for Dixville is built, and has been consecrated. Our work was much facilitated by the sale for \$600 of a lot of wild land, a part of the land in Barford, presented some years ago by Miss Green of Quebec. The people of Dixville gave nearly two hundred and fifty dollars, and over fifty dollars towards the bell, the young men subscribing much of the latter sum. Members of the Church in Quebec and elsewhere gave good help and showed their love for their less favoured brethren, and their interest in Missionary operations. We were aided also by generous grants from the Church Society and the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge. The account of moneys received and spent is deposited with the Bishop of the Diocese.

The Church was consecrated on October 7, and dedicated to St. Cuthbert. The design, very kindly drafted by Col. Ready of Melbourne, is much admired, and the site is the best in the village. A handsome stone font has been presented by the Rev. A. Stevens, my predecessor. The ladies of St. Matthew's Guild of Quebec, have given fifteen dollars towards the silver Communion vessels which we have bought through their agency,—besides giving the work of two surplices for out-stations. The Church opening was rendered the more joyous by the baptism of two adults, two children and an infant, and the confirmation of nine persons.

The Sunday School is flourishing, Mrs. Nelson Egleston continues her energetic and efficient assistance. There are forty-eight names on the roll, and many of the boys and girls are from families unfamiliar with the ways of the Church. On Advent Sunday I baptized one adult and seven children, using the new font for the first time. Three are too young for instruction, the rest are Sunday scholars,

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Unwin a ne inscripand with four of the five baptized on consecration day make nine of the Sunday School. All the seats in the Church are free, and we have now an offertory at every service.

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The St. Lawrence services have been kept up regularly through the year. Mrs. T. W. Ward and Miss Ward, during their stay for the summer at Barford, very kindly conducted a Sunday School. Repairs have been done to the interior of the Church. Congregation up to the average.

My Stanhope work goes on about the same. I have not been able much to visit my out-stations this last summer, and Stanhope with Perryboro, has had less time given to it than usual. The fortnightly Sunday School holds on its way, and when there is full attendance is too much for one teacher. I trust that some one will soon be raised up to help, and to conduct the school when I cannot be present.

At Perryboro there is the customary good attendance at services. Here three adults were baptized at the time of the Bishop's visit in October, and thirteen persons were confirmed. The work of the Church is appreciated as is evidenced by a disposition to conform to its usages.

I am sorry we have not even come up to what we contributed to the Church Society last year. Circumstances have hindered collection. But we are not losing sight of the duty to advance in contribution year by year.

#### EROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

The Rev. T. L. Ball reports :-

Owing to failing health, I was induced in July Iast to change from the Mission of Ireland to this District, with head-quarters at Windsor Mills. I accordingly went into lodgings here (there being no Parsonage) on the 24th of July. So I have been in charge less than four months, and cannot speak definitely of the prospects of the Mission. There are regularly organized congregations at Brompton

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and Windsor Mills, with an average attendance of about forty-five, including children. Holy Communion, monthly, since my arrival. For so far, have found eleven communicants resident in Brompton, and seven at Windsor.

I have opened a station at Hardwood Hill, six miles from this place, and think the prospect of organizing a congregation very fair, as the attendance is quite as good as at

either of the Churches.

I have also, with the Rector of Sherbrooke, commenced fortnightly Sunday services near the Orford Line, four miles beyond Brompton Church. If the Church members on the frontier of these two Townships cordially unite, I see no reason why they should not soon have a Church.

On Thanksgiving Day, the ladies gave the Sunday School children a tea treat at the Town Hall at Windsor. This was followed by service for Harvest Thanksgiving. The attendance of the adult members was not very large, but I trust the happy faces of the children compensated the ladies for

their trouble.

Fully two-thirds of the population of the Mission District, which includes the Townships of Brompton and Windsor, are members of the Church of Rome. The Methodists and Presbyterians have large and well established congregations. So we come latest in time and least in numbers.

There are about three hundred and fifty, including children, who have been baptized into the Church, and do not

materially dissent from the Prayer Book.

In temporal matters, there is not much hope of the District becoming self-supporting for some time. The congregation here, with one or two exceptions, is made up of operatives in the Mills. The Church is badly situated, small,

and needs repairs.

The people of Brompton are making an effort to add \$50 to their Endowment Fund this Autumn, and \$50 in the Spring, and thus secure the liberal donation of \$125 from Mr. Hamilton, of Quebec. I have added to the Statistical Table what I could gather from the data left by the late Incumbent, during the early part of the year.

Assessment or amount towards stipend, \$145; Other purposes, \$65; Church Society, \$7.14; Bishop's College, \$2.00; Foreign Missions, \$1.06; Domestic Missions, \$2.00.—Total, \$222.20.

#### BOURG LOUIS.

The Rev. H. C. Stuart reports:-

No interruption in services during year. Morning and Evening Prayer every Sunday. Holy Communion fortnightly and on festivals during summer season. Services generally well attended. Schools in good condition. Presentation to Church of new stone font of beautiful design, by Mrs. Shakespear.

Baptisms, infants, 10; Confirmed, 21; Marriages, 2; Burials, 2.

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Assessment raised, \$150; Church and Parsonage improvements, \$231; Church Society, \$12.27; Bishop's College, \$2.20; Domestic Mission, \$2.83; Other purposes, \$49.12.—Total, \$447.42.

#### BURY.

The Rev. W. C. Bernard reports:-

Since my coming to Bury on the 18th of July, the regular services have been kept up in the different parts of the Mission, according to the order established by my predecessor, namely:

At St. Paul's Church, Robinson, morning service every Sunday at 11 o'clock, preceded by Sunday School; evening service once in four weeks.

At St. Peter's, Lingwick, once a fortnight, at four o'clock in the afternoon.

The congregation of St. Thomas have no Church at present, which want I trust will be supplied in time, the congregation being made up of the people of two school districts, the service is held in the school house of each alternately, making a monthly service in each district, but a fortnightly service for the congregation known as St. Thomas.

St. John's Church, distant about four miles from the Village Church, I found closed when I came, and it has not been opened since.

At Barterville, service is held once a fortnight, on Thursday evening, by the Rev. A. H. Judge and myself.

At Hardwood Flat, service is held once a month. The services, in all parts of the Mission, are, on the whole, well

attended.

St. Paul's Church, Robinson, has been newly shingled, and has received one coat of paint; owing to some delay, the painting was not completed before the cold weather came on, and so it was thought best to wait until Spring to finish the work. The ladies of St. Mary's Guild meet once a month, and are indefatigable in their endeavors to promote Church work; the painting of the Church is only one item out of many for which the gratitude of the congregation of St. Paul's is due to St. Mary's Guild. On the 5th of December, the Lord Bishop held a confirmation service at St. Paul's, when eighteen persons were confirmed and all received the Holy Communion.

I cannot close my report, without mentioning the kindness that has been shewn me by the people in all parts of

the Mission, since my arrival amongst them.

ST. PETER'S CHURCH, COOKSHIRE.

The Rev. A. H. Judge reports:-

Throughout the year the attendance at public worship has been excellent. In the Sunday School great encouragement is felt. The roll containing forty-six names, beside the Bible Class. The work of the Ladies' Guild for the new Parsonage is most praiseworthy, and the Missionary Union held once a mouth in connection with the Guild has, I hope, served to create interest in the Church's great Mission work, while the Girl's Friendly Society, now entering upon its second year of existence in the mission, has well proved its usefulness and helpfulness to the well-being of the Church. The new Parsonage, begun in September, 1883, is now finished and inhabited. The total cost of the building—in every respect, one of great excellence—was \$2,200. A debt of \$200, assumed by the Building Commit-

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on Thurs. lf. tee, will be removed this winter. The offerings of the people for the new Parsonage have been most generous, and their willingness to undertake and carry out the work very gratifying.

Christ Church, Island Brook.—A prosperous year, with services well attended by devout congregations, and a thriving Sunday School can be again reported. For the latter I have secured the valuable services of an efficient Superintendent, whose work is ably seconded by other teachers.

It is always a matter of deep regret to me that but a fortnightly Sunday Service, and services only on the chief festivals can be given here. It is most apparently detrimental to the churchly training of a congregation to be deprived of the continuous and regular order of the Christian year's services. The same will be the case with the church's service at Randboro, (mentioned below) where especially this lack will be felt.

St. Matthew's Church, Randboro.—In my report of last year I gave an account of the opening of a new work in this hamlet, and, speaking of the enthusiasm aroused, expressed the hope that a Church might some day be built. This hope has already been fully realized, and on a charming site in the village there now stands a correct and pretty Church, with accommodation for 135 people, and almost complete as to its inside arrangements.

The Church has been erected at a cost of \$1,000. The people of Randboro giving \$500, together with land and stone foundation. For the balance of the sum above mentioned, the Incumbent begs now to gratefully thank those who responded to his appeals for help. We hope shortly to have the Church opened and consecrated, when a fortnightly Sunday service will be established.

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At Barterville and Ditton services are still held, though, owing to the removal of the few English families left, I expect soon to close the Mission station in the latter place. Throughout the summer and autumn, St. Luke's Church, Sandhill, was served once a fortnight by me, assisted by Mr. J. Eames, B.A., of Bishop's College, whose work in the Mission during the midsummer vacation was much appreciated.

### COATICOOKE.

The Rev. J. Foster reports :-

That he has held three services every Sunday—two at St. Stephen's and one at Christ Church, North Coaticooke, with occasional week day services at other points in the Mission.

Two Sunday Schools, one at each Church, are in success-

ful operation.

During last Winter, cottage lectures were kept up, once a week, at the North end of the Mission.

Last Spring, a handsome sand-stone font was placed in St. Stephen's Church, as a memorial of the late Mrs. Chas. O'Connor, and her daughter, Marcella.

St. Stephen's Church was nicely tinted in June.

Twenty-six were confirmed by the Bishop in June, and partook of their first Communion.

Through the liberality of the S. P. C. K., over three hundred volumes of excellent books have been placed in the Sunday School libraries of St. Stephen's and Christ Church.

The removal of the Rev. Andrew Balfour from the Mission, is very much regretted, not only by the members of the Church, but by the citizens generally, with whom he was very popular.

Parochial visiting has been kept up as usual.

I append the usual statistics: Baptisms—Infants, 17; Adults, 5; Marriages, 5; Burials, 11.

Diocesan Board Assessment, \$550; Easter offering, \$10; Foreign and Domestic Missions, \$8.64; S. P. G., \$3; Church Society, \$10; Bishop's College, \$3; Other purposes, \$275.25. Total, \$859.89.

#### CAPE COVE.

The Rev. W. G. Lyster reports:-

A very successful Xmas-tree entertainment was given here on the eighth of January, on which occasion the sum of \$126 was raised for Church purposes, and added to a small fund already in hand. To Mr. J. J. Balleine and Miss Higginson, as well as to a number of other friends, some of whom came from Percé to assist, much praise is due for the success of the undertaking.

We have thus been enabled to furnish St. James' Church with new and handsome seats at a cost of \$160, and mat-

ting has been provided for the aisles.

Apart from this, the only note-worthy occurrence of the year was the welcome visit of the Lord Bishop in July, when twenty-nine young persons were confirmed within the Mission.

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I regret to report that the weakness of the congregation (St. James'), both as to numbers and means, is felt severely, when special efforts involving considerable expense are necessary. For instance:—the outside of the Church needs re-painting; a new church-yard fence has become a necessity; and repairs to the parsonage must soon be effected, if the building is to continue habitable.

But we do not see where the funds are to come from: for, of the thirty-four families in the congregation, a few are unable, and, I am sorry to add, a few unwilling, to give

much assistance.

I have no doubt that, although the burden is heavy, the majority of the people will exert themselves to do all that may be necessary, and that the good spirit heretofore shown by them will not be wanting. Were it not for this liberal spirit, the task of meeting the expenses referred to would be hopeless.

I am glad to say our Church-Wardens have signed the new agreement with the Diocesan Board, having made a partial provision for the increase of assessment. The bal-

ance will probably be found at Easter.

Our three daily schools have been in operation throughout the year, and are doing a good work. One or more of them would of necessity have been closed were it not for the liberal aid of the Church Society, for which we are very grateful. Baptisms, 11; Marriages, 5; Burials, 5.

I append the usual statistics of Mission of Cape Cove and Percé for 1884: Assessment, \$450; Church Society, \$21; Domestic Missions, \$6.60; Foreign Missions, \$17.38; Bishop's College, \$2.00; Other purposes, \$260.58.—Total, \$757.56.

#### DRUMMONDVILLE.

The Rev. F. J. B. Allnatt reports:-

The services, classes, Sunday Schools, and guild meetings have gone on generally as described in last year's report, and need not be recorded again; though it may be mentioned that an additional week-day service was held during a great part of the winter in a school-house at the Tannery Settlement. The attendance at services and gatherings of different kinds has been fairly sustained.

Our Church day-school has been enabled to continue thus far the struggle for existence, but our future prospects of keeping the Church's children under the Church's influence—our boys from the "Friars' School," and our girls from the convent—are somewhat uncertain.

The preparation of candidates for Confirmation formed an important feature in the past year's work. Twenty-eight received more or less instruction with a view to the Ordinance, but only eighteen were presented to the Bishop on his arrival; the rest from various reasons (generally insufficient preparation) postponing their confirmation, most of them looking forward to the Bishop's promised visit next summer.

During one of the Spring gales the wooden top of our stone Church-tower was blown down,—a matter of small regret to the Rector, since it afforded an opportunity to replace it by a stone one, which has been done.

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### DURHAM.

The Rev. Geo. T. Harding reports:-

The ordinary services were held, and Holy Communion was celebrated during the year with the same regularity as heretofore; and I am thankful to say that, in spite of bad weather, last winter, I was enabled to fulfil all my Sunday appointments.

In regard to our work, generally, there is much of a hopeful character to report. One point, especially deserv-

ing of notice, is connected with the assessment.

When the last report was made up, things, in this respect, looked as gloomy as possible. We were very much behind in our payments to the Diocesan Board; were called upon at once to bear a further \$100 of assessment, and had the prospect before us of being cast off, altogether, in another year and become self-supporting. Many of our members, at that time, seemed to think that we could not even make up the arrears, and that the Churches would have to be closed. At this crisis, when many were taking the gloomiest view of the situation, a thought came into my mind which suggested a way of deliverance, and I determined to bring it before the people. In giving the notice of suspension at one of the Churches, I told the congregation exactly how matters stood: that we had arrived at the lowest point, that a crisis had come, and that but one hope of escape was left,—would they agree with me to lay the whole matter before God in a special service of prayer? That was my proposal. I appointed a day and place for the purpose, and in order that I might use a service of my own, with special prayers, lesson, address, &c., all bearing upon the object of our gathering, I arranged to have it take place in a private house, and partake of the character of a cottage mission. By God's mercy, there was an unusually large assembly present on the occasion: all went off well; and those who came were, I am sure, deeply impressed; and God answered the prayers of His Church at once; within a few days, more than was necessary to remove the then present difficulties came in with a wonderful facility; propositions were made by some that we should become self-supporting immediately, without waiting another year; and when the subscription lists were got out for the new in the A Sc great sc or

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of s and thin assessment, \$600—I saw what had never happened before in my incumbency—enough was subscribed to make up the amount, with something over to help to clear off arrears. All had increased their subscriptions—some doubled them. Some, who before gave small sums irregularly, became regular subscribers of larger sums, and a number of new subscribers were added to our lists; but a still better result of our prayers is this: that the members now seem all to be more hearty and willing in giving, and to take brighter and more cheerful views of our position. Indeed, some of those who, last year, were the most despondent, are now the most confident, and have even remarked to me, that the prayers of the congregation have been blessed.

I may add that my own confidence, in the near prospect of having to depend altogether upon the congregations for my stipend, is greater, and my anxiety less than when I first came to the Mission and found it struggling to make

up the sum of \$325.

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There are still some arrears of assessment; but they have come down to us from a long past state of things, when there was very little system in the manner of giving; they do not, therefore, represent our present condition. That they will soon be cleared off, now, I have no doubt, and the way in which (D. V.) this will be done is already partly arranged for; but it is a matter which had better be left

for the next report.

The attendance at the various services of the Church during the year has been excellent. In Upper Durham the congregations were very large during the whole period, except for a few Sundays in the Spring and Autumn, when a river, which separates a part of the people from us, was not passable. Cottage Missions were held here, with great success, every week through the Winter, and I cannot help believing that these, in God's hands, were the means of making our congregations so good. The attendance upon Holy Communion has also been remarkably good—better on the whole, I think, than in any previous year of my ministry—and this, too, is, no doubt, owing a great deal to the same cause.

In South Durham, likewise, the improvement is worthy of special notice. Both in regard to the ordinary services, and to Holy Communion, the attendance has been better, I think, than I have ever seen it. The Lenten Services par-

ticularly seemed to be well appreciated. A Confirmation, held in the Spring at this station, brought in, with a number of younger ones, ten married people, representing six families. But what gives me the most grateful joy is to see some—only a few it is true—who for a long time were practically lost to the Church, now regular and earnest communicants. A new family, lately come to the place, has been added to this congregation. The father is a regular communicant and an excellent churchman, and promises to be of great help to us. A new family has also been added to our numbers in Upper Durham, all the adults of which are communicants. These families are most heartly

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In L'Avenir many changes have taken place in the last year or two, which have quite altered the aspect of the place in regard to Church matters. A great many members have been lost to us by death and removals, so that there is not the same bright appearance of things as there was a few years ago: especially, we do not have such good congregations, or such hearty services as in former times. In the nature of things this is not to be expected. It might be discouraging to see this change, but for two things: first, there is a great zeal and love for the Church in those who remain; and secondly, I think I can see a foundation being laid for future prosperity, which a few years will perfect. My faith indeed is strong that ere long God Himself will send us for this congregation a much more solid and abiding prosperity than we have yet known. It will not be advisable, however, just now to enter into particulars, or show the reasons for this belief. But regarding the actual workgoing on, even now, there are many interesting things to relate. A series of Cottage Missions were held during last Winter, once a fortnight, and in connection with them, fortnightly services in the Church. The object in view was to make the Cottage services an influence for drawing to the Church services on the alternate week-nights; and I am thankful to say they proved a great power for this purpose: for the congregations at these special services in the Church were, generally speaking, quite as good as those at the Sunday services. Another interesting particular connected with this part of the Mission is, that, in spite of the congregations not being so good now as formerly, the attendance upon Holy Communion was never better, nor, I think, so good, on the whole, as during this year.

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I shall briefly notice now a few points of interest connected with the temporal affairs of the Church in Upper Mr. Frederick Lyster, a member of the congregation, gave us a very handsome carpet for the chancel, with linoleum and matting for the whole body of the Church, costing, in all, \$196.70. This gift has remarkably improved the internal appearance of the Church, and we acknowledge Mr. Lyster's offering with great thankfulness. The chimneys of this Church had to be pulled down this year on account of their smoking, and new ones, on the plan of those in the Church at South Durham—as noticed in a former report—were erected at a cost of \$60. A new fence of a very substantial character has been placed round the graveyard at a cost of \$63. These amounts were made up by means of subscriptions, special offertories and an entertainment held in connection with our Harvest Festival.

In South Durham a successful entertainment was given last Spring, at which the sum of \$30 was realized. This amount had to be applied to the payment of an old debt for insurance, which by some oversight had been neglected. We acknowledge with thankfulness a sum of \$18.50, collected by Mrs. Frank Placy and Miss Young, which also was applied to the payment of a debt upon the Church. We received in the Summer for the Church at South Durham a very handsome altar cloth, the gift of the Rev. G. H. Parker, for which the congregation feel very grateful; also, carpeting for the aisles from Mr. William Noble, a member

of the congregation, who has since died.

In L'Avenir, the most successful Harvest Festival we have yet had in the Mission, was held in October. The sum of \$33 50 was realized by means of it, although only a

small admission fee was charged

The amounts collected by missionary cards this year are as follows:—Miss Ginn, \$13.25; Miss Burrill, \$13.25; Miss Ployart, \$10 · Miss Abbie Lyster, \$9.75; Miss Doyle, \$9.35; Miss Holmes, \$8; Miss Ellen McDougall, \$3.50.—Total, \$67.10.

The amount collected for your Society, I am glad to see, is, again, an increase upon former years, and the total sum given to outside objects, including what was collected by the Rev. Dr. Roe for Bishop's College, is about \$90 more than last year.

# The Rev. T. S. Chapman reports: -

My Sunday Services have been three as usual, morning at St. Paul's, afternoon, Good Shepherd; and evening St. Paul's, Marbleton, with administration of Holy Communion monthly. The attendance has been fairly sustained.

In consequence of poor health all the last summer, I have not had any Catechetical sheet lessons as heretofore reported, but hope to take up the work again bye and bye, as I am slowly recovering.

Miss A. J. Breadon, whose good works are widely known, was resident in my parish past summer, and gave very valuable assistance in the Sunday School. Since she left her place has been filled by Miss Abbott, teacher of the Model School. The Sunday Schools have kept their way fairly, though from my experience of the sheet or wall lessons a large amount of good is to be derived from them. These Sheet Lessons 30 x 50 inches, large newspaper size might be printed for general Diocesan use for about 2cts. per sheet, and would go far to revive the ancient and desirable prac-

tice of public Catechism. If public Catechising from the mouth of the officiating minister were brought into practice, it would do more than any other *one* thing to raise the standard of public morals, and to minimize those accounts of frauds and embezzlements in business life, with which our newspapers abound.

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sheet, pracOur Model School is doing well, and is so full of pupils, that it has been found necessary to engage an assistant teacher, for the Junior classes. I referred last year to the ebb in point of age for Model School studies, and expressed a hope that we should not be held accountable for a state of things beyond our control. Another year or two will restore the equilibrium. The Marbleton Model School, is the only really good school within a radius of 15 or 20 miles of this village, and perhaps next to the Normal School the best furnished with maps, &c., of any in the whole Province.

French Colonization goes steadily on. These people have now a Church in the village and we expect not very far in the future on account of our small English-speaking population, to be crippled in school and Church-work—in fact in everything.

The new Mission of Ascot Corner and Westbury, which the Rev. Dr. Roe and myself were instrumental in founding I am happy to say from personal knowledge is doing well. Mr. Price the Catechist and Lay Reader is a diligent worker, and under difficult circumstances, has brought up these congregations to a state of unity and activity which is worthy of all praise.

## DANVILLE AND PARTS ADJACENT.

The Rev. I. M. Thompson reports:--

The Mission of Danville embraces within its limits the Townships of Shipton, Tingwick, and part of the Township of Kingsey—known as the municipality of Kingsey Falls.

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Danville the headquarters of the Mission is a village in or about the middle of the Township of Shipton, close to the Grand Trunk Railway—and of some importance as a business and manufacturing centre, there being a good farming country around it. In the village limits there are 5 Protestant places of worship and one Roman Catholic. congregation is small compared with some of the others. Two reasons may, I think, be given for this, First the other Christian bodies were in the field long before us and had secured a hold upon the people before we had a resident Clergyman. Second, a large proportion of the first settlers of the Township of Shipton were from the Northern States of America,—who had been brought up under the teaching and form of worship of the Congregational body and for many years had no other in this the land of their adoption. It could not therefore, be expected that they would enter heartily into the worship, or accept readily the doctrines of the Church of England. These things without doubt have exerted a powerful influence against the growth of the Church in this part of the Mission. We have, however, at present 62 families—42 of whom are openly identified with the Church, attend with more or less regularity her services and contribute towards her support. The rest, whilst claiming in some degree to belong to the Church, seldom attend any of her services, unless they are held in a Schoolhouse convenient for them to reach. The attendance upon Sunday services for the year, has varied from 50 to 150, making a safe average of 90 at the morning and 50 at the evening services. The Church building is of brick and very substantial, but so badly situated as to be a drawback to the Church's prosperity. It seats comfortably 200 per-We have purchased a new Organ and one-half of the purchase money is ready to be paid over when due, and is nearly all, it not all, the gifts of kind friends outside of the Mission. A new bell, 600 lbs in weight is on its way to us, for which we are prepared to pay,—when received. The cost amounting to \$150, with the exception of \$10 from Robt. Hamilton, Esq., \$25 from F. H. Foster, Esq., of Richmond, has been contributed by the people on the spot. Six Choir seats have been put in during the year, which gives the edifice a more Church-like appearance. are 80 Communicants in this Congregation, 45 are regular at the monthly celebrations, the rest communicate with less e in or

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regularity. Reviewing, however, the work of the year, I am thankful to say, that much greater earnestness and much more zeal for the advancement of the Church are being manifested. Our responding is very much improved. Singing is good and to a great extent congregational. Having been only one year in charge of the Mission, I cannot of course, speak confidently of the permanency of these outward manifestations—but I must say that my heart is often cheered by the signs of increased religious life which do appear-and what I say of Danville in this respect, may be said with equal truth of the other parts of the Mission. Our Sunday School is small, owing to the fact that many of our children live too far away to attend regularly. We have however, 27 scholars, who are taught by J. P. Stockwell, Esq, as Superintendent and 3 assistant teachers. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese visited the Mission in October last and baptized 4 adults, and confirmed 36 persons, 32 of whom became Communicants at once. It was indeed a solemnand I trust a blessed day to us all. Danville has regular services, morning and evening every Sunday and on the principal Festivals of the Church, with a monthly celebration of the Holy Communion. In addition to these, there have been services held during the year, with more or less regularity, at Mine School House, Bilton Settlement, Mountain School House, and Union Church, Richmond road. I omitted to mention that through the efforts of Mr. Boutelle, our Church is provided with lamps and is therefore bright and cheerful for our evening services. I cannot close my report for Danville without expressing my thankfulness to my Church-Wardens and to all my people throughout the Mission, for the many kindnesses showed to myself and family, commencing with our entering into the Mission and continuing unto this day. I must also add, that many loving remembrances of my predecessor, Rev. Mr. Petry are everywhere to be found, and his association with this Mission will long be remembered with pleasure by his old parishioners.

Troutbrook.—One of the oldest out-stations of this Mission, is situated in the south-eastern part of the Township of Tingwick—8½ miles from Danville. This settlement, in which there are 37 families, is surrounded on all four sides by French and Irish Roman Catholics. 34 families belong to the Church and attend the services—the other 3 families

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do not claim to belong to us in any way and seldom if ever, worship with us. Troutbrook Congregation is a very enthusiastic and affectionate Congregation, and ready to help their pastor on all occasions, and I have reason to hope, are growing in the love and enjoyment of the things of God. The Lord Bishop visited this Mission during his stay with us last October and confirmed 13 persons, who became Communicants at once,—thus making the Communicants in this congregation to number 48. A very excellent Sunday School, attended by 42 scholars and taught by 3 teachers under the Superintendency of Mr. George Ewing, was held during the summer months, but owing to distance must be closed during winter. The Church building is of wood—very comfortable and well situated—with sitting accommodation for 125 persons. It is well filled every Sunday and the steady increase in numbers at the monthly celebration of Holy Communion is very gratifying. We need an organ for this Church very badly to make our worship more hearty. Perhaps some friend whom God has blessed with means will help us to get one. To this congregation and Church-Wardens I am indebted for many substantial expressions of good-will, and pray God to bless my feeble efforts to the good of their souls.

Lorne.—This Church is situated at the north-east end of the Township of Shipton-4 miles from Danville and near Kingsey Station on the G. T. Railway. The Church stands on the Shipton side, but close to the line which divides the townships of Shipton and Tingwick. The Congregation is composed of families living in both Townships, and number 35 in all. Of these 24 claim to belong to the Church, the other 11 belong to other Christian bodies, but worship with us and try to help us in every way possible. Church has only recently been built. My predecessor Rev. Mr. Petry, who built it, held a Sunday service once a month and one rivice during the week. Since I took charge of the Mission, I have tried, and so far have succeeded, in giving them a regular Sunday service, by stopping over on my way from Troutbrook to Danville. This effort has been warmly appreciated, and good congregations at all services, greet me in this Church. The Church building is of wood —comfortably finished and seats 125 persons—at present, however, quite too small for the Congregation. There is if ever,

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a small debt due Rev. Mr. Petry, which we hope soon to get paid off, and then we shall make an effort to provide more room. The Lord Bishop held a Confirmation, and baptized 4 adults and confirmed 27 persons, all of whom—on the following Sunday, presented themselves at the Lord's Table—thus making 34 Communicants in this Congregation. A very successful Sunday School, containing 44 scholars, was conducted during the summer months by J. P. Stockwell, Esq., assisted by 3 earnest teachers. Altogether, this is a hopeful station. In no part of the Mission is the responding so good—and the singing is very hearty and congregational. Deep earnestness pervades the minds of the young people and if they will only remain in the place, a large and enthusiastic congregation will be built up.

Kingsey Falls is the name of a municipality which embraces the North-east part of the Township of Kingsey and the village of Kingsey Falls, and is 8 miles from Danville. The village of Kingsey Falls is of some importance from the fact that a good deal of lumber is here prepared formarket, and large paper and pulp mills are in operation, which give employment to a large number of persons. We have no Church here, but for our service, which is only a week night service, the Baptists kindly lend us theirs. There are 30 members of the Church living in and around Kingsey Falls, many of whom avail themselves of the service, and some of whom come with considerable regularity either to Danville or Lorne, for Holy Communion. Many of the early settlers of the North-east part of the Township of Kingsey were from the Old Country, some of whom were originally Church people, but owing to the distance that they lived—8 miles from Danville on one side and 8 miles from Kingsey Church upon the other, they could not with any regularity attend the services of their own Church. As a consequence they attended such services as were within their reach. Many of the old people have indeed gladly welcomed the Clergyman and his service amongst them, and may in time return to their former allegiance. I have had many cheering things in this place and many kindnesses from people of all classes and denominations, for which I am truly grateful.

#### EAST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. Felix Boyle reports:-

The services have been maintained, with the exception of a very few intermissions, regularly on Sundays in both of my Churches. Attendance fairly good, considering the roughness of the country and roads, as well as the scattered state of my people. With the fact staring us in the face that Church members in this Mission are annually decreasing, we were not a little startled at first, at the increased assessment of the Diocesan Board. But after due notice given, I held two meetings in each of my Churches after Divine Service on two consecutive Sundays, and I was pleased to see the determination of both congregations to preserve their services as at present afforded them. There was not one dissenting voice among those present, and there being a good representation of both congregations, who requested the Church-Wardens to sign the memo. of agreement with the Board.

Four families more have left us since last year, and more, I am told, will follow them in the Spring; a poor prospect for self-supporting.

Thanks to Church Society, in consideration of their grant, I have been enabled to establish a Sunday and day school in the tenth range, which is doing good work under Miss Bartholomew's careful supervision.

## WEST FRAMPTON AND CRANBOURNE.

The Rev. J. B. Debbage reports:-

Last year's exertions left us free from debt; yet the people find it hard to meet even the assessment, collections and ordinary expenses. Within the last three years fourteen families have left this Mission, and some of these the best supporters of the Church. The loss of these, added to the increased assessments, makes it hard for those who are

left behind to make up what is asked of them.

But, in spite of difficulties and drawbacks, the work of the Mission has been carried on steadily. One Sunday, owing to a violent storm, I failed for the first time to reach Cranbourne; and twice the West Frampton people were disappointed of service through my having been called away to Cranbourne. Once, being the day appointed for the thanksgiving service, when I reached home too late, cold, tired, and even frost-bitten, although I had been on the road soon after five in the morning. Not many had come for the service however.

Our services are usually well attended, both on Sundays and week days. I have two week-day services during the Winter, one in the Church here and one in the first range

of Frampton.

Our Temperance Society continues its meetings. It

numbers 36 members, all total abstainers.

I receive much kindness from the people, both in Frampton and Cranbourne. From the latter place, amongst other things, I had three loads of hay sent to me.

We have to thank Mrs. Williams for another bundle of

things for the Sunday scholars and for the poor.

## GASPÉ BASIN.

The Rev. J. P. Richmond reports:—

During the past year the event of importance was the consecration of St. Paul's Church, Gaspé Basin. The building cost three thousand three hundred dollars, and the congregation are thankful for contributions to the builing from churchmen in Quebec and elsewhere. Grants from the S. P. C. K. and the Diocesan Church Society, and the assistance of the ladies of the congregation through bazaars.

Much remains to be done towards furnishing the interior of the building, towards which the Church-Wardens have received \$261 from Mrs. William Annett, being the proceeds of a bazaar held by the ladies of the congregation last

November.

Mr. McDonald, of St. John's, P. Q., an old friend of the Mission, presented St. Paul's Church with a handsome pair of pulpit lamps.

The Rev. W. T. Forsythe was admitted to the Order of Priest last Summer, so that I have been relieved of the

charge of Little Gaspé and Peninsulà.

I regret the feeling of inability on the part of the congregations in this Mission to increase the assessment again this year, owing to the hard times consequent on a poor

season's fishery and farm crops.

The schools in the Mission, five in number, have been kept open. Owing to the division of the Mission by the waters of Gaspé Basin, these schools are more in number and therefore more costly than in other Missions of equal strength numerically—they cost about nine hundred and fifty dollars a year. The Government grant is growing smaller yearly, owing to deductions, and only one of these schools receives aid from the Church Society. Were it not for this heavy drag, the people would be able to contribute more liberally to the funds of the Mission.

There is also a growing feeling of isolation among the Clergy and Laity in the Gulf District. To ask a man from Gaspé to attend Synod is to ask him to expend on the trip to Quebec from sixty to one hundred dollars. The people feel that a lay delegate from Quebec, however willing and zealous he may be, must fail to represent Gaspé Missions, of which he knows nothing. I have been asked by zealous churchmen here if in the face of these difficulties there ClAt be lio bo vi

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up thi Jai Ge could not be some way devised of taking the vote of the Clergy and Lay Delegates from the Gaspé District on vital questions, and so give them a voice in the Councils of the Church, from which they are shut out by their position. At all events, if some such thing could be done, we should become less congregational in our feelings and more catholic in our instincts in Church matters. At present our only bond of union with the rest of the Diocese is the regular visitation of the Bishop for confirmation in the Gulf Missions. The Deanery stands apart from the rest of the Diocese, and the congregations in it too much apart from each other, so that the feeling that they are but parts of the same body, is too much lost in feelings of individuality and isolation, and perhaps self interest.

## HATLEY AND WATERVILLE.

The Rev. Albert Stevens reports:—

In Hatley the congregations still remain small. The debt upon the Parsonage has been paid except about \$25, and this we hope will be raised before the end of the year. In January last we were called upon to mourn the loss of Mr. George Weston. He was for years a regular attendant at

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the services and most generous in his offerings to all Church purposes. I have here a class of eight persons to present to the Bishop for Confirmation next Sunday. A beautiful stained glass window has been placed in the chancel of St. James' Church by Miss Weston, in memory of deceased relatives.

At Waterville the congregation keeps up well; the responding is hearty, and the singing greatly improved. In September last, Mr. Anthony Wiggett an old and tried friend of the Church was called to rest. He was one of the pioneers of the Church in Waterville, and as long as able most regular in attendance upon the services, and always ready to give according to his means to all charitable and religious purposes. I have here a class of fifteen persons preparing for Confirmation next Sunday.

The services at Massawippi, North Hatley and Libbytown, have been kept up as regularly as circumstances would

permit.

An interesting Sunday School was opened last summer in a School House between Waterville and Hatley, by Mr. Henry Armstrong, who is now a student at Bishop's College. A short time ago I publicly examined the school and

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was much pleased with the progress made.

I hope the time is not far off when this Mission can be divided, and Waterville made the centre of a new Mission which would include North Hatley, and either Capleton or Milby. This would allow the Clergyman at Hatley to extend his labours into Barnston and Stanstead townships which are now without Church services.

st seven rly kept up, though many times I felt myself unable to take the journey from one part of the Mission to the other. I was unwilling to leave the field until a successor was ready.

Aside from the current expense of the Parish, an organ for Trinity Church was purchased in the month of February.

There was no debt of any kind except the assessment by Diocesan Board paid up to the end of March throughout the Parish, when I left the Mission.

I would especially notice the receipt of a very pleasing address and purse of \$67, from the parishioners on my departure. Mrs. Ball also received a very gratifying testimonial from her Sunday School at Maple Grove.

The Rev. R. Hewton reports:-

There are three Churches in this Mission, viz:—Trinity Church, Maple Grove; Christ's Church, Lower Ireland or South Inverness, and St. Luke's Church, Adderley. The position of the Churches forms a triangle, making a drive of 28 or 30 miles to attend the three in one day, which I do fortnightly over very rough and hilly roads.

Parochial visiting is no slight task in a Mission such as this. It comprises Ireland, Halifax, Wolfestown, Colerain and Inverness. The Congregations are scattered about amongst other denominations, so that the task of picking out our own becomes very arduous, and often makes much work for a small number of visits. Such difficulties however become small in the general welcome and hospitality which is offered by everybody with whom the Missionary comes in contact.

There has been some progress, I believe, in the work of the whole Mission, of which "facts and figures" are the best proof. We have met with financial difficulties but they have been overcome.

We had a visit during the autumn from the Rev Dr. Roe, and I am happy to state the people here responded very liberally to him when he placed before them the claims of the University of Bishop's College. I took advantage of his visit to have a celebration of the Holy Communion in Christ's Church. The name of Dr. Roe is a household word in many homes. His work of over 30 years ago as the Incumbent of this Mission, is still remembered by a large

number of my Congregation. The late Incumbent, the Rev. T. L. Ball, also celebrated the Holy Eucharist in Trinity Church, when I exchanged services with him, and on another occasion he kindly celebrated in St. Luke's where I was present.

Through the generosity of Robert Hamilton, Esq., we have increased our Endowment Fund to \$2,000. It stood at \$1,700 and Mr. Hamilton made an offer of \$125 if the Congregations of Trinity and Christ Churches raised the complement of \$300. By a strenous effort I am happy to report success, the particulars of which will be given below.

I have met with much kindness since my arrival here. I desire to express my heartfelt thanks to all my people for their many acts of kindness and love.

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Trinity Church, Maple Grove.—The services have been conducted regularly every Sunday in Trinity Church since my arrival, with an average attendance of 108. There is a decided improvement in the responses and singing. I have made space for a choir of from 30 to 35 by removing an un-The Chancel was too sightly pulpit and reading desk. small and low for the Choir, and is separated from the nave by very large square pillars which prevented the sound from coming out. The Choir and Congregation are now nearer together and the effect on the whole Congregation is very encouraging. I must not close this part of my report without expressing my warmest thanks to Mrs. Henry Wood of Woodside, for her services as organist. She, the Choir and in fact the whole Congregation have co-operated with me in an effort to make the worship of God more like what it ought to be.

We have a I adies' Association, which manifests much active interest in Church work. To the untiring zeal of Mrs. F. II. Wood, President of the Ladies' Association, and Mrs. William Cross, is due in great measure our success in this part of the Mission with the Endowment Fund.

During the summer Mrs. Ball kindly took charge of our Sunday School. She was much missed when she left and will long be remembered for the interest she took in the spiritual welfare of the young. Miss Laura Hall, belongs to our staff of Sunday School Teachers and conducts the musical exercises of the Sunday School work.

I found a Church Temperance Association in existence with a large roll of membership. We have had one meeting when a lecture was delivered on "Temperance and the Scott Act." Although a very wet evening the attendance was good. We hope to continue the meetings during the winter.

Christ's Church, Lower Ireland.—I am glad to report that the much talked of new Church in Lower Ireland is almost completed. The sons of the late Mr. Samuel Johnson have presented a beautiful window in memory of their father. The cld Church has become almost uninhabitable and a new as a necessity. It is a great effort for the Congregation to build it, but many have exercised a considerable amount of self-denial and have accomplised a much to be desired object. The new Church is being built on a site, approved of by the Rural Dean, below the old Church. Although the new site is not so commanding as the old, it is more convenient for the majority of the Congregation.

The money for the Endowment Fund of Lower Ireland was collected by myself. It was indeed gratifying to see the willingness with which all met my request.

The attendance in Lower Ireland is very good, and the responding fair. I feel personally grateful to Miss Bessie Porter. Although not enjoying good health, she has acted as organist and took a great interest in the musical services of the Congregation. We are also indebted to Mr. Marshall who leads the singing. Services have been held every Sunday with one exception.

St. Luke's Church, Adderley.—In this Church there is a fortnightly service. The Congregation here is smaller than those of the other two Churches. The worship here as well as in the other stations is characterized by devout demeanour and intelligent attention. We had some financial difficulties but the energy and zeal of Mr. James Henderson one of the Church-Wardens soon dispelled the trouble and things are running smoothly. I am afraid the increased assessment will be felt very much in this station. The numbers are few, and all are poor.

#### INVERNESS.

The Rev. P. Roe reports:—

The regular Sunday services have been held at St. Stephen's, and Church of the Ascension, Campbell's Corners, they have been as a rule well attended. I have also held occasional school house services for the benefit of a few who find it difficult to attend at the Churches. The Sunday School at St. Stephen's was well attended this season, about an average of 40 present, every Sunday, chiefly from 12 to 6 years old. The School at Campbell's Corners has diminished in numbers, the Presbyterians having opened a school at Inverness, their children have left us and joined their own School. Mr. Austin and his daughter have taken charge of Campbell's School, and have been very faithful in their attendance every Sunday during the season in all kinds of weather. Mrs. Roe has a large Bible class for girls, which she continues during the winter months, and my daughters are all teachers in the Sunday School at St. Stephen's, this part of the work is well done and is I trust producing good results. Where the children are interested and attracted, the parents naturally love to attend themselves, so I find the Sunday School helps to fill the Church!

I have had many sick folks to visit during the year, some most distressingly painful cases, one young married woman with two young children confined to the bed for seven months! These sick calls kept me busy walking up and down through the township; and as I do not keep a horse, only hiring one for Sundays and for occasional long drives, my walks have counted up some hundreds of miles during the past year. Still I confess I do not pay as many pastoral visits as I should do, but I try not to neglect the sick, and my visits to them are always received with thanks.

The teachers of the Sunday School at St. Stephen's, assisted largely by the parents of the children, got up a very nice Christmas tree. It assumed gradually large proportions and was laden with nice presents for young and old, some seasonable things were sent to Miss Roe by Mrs. Williams, who is never weary in assisting to promote the prosperity of our Missions. A very large attendance of the parishioners took place, the children sang hymns; choice readings were given by Mr. Geo. Murray, Divinity Student Bishop's College, who bids fair to be an excellent elecution-I was very much surprised, to find on the tree a purse of money amounting to \$80, for the Clergyman, with an address signed by nearly all the members of the Church, requesting me to accept this purse as a token of their esteem, and to purchase a fur coat with the money; this was quite a surprise, and pleased me most, in that it was a grand expression of good will from all the members of the Mission. I feel myself how little I have done to deserve it, but I put it down here, not to exalt myself, but to show to other Missions how they may by a little self-denial, cheer the heart of the Missionary.

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## KINGSEY.

The Rev. J. S. Sykes reports:—

The chief event of the year has been the visit of our Bishop for Confirmation. 21 candidates were presented after a seven months' preparation; 20, have to my knowledge, become Communicants, one has left Kingsey, I cannot tell whether I am to count him—if so—every candidate I have prepared since my ordination has been added to the list of Communicants.

Next we were honoured by a visit from the Rev. Dr. Roe, collecting funds for Bishop's College, and had the pleasure of listening to three very instructive and pleasing sermons. The amount collected was not large, the sums being for Denison's Mills, \$18; Sydenham Place and Spooner Pond, \$16; \$34 in all. I believe the whole sum promised to be paid within three years is \$84.

The sermons on Thanksgiving Day were preached by Rev. G. T. Harding. It was a cold cheerless day, with very bad roads, which had a visible effect on the attendance. The absentees were the losers of a good, practical and edi-

fying discourse.

In June last, \$35.65 were subscribed in this Mission towards the endowment of a Science Chair in the University tio

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of Bishop's College, Lennoxville.

In July last I received a broad hint from my people that I ought to take a holiday—the breadth of the hint was \$41, I took the hint in its broadest sense and left the Mission for a fortnight, Mr. Wilcox of Richmond, very generously taking the two Sundays work for me. We have built a Steeple and Vestry to the Church at Spooner Pond and have had the woodwork inside and out painted and grained, adding much to the appearance of the building.

A long felt want—a complete Set of Communion Vessels —has been supplied at Holy Trinity Church, Denison's Mills.

My parishioners show their good will by furnishing gratuitously hay for my horse and cow and by a plentiful supply of fruit, vegetables, honey and other things too numerous to mention.

In the month of September there passed away from our midst an honoured and worthy matron Mrs. Primrose Lodge, the mother of a numerous and worthy family of good churchmen and church-women.

#### LAKE BEAUPORT.

The Rev. W. S. Vial reports:—

I took charge of this Mission on June 30th. I found here a day school well taught by Miss Montgomery—about one hundred people, and a Church in a great state of dilapidation, if that can be said of a wooden building. It seems almost a necessity to build another Church, more accessible by the congregation and by the summer visitors, who must be looked to for liberal support in the matter, especially as the Church, will be as much for them as for the residents.

I have held services regularly once a fortnight, have visited the people many times and have held a confirmation class before each service. Congregation once as high as 30, not counting strangers, who increase it considerably. Average attendance, 25 per cent. of the population.

The singing and music are good.

Baptisms-Infants, 1; Adults, 2; Marriages, 1.

Assessment, \$40; Church and Parsonage improvement, \$132; Pensions, 51cts.—Total, \$178.51.

#### LEEDS.

The Rev. John Kemp reports:-

This Mission, unlike many others, has little or no expansive capacity. There is no waste ground to be occupied.

om our Lodge, hurchThe whole field is taken up. All have some recognised religious home—are members or adherents of some religious organization. Under such circumstances the Church does not increase, but rather decreases. Deaths and removals are continually making our numbers less, and the people are less able to meet the demands made upon them.

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St. James' Church.—This congregation is in a better position than the others, having received some additions from without—Church families coming in, which helps to make up the losses sustained ' ' deaths, removals and withdrawals. They are therefore able to meet the demand of the Diocesan Board, for increased assessment for the next three years. Still even here there have been losses. The North West takes many. Services here as reported last year. Attendance about the same.

Sunday School.—During the Summer months, Mr. G. Bayne (lay delegate) at his post as he has been for more than thirty years. I don't know what I should do without him. Miss Marshall and Miss Craig have also rendered valuable assistance.

I have taken a Bible Class myself once-a-fortnight. (We went through the Book of Genesis.) Removals have rather weakened our choir here; but Miss Marshall still renders efficient service at the organ.

St. Mark's Church, Kinnear's Mills.—Here, I am sorry to report, some falling off in Church attendance. People very much more widely scattered, and I fear, many are very careless. We are but few at best, amidst an overwhelming majority of Presbyterians, who are all very zealous and very prejudicial.

We have no Sunday School; no one to take charge of it. Presbyterian Sunday School large, flourishing, with plenty of lay helphers. We have none. Result: children go to Presbyterian Sunday School. I am hand-tied and tonguetied. Wanted, a younger clergyman, who can be in two places at once.

We are continually suffering loss by deaths, removals and mixed marriages. Fewer Church families than when I came. Many losses, no gains; several left; none taking their places in the Church; therefore can't meet the demand for increased assessment—prospects not very cheering.

Broughton.—Here the same tale has to be told. Services same as last year. Exodus of Protestants—Roman Catholics taking their place. We shall have none there a few years hence. Can't pay their small assessment as it is —much less increase it. What shall be done? Are the few remaining there to be abandoned to popery or worse practical infidelity? I pause for a reply. Lastly, elergyman getting old, prosy, and can't be round as much as before, and too old to be removed, nobody wants an old man. What is to be done with him? Let the people off with less assessment, that will help it, nothing else will. They must fully understand that a new clergyman means pay more, a good deal more, if not all.

Finance.-The assessment is somewhat behind, but Leeds

will pay up, and I think the others will too.

Church Society.—I have collected what I could for the Church Society. The subscriptions and offertories for the Society amount to over fifty dollars, besides ten dollars and fifty cents for Foreign and Domestic Missions, and four dollars for Bishop's College.

Baptisms—Infants, 14; Marriages, 5; Burials, 6.

Assessment, \$300; Church Society, \$50.85; Foreign Missions, \$5; Domestic Missions, \$5.50; Other purposes, \$30. Total, \$391.35.

#### MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

The Rev. J. Chambers reports:—

The ice bridges formed early and strong. The severity of frost, combined with favourable winds, formed an excellent bridge to Entry Island, so that I visited that island more

frequently than in previous winters.

We have had three schools in operation, as follows: one at Grindstone Island under a "Board Teacher," and the children have improved satisfactorily. Two others at Grosse Isle were in operation, but were private for the following reason: Grosse Isle consists of many places, such as Grand Entry, Old Harry, East Cape, North and South Grosse Isle.

A school under a Board of Trustees would entail the necessity of having one centre to which the children should assemble from the various surroundings. It was found from former experience that children could not be sent in

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safety to their health. In fact it is impracticable. Consequently two private schools were formed, one at Old Harry Head, the other at Grosse Isle North, and satisfaction has been given, which was not the case before. However, the expenses will be increased, which is always a serious matter, because the inhabitants have to live twelve months on what they earn at fishing in about four.

The three Church buildings are in excellent order and will require but a trifling outlay to keep them in order for

several years.

Divine Services, whether held in Church or dwelling houses, are always well attended, and unless weather prevents, there is scarcely a household unrepresented.

### MAGOG AND GEORGEVILLE.

The Rev. James Hepburn reports:-

In some respects the work of this Mission during the past year has been hard and discouraging. Probably this was in a measure owing to my absence from it for about three months in summer when the population in Magog village particularly was fluctuating,—partly also in consequence of my removal from Magog to Georgeville for the winter (a step rendered necessary by my marriage);—to reside at a distance of ten miles from the main centre of work, must in the nature of things be unsatisfactory to all concerned;—yet I incline to think a weightier reason was that we were overtaken by a wave of indifference for which oftentimes men cannot account.

Notwithstanding these difficulties and discouragements the work has been carried on steadily; and now we think we see more abundant cause than ever before for thankfulness. Our present outlook is certainly encouraging. The increase of population in Magog, although chiefly French, is a source of satisfaction. The success of the Textile Manufacturing Co., if more moderate than could be hoped for, is yet cheering, giving business an onward impulse and opening up other industries. But the chief encouragement to me lies in the fact that the Church seems more alive to her duty,—her members beginning to realize more perfectly that they have powers of usefulness which they ought to employ. This is especially true of the younger members of the Congregation who take delight in works that help me

much. Not only do they prove themselves helpful at the Festive Seasons of the year, and when the excitement of the day carries them along (and this I by no means despise); but also they work in numberless ways throughout the year at works which they choose for themselves, and to which others direct ther—which are a solid strength to the Church. I am more thankful to them personally (and a remembrance of it freshens me) that they look out and minister to the needy and the suffering, that they try to impress the careless ones and awaken a desire for spiritual things; and that they bring many things to my notice which prepare me for duty among them.

And I must not fail to mention their reverent behaviour in Church, and their hearty rendering of the services so

helpful to a congregation.

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In both parts of the Mission we have been heavily taxed:—
in Magog, building a Parsonage upon the site given to us
a year ago, by Mr. R. Merry;—and in Georgeville repairing
the Church and building the Tower, we have threatened to
build for three years past. The statement below shows the
amount of money raised for these purposes, exclusive of a
considerable amount not yet paid in. Magog is indebted
to friends without for \$229, and Georgeville to Mrs. Williams of Quebec, for \$25, which she obtained from a friend
in England To all of these our best thanks are due. I am
greatly indebted to my Assistants in the Sunday School in
whose hands the work has prospered greatly, and no less
indebted to Mr. F. Whiteker and Miss S. Wright for their
efficient services at the Organ.

#### MALBAIE.

The Rev. G. Radley Walters reports:-

A deeper interest in Church attendance. The frequent attendance of many (hitherto careless) at Holy Communion. More reverent behaviour, and a great respect displayed for sacred things. The number of adults (many far advanced in life) who presented themselves for Confirmation.

In this Mission my people depend entirely upon their success in the cod fishery this past year. The first came later than usual, owing, it is said, to large quantities of ice being in the Gulf all the Summer. The catch, too, was smaller, and the price given much less than last year. This fact alone to those who know the precariousness of the fisheries, will explain a very great deal. We have no mills, no factories here, the din of whose busy machinery would be, I am sure, but sweet music to us in our dreary isolation, consequently my people have but five months in which to earn their food and clothes for twelve months. In the month of July last the Bishop came and spent two days; 82 were confirmed in St. Peter's Church. The service was bright and hearty, and the earnest and practical address to the candidates by the Bishop, as well as his Lordship's sermon, was listened to with much attention, and, it is hoped, made a deep and lasting impression.

I am afraid the Mission will experience the loss of much help from Messrs. John and Elias Collas, who, though residing in Jersey, have been always very kind to us. They are now retiring from business. The firm will still go by the same name, so we trust that the new members will be as good to us in the future, as the old firm was in the past. aı

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I am sorry to report no collection has been made in the Mission for the Church Society this year other than the offertory. I could get no one to go and collect, the excuse being the prevailing hard times here, and that those few who could give, have had to pay extra assessment to make up for the many who this year are in arrears, they not having the money coming to them, and the merchants not caring to advance it for them.

My Church work and parish visiting throughout the year past has been as heretofore. Regular services at Malbaie, Corner of the Beach, and the Barachois school house,

on all Sundays and the Fasts and Festivals in the Churchs

vear.

I have to thank a very kind friend, Geo. Sears, Esq., a gentleman from New York, for his generous and kind gift, coupled with that of a few of my people, who subscribed together \$100, with which to purchase for me a house, mine having fallen over a high cliff, was killed.

I must thank here all those who kindly helped at our

last year's Tea Party, which realized for us \$86 32

I beg to state that all our Church property was this year insured in the Imperial Insurance Company, as directed by your Board.

Our thanks are due to Mrs. Williams for a bundle of warm clothing to the poor in the Mission. And again to the aforesaid Geo. Sears, Esq., for a Xmas gift of \$50, just received, to the Poor Fund of the Mission.

Also, we must thank, through the Lord Bishop, the S. P. C. K., for a grant of £5 worth of books, bibles, prayer books, and a small collection for a library in the Mission.

## NICOLET-ARTHABASKA AND LOUISEVILLE.

The Rev. E. C. Parkin reports:-

The ministrations of the Church have been regularly afforded to the congregations of this Mission, with the exception of some weeks in mid-summer, during which time I was seriously ill from cold caught while upon a Missionary tour. In numbers we are decreasing, in Communicants increasing.

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# PORTNEUF.—No report.

## RIVIÈRE-DU-LOUP (EN BAS.)

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The Rev. R. C. Tambs reports:-

Fraserville.—The Protestant residents here number 34, all members of the Church of England. Eleven are children and 9 communicants.

Service is held every Sunday morning; Holy Commun-

ion administered once a month.

The attendance at Church is good and regular, with always a fair representation from the Station, and the services are characterised by reverence and heartiness.

A Sunday School has been opened and kept up through the year by Miss Ross, assisted by Miss Hill. The perseverance of these two always really helpers, is most praise-

worthy.

In the Summer twenty or more cottages were occupied by Protestant visitors, who all seemed pleased to unite in the common ground of our Church's worship. Chairs were placed in the aisles and other available spaces to afford accommodation. It is evident speedy steps must be taken to

enlarge the building.

By a grand fête and a very successful concert, both got up under the management of Mrs. Macdonald, of Ottawa, \$370 were added to our Parsonage Fund. Words fail me to express all the gratitude I feel and all the praise that is due to this sterling Christian lady and her large hearted family, for thus, yet once again, giving up the greater part of their recreation season, and devoting themselves, heart and soul, to work for the benefit of the Church in this mission. Nor can I less warmly allude to Miss Holmes of Montreal, who, with such good success, took in hand the bazaar table in connection with the fete, furnishing it too to no small extent with the tasteful works of her own skilful fingers. To Mrs. Edwin Jones too, I have again many reasons to feel under deepest obligations. We shall always gratefully remember Mr. J. B. Chamberland, M.P., for the hearty way in which he placed his lovely grove at our disposal, and his kind sons for the cheerful readiness with which they did everything in their power to further our efforts.

The day was cloudless; to add to the cherry throng Cacouna drove over in long and festive procession. The tents among the trees, Mr. Woodruff's show creating laughter, games giving sport, flags flying, band playing, altogether the scene was one most gay and animated. Only one thing was a failure—Porcus unctus. Alas! he wouldn't go. Perhaps he was unhinged by a sense of shyness and diffidence occasioned by the August presence of the Dominion's Premier.

The lumber and shingles are on the ground for the Parsonage, ready for prompt operations in the Spring. The building will stand near the Church, on your left as you

enter the gate.

The books of the Church have been furnished with maroon markers by the kindness of Miss Cecilia Chesley. The congregation of Tadousac have kindly given me an harmonium once in use in their Church, which will be of great service to me. By the tender thoughtfulness of the little ladies of St. Patrick's, I was made the happy recipient of a very comforting present in the form of an eider-down quilt, to procure which I learned that they had, of their own accord, given, in a neighbouring farm, a most successful juvenile entertainment.

In August we had the pleasure of a visit from our beloved Bishop, on his way back from the Gaspé coast, accompanied by the Rev. Geo. Thorneloe. His Lordship preached

here and at the Portage.

I regret to have to record the removal from our parish of Mr. George Kittson, Warden, and his family. Their kindliness and support are much missed. They left a valuable donation of books for the library.

Notre-Dame du Portage—A pleasant watering place along the margin of the St. Lawrence, six miles above Fraserville. There are no resident Protestants here—it is consequently only a Summer station. Service every Sunday afternoon, with sometimes an additional service in the morning. Our efforts here have been attended with great success. We began Summer before last, on the Methodists having given up the field, with a congregation of fifty or sixty, in a school house. We have now, situated in the very centre of the settlement, a Church seated with upwards of one hundred and fifty chairs, and these, on two or three occasions, have all been occupied.

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The building is indeed a very simple structure, but it answers well our purpose. It is 24 ft. x 60 ft., with a vestry on the right of the entrance and a cloak room on the left. The whole of the lumber was most generously given by a gentleman in no way connected with the parish. I do not remember any one thing in my ministry that ever gave me more spirit for an enterprise than did this timely and unsought for gift from this large hearted friend, of Rivière Ouelle, Mr. Edmund King.

The rest of the expense, save \$100, has been met by the offertories and by the proceeds of a series of excellent entertainments got up with lively interest by the visitors. There was only one of these entertainments this Summer, but it was so excellent that it was repeated. It was managed by Miss Beers and Mr. Weir, both of Montreal. There was also a juvenile bazaar, got up by the "Sea-side Club," and the proceeds handed to me by their happy little President, Miss Hannah Cameron. The remaining \$100, one of the congregation, a Montreal gentleman, has kindly promised to collect.

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The visitors to this locality are chiefly mothers and their children, and the majority of them Presbyterians and Baptists All attend the services and enter heartily into the worship, being enabled to follow by means of the paged prayer books. And here, as in a former report, I must express a sincere hope that ere long we shall be furnished with prayer books of different sizes, all paged to correspond. As it is, even those which appear in every respect alike are not paged the same. Not long since, on a very solemn occasion in another part of the parish, I had occasion to use the service for the visitation of the sick; accordingly I gave out the page, but I was surprised that so few responded, for there was a large number present. My feelings can well be imagined, when I learned afterwards that most of the congregation had their books open at the matrinonial service.

And why could we not have the "Prayer for all conditions of Men," and "the General Thanksgiving," inserted where used? It would be but a slight change and in arrangement only, yet what an advantage it would be, especially to the many who, from outside, are at the present day being attracted to our worship.

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ll condiinserted arrangespecially ay being The Station—A mile from Fraserville.—The few Protestant families here are nearly all connected with the railroad.

The majority, 75 souls, are connected with the Church;

of these 28 are children and 14 are communicants.

Nevertheless, we have much reason to feel encouraged. Notwithstanding removals, our services, like those at the village, have never been better or more regularly attended,

and they are always bright and hearty.

One great want is a little Church, and as soon as we see prospects of permanence in the Protestant element of the place, we must set to and build one; in the meantime we must do the best we can with the school room. it looks much more cheery than it used to, especially in its Christmas decorations, which are still up and remind us of the festival gathering we had not long since, in connection with our annual Christmas tree—an occasion that was taken advantage of by the congregation to show their appreciation of the services of the Sunday School teachers, the two young ladies already mentioned, together with Miss Ferguson, Miss Fyles and especially the Superintendent and Bible Class teacher, Mr. John Hill, of whose loving and persevering interest in this good work, as well as in the great cause of temperance, I cannot speak without deep feelings of personal gratefulness and expressions of warmest praise.

The Railroad Temperance Association, now in its fourth year, continues its fortnightly entertainments with unabated

interest.

Open intemperance is now rarely seen—a mighty contrast when we think of days gone by—and not only has a healthy public opinion been developed in regard to this grave question, but the whole tone of the community has at the same time become correspondingly elevated. Though not a Church organization, much of my time and energy are given to the furtherance of its operations.

The day school (Protestant dissentient) is flourishing, and the English community are to be congratulated in having Miss Fyles a teacher, so enthusiastic in her work and so winning upon the esteem of her pupils; it is a satisfaction to know that the exercises are always opened and closed in a manner consonant with the feelings of Christian parents.

This year we have been able, as we have not been before, to keep up Friday evening service, with but few interrup-

tions. Recently these meetings have assumed a form that promises increased interest and usefulness. We open with a short service, mainly the service of the Beatitudes from the enlarged American Prayer Book, intoning the responses. This is followed by a hymn which, I first explain, that the singing may be "with the understanding also." I then take up questions that have been handed in at the previous meeting, in my explanations making free use of the blackboard. The questions may be on the bible, prayer book, the Church or the Church's work. This I find productive of that enquiring interest that we so much desire in our people. When time is up we sing another hymn and then close with intercessory prayer. The occasion is further utilized for drawing together socially, for practising hymns, &c., and for exchanging library books.

Last winter a very able and interesting lecture on Insects, was delivered here for the benefit of the Parsonage Fund, by the Rev, Thos. Fyles, who most kindly came all

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the way from Point Levis for the purpose.

Bic—Fifty-five miles down the line from Rivière-du-Loup Station. We opened services here for the first time this summer. It is the loveliest spot along the whole of the south shore. The visitors, however, I found were not numerous. They were nearly all ladies and all members of the Church of England. The Town House was most kindly placed at our disposal for our services, which were held on five successive Sunday afternoons, the mornings being given to Rimouski. The attendance was between 30 and 40, and all expressed themselves highly pleased.

One Sunday was very kindly taken for me down here by the Rev. Chas. Hamilton, for whose valuable and most cheerfully rendered help at Rivière-du-Loup also and at the Portage on many occasions, I must express my deepest gratitude. Indeed I do not know what I should have done but for his

great kindness.

Rimouski—Nine miles further down.—Resident Protestants, including family at Father Point, six miles off, 29. Of the 10 adults 5 are communicants. In summer there is the addition of a few visitors. My visits here average once a month throughout the year. We usually have two bright little services at Mr. Wm. Butchart's hospitable home each time, one in the evening and one the following morning,

Mrs. Butchart acting as organist. The children are well trained in the Church service and carefully eatechised.

St. Flavie.—When I visit Rimouski I usually continue my journey 18 miles further down to St. Flavie. Here are now but two Protestant families and a few railroaders coming and going. I shall be heartly glad when these two remaining families can see their way clear to remove from this rough and most undesirous locality.

I have also visited Grand Métis, still further on, and by

request held a service there.

Sault-au-Cochon—A lumbering establishment on the north shore of the St. Lawrence, opposite Rimouski and reached by sailing boats from Haté Bay.—The distance across is thirty-eight miles, and the passage sometimes is very rough, though fair weather is usually waited for, which sometimes causes a delay of two or three days.

As at Rimouski, my visits here are always most enjoyable. There are 16 Protestants, 9 of whom are communicants.

On my visit in the spring, we had eight cheery services and Holy Communion, Mrs. Reed presiding ably at the organ. My usual Autumn visit I gave up, as at the time I could have gone, the little flock happened to be scattered.

It is a great comfort when one thinks of the isolation of these good people, especially in winter, to know that the Manager, Mr. Grant Forrest, assembles them regularly every Sunday and kindly officiates for them as lay-reader.

In this truly Christain home there is one of whom I feel constrained to speak still more particularly. It is Miss Annie Forrest, Mr. Forrest's cousin. By reason of her knowledge of medicine, skill in nursing, and Christain devotedness to the work of ministering to the sick, this lady proves herselfan inestimable boon not only to Saul' au-Cochon, but to the poor habitants for miles along the coast. Her father was a physician with an extensive practice, during the last six years of his life, however, he was totally blind.

It was in acting as eyes and hands for him during this period that she acquired the knowledge that she now exercises with such Christian love and with such good success. Could Sault-au-Cochon spare her, I feel that she is a person most eminently fitted for membership in a sisterhood like

the noble one we have at Winnipeg.

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Grand Bay - Up the Saguenay, eighty miles from Rivière du Loup, in connection with the Price Bros' lumbering establishment here, there are nineteen Protestants, nearly all adults, of whom seven are communicants.

Seven services were held here, one by the Rev. A. A. Von Iffland, and one by Ven. Archdeacon Evans, and the Holy

Communion administered twice.

The manager, Mr. Alexander Blair, opens his house for united worship every Sunday, and kindly officiates as layreader.

By a bequest of the late Honorable David Price, I understand there is to be a neat little Chrack erected here.

Chicoutimi.—Some twelve miles further up. The number of Protestants here, including a family at L'Anse au Foin, is twenty-nine, of whom thirteen are communicants.

Seven services were held here, one by the Rev. A. A. Von Iffland, and one by the Ven. Archdeacon Evans, and the

Holy Communion administered twice.

The families are too scattered to assemble regularly on Sundays; worship, however, is duly observed in each home.

I have not yet managed to visit the poor scattered sheep along Lake St. John, between twenty-five and fifty miles further up. For these I feel much concerned. Another season I must try and do something for these, and more indeed for the Saguenay generally. In the mean time I have no doubt but that the agent of the Hudson Bay Co. and his devout wife, Mr. and Mrs. Cummins, do all they can for the welfare of all they can reach in the neighbourhood of Point Blue.

I'Anse au Foin, I have never reached but once, and so violent was the cart shaking that I had to endure because of the tide, that I was poorly for two months after.

My second trip to the Saguenay was prevented by the terrific storm of November. The water rose so high and the waves were so violent that two wings were torn away and carried off from the house in which I was staying, awaiting the steamboat. I was sorry thus to fail of my last chance for the season, particularly on account of the good people, numbering some twenty-five, including children, at the new lumbering establishment of St. Etienne, nine miles above Tadousae. Here again, however, I have

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the comfort of knowing that the manager, Mr. Hugh Blair, opens his kind home for united worship every Lord's day.

Trips up the Saguenay are always pleasant, and on landing I am always sure to be gladdened with a hearty welcome.

The Manual of Family Prayers, published with the sanction of the Bishop, is in every home throughout the Mission, and is in more or less general use.

"Church Work" and "The Dawn of Day" are taken by nearly every family. The Church Guardian has I regret to say been in most cases discontinued, chiefly through lack of news concerning the diocese of Quebec. The most fruitful cause of the indifference to religion with which one has to contend is that of mixed marriages. It is needful that our people should be warned from the pulpit, from time to time, of the grievous mistake of such alliances. Counsel in this matter is not usually ventured upon until it is not only a very delicate matter but almost invariably when it is too late.

And this reminds me of my repeated obligations to Dr. Littledale for his "Plain Reasons." If any one reading this report have not already got this timely and most powerful book, I would strongly urge them to get it by sending direct to Miss Wood (S. P. C. K. Depository, St. John's St., Quebec,) or by applying to their clergyman who will be pleased to get it for them. It is only a matter of 30 cts.

### STANSTEAD.

The Rev. Geo. Thorneloe reports:—

The work of this Mission which now includes the two distinct and separately organized posts of Stanstead Plain and Beebe Plain, has been carried on without break throughout the year, the services in both Churches being same in number and character as in former years.

And although, owing to the constant drain upon our numbers through removals, we have missed many familiar faces from the Congregations, still on the whole the attend-

ance has kept up to about the usual average.

Our Lenten services in Christ Church were marked with unusual interest, the Congregations being larger and even more appreciative than in previous years. Holy Week was made, as usual, a time of special devotion. And we are convinced that the daily services of that week bore fruit in the increased earnestness of our people. We have felt that it was not only our duty but our wisdom to observe Lent strictly being persuaded that in its annually recurring appointments, the Church has provided for us just what we need to keep us spiritually awake. And we have felt moreover that by this strict observance of that Holy Season we were not only promoting our own best religious interests but were affording encouragement to neighbouring parishes where the report of our doings would be carried, and were leaving witness against that over-excitement of revivalism from which our Eastern Townships have, in many parts, so sadly suffered.

And it is hard to see why all this should not apply also

to the Advent Season.

Among many encouragements there are in this part of the parish one or two discouragements of so serious a nature as to sadden the heart of the Clergyman and seriously affect the heartiness and interest of our services. I may mention, for example, the lack of regular habits of Church-going and the difficulty of keeping up a regularly organized Choir.

Among the office-bearers of Christ Church to all of whom our thanks are due, I cannot forbear to single out and specially mention our Warden Mr. H. E. Channel, to whose untiving zeal and able administration of affairs we owe it largely that the Mission is to-day in so healthy a financial

condition.

The Church day school is in efficient operation under Miss Hepburn. We have this year adopted the envelope system with excellent results.

At Beebe Plain the growth has not been so marked as in the previous year but has still been very perceptible. The congregations have rather improved than otherwise. The Sun-

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day School in connection with which Mrs. McClintock and Mrs. McGowan, deserve especial mention, is in a most prosperous condition. The Church edifice has been repainted, the furnace completed, the grounds about the Church levelled, and a very neat fence built. Upon these works we

have yet a small balance to pay.

In speaking of our Lady workers, I feel bound to give especial prominence to Mrs. McClintock, who has been indefatigable in every good work; and Miss Elder an organist, who from the very early days of our Mission has been faithful to her post. And yet it seems invidious to pass over any of those zealous ladies who last winter carried off a most successful series of socials, realizing thereby the sum of \$108. Nor must I omit to mention that during my absence in the Summer, the various workers of this Mission combined to give a very successful concert. In which good work they were ably assisted by kind friends from Bolton and other parts, notably by Mr. John Hall. To these kind friends we are heartily grateful.

Next year this Mission will begin to share the burden of

the general expenses of the parish.

At the Vestry Meeting held last Easter, it was resolved that from the first January next, All Saints Church, Beebe Plain, should contribute towards the stipend of the Clergyman at the rate of \$100 per annum.

It remains for me to add that the year just closing is an

important one in the annals of this parish.

In the first place it is the final year of our dependence upon Missionary aid. Next January we are to become

self-supporting.

This certainly is not a matter of despondency and the less so since the way seems to have been providentially smoothed before us. About mid-summer, Wm. Grannis, Esq., of Chicago, a brother of Mrs. Meigs of Stanstead Plain, himself formerly a resident of Stanstead, a gentleman who had already munificently befriended us, sent to us the unlooked for and almost startling message that he was ready to pay whatever remainder of debt there might be at that time hanging over the parish. Later on he fulfilled his promise by sending to our wardens a check for \$3.10, thus not only filling our hearts with gratitude but enabling us to look forward without serious misgiving to the approaching date of self-support. This coming at this juncture certainly seems providential and I trust it will have the effect of stimulating us to do our duty fully and faithfully in the future.

Then in the second place the year has been noteworthy, as being the first year of our occupation of a Parsonage wholly our own. It is a matter of devout thankfulness that we have been enabled to secure and to pay for a property in every way suitable to our needs. And this year also we have had the additional satisfaction of seeing the house put into excellent repair and beautified by the erection of a neat new fence.

So much for the parish. To me personally—if I may be allowed to refer to myself—the year has been notable.

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Three times during the year I received proofs of my people's good will towards me and mine. First shortly after a brief illness in the early spring, I received through the kindness of Mrs. T. Lee Terril, a purse with the request that I would expend its contents in seeking renewed vigour.

Next through the kind hands of Mr. and Mrs. Sheafe, I received another touching proof of my people's kindness, in the presentation on two different occasions, of gifts to Mrs. Thorneloe, the latter of the two occasions happily coinciding with the 10th anniversary of our marriage. We naturally valued all those testimonials, as tokens of the harmony existing between our people and ourselves. We make grateful acknowledgment also of a generous gift of \$25 from Miss Sheafe of Boston, sent to us at Easter through the hands of Mr. N. T. Sheafe.

And finally I must not omit to make reference to the kindness of the Bishop who, on hearing of the brief illness above referred to, invited me to join him in his trip to the Gulf of St. Lawrence and the Magdalen Islands. This trip which was a delight from beginning to end, was one of great benefit to me; and I cannot be to grateful to his Lordship for his goodness.

I have not included the value of the gifts above referred to in the accompanying financial statement.

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## SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. W. T. Forsythe reports:-

During the past year, the first of my incumbency, there has been much to encourage one in this Mission. Perhaps the progress of Church work was somewhat impeded by the fact that much time was necessarily consumed in my getting accustomed to the ways and manners of a new country, but now I think I may say that the Church machinery of the Mission is fairly at work. Another obstacle which must ever seriously injure the work of the Mission Priest here is the geographical feature of the district, its division into two great portions by a sheet of water which at many times it is impossible to cross. Still, in spite of all obstacles, in looking back and reviewing the work of the Church amongst us this year, all members of the Mission must thank God and take courage.

Sandy Beach.—The services of the Church have been regularly conducted here nearly every Sunday, once, and upon some days twice. The only occasions when Sunday services have been omitted here have been when I was detained by services in the other parts of the Mission. Besides Sunday services we have established services also on the evenings of all the Saints' Days. The chief fasts and festivals are duly observed by special services. Special services are held moreover on certain week-days in Lent and Advent. The Holy Eucharist is celebrated at all the Sunday morning services and upon the chief festivals. We have also started a special children's service, which is held about once a month. During the past year the exterior of the Church fabric was limewashed and painted, and the porch ceiled. To defray the expense of this the ladies of the congregation organized a tea meeting on Easter Monday, the proceeds of which, aided by subscriptions from members of the Church and two offertories, amounted to the sum required, and we can now gratefully look at a Church repaired exteriorly, upon which no debt exists. friend of the Mission also furnished means by which the chancel was painted and beautified without any expense to the congregation. A set of altar linen, an alms dish and a Communion flagon have also been presented to the Church. It is to be hoped that next year the interior of the Church will be further repaired and beautified. As will be seen

by the financial statement appended to this report, the people have nobly contributed towards the various Church works and the Church Society funds, and doubtless if the fishing season of this year had been a good one, the contributions would have been even greater. I must here express the thanks of our members to the people's warden. C. Veit, Esq., for a generous gift towards repairing the Parsonage. Both this gentleman and his fellow warden, N. Bailey, Esq, are most zealous in the support of all Church works in this parish, and for their labours for a long period of years they have fairly earned the gratitude of all church. men here. I must express my thankfulness to many others who have nobly assisted in parish work as Sunday School teachers, members of the choir, &c. I must especially instance the conduct of our choir members, who are mostly young girls, and our two youthful organists, who have seldom missed services or practices, however inclement the weather. July 14 and 20 were red letter days in the calendar of this Mission, owing to two visits from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. On the first of these two days twenty-seven persons were admitted to the full membership of the Church by the holy rite of Confirmation. On the second of these days I was ordained to the Priesthood. The recollection of this episcopal visit will long linger in the minds of our people. Besides the regular services in the Church, I have been enabled to hold a periodical service at Douglastown on Sundays, and at a house in a distant part of the Mission, the Barachois, on week days, While chronicling the progress of the Church amongst us in material things, we may believe that the spiritual fabric has been building also, and by the aid of frequent services and Eucharists, many have advanced further towards perfection in the spiritual life. Although the number of communicants here is very fair, still I must lament that there are many, especially amongst the young men of our congregation, who habitually turn their backs upon this blessed feast. I have endeavoured to keep our young members together by means of a communicant's class, which I hope, under God's blessing, may do good to some. I hope that the work of the Church may progress yet amongst us, and pray that the blessing of the Great Master may descend upon all our efforts for His glory.

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Peninsula .- I think that I can also record progress in the Church's work here. The services of the Church have been held with regularity as far as possible, although on some Sundays I have been unable to cross the bay on account of weather or other hindrances. Services are held here on all the Sundays of the month except the first. Services are also held on the chief fasts and festivals and on certain week days in Lent. The Holy Communion is celebrated once a month, and also at the chief festivals. The congregation has this year purchased a reed organ for \$100, and this has greatly helped the services, and adding to their brightness and beauty. There have been presented to this Church during the past year, a set of altar linen and a paten. July 15 will be a day long to be remembered in the annals of this congregation, for on that date the Lord Bishop of Quebec visited this part of the Mission, and consecrated the Church, which is dedicated to St. Matthew, and also confirmed eleven persons. My thanks are due to our young lady organist, who has effectually trained the choir and enabled them to well render the musical part of the service.

Little Gaspé.—The work here is more truly pioneer than in any other part of the Mission. The interior of the Church is still in a deplorable condition, but thanks to the exertions of Rev. J. P. Richmond, for whose efforts in their behalf, when he had charge of this Mission, the members of this congregation can never be too thankful, we are now in a condition to finish the interior. A contract has been entered into, and the work will commence at the beginning of the New Year. When the work is completed, we hope to have a Church worthy of being a sanctuary of God. We must renew our gratitude to the "Sisters of Killum," whose good deeds are known throughout the Christian world, for the gift of a really beautiful altar cloth, a set of altar linen, a kneeler and book markers, which already beautify this Church. Services are held here on the evenings of the third Sunday in the month and of the Saturday before the fourth Sunday, and on the morning of the fourth Sunday, when Holy Communion is always celebrated. I also occasionally hold services at the extreme end of this Mission, at Ship Head. Next year, by the generosity of the agents and employés of the firm of Messrs. Fruing, we hope to have a bell on this Church.

### SHIGAWAKE AND PORT DANIEL.

The Rev. C. D. Brown reports:-

During the year that has just passed away, all the appointed Sunday services have been held with two exceptions.

The "two exceptions" occurred at St. James' Church, Port Daniel, and were owing to the inclemency of the weather. The Missionary made great efforts to be present on those occasions. The Congregation, however, acted more wisely by remaining at home. Unfortunately one was Christmas Day. A heavy easterly snow storm (the first during five years on that day) happened, which prevented the service at Port Daniel, but not at L'Anse aux Gascons, nor at Shigawake. Week-day services were held in St. James' and St. Paul's Churches during the season of Lent. And also a Thursday evening service was conducted at Port Daniel, in the fall months. Harvest Thanksgiving services were also given. The attendance at Church is increasing. Regular celebrations of the Holy Communion have taken place Nineteen of the baptisms took place on Sundays, after the second lesson, two only being private. The marriages were performed in Church; one, was by license, and two by banns.

This has been an unusually hard year on the coast. The harvest was not an average one, and the fishing proved a failure, consequently, the financial condition of the Mission is not very bright.

The former will be paid in a few days from this time of writing; and for the latter vigorous efforts are now being made for an early settlement. The Congregation intend doing the best possible for the increased assessment asked by the Society.

Thirty-nine persons in all received the rite of Confirmation at the hands of his Lordship the Bishop, when he visited

the Mission in the summer.

St. Paul's Church, Shigawake.—This Church is now in a good condition inside, but still requires painting on the outside. A new fence has been placed round the Churchyard. An additional stove, an oak matting carpet add much to the comfort of this Church. The Sunday School is doing well. It is still under the care of Mr. Skene, assisted by an able staff of teachers. Twenty-four candidates were confirmed here.

St. James' Church, Port Daniel.—A successful bazaar was held in aid of this Church, which realized about a hundred

dollars.

This sum will do much towards repairing the Church. It requires painting and also some other improvements.

With much sorrow I have here to record the death of Mr. Wm. McDonald, who acted at various times as Church-Warden, and for a long time as Superintendent of the Sunday School. He was a devout Christian, and a staunch member of this Congregation. The Sunday School is now under the charge of Mr. Norman Dow, who takes great interest in the work. Five candidates were confirmed at this Church.

L'Anse aux Gascons.—The Church here has had the roof inside finished, and also other work has been done upon the building. The handsome grant of a hundred dollars from the Society will complete this Church. We feel much indebted to the Society for its kindness; and also to F. T. Thomas, Esq., merchant of Quebec, for the generous gift of a large and handsome lamp to our Church in this place. Ten candidates were presented for Confirmation.

I have now been in charge of the Mission nearly eight months, and am thankful to say that the congregation has been steadily on the increase, considering the indifference the people had fallen into on account of the Church having been closed so long. During the Summer months we have had a congregation of 80 to 90 every Sunday. The services are very hearty and cheerful, and the singing also is greatly improved. The organ has been bought at a cost of \$125 and is paid for, and proves a great help to our musical services.

Our Sunday School is also on the increase. I give a children's service once a fortnight, and proves an attraction to the children.

There will be a good number of candidates ready for Confirmation at an early date.

We hope before long to establish a Church Guild and

also a "Women's Friendly Society."

East Angus.—This part of my Mission has only been in existence about two years and is a growing place. I hold a fortnightly service in the school room, which is much appreciated and is generally attended by about fifty to sixty. The services are hearty and cheerful.

We have also a Sunday School here every Sunday, which

is superintended by Miss Bryant.

I have also a night school three times every alternate week for the young men who work at the pulp mill, and who are unable to read and write. This I have established as an inducement to bring them to Church, and proves very satisfactory indeed; most of them are old country young fellows brought up in ignorance and in entire disregard to religion, and who, I hope, before long will be instructed for Confirmation.

There is a growing want here for a Church, and we hope ere long to erect one, as the majority of the residents are Church people and would be most willing to do all in their

power.

There are also a number here being prepared for Confirmation.

Ascot Corner.—The attendance at this Church is encouraging. I find that the people here, and so indeed at my other Mission, will not attend Church regularly unless they are regularly visited. The average attendance is about sixty. The services are very hearty.

The Sunday School here is also on the increase. I give a fortnightly service for children and is much appreciated.

I have a number being prepared for Confirmation.

The following Reports have been received from Clergymen not in connection with the Diocesan Board.

# REPORT OF BISHOP'S COLLEGE.

The Principal begs to report:-

There is little that is new to report as to the religious condition of Bishop's College and School. The services in the College Chapel are ordered as heretofore, and the Chapel

itself is free from debt.

Two of our students, Mr. Hewton and Mr. Bernard, were ordained Deacons on the 22nd of June by the Bishop of Quebec. Of our present students one is a Deacon, and thirteen are candidates for Holy Orders. Of these five are exhibitioners in training for this Diocese, one of whom, Mr. Eames, is in his last year.

On the 22nd June the Bishop of Quebec held a Confirmation in the College Chapel, when one student and eight boys received the Laying on of Hands. They are still with us and are all communicants. All the students who belong to our Church are communicants, and so are twenty-

three out of our sixty-four boys.

The College Missionary Union continues to hold its terminal meetings, and I trust is the means of helping to keep alive amongst us an interest in missionary work and habits of intercession. We have had the benefit, during the year, of hearing sermons and addresses from the Right Rev. the Bishop of Vermont, the Rev. B. B. Smith, M.A., and the Rev. J. Hepburn, M.A.

The offertories in the Chapel have amounted to \$213.32, for the following objects:—Chapel expenses, \$56.57; Lectern Fund, \$64.97; Bishop's College, \$23.04; General Fund of Church Society, \$4.85; Mission Fund, \$4.71; Pension Fund, \$4.30; Algoma, \$3.99; N. W. Missions, \$5.88; S. P. G., \$31.46; Madagascar (Missionary Union), \$13.55.

The subscriptions of the members of the Missionary Union (for Madagasear) make a further sum of \$5.75.

The Mission services at Milby and Capelton are still maintained, the former being carried on by Mr. G. H. Fooks and the latter by Mr. G. H. A. Murray. Mr. Fooks, who was in charge of Milby and Capelton during the Summer, began also a service in the school-house at Huntingville,

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which is now conducted by Mr. W. H. Nightingale, B.A. The work in these Missions is kept going, and that is all that we can do. Any development or growth can scarcely be expected until they are placed under the care of a resident Clergyman.

The offertories at Milby during the year have amounted to \$64.91 for the following objects:—Current expenses, \$56.32; General Fund of the Church Society, \$1.64; Mission Fund, \$2.04; Pension Fund, \$3.16; Bishop's College,

\$1.75.

The offertories at Capelton amount to \$18.12, and the companies working the mines have contributed \$20 towards the expenses of the Mission. Mr. G. H. Nichols, of New York, who represents one of these companies, has offered to build a Church (which, however, he wishes to be a "Union Church"), if we, or any of the orthodox non-Roman bodies will undertake to provide resident pastoral care. Perhaps something might be done by means of a combination of Missions.

#### COMPTON.

The Rev. G. II. Parker, reports:—

I wish here to acknowledge the open-handed generosity of the Hon. M. H. Cochrane, in defraying the expenses of painting the Rectory, inside and out, at a cost of over two hundred dollars. And I also wish to acknowledge the many acts of kindness on his part in the way of generous gifts to myself personally, especially at Christmas and Easter.

On the first Sunday in April of the present year, we introduced into the parish what is known as the "Envelope

System," and with marked success.

In October the Lord Bishop visited the parish and confirmd fourteen candidates—five males and nine females.

I must also mention with unfeigned regret the closing of the Compton Ladies' College. For ten years the Rev.

Principal Dinzey carried it on most laboriously and in spite of many and serious obstacles, and it is a matter of most sincere regret that he was not able to make it a thorough success, as he had hoped to do. The closing of the Institution I look upon as a very great loss, not only to this parish, but also to the whole Diocese, and I most earnestly that it will be re-opened in September next, and that

tefforts will be put forth to make it a successful Insti-

tution, and a permanent blessing to the Diocese.

Special thanks are due to Mr. James Hamilton, for superintendence when the Rector is absent at Hadlow. In course of only 2 months the unprecedented number of 4 adult parishioners died. Mr. Joseph Tinker, a long trusted G. T. R. employée, had fought for his country in the Crimea, Last March, he re-enlisted as a "soldier of the cross," when with his eldest son he was confirmed and admitted to Holy Communion. Mr. R. White, at the age of near "three score and ten," died after a sad accident. Mrs. Glover was a worthy young mother—a new comer to a new country. Miss Henningsen, not far beyond the teens, leaves many friends to mourn her apparently premature death. Over all these may be echoed the Church's loving hope.

## NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

The Rev. Thos. Blaylock reports:—

The year opened with great affliction in my family, and it was not until the middle of February that I was able to hold the first service. On the eighth of January my eldest son died of diphtheria, (which had for over a year worked death in the parish.) Five days later his youngest brother followed him to the Paradise of God. Both had that strong, unquestioning faith of childhood, which makes the "little ones" our teachers, so that we must become as such, to be fit for the Kingdom of God. My wife, self and other children also had the disease, but were, by the mercy of God, spared.

I have to acknowledge with many thanks the help of a Sunday's services from my neighbour, Rev. C. D. Brown, in this time of trouble, and also on another occasion, as well

as much material aid from my parishioners.

In the early Summer I was called upon to officiate at a double funeral—that of two young men; one was instantly killed by falling from the yard arm of a vessel, and left a young widow to whom he had been only lately married, the other died after a few days of extreme suffering, from a simple scratch, of a rusty nail. All present must have felt the truth of the lesson contained in the words of the burial service: "In the midst of life we are in death."

The young men connected with the firms in Paspebiac have taken charge of the musical part of our services, which, with the diligent aid of Miss Vielle, the organist, have improved immensely, and are now a pattern of hearty

worship.

Several adults have been baptized during the year after

due preparation.

In July the Lord Bishop, accompanied by his chaplain, the Rev. Geo. Thorneloe, commenced his visitation of Gulf Missions at this parish. I had the pleasure of presenting eighty-three candidates (out of a class of ninety) for the solemn rite of Confirmation, and trust that many have not received the gift of God in vain. Three of them had been brought up Roman Catholics, and two others of the same faith have since given adhesion to the Church. Some from another faith have also joined our ranks. Notwithstanding the weather was very wet and stormy, very large congre-

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In New Carlisle, there has been a steady increase in the number of communicants. In Paspebiae the number is nearly stationary, but I trust will soon improve.

On account of a weakness in my lungs I have been unable to hold special services in Lent and Advent during the year past.

Though the season has been one of the hardest I have ever known on the coast, crops and fishery both being poor, yet contributions in New Carlisle have increased over last year, much to the credit of the Church-Wardens, Messrs. J. L. Smith and Robert Caldwell—but this Church still falls far short of Paspebiae in punctuality of payments, and leaves much to be desired in this respect.

The Church in New Carlisle has been renovated outside at considerable expenditure of voluntary labour and some cost.

Seventy-six dollars have also been collected there towards the last of the Rectory debt. Many and welcome Xmas presents were sent to the Rectory, for which my parishioners have my best thanks.

The year now closing has been, I regret to say, a very

trying one financially, for this struggling parish.

The collapse of the lumber trade, on which our people mainly depend for support, has been a great trial, and our Church-Wardens in consequence, have had no easy task endeavouring to meet expenses, &c.

A number of families have left us, driven away by the hard times, and the present outlook is certainly not as encouraging as we could wish. Still we try to keep up heart,

and have yet much to be thankful for.

The average attendance at Church has been good, considering our diminished numbers, and there has been no break in the yearly course of our sacred services.

Our Sunday School, though reduced in strength and numbers, still holds on its way. Our day school, under the management of its efficient teacher, does its work thoroughly.

That true and faithful friend of the Church, Robt. Hamilton, Esq., having promised towards the reduction of our Parsonage debt \$150, provided we meet his donation with a like amount,—we have been making great efforts to secure this much needed help, and have now in hand rather more than half the sum required. What other generous friend will kindly hold out a helping hand. The payment of that debt and consequent relief from the burdens of annual interest, is a matter of vital importance to the maintenance of the Church here. God grant her light may not be extinguished in this place! I have continued this year, the monthly services for the benefit of the Railway employees at Chaudiere.



# RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

The Rev. A. J. Balfour reports:—

The chief event of the past year in the history of this parish has been the erection, in the town of Richmond, of a new Church to replace the old one, which, owing to the northward growth of the place, now stands quite at its outskirt. In tones of dilapidation and decay the old structure had long and loudly demanded to be relieved of its duty,









seemingly conscious that it were a reproach to any well-to-do, Church loving people. The troublesome question of site alone, I think, counselled silence, until the removal, recently, of the old St. Francis Bridge compelled us in the Church's interest to move,—the Church, like the Bridge, having to accommodate people on either side of the river.

As we are deeply indebted to many kind friends in Quebec, Sherbrooke and elsewhere, for generous assistance, in the name of my Congregation and myself, I desire here to thank them most sincerely. I shall venture to give a brief description of the House which they have helped us

to creet to God's glory.

The building, which is of brick, with slated roof, is cruciform in shape, and gothic in architecture. The nave is  $35 \times 73$ , the chancel  $24 \times 26$ , the transepts  $12 \times 16$ , all inside measurement. The roof of the chancel is "barrel" shaped and panelled, the form of the arch almost pointed, being preserved. For Sunday School and other like purposes, it was deemed expedient to have a lofty basement under the entire structure: this, which of course added very materially to the cost of the building, has not marred, as much as might have been expected, its symmetry. Beneath the Chancel, where the ceiling is loftiest, is a room of sufficient size to accommodate 70 people, intended for use as a Chapel when, on week days, the Congregation is small. The Chancel window is well elevated, and of very pretty design: this as also a corresponding one in the west will, at no expense to the parish, be filled with appropriate subjects and emblems in rich coloured glass, executed by Messrs. Spence and Son of Montreal; the rest of the windows, with heavy ground glass with an ecclesiastical pattern thereon. the present we shall have to be content with a belfry. Possibly some kind friend whom God has blessed with a plentiful supply of this world's goods and a generous and grateful heart may, some day, as a thank offering or a memorial, erect in its stead a handsome tower. This would certainly contribute vastly to the external appearance of the building. The Church will accommodate 425 or more, and be ready for occupation within a month.

And now about the expense. The Site, a very central one costs us \$1,300; Contract price for Church was \$8,500; Extras, \$350; Furnaces, \$250; Architects for professional services, supervision of work and R. R. expenses, \$600;

Our assets are—subscriptions paid \$6,067.53; outstanding subscriptions and old school house, \$950; say \$7,000; leaving a balance of \$4,000, which we have borrowed at 6 p.c. But immediately, some further outlay will have to be made for extra lights, benches and so on and even this will leave much to be desired such as chancel carpet, altar cloth, pulpit, &c., which for the present we must do without, unless some kind souls will come to our aid and present them as offerings to God for His service here.

Heavy though our liabilities are we are determined that they shall soon be wiped off and God's House left free from

debt and decently furnished.

I cannot refrain from here expressing the hope, pleaded from house to house, that, as is surely most consonant with Christianity, this House soon to be dedicated to God's service may be free having seats unappropriated, where all who will enter, will find an equal welcome, and meet as children of a common Father without distinction. I hope that in my next report, I shall be in a position to announce that my good people, recognizing the nobler principle, have adopted this new and better way, if at the sacrifice of personal convenience and comfort so much the more praiseworthy the act.

Our subscriptions in behalf of the Church Society have fallen off during the past year. This, while a matter of regret is not one altogether of surprise, considering how pressing have been our home claims. I am happy however to say that our offerings on behalf of Missionary work in the North West, are considerably in excess of any previous year, amounting in the aggregate to \$196.79. For this we are much indebted, as in former years, to our two zealous collectors in the interest of Algoma, Mr. Journeaux and Miss Cleeve; \$107.85, being the amount collected by them

during the past year.

Our Ladies' Missionary Union continues to meet once a month for prayer, the circulation of Mission intelligence and work. The material result of the year past has been a box of clothing, sent to the poor on the coast of Labrador, and \$50 in money, sent through the Central Board, one half to the Bishop of Rupert's Land and the other to a struggling

Missionary in Minindosa, N. W. T., to aid him in building a Church. We hope however that these meetings have not been without other results, not the less important because now unseen. Our Union does not number many members, but were it but half so many, we should not be discouraged. At the same time, one cannot but regret that others would not share with us the privilege of thus furthering our Master's work and ours, and claim as well as give a blessing.

Twice during the past year have we had a public Missionary meeting, when very interesting addresses were delivered, on one occasion by the Rev. Canon Mills of Mon-

treal, on the other by the Rev. Dr. Roe of B. C. L.

The Women's Guild was never in a more flourishing condition since the first year of its organization, than now. They have recently handed over to the new Church Building Committee \$300, the proceeds from last year's work; and they confidently expect to have a much larger amount to tender for the same object next year. I cannot speak too highly of the deep interest and zeal which they manifest in furthering the Church's work, or sufficiently express by gratitude therefor. A Clergyman meets with many trials and discouragements which are unknown to any but himself; these are very sensibly lightened by such kindly cooperation as I have referred to.

I desire to acknowledge with thankfulness the kindness and zeal of my Church-Wardens for the past year as in former years; and also that of our Building Committee. And when I remember that we have met once a fortnight for nearly a year, with seldom an absentee, and have scarcely suffered one day to pass without some of us visiting and inspecting the new Church while in course of erection,

their faithfulness to duty will be seen.

I have held Divine Service at St. Anne's Church twice every Lord's Day and on the Church's Festivals and Saints Days. During Holy Week, when we had a daily service, the attendance averaged fifty each week-night. A devout Congregation being evidently deeply impressed by the solemnity of the holy season. We have had a celebration of the Holy Eucharist twice a month. I am indebted to the Rev. Dr. Reid, Dr. Roe, Professor Read and my own father for occasional help; which enabled me to administer the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in St. John's Church and elsewhere. I have superintended the Sunday Schools at

For this I thank them very much.

#### SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. Buxton B. Smith reports:-

In submitting this report for the year ending March 1st, 1884, the Church-Wardens "congratulate the Vestry upon the very satisfactory result of last year's operations"—over \$4,700 having been raised for Church objects. The Ladies of the Guild continue their good works. In addition to supporting an Indian girl at the Wawanosh Home, Algoma—they have furnished the Church Hall with Prayer Desk, Lectern and Book cases and the Church Chancel with a handsome Brussels Carpet. Towards procuring the Carpet a donation of \$30 was also received from a generous layman of the parish.

Some of the children of the Sunday School have formed themselves into a "Little Guild," and during the few months since its formation have raised \$35 for Mission work and are now busy preparing a box for the Christmas tree at the Wawanosh Home.

Acting upon the resolution of the Diocesan Synod requesting the Bishop to invite the establishment of Branches of the Church of England Temperance Society in the various parishes and Missions of the Diocese. A Branch was formed in this parish December last—starting with a membership of 74, it now numbers 229—of this number 180 are total abstainers and 49 belong to the General Section. Besides the regular meetings of members, public meetings have been held from time to time and have been largely attended. In many ways the establishment of the Society has been of great benefit to the parish.

Both Rector and parish are much indebted to the Rev. Dr. Reid, for his kind and generous assistance in the work and services of the Church during the year past. Towards securing the generous offer made by Mr. Robert Humilton, to Bishop's College, subscriptions amounting to \$2,500, have been received from this parish. The payment of many of the subscriptions is to extend over three years. The Rev. Dr. Roe reports that up to date Nov. 27th, \$1,164 of the promised sums have been received, \$998 from members of the Church and \$166 from friends outside of her Communion.

That inasmuch as the notice of business to be transacted at this meeting, published in the Quebec Chronicle, does not correctly give the Proposed amendment to Article XIII, the words, "The Revenue," being left out, the meeting do now adjourn.—Lost.

The Secretary read a letter from Mr. Lowndes, of Gaspé, deprecating the proposed alteration in Article XIII, respecting Endowments.

The following amendments to By-Laws then came up for final adoption:

Moved by Mr if. Carter, seconded by Rev. G. V. Hous-

That Article XIII be amended by erasing all the words from, "That from and after the First day of January, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Seventy-Three," down to, "Shall not be less than Six Hundred Dollars per Annum," and substituting the following:

That from and after the First day of January, in the year of Our Lord, One Thousand Eight Hundred and Eighty-Five, the scale of Stipends to the Clergy serving under the Diocesan Board shall be as follows:

\$600 per annum for the first Five years.

\$650 after Five years' service. \$700 after Ten years' service. \$750 after Fifteen years' service. \$800 after Twenty years' service.

Before the confirmation of the amendment, Capt. Carter asked permission to insert the words, "Not less than," before \$600, \$650, \$700, \$750, \$800. This being agreed to by a majority of two-thirds of the members present, the amendment so altered was put to the meeting and carried.

Mr. John Hamilton asked that before the consideration of the amendment, the words, "during their incumbency," be added after the words, "or of Missionaries in charge of missions whose Endowment Funds shall," in the last clause. This was agreed to by two-thirds of the meeting present. The amendment, so altered, was then put to the meeting,

(Same as foregoing, only instead of the words in Italics say) towards the augmentation of the Fund formed for the purpose of providing for the future support of the Clergy of the Diocese, called the Sustentation Fund.

Towards the support of Missionaries and Clergymen of the United Church of England and Ireland in the Diocese of Quebec.

Or.

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for those of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity, called the Pension Fund

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund formed to make provision for the widows and orphans of the Clergy of the United Church of England and Ireland, in the Diocese of Quebec, called the Widows' and Orphans' Fund.

Or,

Towards the augmentation of the Fund for endowing the Church in the Mission of (or at ) held by the said Church Society, subject to the conditions of a Deed of Trust passed between the said Church Society and the Incumbent and Church-wardens of the Church in the said Mission, (or at .)

Or,

As the commencement of an endowment for the Church of St.

in the Mission of (or at

) and to provide for the future maintenance of divine worship in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or,

For and towards the encouragement of education, and the support of day schools and Sunday schools in the said Diocese of Quebec, in conformity with the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland.

Or,

For and towards a Fund for assisting persons preparing for the Ministry of the Gospel in the United Church of England and Ireland, within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and the Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

Or,

As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage

houses, yards, ar rectories

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houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and churchyards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.
