At Buantrons, Ont., on Monday last, the laying of the comer stove of the Craren cotton mills was putformed it the presence of a large gathering, with interesting ceremonies and inaugural addresses in which the major and other citizens took part.
A ueetisg of the creditors of the Consolidated brak is called for the 9 th of June next to appoint a liquidator under the Act passed at the late session of Purliament "to authorize and provide for the windiag up of the Consolidated Bank."

The Government proposes to build a line of telegraphacross Anticosti Ishand, from end to end, and tolay cables between Anticosifand the maibland, between Magdillen [sland and Gape Breton, and betwen the mainland aad Sable Island. Superintendent F. N. Gisborne is commissioned to coutrict for the cables in Englatid.

Dife statement of the Bank of Montreal, for the fiseal year en liag A!ril 3: th, 18 ; 0 , jus $t$ published, cmapares tworably with that fur the previnus year, the het cami igs then shown amounting to $\$ 611,487.48$, and now, $51,049,-$ 340.97 ; an increase of $5137,853.49$. The balance carried over from 1 rofit and Loss April 3 )th, $1879,5101,784.55$, with the year's earaings, above given, make a total fund of $\$ 1,151,125.52$, from which dividends amounting to $\$ 1,079,028$, or 9 jer c nt. on the crpitnl stock, lave been paid or appropriated, leaving a balance to the credit of Paofitand Lonss, A pril 30th, 1880, of $\$ 71,197.52$. On the Stocli Exchange, the sharea ahowed some improveme.at upon the publica-




tion of these figures, indicative of the favorable construction which, in view of the libern appropriatio.as made for bad and doubtful debts urfler the new management, is put upon them in fianncial circles.

Tue troubles on the wharf remind us that prople who live in glass houses shonidn't throw stones. We lave laken occasion more than once of late to offer some strictures apon the way affits are manged amongst the ship laborers at Queber, and now the same chatacter of disturbances, only differing in. degree, arrests attention here. On Morday list a certain lut of wharf laborers receiving 124 cents per hour struck for 15 cents, and, after some parley, the demand whis anted. Later in the day, the news of this suce ssful strike hating, Fithoul doub', becone known all along the whart, another set of haboters struck for 20 cents per hour, lems that were peremptorily refused. The discontented men then started on a tramp to in luce of compel a general strike, and among the lirst laborers they approathed were the gang that hai alrealy samek and agroed upun 15 cents jer hour. Theser, against their inchinationand s-nge of right, were driven by threats to desist work it uot ullownd a further adrance to 20 cents. The cowd of stikers now rupidly increaced, and fursued its way ull along the wharf; furcing willing hatnds to stop work, and in some instances tuaking good their threats by burling sto es and other dangerous missiles amougst hose who pe sisted in working on. Some slight wounds or bruises were inflicted, but no serious ludily injury was done. In a short time the strike becnme general, the disorderly or riotons gathering numbering, it is estimated, some 2,000 men. At this siage a squad of the Witer Police, twenty in number, armed with rifles, uppeared upon the scene,
fixed bayonets in the presence of the rioters, and-quiel was restored. 'lhis is somewhat different from the way they do things at Quebec, and we cannot lut commend the example heartily to our sister city; it has such an immediate nind wholesome efoct. Those who chose to resume work were now protected from aseatult, a large body of cily policealso arriving and taking efficient part ia keeping the peace. The disorder cudted as suldenly as it began, and ended in the camplete frustation of the purposes of the leaders. Williug haburers were protected in their right to work on any terms they chose. The strike was not wholly uthsuecessful ; there is a good demand for labor just now, and fhippers have been induced to grant betler wages ; but we believe that in no case has 20 cents per hour been allowed for ordinary hands.
Tha Fortane Bay affir is not to be nllowed to drop, so firt as the United States can prevent. In recent messiges to Oongress both the President and Secretary of sate call the atteation of that boily to the failame 10 reach ail understa 1 ding and agre ment with the British Gove:mment, and press the satter upou the athention of members as cathing for immediate actinn, in order to secure the maintemance of the rights accorded to wr fisherme i by the British concessions in the Treaty (of Washington, and in procuring suinable action towards indemnity for the injury which this interest has atrendy suffered." clanse of the Banking Act directly denying this right is as fullows, Section 51:

The Bank shall not make loans or grant discomits on the security of its own stock, but slatl have a privileged lien for any debt or liability for any debt to the Bank on the shares and nupaid dividends of the debtor or party so linble, and may decline to allow my transfer of the shates of such debtor or party until such debt is paid, man, if such debt is not paid when due the Bank may sell such shares, after notice has been given to the holder thereof of the intention of the Bank to sell the same, by mailing such notice in the post office to the last known address of such holder, at least thinty days prior to such sale; and upon such sale being made, the president, vice-president, manager or casinier shall execute a mansfer of sucb shares to the purchaser thereof in the usual transfer book of the bank, which tansfer shall vest in such purchnser all the rights in or to such shares which were possessed by the holder thereat, with the same obligation of warramy on his part as if he were the vendor thereof, but without any warranty from the bank or by the oflicer of the bank executing such transfer:"

It will be sten that, while the jutent of the law is plainly that banks shall in no case make advances on their own stock, the door of evasion is left open through the provision that, in case of a debt due the bathk from a shareholder, his stock may be made subject to a privileged lien on the part iof the bank and rendered non-trunsfernble except by the bank. Practionlly there would be very little difference between securing $a$ debt in this way and making an open pledge of the stock for $a$ loan, and what diflerence there is almost wholly disappears if the bank make adrances to a stock holder on his demand note, and then,

## INSOLVENCY LEGLSLACLION.

Legislation upon insolvency will wilh. out doubt ently engage the attention of Parliament at its next session. Already the need of some Act provicling for the distribution of the assots of defrulting debtors makes itself sorely felt, and it is a want sure to become yet nore pressing with the lapse of time. instances are coming to light of clebto:s bluntly refus. ing to meet bills and inviting the creditor to do his worst, confident that the alternative of proceedings under the common har will not be resorterl to, and conseious that, if they should be, precantionary mensures already taken will reader them abortive.

A dry goods merchanl of this city was recently informed of the insolvency of a cubtomer, a small country stoze-keeper, and apon opening investigation soon learned that the father-h.-lay held a judgment by confession is the amount of S6,000, a sum that would more than cover the value of the entire estale. Other in. stances, similar in character, lave come to our knowledge both in the dry goods and hardware trades, and we have no manner of cloubt that inquiry would discover such cases in numbers.
So manifest are becoming the evils of no insolvency law that there sems a dis. position in some quarters to regret the repeal of the old law with all its attendant ovils, but this is an extreme view not shared by merchants at large, nor likely to be. The abuses which crepl in under the Act, the facility with which composi. tions and discharges were obtained, the incentives to collusion, the faitening of the official assignees, the impulent compatition of the newly discharged bankrupt
with his stock costing fifty or seventy five cents on the dollar, all these unwholesome operations of the law aro too fresh in the minds of the public to permit of any serious regrets over its repenl. If it be permitted to paraphrase the great dramatist, we should say of the late Insolvent Act, "the evil that it did lives after it; the good was all interred with its bones." Now what is wanted is to resuscitate the good and leave the evil, so far as enactment goos, buried.
'lwo bills having this object in view passed through a second reading at the late session, Mr. Wallace's and Mr. Abbott's. The striking leatures, and we may at once say, defects, of Mr. Wallace's bill are that it provicles for the full discharge of every debtor whose aftars shall have been administered in accordance with the terms of the bill, without regard to the percentage realized therefrom or other limitation, and that it makes no provision for the liquidation of the unsal. able portion of insolvent estates, such as book accounts, notes and other debts due the bankrupt.

The Abbott bill has already been noticed in the docksat. It hats mot the approval of the merchants of this city as formally expressed by a deputation which urged its passage upon the Govermment, and it commends itself to the favorable consideration of the mercantile commanity not as a complete lav, but as a practical measure carefully framed, and, as far as it goes, meeting the requirements of the time. It makes no provision for composition, none for discharge.

On these two points the bill is unsatis. factory, and will very likely incur opposition, first from the creditor and next from the debtor. Under ordinary conditions creditors can obtain far more from an insolvent estate by composition than in any other way. If anly the insolvent be honest and capable it neods no argument to demonstrate that ho can liquidate his own affairs to better advantage, get more out of the assets, than any one else; and large creditors will never be content that clamants for trifling sums should have it in their power to exact payment in full, or compel the winding up of the estate. On the other hand, the debtor class can hardly be expected to approve of a law which in case of insolvency fails to provide for a discharge in bankruptcy after surrender of the entire estate for clistribution amongst creditors. Friends of the Abbott bill acknowledge these defects, but maintain that they can best be remedied by subsequent legisla. tion, when the needs of both deb tar and creditor shall appear through the practi-
cal workings of the Act, and their wishes become known through the action of their representatives in Parliament.

The one point upon which all are agreed is that an insolvency law is essential to the healthy and equitable rogula. tion of trade. It is intolerable that a tradesman should be able to buy goods, fail before the maturity of the bill, and his whole estate pass into the possession of a suspiciously close friend or near relative withour redress of any kind for the real owner of the goods. let this is what can be done, is done, under cover of the law as it is. The gravest offences muler the old litw were light by comparison. A remedy is needed which the Abbolt bill, unsatisfactory though it be to both creditor and debtor, certainly supplies in part. No bankruptey bill has yet been franed in any country to meet the views of all interests, nor is likely to be; nor can bankruptey legistation reasonably be expected to constitute an impassable barrier to roguery. But between the rognery possible under any fosolvency daw am that possible under no law there can be little question of tho wisclom of choosing the first and lesser evil. Should no better bill be fumed meanwhite, we bespeak for Mr. Abbott's "Act to provide for the distribution of the assets of insolvent traders " prompl and favorable ation at the next session of limimment.

## Is The value of money rising THROUGHOUT THE WORLD?

A most interesting paper on the sub. ject prefixed to these remarks was read at a recent mecting of the London Statistical Society by Mr. R. l. Patterson, a member of the Council of that Soctely. It has long been a generally received opinion in Europe that the value of silver has fallen off very considerably of lato years, although a Commission appointed in the United States reported in the most. conficlent terms that the purchasing power of silver has not fallen off, while that of gold has risen in all countries. The report of the United States Commission was at first received with great distrust, as it was imagined that the United States wero interested in upholding the value of silver for the sake of the splendid Nevada mines. Nore recently doubts have been entertained whether the depreciation of silver, of which there is no doubt, may not, be due to a rise in the value of gold. Mr. Patterson admits that to determino correctly any substantial change on the value of the precious metals compared with other commodities is ono of the most
difficult of enquiries. It can only be done by reviewing prices over a long period of years, and taking likewise into account a variety of enuses of the most complicated kind. He himself does not pretend to gn beyond the broad facts of the last half linen years. The enquiries instituterl by Mr. Patterson are deeply interesting to the people of this continent, and, though it is quite impossible, in such a notice as the present, to convey any satisfactory ifler of tho scope of the paper, we shall endearor to state some of the man points.

MONEY AN! PMOES IN (GENAT MHTTALS.
By a reference to reliable tables of prices it is established that between 1573 aml 1575 there has been a fall of prices equal to 243 per cent., which proves that the purchasing power of gold has risen fully 24 per cent. It is then shown that the fall in the value of silver compared to gold is 11 per cent. less than the rise in the value of gold compred with general commodities, so that silver, though depreciated as compared with gold, has risen about 11 per cent. as compared with genemal commodities.
moner ard preces in inma.
A most interesting statement of the movement of silver in lndia is furnished by Mr. Patterson during the twenty years from 1855 to 1875 . The addition mate during that period to the stock of silver was no less than 160 millions sterling, or nearly eight hundred millions of dollars, and it is satisfactory to find that the need of additional currency was owing to more employment and higher wages, as well as to the gradual displacement of barter. As early as 1803 the Governor of Bombay wrote as follows: "Great quan"tities of silver are absorbed in remote "parts of the country, and go to fumish "a currency where no general medium " of exchange existed before; rupees are " now to be found in hundreds of small "bazanrs where all tracle used to be con"ducted by barter." Although, as might be expected, no such reliable table of prices of commodities can be obtained in India as in England, Mr. Patterson, on the data within his reach, is of opinion that prices have fullen probably 10 per cent., so that the purchasing power of silver would be nearly the same in Inclia ans in England.

Haying established the fact of the rise in the value of money, the important question arises as to the cause, that is to say, whether the change is due to money or to a transient condition of trade. Under this bead the lecturer remarks that, during the last thirty years, prices
have been chiefly influenced by two wholly distinct and, in their operations, conflicting factors. The steam engine las been employed to amnihilate distance and to cheapen conveyance, and in this way steam locomotion has cansed prices to rise in remote places, and to fall in the great towns and in countries which are the hearts of commerce; while, on the other hand, the new gold mines have tended to raise prices chiefly in the hearts of commerce. The result is, that as these and other factors operate more or less wogether, there is usually a tide-like change in prices. The two great factors are the produce of the mines and the state of trade.

## tue produce: of min mises.

The average production o' the precious metals when the gold mines were at their best, viz., $1852-60$, was 36 millions sterling annually, and it continues much about the same, but there has been a great change in the chamater of the supply. In the years above cited the produce of gold was about 28 millions and of silver $S$, while of late years the produce of gold has fallen to 191 millions, while that of silver has risen to 15 millions, so that in combries with a single gold standard money ought to be rising in value, and in coumtries with a silver standaud it ought to be falling. It has, however, been shown that in England and India silver still maintains its purchasing power, indeed has rather risen in value.
empects of the stats of trades.
The other important factor which lies behind prices is the state of trade. A depression of trade produces a fall of prices or a rise in the value of money: On this point Mr. Patterson daras attention to a very important fact, viz. : the great diversity in the tables of prices compiled by able men practised in the work. A very interesting portion of Mr. Patterson's remarks under this heal is his attempt to explain the apparent anomaly of an abumiance of money being coincident with low prices during a period of depression. We shall here quote Mr. Patterson's own words: "The explana"tion appears to be, that in those cases of "commercial collapse or depression "there is a great loss of weallh in the "community. People have not so much "wealth to spare. Money may be plen"tiful, but people cannot employ it "plentifully. With less wealth people "have less command over monay; they "have not their former power of employ"ing it. In other words, perhaps it may "be said that in bad times people having "less wealth or property cannot afford to
"employ or leep in circulation so much " of it as usual in the shape of money. "They cannot aflord to spend so much or "to pay the old prices, whether for labor "or eroods. Merchants must trade in "order to maintain their conmercial "connections; manufacturers must con"tinue their production, or elso lose the "interest on their costly factories and "plant; and coal and iron masters must " keop their mines or furnaces tu opera"tion, or else have to incur a large ex"penditure in putting them to work "again. llence, traters of all kinds will "submit to very low prices rather than " not trade at all. All classes, in short, in "bad times prod see trade, orspend upon "lower terms, and thus with diminished "profits and less weallh there are lower "wages and lower prices. In other words, "the purchasing power of money is "greater thru usual. At the same time, "although money buys more than usual, "yetits value on loan is less, because "people in trade-the great borrowing or "discounting class--ean hardly find pro"fitable use even for the money which is "at their own command. The actual "amount of reserve-wealth or lomable "enpital may be reduced, but the demand "for it is reduced very much more, the "result being a low bank rate."

We shall here dismiss the subject for the present, but shall take an early. opportunity of restuming it.

## THE GLOBE MUTUAT.

The public, if they gave it a thought at all lately, must have imagined that the Globe Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York was dend and buried once and forever. It seems, however, from recent developments as though it is likely to do more good in the future than in the past, in teaching us all a lesson or two in life insurance.

It will be remembered that the Globe, after fighting hard against repeated attacks, levelled at it in New York and elsewhere for some years past, went into insolyency some nine months ago. Arrangements were made meantime to reimburse the Canalian policy-holders, and pay the credivors in full, the deposit in Ottawa, $\$ 100,000$, being estinated sufficient for this pupose, besides leaving a surplus of $\$ 30,600$ to $\$ 40,000$ to help swell the assets to be divided among policyholders in the Inited States. This arrangement was based on the interpretation of the law as held by the late manager, and not less by his i rother, the assignee of the Company iathis city. But the Receiver of the company in New Fork, holds different views, grounded upon a clanse of
the Insurance Act of $18 \pi T$, and he accordingly issued an injunction a few days ago through his counsel in this city, Mr. J. N. Greenshields, forbidding the assignee in Montreal carrying out his amounced intention of paying the policy-holders and creditors the amounts of their respective claims last Monday. The largest claim is that of one of our home companies, some $\$ 10,0100$ for re insurance of a number of policy-holders, who chose that mode of settlement, and who, umler the circumstances, are the best off.

The public will remember several articles on this snuject which appeared in the duursal from time to time in referring to the security of Canmim policy-holders in American Tile Companies, more particuLarly in the numbers of Std May, 1878, and ISth July, is7!, where the subject is fully discussed. The following clause of the Insurance Aet was quoted and commented on, and upon it hinges the whole guestion at issue:
"Provided always that, in all cases of "distribution of the proceals of the de"posit in the hands of the Receiver"General and the assets rested in the "thustees as provided for in this section "if it appens from the chater act of "incorporation, or articles of association, "of the comprny, and from the conditions "of the policy, that any Canadian policy"holder claiming a share in stich distri"bution has been insured on the " matual" "principle,-then such policy-holder shall "be entitled only to claim a share in the "distribution as atoresaid, at the same "rate as all ohher holders of policies "under the same conditions may be enti"tled to claim in the distribution of the "total assets of the company, whether "such be halders of Canadian policies or "otherwise; but this proviso shall apply " in the cases of such companies only as "by the laws of the country (if such coum"try be other than Canada) in which such "company is chartered, incorporated, or "associated together, a Canadian policy"holder in such company is entitled to "claim a share in the distribution in "such country other than Camada, at the "same rate as all other holders of policies
"under the same conditions may be enti-
"tled to claim in the distribution of the "total assets of the company, and to en"joy all the rights and privileges as policy"holders which are enjoyed by the poliey-
"holders who are natives of or natural-
"ized in such country."
It is of course contrary to the principles of a mutual society whose members have all co-equal rights to grant any special privilege or to set apart any portion of the assets for the benefit of any particular
class of policyholders to the exclusion of any other class, and they are prohibiterl by their charter and by-laws from sodoing. It is quite diflerent in the case of stock compranies. Those who are contesting the recent movement of the New York Receiver in the case of the Globe Jife contend that the term "mutual "in its case is a misnomer, that the Globe is a Stock Company, ancl, consequently, does not come under any application of the clause quoted. The stock of the company was made up ats follows :

Early in 1859 the Freemans surrendered their stock, which was placed with a trust company, but on condition that, if the affairs of the Globe should improve sulliciently to warant it, the stock should be re-transfercel, the Attomey-feneral and the State Supt. of insurance concurring.

Several life insurance companies although bearing the term "mutual," partake mather of the nature of stock companies, and all stock companies are more or less mutual accoving to the ratio of profits they divide among their policy holders. $1 t$ is another question as regavals policyholders outside the Confederacy, for instance in Newfoundland, where the insurance laws of Canda do not apply, and where the Chobe had been doing business. It is to be feared that our comsins by the sand-banks must content themselves with a share of the proportion realized for and to be divided anong the American policyholders:

## HONORABLE GEORGE BROWN.

## SECOND NOTIOR.

Although in our last notice of the career of Senator Brown we assumed the year 1854 to be that of the disruption of the old Reform party, we might have been justified in naming an earlier period, vi\%, October, 185!, which was the date of Mr. Brown's formal secession from that party. When we look bick after the experience of years, it seems hardly credible that two political parties, of one of which the late Sir George Cartier was a far representative, while the late Se mator Brown was an equally fair representative of the other, should, during a pexiod of ten years, have acted iogether with the utmost cordiality. The alliance, while it lasted, was certainly productive of good. It established Respon-
sible Government, increased the representation, so as to strengthen the popular ele. ment, reformed the Munieipal institutions of both provinces, amended the Assessment law of Upher Canada, transferred the Universily endownent from a close corporation to the present University of 'toronto, reliomed the Common school system in both Provinces, abolished the law of primogeniture, innoduced the decimal currency, established the Post office department with cheap postage, vigorously prosecuted the construction of the canals and wilroads, and paved the way for the secularization of the Clergy Reserves, the abolition of the fendal tenure, and tho reform of the Legislative Council. Regarding the last three measures it may be observed that no time was lost in dealing with the Clergy Reserves and Legislative Council, both of which required the previons authorization of the Imperial Parliament, while the lirst Seigniorial Bill was rejeoted by the Legislative Council. We have indicated a few of the leading measures of the United Reform party, but there were many others deserving of notice, and we venture to affirm that it will be generally admitted that the legislation of the country was beneficial daring tho period of the alliance. It is only justice to the Lower Canadian branch of the allied party to state, that the power to accomplish the liberal measures which we have indicated, was due chiefly to their influence. In the secoud Patliament of United Canada, the Conservatives had a considerable majority from Upper Camada, which enabled them to carry on the Govermment in opposition to a Lower Canada majority. In the third Parliament, tho Liberals were successful, but the majority in Upper Canada was only four. At the general election of 1S51, parties in Upper Camada were neally equally divided, but as Messrs. Brown, W. L. Macken\%e, Iartman, Fergusson-Bhair, and others holding the same views, were included with the Liberals, the Government was mainly depentent on Lower Camada support. In 1854, the disaffection in Upper Canada led, as has been stated, to complete disruption.

We must not omit to notice that the olit liberal party in Lower Canada had likewise censed to act in perfact harmony. The founder of the new opposition was the celebrated lonis Joseph Papinean, who, on his re-entrance into public life, stood almost, if not quite alone. In a comparatively short time, however, he rallied round him a number of younger men of considerable ability, who eatablished "L'Institut Canadien," and advocated very advanced views. Mr. Papineau
was himself astrong alvocate for representation according to population, although he carried wilh him very few of his countrymen. When we look back on the history of Canada from 1854 to the present day, it seems marvellous that there should ever have been a political alliance between the Reformers of Ontwio and the Lower Canadian majority, but when we look still further back to the history of the years from 1830 to 1849 , it is still more marvellous that there should have been an alliance between the old Conser. vatives of Lower and Upper Canada and the French Canodians. And yel this last alliance, it camot be denied, is what might have been most reasonably expected.

After the disuption of the Reform party in $185-t$, there was for somo time anything but cordial union anong the secessionists. The popular leader was Mr. Brown, whose earnestness in support of the views, which he hat constant opportunities of bringing before the people in the columns of the filobe, alded materially to his influence, but Mrr. Sindfield Macclonald, who was still elinging to the hope of n new alliance with the french Canadians, was not prepared to commit himself to the principle of representation by population. For three or four years the Coalition Ministiy was sustained chiefly by lower Canadian votes, which materially strengthoned Mrr. Prown. At last, in 1S5S, the defeat of the Ministry led to their resignation, and MLr. Brown was applied to by the Governor Genemal, Sir Edmund Head, to form a Ministry, which he promptly staceeded in doing. The crisis of 1858 has been discussed with great real on many occasions, and it is not likely that those, who were disappointed at the result, will have much charity for the Governor General, who nevertheless, it is only fair to assume, acted conscientiously according to his conviction of what was his duty.

The circumstances were peculiar. There had been in 1857 a reconstruction of the Cabinet, followed by a general election. Parliament soon after met. Several attempts were mate by the opposition to defeat the Minishry, but without success, until at last a majority was obtained against their policy on the question of the seat of Govermment, which had been determined by the Queen in compliance with the request of some of the very members, who voted agninst Her Majesty's decision. The reference to the Queen was a great blunder. It should have occurred to those, who proposed it, that Her Majesty could only tict under aclvice, and that Her Colonial Minister would naturally take the advice of the Governor Gen-
eral, who thus becrmo the actual referee althourh probably no considerable num. lier of the members would have been willing to leave the decision to him. The refusal of the majority to accept the award ereated an embarrassment, which justified the Ministry in resigning, but it by no means follows that the Governor General was bomal to follow the advice, as to a dissolation of Pirliament, of a leader of the minority. 'The Govemor Cieneral had a consbitutional right to use eftorts to prevent the necessity of a dissolution, and, il he gave wanning, as it has always been sad that he did, that he would not consent to dissolye, he can hardly be blamed. 'the opposition leader would probably have fared better had he refused to accept oflice on the ground that he was aware that he had not a majority in the present house and that, though he had entire conficience in the result of an appeal to the people, he had been refused the opportunity of making such appeal, and must, therefore, leave the Ministry to take their own course. For the refusal to permit a dissolution the existing Ministuy would have been clearly responsible it they retained oflice, as would any other Ministry formed after the refusal. When Queen Victoria declined to follow Sir Robert Peel's advice to dismiss the Ladies of Her Household, he simply declined to accept oflice, and Lord Melbounne resumed his duties, accepting the reaponsibility for the Queen's clecision. So long as the Crown can find a Minister to assume the responsibility for its Acls and a Ilouse of Commons to support that Minister, charges of' unconstitutionality are unsustainable.
'Those who have denounced Sir Edmund Ilead in the unmeasured terms of the Herald fail to look at the question at issue from any point of view but their own The worst that can fairly be said is that Sir Edmund Head committed an error of judgment, and it must be borne in mind that he was in a. peculiarly delicate position. It is beyond doubt that he was the adviser of the Crown on the seat of Govermment question, and he must have felt that it was owing to his advice that his Ministry had got into a very embarrassing position, and that he was not called upon to give any facilities to the leader of one section of the heterogeneous bocly of their opponents. It is strange that Sir Bdinund Head failed to perceive that there was a simple mode of extricating the Crown and the Ministry from the dilemma. Te had only to recommend that the Crown should decide that, as the sent of Government was then at Toronto, it should remain there until Parliament should vote the amount necessary to
erect buildings at any ohner place on which it might determine. 'lo such a decision no reasonable objection could have been made, and it would probably have prevented a great deal of ill-feeling, and have induced members to abandon their local prejudices. While wo have felt it only just to deprecate the Herald's re. ference to a deceased Governor of a truly upright character, we aro bound to acknowledge that Mr. Brown had a per. fect right to adopt the course which he deemed right, and it is to be inferred that he relied with conficlence that, after forming an administration, his advice would not be refused.
'The next important event in Mr . Brown's career was his acceptance of oflice in the Conlition Govermment. After the firm stand which he had taken against the maintenruce of the Union on the basis of equal representation, it seems clear that there was no course open to him but to join any party that would mako: an amendment of the constitution a sine qua non. His political friends in Lower Cimada, and some of those in Upper Canada, were not prepared to insist, to the extent that he was, on a constitutional change. He had been vigorously contending for it during many years, and had quite made up his mind that it was indispensable. We hold, therefore, that at that crisis he acted in the only way that he could have done consistently with his opinions. It is cleal that confederation, whether it turn out well or ill, was chiofly owing to the earnestness and vigor of Mr. Brown's assaults on the old Union.

We are by no means so clear that the subsequent resignation was justifiable, indeed it has been frequently admitted that there were other reasons for it than the one assigned. We shall cite a brief exbract from tho obituary notice in the Globe:
"This was the ostensible reason for his "withdrawal, but the fact is he felt he "had been in the Govermment long "enough. There was no good purpose "to be served by his continuing to hold " oflice with persons in whom he had no "confidence and to whom he had been " long opposed." We cannot think the foregoing remark a satisfactory explanation of a lesignation, offered withont the concurrence of those, who had accepted oflice with him, to carry ont a common object. It is diflienle to speculate on what might have been the result of a different line of action. The actual restalt we know was to throw the Government into the hands of Sir John A. Macdonald, who, it is generally supposed, was only too glad to get rid so easily of one, who might have
exercisell a powerful influence on the arrangements made subsequent to Confecleration. We submit that the obtensible reason was wholly insullicient under the oircunstances, while what is given in the Globe as the true reason, seems to have been an abandomment at the very tima when it was likely to be of use, of the great iufuence which Mr. Brown had acquired. To the colleagues, whom he had induced to enter the Government rith him, it was a death blow.
After Confederation Mr. Brown was defeated at the general election, and thereafter took no active part as a leader, although he necessarily exercised a great influence in the eouncils of the party. After the accession of his party to power he accepted a seat in the Senate, and in 1874 was acceredited by the Imperial Govermment to that of the Uniteci States to negotiate a reciprocity treaty in conjuncfion with Sir Edward Thornton, the resident Minister. It has been said that this mission was $a$ failure, and that his speech in the Semate in vindication of the negotiation, was unsuceessful. We are wholly unable to concur in that opinion. We maintain that Mr. Brown evinced marked ability in the conduct of that negotiation, and that his speech in the Senate was one of his most successful offorts. As to the fact that the result of the negotiation was not satisfactory to Canada, we should like to be iuformed what treatr ever gave satisfaction to oither of the parties interested. In negotistions batreen States, concessions are indispensable to success, and concessions are never acceptable to the parties who have to make thom. Mr. Brown hacd to discuss the whole subject, including every article imported into or exported from Cannds, with experienced statesmen, and the fact that the Senate refused to entertain the draft treaty, transmittel to it by the President, is to our mind rather a proof that Mr. Brown had suceeeded in effecting a fair arrangement. We have no hesitation in affirming that his negotiations at Washington, in 1874, reflect the highest credit on MIr. Brown. We have but little to add in conclusion. Whatever may be the result of Confederation, and ther are not $a$ few who predict its failure, the fact of its accoptance by the Canadian people is a full justification of Mr. Brown's hostility to the old Union. The energy which he displayed throughout a long contest has seldom been equalled. It must, however, be almitted that, while the Union lasted, Mr. Brown was not successful in carrying his favorite measures. Ecclesiastical corporations, sectarian schools, and grants to charitable institutions undor clerical in.
fluence, were never suppressed. On the clergy reserve question, Mr. Brown was one of the most moderate of the advocates of secularization. Jle acknowledged in unequivocal terms the necessity of obtaining the repeal of the Imperial Act prior to any action by the Canadian Parliment, and he had no fatult to find with the Ministers, hough in his habitual earnestness, he was inclined to suspect them of want of zeal, a suspicion that must have been removed after the publication of the correspondence between Sir John Pakington and Mr. Hincks in 1852. We must bring this notice to a close, which we caunot do without expressing our entire concurrence in the genemal expression of regret at the loss which Canada has sustained in the death of one of her most eminent statesmen.

## THE GRAND TRUNK REPORT.

The speech of Sir Henry Tyler at the recent meeting of the Grand Trunk Company in London, is by far the most satis. factory exposition of the Company's allairs that has been given for many years. The net increase of revenue for the last six monthe of 1879 was about $\$ 250,000$, and the Chairman was able to hold out sanguine expectations as to the future. In the course of his speech Sir Menry Tyler made some severe remarks on the Great Western Company, quoting a letter addressed by one of the local agents, offering inducements for passenger traffic, which, Sir Henry said, would, if written by a Grand Trunk agent, have led to his immediate dismissal. His reference to the purchase of the lines leading to Chicago was by no means complimentary to Mr. Vanderbilt, who in attempting a very " olever" manouvre, seems to have been out-generalled. Mr. Vanderbilt bought up a por ion of the Chicago road in the centre, thinking by that means to obtain the control of the whole line. The effect of this was to reduce materially the value of both ends, which were purchased by the Grand Trunk, which then decided on connecting them by a line, parallel to that of Mr. Vanderbilt. 'This would have rentered his centre section a total loss, and he therefore deemuri it most expedient to si-li ، ut. Sir Henry Tyler informed the proprietors that they were $5 \frac{1}{2}$ millions sterling richer than they were $x$ months ago. He made $t$ t eference to Mr. Hurd's bill, to obstruct traffic on the Canadian lines, but assured the proprietors that they need feel no alarm whatever on the subject, as Congress would just as soon think of prohibiting traffic in British ships on the coast, as prevent the free running of trains through Canada. The speech was received with great satisfaction.

The Dritio of Lady Hingks.-Our citizens and the public at large have heard with heartfelt sorrow of the death of Laty Hincks, wife of the IIon. Sir Francis Hincks, K.C.M. G., C.B., which took place at the fimmily residence in this city on Friday last, after an illness of a few weeks. Lady Hincks was born in India in 1810 , and was consequently in her seventioth year. Her first husband was the Hon. Justice Sullivan of Joronto, who died in 1833. She married Sir Pizuncis lineks in 1875. By her many amiable and social qualities she had long endeared herself to a wide host of friends, as well as to all who had the pleasure of her acquaintance in the distinguished circles in which she moved on both sides of the Athantic. The remains were taken to Toronto for interment, where the funeral took place, on Tuesday, from the residence of her sollinlaw, Mr. Charles Moss, of that city. Sir Francis Hincks has the heartfelt sympathies of the public in his sad bereavement.

The lion. I. 'llibaudeau, President, read the following report and statentent of the affars of the Bank:-
Theonieth Anmual Repoit of the Directors of Lu
Janquc Nationule:-
Your Directors have the pleasure of seeing you at the 20 th anmul meting to make you necquainted with the business and financial state of the Bank.

The fiscal year just clnpsed has not becn crowned with greater financim success than those of the past fonr years, but at least, it has witnessed a smaller number of failures among the custoners of the Bauk.
Among the debts cousidered as doubtful last yent, the Directors have thought proper, in the interest of the Bath, to close a certain amount thereof by Profit and Loss, to accomplish which they have paid small dividends, and have drawn on the Rest for a sum of titty thousand dollara ( 550,000 ) in addition to what has been taken for same purpose, leaving one huadred and fifly thonsaud dollars ( $\$ 150,100$ ) to credit of that fund.
It is to be hoped that the crisis is at an end, and the sunction of the repent of the lasolvency Act will insure its disappearance.
Your Directors have good renson to believe that prosperity will be renewed throughout the whole Dominion, facilitating trade nad industries, giving increased value to real estate as
well as to agricultural and other"products. The improvement in business is nlready felt, and it is but reasomable to hone that the Bank will also benefit by the inereased value of the proferties, which it loolds as secarily for sums due.
The legal difliculties, in which the Barkk was engaged last year, lave disajpeared, having been settled privately in the interest of the Bank.

The economy practiced last year has produced good resuits, und your Directors recommend their successors to pursue the same course.

The Federal Government has been yequested to take in'o consideration the renewal of Bank charters. Whis question of vital importanec, apon due consideration after lengthened discussion by the parties interested, has been finaly setiled: let is hope that all interests at statie will be carefally protectea.

You undoubtedly, us well as the Directors, regret the absence, though serious illness, of onr mush esteemed President, the llonorable Eugine Cbinic, which mity deprive us of his valuable services for a long time to come; jonr Directors cannot forget the great ability displayed in managing the aflitiry of the Bank by this most excelfent citizen, and with what netil he worked towirds the fonndation of "Lat Banque Nationale."
According to the wishes of the Presirlent, you will have to amoint on the Bund of Directors a suceresor, whom we are sure will merit the snme title to our respeet.

The statement which will be haid before you shortly will exhibit the fimanciat position of the brank.
On retiring, the Directors are happy to certify, as heretofore, to the order and nsidnity observed in the several banches of the admanistration, haten since the begiuning of the erisis with many and complicated affides.
The zeal of the clerks, the ruod example shown by the Cashier and o hee chief ollicers, dinvealso a right in your thanks.

## GENERAL MARKE'TS.

'Thursday, May 20 th, 1880.
The stirring commereinl event of the week is the strike of the wharf laboters. It was, owing to the prompt and evergetic action of the police anthorities, in flush in the panallitir, and though attended with some unpleasant consequences, is likely to result beneficinlly to the shipping interests through teaching malcontents that: whaterer their grievances, the remedy will not here be found in acts of lawiessuess. It is well that the aren in which immnaity and suecess attend upon volence and riot slonld be circomseribed within the narrowest limits; it would be better still if the example set by our constabulary should be found worthy of a collowing at Quebec. The strike, which is noticed more at lengith elsewhere, was not without premonitions of its coming, as renders of the Joobsal are aware. Just prior to the opening of navigation, three weeis ago, we wrote, "Expectations of an unusually good business this season have extended to hatorers generally, and there are already indiations that what hands propose to have an anthoritative roice in determining the rates of wages." 'Tlic promise of these indications bas certanly met with prompt filtilment. Businces for the wdek is guiet. Hardware contimues grently depressed, and filling price lists check dealings. Dry goods are inactive, though not musensonably so; stocks low. Groceries quiet. Leather mantains suecinl firmness for black, all descriptions of which are in light suphly; Sole unchanged. Boots and shoes are witnessing the duluess of "between seasons." the trade is a good deal exereised as to strikes already cropping out in some quarters, and suspected to be impending on a more extensive scale. Wool lacks the firmuess of tone recently reported, but is otherwise unchanged. Butter and checse are weak, and the tendency seems to be towards lower prices. Money is in aburdant suyply at rates last guoted, wamely, 4 to 5 per eent. for call lonns, and 6 to 7 per cent. discount for good commercial paper. Sterling Exchange is reported $9 \frac{1}{5}$ between banks nud 9 ? ordinary counter demind; documentary bills, Be. New York rates are S.4.85, to S4.8its, Siflt Exchange, Commercial bills, 58.534 to 84894 60-day bills; Commercial bills, St.S8t to $\$ 4.843$. On the Stock Exchange $n$ finir volume of business was done at firm prices, the more netive slares slowing a stendy factional inyrovement as the week adranced. Bink of Montreal took the lead, grining in all $1 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. The strike it this instance was we believe confined to the lamds eugriged in" "lastiner." In mother establishment the "heelers" demanded an increase, but with what success we are not informed. We hear of further strikes or partinl strikes in other quarters still, bat these are yet of an indefinite character. Dhere is unmistakably a feeling of distrust. in the trade lest a surike shonk become general, and our inguiries lead ns to the belief that manumacturers would willingly make some adrances in wages were it not for the fear that this would embolden discontented hands to demand still more, and so precipitate a erisis that might otherwise ve escaped. Ithe head of a leading house professes that he would undesitutingly shut down before yielding to an oltt-ind-out strike, if manimity on the pret of mamufteturers could be secured, und his riews of poliey doubiless represent those of the very strong honses in the trade; but there are others to whom stopping work would be a very serions matter indeed, and here hes the obsincie to unanimity, berein is the streugth of the strikers, and it may be assumed hey know it. The prices we have heard named in combection with the placing of the heavy orders nbove notie d are fibulously low, beyond the possitility, it is said, of manufincture ut a profit. But the whole matter lacks authenticity, and is only given as
