To be accused is not to be found guilty. A guiltless man accused courts the fullest and freest inquiry. That there are persons in town that devoutly hope that Ponton will get off, guilty or not guilty, there is no doubt. But they are the closest friends of the prisoner, or girls of tender years, whose charming personalities will pardon them for their lack of logic. 





### STARVATION IN LABRADOR

Expedition Finds Four Hundred People Distressed From Lack of Food.

Halifax, N.S., Aug. 5.—The Schooner Cambridge, which sailed from this port June 6, to explore the coast of Labrador, returned to-day. The expedition was fitted out by Capt. F. M. Clay and Dr. Morris, whose object was to exploit the Newfoundland-Labrador coast in search of gold and lumber. The schooner went as far as Hamilton. ploit the Newfoundland-Labrador coast in search of gold and lumber. The schooner went as far as Hamilton Inlet, but at Lewis Inlet, the party divided. Their mission was unsuccessful. Capt. Clay told a reporter to day that from the Straits of Belle Isle, as far north as Hamilton Inlet, there is no gold, nothing but a granite streak and very little timber. Capt. Marvin's expedition which left here on the schooner A. Hardy, Capt. Clay said was equally unsuccessful. When Capt. Clay reached Lewis Inlet he found the 400 people there in a state of starvation. They had no flour for five weeks, and many were so weak through lack of food they could hardly crawl around. The people are suffering tremendously on account of the excessive duties levied by the Newfoundland Government on food stuffs. Dr. Morris did good work in alleviating the suffering of the people, attending to the sick night and day. The Labrador fishery is this year a complete failure.



It will be seen that a thousand men are employed in developing the mines of Rossland, and that over \$100,000 is paid to them every month. The figures do not include men doing assessment work.

In addition to miners, eight hundred men are working on the widening of the Columbia and Western between Rossland and the smelter, many are engaged in transporting ore and several hundreds are at work on street grading and other civic contracts. Hundreds of men in the building trades are busy in the construction, among others, of the following new buildings: New ore reduction works, new C. P. R. depot and terminal buildings, court house, Presbyterian Church, Bank of Montreal, B.A.C. headquarters, engine house, etc., on the War Eagle. The Government has several gangs of men working on traits and roads, including a large gang which is constructing a wagon road around Red Mountain. There is work for every man now in Rossland.

A conservative estimate of the number of man drawing new in Poscland to decrease.

A conservative estimate of the number of men drawing pay in Rossland to-day is 2500. In salaries and wages over \$200,000 a month is paid. At Trial Smelter.

At Trail smelter nearly 20,000 tons of Rossland ore is awaiting treatment. When operations begin, which will be within two weeks, over four hundred men will be employed in the reduction of ore and refinement of mineral. Le Roi is shipping 250 tons to Northport smelter every day. The War Eagle sends 175 to 200 tons daily to Trail, the Centre Star ships 275 to 300 tons a week, and Iron Mask, Monte Christo, Giant and Sunset No. 2 are making regular shipments. Virginia and Deer Park will probably join the list of shippers very shortly.
