Buoyed by German Blow.

He and his chiefs were buoyed up by the German consul's proclamation, and vague talk that Germany would support them, and was the greatest nation on earth, invincible in war, and that Great Britain and America would never deep to energy Germany in code. in war, and that Great Britain and America would never dare to engage Germany in conflict. Signal guns were fired, and the foreign population of British and Americans were taken on board their respective warships. Other nationalists went on board sailing vessels in the harbor. One hundred and seventy-five men and officers were landed, and at Admiral Kautz's request Captain Sturdy of the Porpo'se assumed command of the combined force on shore, Flag Lleutenant Miller of the Philadelphia assisting. Surgeons were landed from both ships, and Miss McCoy and Miss Forth, missionaries, volunteered as nurses. The whole native population sought protection behind the American lines. As soon as the hand forces were stationed, the Philadelphia opened fire by throwing a shell into the outskirs of Apia. The Royalist followed with six inch shells, and the Porpolse went down the coast a couple of miles and bombarded the village of Valusu, where large parties of rebels were supposed to be. About 2.30 a.m. the natives made a rush on the guard at the Tivoli. Three British sailors were killed and one woulded. The native loss as inknown. days of clinging females; how have they fallen from their high estate! But then there was no ultra progressive or new woman to point out masculine shortcomings and iniquities, or to presume to demand equality with their lordships; the temperance lady had not begun to ask how much wine my lords consumed at dinner, and no assertive female dared to question their opinions upon any subject upon which they chose to deliver themselves. But how are tile mighty fallen!
