

The same brokers, commonly supposed to act for the same large Standard Oil, Morgan, Harriman and Gould interests, were active in buying and bidding up stocks to-day as they were yesterday, St. Paul especially being lifted again and again by main force to the neighborhood of 167. The 'ast price of that stock formed an epitome of the whole market. The central and southern transcontinental stocks were learest in point of activity, but the advance showed a tendency to spread beyond yesterday's narrow limits. until the enormous realizing forced prices back. Prices generally show losses on the day running from 1 to 1½ in the leaders, and from that up to 3½ in St. I'aul and the local traction stocks, which were notably weak thruout. Henry Clews' Views.

New York, Oct. 12.—Wall street was suddenly lifted out of its pessimistic hood by renewed reports of progress in the vast raliroad combinations, which were catculated to have a stimulating influence upon values and speculation. These plans were interrupted last spring and summer by a series of familiar drawbacks, as well as by the fact that prices were then too high to perint of any further successful upward manipulation. The large interests then in control accepted the situation; they stood together in preventing any rapid decline, and finally availed themselves as far as practicable of the advantages of lower prices. Stocks are now more highly concentrated than in and previous period of our financial history; the big men having accumulated them for the sole purpose of carrying out their vast schemes of combination which seem to be an irresistible of more of modern tendencies. It is folly to underrate the importance of such transactions. They will unduestionably add to the stability and profitableness of railroad investments, and they may be used to infuse fresh life into the speculative situation, but outsiders must accept the various reports with caution, and expectations of a prolonged bull movement based on these developments do not seem justifiable when such large amounts of stocks are held awaiting buyers, as is now the case. Whether it is the plan or not of the market leaders to inaugurate a new upward movement remains to be seen. Recent market operations suggested that some parties were endeavoring to accumulate stocks as cheaply as possible, and if this means the entry of a new buil element into the market we may expect increased activity. Just now the situation is considerably mixed.
