Scheme for Trinity Federation Goes In Spite of Unpopular Opposition

Probable that Malcontents Will Put Legal Obstacles In Its Way.

The adjourned meeting of the alumni and friends of Trinity University, held in Convocation Hall last night, showed an intensity of feeling between the two factions in the church, which, the not expressed in such bitter terms as at the previous meeting, will create a breach that will not be healed for a long period. The strength shown by the opponents of the plan of federation, in the face of the stronger influences which could be brought to bear, was surprisingly great and it is altogether improbable that the scheme will be allowed to go through without legal obstacles being placed in the path of the federationists.

Every possible seat in the hall and gallery was occupied when the meeting was called to order. Provost Mackinnon and Dr. Langtry, as the opposing leaders, were greeted with loud applause for their appearance and the sentiment of those present seemed to be almost evenly divided.

A large number of ladies were in the audience, and showed their interest by remaining until the morning, but as the vote was not reached until midnight, the number of those present was greatly diminished. The opposition to the federation scheme was strong, but based entirely on sentiment, and the ladies, who might be expected to be more readily influenced than the men, were almost as equally as the other sex. That the anti-federationists have not yet exhausted their efforts was made apparent by the announcement that they would hold a meeting to consider further action to be held at 10 o'clock, in the Synod office.

REMOVE CATTLE EMBARGO.

(Canadian Associated Press Cable.)
London, Sept. 10.—At a conference of agricultural and commercial interests held in Glasgow to endeavor to obtain an interview with Lord Onslow and Hon. Joseph Chamberlain during their visit to Scotland in October, the chairman explained that the object of the meeting was the removal of restrictions in the importation of Canadian cattle.

The chairman believed they were more strongly convinced than before of the righteousness of their cause. Representative Henderson considered that the conference had a complete answer and could place before Lord Onslow the resolution and speeches of the Montreal Congress.

Representative Lyon said that Lord Onslow being a new Minister, it was important that the matter should be put fairly and squarely before him.

Sir David Richmond stated that a letter received last June from Lord Onslow stated that there was no prospect of changing the law, so he thought they were losing time in appealing to Lord Onslow.

Several representatives disagreed with Sir David Richmond. All thought Lord Onslow should be interviewed. Henry Allan of the Allan Line agreed with Sir David Richmond, and said Mr. Chamberlain's policy was one of the restrictions of trade, rather than of free trade.

The blaze caused a big reflection, so much so that one of the first alarms sent in to the city fire department was from box 147, away up at College-street and Spadina-avenue.

The fire started in the bar-room, where a gas stove had been left burning, and the gas, hurried toward the water front, expecting to see one of the large business houses in the wholesale district in flames. As it was, the fire, viewed from the street, presented a grand spectacle. The stands, which were burned, could be plainly seen across the street, and the fire spread across the stands as the wind blew.

Ottawa, Sept. 10.—(Special.)—Fair progress was made with the Redistribution Bill. The non-contentious clauses were taken up first, and the debate was confined to rather narrow limits, and it is clear now that the debate will not be long drawn out.

Some members predicted that there would be two weeks' discussion on the Redistribution Bill. That prediction will not be verified. The debate may last a week, but no more. The question was discussed very fully in committee and the discussion that is going on now bears all the characteristics of a reshuffle. When the redistribution was introduced to become a party to the bill, the committee tied its hands. No question of principle is involved in the debate that is now going on. The recognition of the principle of adherence to county boundaries is shown to have been a slightly important concession.

Working well within the limits of that principle, the government has evolved a genuine gerrymander, and now indignant oppositionists may plead for the principle of representation by population in vain.

Already the debate shows signs of decay. Those who were figuring on propagation about the middle of October or early in November have changed their views and there can be little doubt that the propagation gains will be somewhat less than those of these days.



ORILLIA'S POWER PLANT FAIR BOARD MAKES GOOD WAS A GOOD INVESTMENT PROMISES TO DOMINION

Revenue of \$21,237 From Water, Light and Power, Cost Being Only \$7500. Every Obligation Imposed by Government Will Be Fully Carried Out.

The September issue of The Canadian Engineer and Electrical Science Review has an article on "Orillia Power Development," which is a strong argument in favor of civic ownership. More than twenty years ago a private company built waterworks, which were taken over by the town in 1883. In 1887 electric lighting was introduced. The waterworks and electric light were operated by steam power till the electric power plant now in successful operation was installed.

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
