REPORT

-OF-

The Session of Knox Church, Ottawa,

Presented at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation, Jany 12th, 1888.

In looking back upon the year that has just closed, we feel that we have had to deal, notwithstanding our much forgetfulness of Him, with a God of infinite goodness.

Many of the families of our Congregation have been visited with sore affliction, but the rich consolations of the Gospel have, amidst these trials, not been withheld.

Of those who have been stricken by the prevalent epidemic, which has removed beloved ones and made desolate many homes, there has been no one connected with our Congregation to whom, so far as we are aware, it has proved fatal. Surely for this our fervent gratitude is due to our Heavenly Father.

During many weeks our beloved Pastor has suffered from the prevalent sickness, and been rendered thereby unable to attend to his public duties. We fondly hope that through Divine Goodness, in answer to his people's prayers, he may be soon restored to his wonted health and activity.

During the year we have had to record the removal by death from our midst of two highly respected membrrs in full Communion with the Church, namely, Mr. Henry Alexander and Mr. John Robertson. Mr. Robertson had been for several years the Treasurer of our Congregation. We deeply sympathize with the widows and children of the deceased, and commend them to Him who has promised to be a father to the fatherless and the widow's husband.

The number of Communicants, according to the last Report, was 260. During the past year 16 names have been removed from the roll, and, on the other hand, 29 have been added to it—14 by certificate and 15 on profession of their faith, thus making the present number 273, or 13 more than last year. But for the postponement of the observance of the Lord's Supper in December, consequent on the Pastor's sickness, the increase no doubt would have been larger.

The number of baptisms during the year has been 9.

The financial condition of the Congregation will be placed before you by the Report of the Temporal Committee.

The Report of the Bible Class and Sabbath School will be submitted by the Superintendent and Treasurer, and will show their progress, their present condition and their collections during the year.

We are glad to observe that the attendance at the Sabbath services continues to increase.

The thanks of the Congregation are due to the lady collectors, who, with their usual diligence, have distributed the *Record*, and obtained subscriptions for the Schemes of the Church.

The Session regret to find that there are still many members whose names do not appear on the collectors' lists.

There are at the present time many and urgent calls (as the readers of our *Record* will have observed), on all our congregations, for larger contributions to further the Home and Foreign Missions, the Augmentation Fund and the other Church Schemes.

The Session think that the Prayer Meeting should be much more largely attended than it is, and it would be so did there exist among us a deeper interest in spiritual things.

The Presbytery having inaugerated special religious services, which are now being conducted, with the help of the city Pastors, by the Rev. Mr. Meikle, and which are to be continued through this month, we fondly hope that all who can possibly do so will attend these meetings, and that, in answer to our prayers, the windows of heaven will be opened and a blessing poured out, till there be scarce room to receive it. May the Spirit of the Lord breathe on us, causing the bones which are many and dry to live and become a great army.

FORTY-THIRD ANNUAL REPORT

-OF THE-

Temporal Committee of Knox Church,

By the good hand of our God upon us, we are permitted to-night, under circumstances which call for thankfulness for the past and good hope for the future, to present the Forty-Third Annual Report of the Temporal Committee.

We first submit a statement of the receipts for 1886 and for 1887, together with a condensed statement of the items of expenditure for 1887, so that you may by comparing these items for the two years fairly estimate the financial condition of the Congregation for the year just closed.

The principal and constant sources of our revenue must be, Weekly Contributions, Ordinary Collections, Missionary Collections, Thanksgiving Offerings, and the Ladies' Association. From these sources, united, should come supplies sufficient to meet all the necessary financial needs of the Congregation, and any incidental revenue from other temporary sources cannot be rightly taken into account in estimating our available income. From this comparative statement of the receipts for 1886 and for 1887, and from the items of expenditure for 1887, the following conclusions, which we earnestly commend to your serious consideration, seem to be fairly deducible:—

1. It will be seen by an examination of the figures given above that from Weekly Contributions, Ordinary Collections, Thanskgiving Offerings, Prayer Meeting Collections, Missionary Collections and Ladies' Association—that is from the ordinary sources of our revenue—our income for 1887 fell short of that of 1886 by the somewhat large amount of \$683,13. If our income from these sources had been kept up even to the standard of 1886, we should have been able to meet all

the ordinary expenses of the year, and also almost all the amounts left unpaid last year, due for improvements on Church building. But owing to this largely decreased income, your Committee was unable to pay out of the ordinary revenue the amounts still due for improvements made on the Church building, so that to meet these imperative demands we had to borrow the sum of one thousand dollars. There is still due for these improvements, to James MacLaren & Co. the sum of \$318.00, and to William Howe the sum of \$187.53.

We must resolutely determine, during 1888, to pay off these amounts, that we may be free from enjoying the questionable luxury of a floating debt.

2. Although no amount has been received from the Ladies' Association, we are happy to be able to report that the Lecture Room has been cleaned, painted and otherwise greatly improved in comfort and appearance, at the expense of the Ladies' Association. The amounts paid for these much and long needed improvements we are unable at present to state, but it is certainly less than the sum which the Ladies' Association has to its credit in the bank to meet the cost. The amount to the credit of the Association, we believe, is \$166.88.

3. As compensation to some extent for the unhalpy reduction in income, referred to above, we gladly notice that the sum of \$1,037.32, outside of our ordinary annual liabilities, was paid during the year. This sum, which cannot be expected to occur annually, was made up as follows:—

4. It will also be noticed that even after borrowing a thousand dollars the total ordinary receipts exceed those of 1886 only by the small sum of \$30.21. In this sum, however, is not included the \$1,140 collected and paid for the organ during the year.

These are the most obvious features of the year's finances. While the deficiency in the income cannot be overlooked, and should not be repeated, it need not discourage us. Far more serious obstacles have in the past been faced, and forced to yield before united and courageous effort. That this united and courageous effort may be immediately put forth is our plea and justification for referring so definitely to the subject. But the sums outstanding must be paid out of the ordinary revenue, and to secure this desirable end every contributor must be fully alive to his responsibility and privileges, so that larger weekly contributions may be placed at the disposal of your Committee for 1888.

Your Committee would specially call the attention of all contributors to the principle upon, and the method by which Gospel Ordinances are maintained in the Congregation. The principle is that of voluntary offerings; the method is, that these voluntary offerings should be contributed weekly. But many do not contribute weekly, and many give their voluntary contributions only at the end of the year. This is easily seen if we look at the amounts received from Weekly Contributions during each quarter of the past year. If the system of Weekly Offerings were fully carried out, the amounts received during each quarter would be equal. Our Weekly Contributions for the year amounted to \$3,713.87, which should give \$928.47 each quarter. During the first quarter however, the Weekly Contributions amounted only to \$689.59; during the second quarter to \$788.78; during the third quarter to \$618.50, while during the fourth quarter they amounted to \$1,616.91, that is to more than the sum received during any two preceding quarters, and almost equal to half the total receipts from Weekly Contributions. It is very manifest, from this statement, that much of the advantage derived from the system of Weekly Contributions is lost, that your Committee must be unable to meet promptly financial obligations as they fall due, and that increased expense becomes absolutely necessary. We, therefore, sincerely trust that every contributor to the maintenance of God's cause in our midst, will during 1888 see that his contribution, whether small or large, shall reach the hands of our Treasurer once a week.

Another year has passed, its labors are over, and we are again called on to submit our Annual Report. The International Bible Lessons have been studied throughout the year, and the work has been faithfully, earnestly and, we hope, well done. The following pupils missed only one Sabbath:—Annie Taylor and Alex. Cummings.

The Superintendent's prize for the class having the highest average attendance has again been won by Miss Mary Masson's class, with the very high average of 97 per cent.

The following pupils are entitled to Mr. Blackburn's prize for Scripture Recitations:—Victoria Strachan, Jessie Laing, Violet Kennedy and Willie Alexander. The portion of Scripture assigned was the Sermon on the Mount and chapters 14, 15, 16 and 17 of John's Gospel. In most cases the recitation was almost perfect.

The prize given by the Rev. Mr. Farries for reciting the Shorter Catechism, or the first 53 questions of it, has been earned by Maggie Bremner, who recited the whole, and John Robertson, who recited the first 53 questions in a very satisfactory manner.

The number of books in the library has not been increased during the year, as expected, but we hope soon to be in a position to appropriate the amount voted for that purpose some time ago.

The finances of the school are in a satisfactory condition. The collections this year amounted to \$101.07, an increase of \$12.54 over last year's. This amount does not include the very liberal contribution of over \$40 to the Van Meter Italian Mission.

The annual grant of \$50 (raised by monthly contributions) for the support of a student at the Pointe-Aux-Trembles School, has been continued. A very encouraging report concerning the progress and conduct of our student has been received.

The attendance of the majority of the teachers has been very regular, but some have been compelled by circumstances to withdraw, for the present at least, from the teaching staff of the school. Their places have not been filled, despite the earnest efforts of the Superintendent, who, as a consequence, is compelled to neglect his proper work and assist as a teacher. This should not be so, and our school cannot prosper, as it should, under such circumstances. We appeal to the Congregation for greater co-operation and assistance. Let a com-
