PREMIER WANTS AT VETERANS' PENSIONS

Construction Placed on One of His Utterances During Debate in the House of Commons.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—(Special.)—It is not often that the opposition in the commons has to find fault with the government on the score of parsimony, but that was the ground of complaint to-day.

The resolution granting 250 acres of land to every volunteer from Manitoba and the northwest who served in South Africa was taken up early in the afternoon and debated until late at night.

The opposition took the stand that the grant should be made general to South African volunteers from all parts of Canada. They pointed out that the limitation used words capable of the construction that a pension for South African volunteers was within the possibilities.

The house took up consideration of the resolution awarding the land grants of 250 acres each to volunteers of Manitoba and the territories who served in the South African war.

Col. San Hughes pointed out that when he first introduced his resolution the prime minister declared the grant could not be made as it had not then been decided whether the lands in the Northwest would be given to the new provinces or retained by the Dominion.

Finally it was decided that the Dominion should retain control. Then, however, the prime minister raised the objection to a general grant of two of the provinces had already provided their volunteers with land, and it was to meet this objection that he introduced his resolution of last year.

“That resolution carried,” said Col. Hughes, “but I knew then that the prime minister's sense of justice would correct that discrimination and lead to the grant being made general. MAN BE REPORTED INSTEAD OF TRIED

Provincial Authorities Convinced That the Alleged Murderer of Terrace is of a Weak Mind.

John Terrace, the young Englishman charged with the murder of William Curry, the aged farmer, at his farm in Toronto Township, near Brampton, on the night of Dec. 25 last, may never face trial.

The provincial authorities will examine him with a view to deporting him to England, whence he came to this country fifteen weeks ago from Newcastle-on-Tyne. Dr. Bruce Smith, provincial inspector of asylums, was in Brampton this week collecting data as to the history of Terrace's life and family.

It learned from Terrace that thru-out his life he has suffered from fits, or seizures, during which time he has not been conscious of his actions. There is also said to be a strain of insanity in his family.

It appears that there is a strong feeling in the County of Peel against the case ever coming to trial. This feeling is growing in strength as the time for the spring session, for which the case is set, draws nearer. A verdict of guilty might bring about an execution, something which has never yet occurred in the county.

In this connection it is recalled that Terrace made, or pretended to make, a discovery of a letter in the courtroom at his preliminary hearing, which he said had fallen from James Curry's pocket. The letter was addressed to one who had stood outside the window of the Curry home on the night of the shooting. It is said that unless Curry paid a sum of money the truth of the shooting would be told.

In addition to this, Terrace said that he had found Jim Curry's diary, in which from time to time entries were made, setting out that Curry had committed a number of robberies and had been upbraided by his father upon returning to the house. Observations that he would have to do something to silence the old man were scattered thru this book, which, with the letter, is believed to be the product of Terrace's own mind and hand.

These things have been said by doctors connected with the case to indicate the low cunning of a poor order of mentality.

If not deported, to be taken in charge by English authorities, he may be placed in an asylum in Canada.

BRITISH COLUMBIA IS SCORED BY JUSTICE CLEMENT

Inflaming Question on Which There is No Shadow of a Constitutional Doubt.

VICTORIA, B. C., Feb. 25.—(Special.)—Something of a sensation was occasioned to-day by the outspoken manner in which Justice Clement arraigned the provincial government for disloyalty, treason and un-Canadianism in connection with the recently enacted Natal Act, directed at the exclusion of Japanese.

The unusual comment was embodied in his lordship's judgment in the full court, dismissing an appeal from the chief justice's decision that the act is ultra vires of the legislature. Justices Irving and Morrison concurring with Justice Clement. After sketching the relative jurisdictions of Dominion and province, Justice Clement said:

“No doubt honest differences may exist as to where the line is drawn by the B. N. A. Act, or as to which side of the line a particular matter may fall upon; but to suggest doubt where no real doubt exists, and particularly as to matters apt to inflame, is not to be commended. Such a matter we have here. This matter of Japanese immigration has been dealt with properly, that is to say, constitutionally, by the parliament of Canada, and I must say it smacks strongly of disloyalty to our settled form of government when the authorities of one province undertake to override and render abortive the will of the people of Canada. ‘Et ceterum pars magna sumus’ constitutionally expressed in an act of the parliament of Canada, and when they ever made bold to forbid the honorable observance of our solemn engagements with a foreign power.”

LONDON, Feb. 25.—Lord Fitzmaurice, parliamentary secretary of the foreign office, was asked in the house of lords to-day for information regarding the Macedonian reforms and the effect of the Austrian project for the connection of a branch railroad thru Turkish territory, to connect Vienna with Saloniki.

In reply Lord Fitzmaurice said he regretted that he had no cheerful news to impart. A very critical stage had been reached, he said, in both the local affairs of Macedonia and in the diplomatic enquete known as the concert of Europe.

WILLIAM HALLIDAY'S DEATH WAS ACCIDENTAL

Jury Finishes Inquest and Renders Verdict—Live News of a Day in Hamilton.

HAMILTON, Feb. 25.—(Special.)—The inquiry into the circumstances surrounding the death of William Halliday, the contractor, who came to his death through asphyxiation, was finished this evening before Coroner Rennie. The jury brought in a verdict that death was accidental. "The evidence showed that the deceased was alone in the house at the time. WHAT'S THE ANSWER? MR. ELSON WANTS TO KNOW

Horse Racing on the Boundary Line—Can it Be Legally Stopped?

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—(Special.)—In the commons this afternoon Mr. Elson of Middlesex drew attention to the proposed Ministerial Association against Sunday horse racing on the Ottawa River.

"But the act doesn't apply in Quebec," observed Dr. Spruille.

MILITIA DEPT. BLOCK CAR LINE THRU FORT

City Can't Remove Building Until Ratepayers Pass Bylaw—A Power Conference.

A communication from the minister of militia, received by the mayor yesterday, practically ends the possibility of a car line to the eastern entrance of the exhibition grounds being constructed in time for the fall of 1908. The letter stated that the government will not allow the city to remove the old buildings in the way of the proposed route until a bylaw approving of the car line has been carried by the ratepayers.

Sir Frederick Borden also explains that, pending a decision as to whether such a line would interfere with the preservation of the Old Fort, as agreed upon when the city purchased Garrison Commons, permission cannot be granted.

Mayor Oliver is in favor of the bylaw being submitted without loss of time.

Hydro-Power Conference.

Hon. Adam Beck and W. K. McNaught, M.L.A., represented the Hydro-Electric Power Commission at yesterday's conference with the board of control, when, according to the mayor, the power situation was discussed in a general way.

Mayor Oliver is in favor of the Hydro-Electric Light Company's contract with the Electrical Development Company, which is being considered for the reason, as his worship explained, that the controllers "knew very little about it."

The commissioners, so it was stated, expressed no objection to the Hydro-Electric Light Company's plan on reasonable terms, but asked for a few days' adjournment. The controllers will meet the commission again before negotiating further with the company.

AMENDMENTS TO SUIT THE HORTICULTURISTS

Changes Which Will Be Made to the Act, as Finally Agreed On.

All the amendments set forth in the bill re the Horticultural Societies' Amendment Act have been fully discussed by representatives of the horticultural societies, and the bill has been introduced at the request of the Ontario Horticultural Association. The chief amendments are:

Section 2: The objects of horticultural societies are set forth in section 9 of the main act, such as the holding of meetings, holding exhibitions, distribution of seeds and plants, circulation of horticultural journals, etc. Formerly the act limited the expenditure for any one of these objects to one-third of the total receipts. Some of the societies felt that this was allowing them too little. For instance, Mrs. Catharine holds a public exhibition of early fruits and amateur flower products in September, which is second only in importance to the exhibition of the same nature held in Toronto, and it interferes with the success of that organization to limit their expenditure to one-third, hence the change to one-half.

Section 3: This provides for the holding of the annual meeting in Toronto in the second week of November instead of in January. By the first week of November the year's work will be done and local new officers in office in good time to make preparations for the year's work. Further, as the Provincial Horticultural Association meets in Toronto in the second week of November, delegates to that body are more likely to be properly selected just before that meeting than if elected in January, ten months before.

Section 4: This provides for the sending of all reports of the societies to the minister of agriculture in February, instead of the first day of February. The result will be that the grant for the year can be approved in the month of February, instead of being held up until the first day of February. Section 5: The time for the completion of membership is extended from May 1 to July 31, that is, societies have until July 1 to gather in all their new members, so as to qualify for the grant which is not paid until after the first of July, when the department has been notified of the completion of the membership list.

Section 6: As the act stood it was impossible to inform city societies definitely as to the amount of their grant until the membership for the current year was complete. The change proposed takes the grant to city societies on the membership of the preceding year, so that all societies can be notified early in the year as to the amount to which they will be entitled.

The old act did not make provision for determining the grant to societies newly organized. The amendment here proposed fixes the limit for this grant at \$100.

Section 7: With the above amendments, schedule B of the act is not required, hence is struck out.

OFFICE SPECIALTY'S SHARE

Supplied Equipment to Government Worth About \$123,000.

OTTAWA, Feb. 25.—G. Kingston, accountant of the public works department, was examined in the public account committee to-day, in respect to the payment made of about \$123,000 to the Office Specialty Company of Toronto. This represented the amount paid to all the departments in Ottawa, as well as the various public buildings throughout Canada.

The chief architect, J. A. Ewart, was also examined. Old fittings were gathered together and sold once a year. Mr. Ewart said that his information was that the head of the Specialty Company was in Newmarket, George M. Reid, and that his brother, Commissioner Reid of the national transcontinental railway was a friend of his, and sometimes called upon him in his private life. He said that he was never met Commissioner Reid, he did not know that either of them was interested in the company.

Mr. Ewart said that the companies which had done the work for the Office Specialty Company of Ottawa, the Office Specialty Company of Toronto, and the Gananoque Company. In one case he knew of tenders being advertised for. It was not customary to advertise or give orders in the United States. In one case, for the fitting up of the railway department, the witness said that he asked in Washington what the work could be done for. The Office Specialty Company of Gananoque got the work, being the lowest tender, but they could not do the work, and the contract went to the next lowest tender, the Office Specialty Company of Toronto, at about \$20,000.

WRECKED THE WRONG TRAIN

Woodchopper Had Planned to Rob Passengers.

SEDALIA, Mo., Feb. 25.—G. W. Cox, a woodchopper, whose home is at Franklin Junction, Mo., confessed to Missouri Pacific Railway officials here this afternoon that he removed the rail from the track on the top of Otterville Hill, 15 miles east of here, on Friday night last, that resulted in the derailling of a freight train from St. Louis.

Cox said he had intended to wreck and rob the fast Missouri Pacific Kansas City-St. Louis passenger train No. 4, which was due at Otterville a few minutes after the freight was wrecked.

Cox was taken to the scene of the accident and after close questioning confessed. He said he committed the deed alone and had no accomplices.

Cox is 35 years old and has a wife and child.

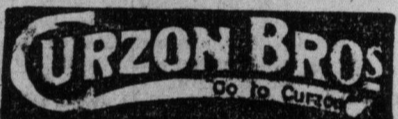

LEGALLY SHAREHOLDERS INSTEAD OF CREDITORS

Referee Kappel Gives an Important Decision in Affairs of the York Loan.

That the York County and Loan Savings Co. was empowered by its charter to transact business outside of the Province of Ontario and that, therefore, all outside of the province who have imagined themselves creditors are instead shareholders, was the decision announced yesterday by Referee George Kappel.

In his decision the referee says: "Mr. Mulvey, who represented the attorney-general on the argument, did not claim any right on behalf of the province to incorporate a company with powers to do business anywhere outside of the province as a matter of grant, but he claimed for the province that the company is legally incorporated to carry on business, the subject matter of which was within the jurisdiction of the province, was in a high position, as far as the law of comity is concerned and its right to foreign recognition, as a company incorporated by the Dominion or by any other country or state, and on principle it would seem this contention is well founded.

"It would require a very express enactment in the British North America Act to take away from those companies which the province has legally incorporated the powers which the general law of nations gives to every corporate entity of a foreign state.

"The other grounds of ultra vires and illegality, raised by Mr. Masten, are also disallowed. The referee says: "I have, therefore, come to the conclusion that this company was legally incorporated by the province and is not limited by anything contained in the British North America Act to confine its operations to the province that created it.

"The result is that the claim of the shareholders outside of the province to rank as creditors, and the ground that the issue of their shares or the collection of calls thereon was ultra vires of the company or in breach of the statute law of any province, is disallowed, and that the holders of shares issued and delivered to persons outside of the Province of Ontario are in the same position as the holders of shares issued and delivered to persons within the province.

"Too Late to Repudiate. "These shares were in fact accepted by the shareholders, and it is too late for the shareholders to seek to repudiate the shares after they were issued and held by any persons in Nova Scotia. The want of power or capacity claimed does not affect the shares, but the persons who may hold them.

"The result is that the claim of the shareholders outside of the province to rank as creditors, and the ground that the issue of their shares or the collection of calls thereon was ultra vires of the company or in breach of the statute law of any province, is disallowed, and that the holders of shares issued and delivered to persons outside of the Province of Ontario are in the same position as the holders of shares issued and delivered to persons within the province.

"Even if the Nova Scotia shareholders could legally follow their money, I think they would find that they would get very little, if any, more than what would result from a dividend as ordinary shareholders.

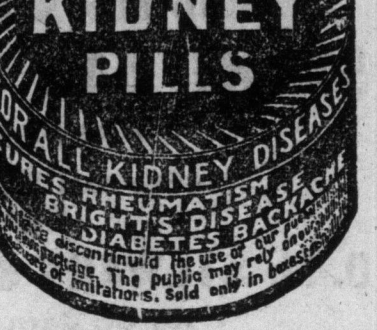

Invincible Discrimination. W. L. Borden pointed out that the western lands were as much in the control of the Dominion as any dollar in the treasury.

Col. Sam Hughes argued that the government would better have extended the grant, not only to all Canadians, but to every British soldier, than squander all the money that has been spent on the North Atlantic Trading Co.

Col. Hughes replied that he had thought Col. Borden's resolution of last session was worded as it was meant, but that hon. member it now appeared, had something in the back of his head at the time that he intended to bring out later.

Col. Hughes interrupted to observe that he himself had last session asked that the land grant be extended to veterans all over the Dominion.

"And couldn't persuade one member on his own side to join him," replied the prime minister. "He was like the last rose of summer, left blooming alone."

The government, he went on to say, had acted on the recommendation of Col. Hughes, but he sooner said he done so than he wanted the whole Dominion including the west provinces had accepted Col. Hughes' resolution because there was some sense in it.

Col. Hughes replied that in his resolution of last year he was simply taking the half loaf, which was better than no bread.

George Taylor put in a plea for land grants for the Egyptian and Sudan.

In the course of the further discussion, Mr. Monk suggested that the British and western provinces should be given similar recognition for the Nile volunteers with whom, by the way, he himself served in Egypt and Sudan.

Mr. Herron of Alberta urged that the grant to volunteers in the Northwest be given to the heirs of volunteers who had lost their lives in South Africa.

The resolution was finally reported, the bill founded upon it, and read a first time.
