It was moved by Ill.. Bro.: WILLIAM HENRY HUTTON, and resolved, that inasmuch as the proceedings of the Supreme Council, for the year 1889, have been printed and distributed, the reading of the same be dispensed with, and they be now confirmed.

Labor in the Thirty-third Degree was dispensed with, and a number of brethren were admitted.

The Grand Commander then delivered his Annual Address as follows:

PEERS AND BRETHREN :-

For the first time since the formation of the Supreme Council at Ottawa in the year 1874 we are convened in regular Annual Session outside the City of

Montreal. But this is not our first meeting in Hamilton. In 1883 the Annual Session was opened at our Grand East and, by adjournment, came to this spirited and beautiful city. The remembrance of the hospitality we enjoyed, of the graceful courtesies extended to us as individuals and as members of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite, the effective way in which the work was exhibited by our Subordinate Bodies here, must still be fresh in the memory of all who participated in the business of that Session.

In the pleasure of the meeting and of the greeting of this hour we cannot forget those whom we can meet and greet here no longer. At the close of our last Annual Session we had upon our roll twenty-four Active Members, three Past Active Members and five Honorary Members. bers are altered by the death of one Active and one Past Active Those of us who were at Montreal a year ago must remember the remarks of Ill.: Bro.: MACLEOD MOORE, who then declared his firm belief that he was with us for the last time, and who pathetically bade us a final farewell. His words were prophetic, for he closed his earthly career on the 1st September last. He was the oldest Active Sovereign Grand Inspector General of our Supreme Council, one of its founders, instrumental in establishing the Rite in Canada, the Representative here of the Supreme Council of England and Wales, and of that of Greece, an earnest and intelligent Mason, warm of heart and full of kindly impulses. The Order of the Temple in Canada, of which he was Grand Master, had his warmest affections, and he gave it the benefit of his abundant information and his active intellect. The effort he made-sincere. determined and scholarly-to restore to that Order much of its ancient prestige and power, to incorporate into the modern Templar life some of the old practices and habits of the soldier-monk, could not be followed without a feeling of profound interest. It was impossible that that effort could succeed to the full extent of our Illustrious Brother's wishes, but the Masonic historian will not be able to do his duty effectively if he cannot fully appreciate the scope and object of the intentions of Brother Moore. He died in the fulness of time at a ripe old age, having accomplished much for the Fraternity he loved so well. Last year we transferred from the roll of Active Members to the roll of Past Active Members the name of Ill.: Bro.: DAVID RANSOM MUNRO. Bro.: MUNRO was also one of the original members of the Supreme Council, and, as opportunity offered, a very energetic one—as, indeed, he had been in all the different branches of the Fiaternity in the Province of New Brunswick, where had been his home for over fifty years. short time ago he removed to the United States, where his children were, and since then his active connection with us ceased, but his interest never did. All of ever stated his views moderately and clearly, and with much judgment, and the offices which he filled were filled satisfactorily. The hard circumstances of life compelled Bro.: Munro to leave Canada, and it was to him a matter of deep sorrow that when past his meridian he had to seek a home and a grave in another land than that in which he was born. 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Many of our sister Supreme Councils, while sympathizing with us have also asked our sympathy for the losses which they have sustained by death. the number of members actively engaged in the work of the Rite, whose labors are suspended on earth in this year, is unusually large. The Supreme Council of England has notified us of the death of EARL CARNARVON, Past Sov.: Grand Commander, who died June 18th, 1890. The late Earl was at the head of the Rite in England at the time of the formation of this Supreme Council and signed the Patent authorizing the formation. He held the office of Pro. Grand Master of England at his death, and was eminent as a statesman of the Empire. The Supreme Council for Belgium announces that on the 5th July, its Ill.: Grand Commander, PIERRE VAN HUMBEECK, died after a long and painful illness. This Illustrious Brother devoted his life to the work of the Fraternity, and he found time to discharge many important public duties, the most important being that of Minister of Education in the late administration in Belgium. knighted not only by his own Government but by those of other countries for his services to the people. A man of high character, he had long presided with dignity and ability over the Supreme Council which mourns his death. The Rite in France sustained a severe loss by the death, early in February last, of Ill '. Bro.: CHARLES EUGENE BERARD, Secretary-General of that Supreme Council, and in Switzerland on 27th March died EUGENE BAUD, for a long time and at his death Grand Treasurer-General of the Supreme Council of that Republic. Both of these Brethren had world wide reputations. The Supreme Council of Tunis, under date 25th March, announces the death of Ill.: Bro.: Cosmo Burlizzi, its Lt. Grand Commander, J. JEAN BAPTISTE BONREPAUX, Grand Minister of State, and of ERNEST IRENE GARDETTE, Grand Almoner, active members of the Rite, and citizens discharging responsible duties. Our Sister Supreme Council in Mexico, informs us of the death on 6th January, 1890, of Ill.: Jose Maria GAONA, 33°, its Secretary-General. That of Uruguay announces the death in February last of Col. JUAN M. DE LA SIERIA, its Lt. Grand Commander. The Supreme Council of St. Domingo mourns the death of four active members of the fraternity within its jurisdiction : Antonio Delfin Madrigal, 33°, who contributed largely to the introduction of Masonry into the Republic; JUAN DE LA CRUZ ALVAREZ; PEDRO MARIA PINEYEO and APOLINAI DE CASTRO, all active members of Supreme Council, the latter being the son of the venerable Mason who is at its head. The Supreme Council of Brazil on 19th May announces the death of its Lt. Grand Commander, the VISCONDE DE JURY. Council for the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States, announces the death on February last of Ill.: Bro.: JOHN CHRISTIE, at the age of 85 years, an active member of the Supreme Council, and the oldest Inspector General in years of service in the United States, and among the honorary members of that Jurisdiction who died during the year was General CHARLES ROOME, recently Grand Master of the Temple in the United States, and WILLIAM BRINSMAID of Vermont, a venerable Mason in that State.

I have observed in the newspapers—but no official intimation has been sent me either as head of this Supreme Council, or as representative here of that of Scotland—announcement of the death of the EARL OF ROSSLYN, Sov.: Grand

Commander of the Supreme Council and Grand Master of the Temple in Scotland. A devoted Mason and active in many branches of the fraternity, the death of this Brother will be a serious loss.

Since our last annual meeting, an Ill.: Brother, who was at that meeting created an active member, and understood to be for the Province of Nova Scotia, has removed into another Province. There is no regulation of our Supreme Council dealing with a matter of this kind. In the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States removal from the State for which a Brother was created an active ern Jurisdiction Section 9 of the Constitution provides: "If an Inspector General "remove permanently into another jurisdiction (State or Territory) in which there "is a resident Inspector General, or a Special Deputy of this Supreme Council, "he ipso facto loses his active membership and becomes an Honorary Member; "but by vote of the Supreme Council may be made an emeritus member." The only provision in our constitution dealing with the matter of removal refers to the removal from the jurisdiction of the Supreme Council and not to removal from one Province to another. It is quite clear that if all of the Brethren who are Active Members in one Province were to remove into another there would have to be a new creation of Active Members from the Province thus deprived of its representatives. I say it is quite clear, but this would after all only be as a matter of expediency and of duty, not as a matter of constitutional law, for it must be remembered that while it is understood here that certain members represent particular Provinces, and, possibly, may be created for these Provinces, the constitution itself does not make any provision for representation by Provinces, and I do not think that the standing of any of our present members could be affected by a new rule. Nevertheless the matter is one which ought to be provided for by constitutional regulation.

Having regard to the extent of our territory, which compels the expenditure of large sums for travelling expenses by those Brethren who attend our meetings from distant places, to the conditions of life in some parts of the country, to the many calls upon our Active Members, several of whom discharge public functions of various kinds, it is a fair matter for your calm consideration whether the rule should be rigidly enforced which deprives an Active Member of his seat for failure to attend the Annual Sessions within a certain time specified in the constitution, We need and should have the counsel, advice and assistance of all of our Brethren in Supreme Council, and if we all remained away the consequence would be serious. But it is wise to have regard for the conditions of the Rite in the Province to which these members belong. Are they fairly doing their duty at home? Are there others ready to take their places whom we would desire to have? The rule in regard to non-attending Brethren is made principally to meet a particular condition in the Supreme Council itself. Its rigid enforcement may not be the wisest thing.

Without anticipating the reports of the Deputies of the Secretary-General and of the Treasurer-General, I may say that these reports will show a very good condition of affairs. Our membership increases, the number of our Subordidate Bodies

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have been added to, and our financial standing improves. The receipts of the Secretary-General's office last year were larger than in any year preceding. We have increased our permanent investments by the purchase of an additional one thousand dollars debenture of the Landed Banking and Loan Company, without impairing our ordinary Bank balance for current needs; and, above all, so far as I can observe there is throughout our membership a very hearty and cheerful feeling.

Acting upon a suggestion made last year the Secretary-General has prepared a complete inventory of all our property, and this can now be carried or added to from year to year.

Warrants have been issued as ordered by Supreme Council last year to Quebec Lodge of Perfection at Quebec; to Ottawa Lodge of Perfection at Ottawa; and to Royal Oak Lodge of Perfection at Kentvillė, Nova Scotia. Dispensations have been issued during the year to open a Lodge of Perfection at Amherst, N.S. to be styled Cumberland Lodge, a Chapter of Rose Croix at Quebec, with the title Quebec Chapter; and a Chapter at Ottawa, Ontario, to be called Murray Chapter. All of these bodies start with fair prospects, and in the hands of the energetic brethren who have charge of them will render good service to the cause of humanity.

In January last I was able to be present at the annual re-union of the members of the Rite in this City of Hamilton, as was our Ill.: Past Gd.: Commander, Bro.: Hutton, and attended all of the meetings of the bodies here. at the time there was a general prevalence of la grippe, the number of members present was large, and the object of the re-union was most successfully accomplished. Scarcely any words of praise would be too warm in which to declare my appreciation of the manner in which the rituals were rendered. All of the appointments and fittings were appropriate to the work to be done, but these were as nothing compared to the skill and effectiveness displayed by the brethren who had the work in hand. It was all an intelligent rendering of our degrees by men who understood them and felt their meaning, and who could convey their impressions of them to others. The effect was increased by the thoroughness of the musical accompaniments. Aside altogether from the importance of these re-unions as teaching those who desire to learn the real meanings of the degrees, they are most beneficial in bringing members together from different parts of Canada, and enlarging our personal acquaintanceship each with the other. To the members of the Rite here a debt of gratitude is due by all who witnessed their work, and participated in the social meeting which followed it.

A few weeks later I consecrated the Ottawa Lodge of Perfection and installed the office-bearers. There was a full attendance of members, and they then had almost all of the paraphernalia necessary for the full working of the degrees, much of it of the very best character. In their presiding officer, Bro.: BUTTERWORTH, the Lodge has a most earnest and faithful brother, and he has the hearty support of an intelligent body of Masons.

In accordance with the desire of the Supreme Council expressed at the session of 1888 and at that of 1889, I paid a visit to British Columbia recently in

the hope that something might be done through the presence of a member of the Supreme Council to overcome the difficulty which for the past three or four years has caused a total suspension of our work in that Province. Although I had the benefit of counsel and suggestions from Ill .. Bro.: PARTRIDGE, who visited the Province a few weeks before I did, and who foresaw obstacles in the way of success concerning which he gave me valuable information, I was unable to revive the dormant bodies of the Rite at Victoria. I had several interviews with our late Special Deputy in that Province, Bro.: Eli Harrison, 32°, and with a number of other brethren; and while, after a full examination of all the conditions, I was able to make up my mind as to the only possible course to pursue with any prospect of attaining success, I was not able to pursue that course; therefore the authority in the resolution of last session empowering me to confer the Thirtythird degree upon one or two brethren in that Province has not been exercised. In discussing the situation with Bro. . HARRISON, he claimed that injustice was done him by the terms of my address to Supreme Council in 1888, in which year the office of Special Deputy for British Columbia was abolished and that Province placed in charge of our Illustrious Secretary-General. I assured Bro.: HARRISON that no reflection whatever was intended upon him by my language, or by the action of the Supreme Council; and that the office which he held was abolished because the Supreme Council felt that the limited powers in the hands of a Special Deputy of the 32° were not sufficient to meet the needs of the Rite in the Province; for this reason, and this alone, British Columbia was placed in charge of a Sovereign Grand Inspector-General. This was far more advantageous than to make special legislation as to the time-limit between the giving of the degrees as had been more than once asked for by Bro.: HARRISON in different reports made by him to Supreme Council. As a matter of fact leaving out of sight the personal grievance, the only complaint against the Supreme Council itself was that it had not authorized the bodies at Victoria to confer degrees at intervals of time under those prescribed by the Constitution. In two or three cases there may have been inconvenience and even expense to individuals by the time-limit. but generally the limit could have worked no hardship to the applicants for the degrees in or near Victoria. The real difficulty, the true cause of the existing condition is not in the Rite itself, but it originates in trouble which arose in another branch of the fraternity, and which, unhappily, created a sharp division among members of the Rite. I wish to say nothing which would have the effect of reviving the remembrance of past differences, and, therefore, go no further on this point, than to express my regrets that worthy brethren whom I met in Victoriaearnest, sincere and true Masons-are divided, and my fear that until time or unforseen circumstances close the breach, or at least soften existing asperities, the bodies of the Rite in Victoria will not be revived. Nevertheless I did not deem it advisable to ask for the return of the warrants or the surrender of our rituals, preferring to leave that to the decision of the Supreme Council, which either may or may not so ask, or which may leave it discretionary with me to do so. The warrants and rituals are in the careful hands of Bro. George Sargison, 18°, from whom and from Bro.: HARRISON, sen., 32°, Bro. A. R. MILNE, 18°, and Bro. HENRY BROWN, 18°, Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of British Columbia, and Grand Master McKrown, I received courteous attention. I believe

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that good results will follow my visit, though they may not appear immediately. The fact that the Supreme Council authorized a visitation awakened much interest in the craft. Possibly the work in Victoria will have to be begun anew. Of the 27 members reported in the proceedings as on the roll of the Lodge of Perfection, there are now scarcely fourteen available at Victoria; and out of this number not more than half would take up the work. Bro. . HARRISON, who has discharged many important craft duties, been Grand Master of the Province, and the recipient of many evidences of the good will of his brethren, is infirm from the effects of an accident, and has positively assured me that he can no longer be relied on for the performance of active duties. The brother whom I thought best fitted to take up the responsibilities of work for us was unwilling to do so. There seems to be, so far as Victoria is concerned, nothing to do but to wait. In the young and rising city of Vancouver there are greater immediate possibilities than there are at Victoria. Bro.: ISAAC OPPENHEIMER, formerly M. W. of the Khurum Chapter, is now a resident of that place, but he was absent in California at the time of my visit. There are two or three other members of the Rite there who might be depended on to assist us if called upon. Acting upon what I conceived to be for the best interests of the Rite, I conferred the degrees 4° to 18° upon Bro.: WILLIAM DOWNIE, Grand Senior Warden of the Grand Lodge of the Province, on L. R. JOHNSTON, Master of Cascade Lodge, No. 12, and on Bro.: JAMES T. CARROLL, M. D., of the same Lodge, all residents of Vancouver, and I have little doubt whatever from the interest shown by these brethren in the short time I spent with them, the Rite in British Columbia will have a new future. I may add that while on the Pacific coast I visited the city of Seattle, and there met III. Bro. J. R. HAYDEN, Deputy of the Supreme Council for the State of Washington, Southern Jurisdiction of the United States, who was instrumental in introducing some of our degrees into British Columbia. He again kindly placed his services at our disposal whenever the occasion for the use of them rises. Although I took the long journey of 3,400 miles from my own home with some feeling of dislike, I must add that I had an enjoyable and pleasant trip. I saw a wide extent of country, much of it very fertile, a great deal of it wild and yet beautiful, all of it interesting. Above all I formed friendships with members of the craft on the Pacific slope and in the prairie Provinces, which, I assume, will prove as durable as they are now agreeable.

While on my way back I spent two days at Winnipeg, and visited the Lodge. Chapter and Consistory at that place. Promises made to the Supreme Council last year with regard to a revival of the work at Winnipeg, by Ill. Bro. Bell, have been well kept. A new suit of apartments has been fitted up very tastefully and comfortably, and the Lodge and Chapter have made considerable progress in restoring the properties lost by the fire. Several new members have been admitted and a great deal of interest is taken in the work. I saw the 4°, 5° and 18° conferred in full, with an effectiveness which was most creditable to the brethren. Difficulties which have interposed to prevent successful meetings have now all disappeared, and we may expect a steady progress of the Rite in that city. This has not been accomplished, however, without an expenditure of time, labour and means on the part of the brethren, which is worthy of consideration.

The Consistory has taken steps to supply itself with the necessary material to revive its work, and I think the Supreme Council might fairly, under all the present conditions, aid our distant brethren by cancelling the existing financial obligation to the Supreme Council, and thus relieving the Consistory of a burden which will be a very heavy one, if liquidation of all the debt is demanded. The work which has been accomplished by our Illustrious Deputy and by the bre hren who have rallied to his support is gratifying in the highest degree, and merits the warmest praise.

I took the opportunity while at Winnipeg to confer—with the assistance of Ill.:. Bro . Bell-under the resolution of the Supreme Council of last year, page 313 of our proceedings, the Thirty-third degree upon Ill. . Bro. . DANIEL HUNTER McMillan. Bro.: McMillan is Commander-in-chief of the Consistory, an earnest and intelligent Mason, a member of the government of the Province, a man of high standing in the community in which he lives, and an excellent addition to our Honorary membership.

With respect to the Lodge of Perfection at Brandon I did nothing. Bro.:. Bell assured me that for the moment it would be useless for me to attempt to meet the membership, now pretty well scattered; but he has promised to use his best efforts at an early day to revive the body. The town of Brandon is showing many evidences of prosperity. Masonry is in great esteem there. So that I have little doubt that a properly made effort by him will culminate in success.

Among matters presented to my notice or to that of the Grand Secretary are two or three of which special mention is made. The question has been asked, "Does suspension by a Craft Lodge for non-payment of dues take effect in bodies of our obedience?" We must all feel that every brother should retain his good standing in Craft Masonry, but suspension for non-payment of dues is clearly not the suspension for unmasonic conduct contemplated by our Constitution. It is not the act of a Grand Lodge, but of a Subordinate Lodge, and such an act-often times arising from inability to perform a duty—should not unaffiliate our members without some act of ours. I confess that the question is a difficult one, because we cannot desire to retain on our roll members who do not do their duty as Blue A brother unable to pay dues should honorably retire from his membership. On the other hand it is well to recollect that a brother who is a member of a Lodge of Perfection and Chapter of Rose Croix is a joint partner with his fellows in the ownership of the property and privileges of the body, and failure to do his duty financially in some other body cannot justly of itself deprive him of membership in an association in which he discharges his duty faithfully. Questions of this kind ought not to arise, because every brother knows just what he can do and what he cannot do with hismeans, and Blue Lodges are not very likely to suspend a brother for non-payment of dues who will show any good reason why he should not be suspended.

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be asked to complete the work for the Lodge in which it was commenced, so that the Brother might receive his 14° certificate from us, and the degrees under the ballot which elected him to them. This is an act of courtesy which is not unknown in the Craft, and is simple enough.

A Brother was proposed for the degrees in a Lodge of Perfection and the ballot was unfavorable. In six weeks after the date of rejection the Lodge to which application had been made received a request from a Lodge of Perfection in another Province asking permission to receive a petition from the Brother. The Lodge in the original jurisdiction asked several questions; first, as to whether a Brother could apply for the degrees outside of his own Province; second, if so, can the application be made within three months, the time specified in the constitution which must elapse before the application could be renewed in the Lodge first applied to; third, how is the consent referred to in Section 2, Article 32, of constitution to be given. That article reads: "Whenever application shall be " made for the degrees to any Lodge or Chapter, other than the one nearest the "place of residence of the applicant, no action shall be taken thereon unless the "consent of such body is appended thereto"; fourth, if this consent is to be given by open vote will a majority vote suffice; if by ballot what number will reject? Inasmuch as it was quite reasonable to hold that a Brother could not apply to another Lodge before he could renew his application to the first Lodge I so declared, and there the matter has so far rested. But the constitutional question raised as to the mode of giving consent is of sufficient importance to require a definite declaration from the Supreme Council.

With all the Supreme Councils of our correspondence we are upon terms of the most friendly kind; and I think we are justified in feeling proud of the fact that our Supreme Council by its conservative management, its prudence and good judgment is everywhere respected. I was able to pay, during the year, a visit of courtesy and respect to Ill. . Bro. . PIKE, at his House of the Temple, in Washington, to enjoy a half hour's pleasant conversation with him, to inspect the library, containing many rare and valuable books, which belongs to the Supreme Council, and to see many of the practical results which have followed from his devotion to the work of the Rite. Notwithstanding his age he seemed to be quite as vigorous as he was when he came among us in 1874, and I felt that it was well worth a journey to Washington to meet him. The Supreme Council over which he presides is in session at this time, and it would be a graceful act on our part to send an expression of our esteem and good-will. Our amiable and kind-hearted representative, Bro . FRED WEBBER, the Ill . Secretary-General, left nothing undone on his part to make my visit to the headquarters of the Supreme Council, a pleasant one.

None of our members were present this year at the Northern Supreme Council, which met in Cleveland in September, which is much to be regretted. I append a note from Ill.. Bro.. Geo. O. Tyler—marked C—giving a brief resume of some of the proceedings. There were forty-three active members present, and nearly three hundred honorary members. The honorary degree was given to thirty-two applicants.

Among other matters of interest which may be noted as occuring in Sister Oct., Jurisdictions, is the great advance made towards the unification of the fraternity in the Republic of Mexico, by which a union or fusion has been effected by two prominent governing bodies, the basis of union being an unders anding that the Supreme Council will hereafter control the degrees 4° to 32°, while the Crast Lodges will establish their own form of government. In San Domingo there has also been an agreement which will result in the government of the Craft Lodges by their own Grand Lodge, while the Supreme Council will control the superior

I again renew my recommendation of last year with regard to the Library. We ought to obtain a complete set of the Bulletin of the Southern Supreme Council, a book which is every year growing more valuable, and a portion of which, I

HAMILTON.

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The progress of the Rite in Hamilton is, as usual, highly satisfactory. The Moore Consistory has had the most successful year in its history and has added more to its membership, and members of the Rite have come from all parts of the Province to receive the Consistory Degrees. The Rose Croix Chapter has also made great progress, and never at any previous time was it in a healthier condi-

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tion. 14 Assemblies have been held, 12 regular and 2 special. The 16° was worked for the first time at the Re-union in January last, and is now a part of the regular work of the Chapter. The Murton Lodge of Perfection has initiated 31 members and stands at the head of the list for work done in this Province. The Rite is held in high esteem in Hamilton and vicinity, due no doubt to the high character of those who are permitted to become members.

The annual Re-union of the Hamilton Bodies was as usual the event of the year and was largely attended.

TORONTO.

Toronto Rose Croix Chapter has not increased its membership to a great extent, owing to the unfurnished state of the rooms, but having secured better quarters the prospects of the Rite now are most encouraging. The Lodge of Perfection has been more successful, having added largely to its membership. Under the able management of its present officers it is certain to make steady advancement. The outlook of the Rite in Toronto was never brighter. There is more enthusiasm among the members and greater desire among Masons generally to be admitted. Having three Inspectors-General in that city, we have a right to expect greater results in the future.

LONDON.

The London Bodies are improving and show a steady increase in the work performed.

KINGSTON.

The Rite in the Limestone City is advancing and increasing in members. Nine members were added to the Rose Croix Chapter, and three to the Lodge of Perfection. Great care is shown in receiving applications and the brethren are very particular in their enquiries before admitting new material. The present members are leading Craftsmen and prominent citizens, and the Masonic Fraternity of Kingston have a very high opinion of the Scottish Rite.

WINDSOR.

The Rite in this rising town has been specially favored, having able and zealous officers and brethren, who are enthusiastic in securing members from the best material, and in working the Degrees most efficiently. The Chapter has conferred Degrees on five members, and the same number has been added to the Lodge of Perfection. The prospects of the Rite are very good indeed and the Supreme Council may rest assured that none but earnest Craftsmen will be admitted in the Windsor Bodies. Our Worthy Illustrious Brother, Geo. D. Adams, 32°, visited Colorado Consistory, Denver, last January and assisted in conferring the Degrees from 4 to 32° inclusive on a class of 35 candidates. Our Colorado Brethren were so well pleased with Brother Adams that they presented him with a testimonial expressive of their appreciation of his labors and have invited him to return next November and assist them again. This compliment to one of our members is worthy of being recorded.

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OTTAWA.

The capital of Canada presents a record that calls for our warmest admiration. A Chapter named "Murray," after our worthy and esteemed Secretary-General, has been organized with a membership of eight, and it has the very brightest prospects. The Lodge of Perfection has initiated 21 and has conferred the 4th, 5th, 9th, 13th and 14th Degrees in full. The membership is now 48 and several applications have been received. The Brethren of Ottawa are under the able generalship of Illustrious Brother E. B. Butterworth, 32°, one of the most enthusiastic and zealous Masons in this Jurisdiction.

BARRIE.

Little progress has been made during the past year, but several applications are now before the Lodge of Perfection, and there is every reason to hope that the Rite will make greater advancement in future, although the source is limited from which to select material.

GUELPH.

The Lodge of Perfection has added 4 to its number of members, and it is the general belief that the Rite in the Royal City will in due time have the leading Craftsmen among its members.

REMARKS.

It will be observed that there has been a steady increase in the membership in this Province during the year, and a more lively interest taken in the advancement of the Rite. In some places there might have been more zeal, and probably greater ediciency, but I have not particularized these cases, as I am satisfied that our Brethren are, as a rule, working in the interest of Scottish Rite Masonry.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN :-

I respectfully submit my Annual Report on the affairs of the Rite in the Province of Manitoba.

In October last on my return from the meeting of the Supreme Council, I called an informal meeting of the members of Winnipeg Lodge of Perfection and reported the wish of the Supreme Council, that the Bodies in Manitoba should be re-organized and active work prosecu ed by them. Some ten members, who were present at the meeting, heartily entered into an agreement to infuse new life into the Lodge. Immediately after the Lodge was called together and an election of officers held, and at this meeting several applications for affiliations were received from Brethren residing in Winnipeg and hailing from other Jurisdictions. To

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ERS, 33°, w Brunswick. illustrate the thorough change that has taken place in the situation, I will merely say that in the ten months succeeding twenty-four members were added to the roll of the Lodge (8 by affiliation and 16 by initiation) and the dry branches on the roll were effectually removed, so that now the body is working in full, with a greater number of applicants than can be properly and impressively received at the regular meetings, necessitating the calling of emergent meetings each month. Great care is being exercised as to the character of the material accepted, and I can unhesitatingly report that I have been perfectly satisfied with the additions to our numbers.

In August I succeeded in re-organizing the Rose Croix Chapter, (Bethesda). An election was held and eight members added to the roll (6 by initiation and 2 by affiliation), during the two months preceding the close of the fiscal year. The work in the Chapter is faithfully followed, and ten applications for degrees have been received during the past two months.

Owing to the fact that several of the original members of the Consistory have eft the Province, it seemed an almost useless task to attempt to re-organize that Body during the year, when so much time and care was required in the service of the Lodge and Chapter, but, securing a quorum in August, I called a meeting at which seven applications for degrees were received and acted on. Since that time a number of applications have been made and the Body is fully re-organized, and is rapidly furnishing its apartments.

During the year the apartments used by the Bodies of the Rite in Winnipeg were vacated for more commodious quarters. Nine rooms are now in use and they have been well furnished. The paraphernalia used is ample to effectively render the ritual in all particulars. Over three hundred dollars was expended in this direction during the year to supplement the fittings previously owned.

I have to report that I endeavored, by correspondence, to have the work in Brandon revived, but owing to the death and removal of some of the original members, matters are at a stand still there. Some of the Winnipeg members intend proposing to the Brandon brethren during this coming winter that a meeting to be held there should be attended by a ritual working staff from here who would work degrees for them and initiate a sufficient number of new candidates to enable them to carry on the work with more success.

I issued two dispensations, one for the holding of election of officers at other than the constitutional time, and one waiving the statutory time between degrees for certain brethren named specifically in an application from Manitoba Consistory. The requisite fees have been forwarded to the Secretary-General for these acts.

It is important that the balance against Manitoba Consistory standing on the books of the Supreme Council should be settled on some equitable basis so that the members of the former body may know just where they stand financially, as it is their intention to provide fittings and paraphernalia in a complete manner before receiving any more candidates. The new apartments have been laid out

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to meet all the requirements called for in working in full the degrees of the Lodge, Chapter and Consistory.

The Winnipeg members of the Rite have been favored during the year with visits from our Ill.: Grand Commander and Ill.: Bro. PARTRIDGE, 33°. The former was present at a reunion held on the 15th and 16th October inst., when the Lodge and Chapter exemplified, for his inspection, different degrees of those bodies.

The Committee to whom was referred the Address of the Sovereign Grand Commander presented the following report :

To the Supreme Council A. . & A. . S. . Rite, for the Dominion of Canada.

ILLUSTRIOUS BRETHREN:-

Your Committee on the Address of the Sovereign Grand Commander report that they have carefully considered this scholarly and interesting allocution, and now deal with the various matters contained therein.

They heartily concur with the Grand Commander in his expressions of gratification in the meeting of the Council in the City of Hamilton, and are pleased to know that this is one of the advantages resulting from the adoption of the itinerant system, which enables the Council to meet from time to time in the various parts of the Dominion, thereby giving a stimulus to the Rite in the locality where such meetings are held.

We concur with the Grand Commander in his expressions of sorrow in the great loss sustained by the Craft in general by the death of Ill.: Bro.: Col. W. J. B. MACLEOD MOORE, one of the founders of the Rite in the Dominion, and through whose efforts the Order of the Temple was revived in Canada and placed upon a permanent basis, and we agree with him in his estimate of the deceased, as one of the most cultured Masons of the present day.

We also concur in his expressions of regret in the death of Ill.. Bro.. DAVID RANSOM MUNRO, who in the early days of this Council did much for the Rite in his Province.

Other Supreme Councils have, we regret to say, also suffered heavily by the death of eminent brethren. England mourns its Past Grand Commander, the EARL

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OF CARNARVON, in whom this Supreme Council was especially interested, owing to the fact that he was the head of the Rite in England and Wales when that Body conceded our independence. Scotland sustains a severe loss in the death of EARL ROSSLYN, Sov. Gr. Commander, an Honorary Member of this Supreme Council. Belgium has lost its Grand Commander, Ill. Bro. PIERRE VON HUMBEECK, a Mason of high standing and a distinguished statesman. Other Supreme Councils have also suffered by the death of distinguished brethren, and the committee agree with the Grand Commander in expressing our sympathy.

The reference made in the Address to the case of Active Members of the Council removing from one Province to another, should, in the opinion of the Committee, be reported upon by the Committee on Jurisprudence

The Committee join with the Grand Commander in congratulating the Supreme Council on the prosperous financial condition of the Rite.

The Committee recommend that the dispensations issued by the Grand Commander for new Bodies be continued until the next annual meeting.

It is matter of congratulation that the Grand Commander has been able to visit so many sections of the jurisdiction, such visits being of great benefit to the Bodies visited.

Regarding British Columbia, your Committee recommend that the Grand Commander be requested to continue his exertions towards re-organizing the Rite in that Province, and that he be asked to take such action as he may deem expedient, either by the withdrawal of the warrants of the dormant Bodies, or otherwise, as he may deem advisable.

Regarding Manitoba, the Committee are pleased to learn that the Lodge and Chapter at Winnipeg are now in a flourishing condition, due in a great extent to the labors of the Deputy for that Pnovince, Ill.: Bro.: C. N. Bell, and are of opinion that the visit of the Grand Commander will have a beneficial effect.

Your Committee recommend that the action of the Grand Commander, in reference to brethren who remove from the jurisdiction before receiving all the degrees of the Body to which they belong, be approved.

Regarding the case of a brother rejected in a Lodge of Perfection applying within six weeks to a Lodge in another Province to receive the degrees, the Committee are of opinion: 1st, that the Supreme Council should rule that an applicant must receive the degrees in the Province in which he resides, unless by dispensation of the Grand Commander; 2nd, that the statutes provide that the application of a rejected candidate cannot be again received until three months have elapsed; 3rd, that the consent of a Lodge, that a Mason within its jurisdiction may apply for the degrees to a Body in the same Province, should be given by a vote of a majority of the members present at a regular meeting; and 4th, that the vote in such a case should be an open vote.

The Committe are pleased to learn that the visit of the Grand Commander to Ill.. Bro . PIKE, Grand Commander of the Southern Jurisdiction, was so pleasant, and that he received from that Illustrious Mason, as well as the Secretary-General of that Council, Ill.. Bro.. FRED. WEBBER, our representative there, the courtesies to which he refers.

The Committee in conclusion desire to express the great pleasure and profit they enjoyed in dealing with the able Address referred to them for consideration, and they earnestly hope that our Illstrious Grand Commander may long be spared to meet with us in the Supreme Council.

TO ALL MEMBERS AND BODIES OF THE OBEDIENCE OF THIS SUPREME COUNCIL—GREETING:

BRETHREN :--

Ill.: Brother D VID RANSOM MUNRO, 33°, one of the original members of this Supreme Council, died at Roanoke, Virginia, United States of America, on the ninth day of July, 1890, at the age of sixty-two years. The Masonic life of our late Illustrious Brother, extending over a period of thirty years, was a very active one. He became a member of Union Lodge, of Portland, St. John, N. B., in the year 1860, and until he removed from St. John, was one of its most vigorous and earnest members. He was its Master in 1867 and 1868, and in that compacity took an active part in the formation of the Grand Lodge of New Brunswick. He was one of the early promoters of the Masonic Board of Relief of St. John, and its first President. He took the Royal Arch Degree in New Brunswick Chapter, and served in all the chairs with skill and fidelity, and became Grand Superintendent in New Brunswick for the Grand Chapter of Canada. He was instrumental in introducing the Royal and Select Degrees into New Brunswick, and was the Ill.: Grand Master of the Grand Council of the Province. He was among the first members of the Union de molai Preceptory Knights Templars and served as its Eminent Preceptor, while he was also active in the governing body of that Order in Canada under the Grand Priory, and served as Provincial Prior. When the degrees of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite were introduced into this part of America in the year 1872 by authority of the Supreme Council for England and Wales, Bro. '. MUNRO was among the first to receive the degrees and in that year he was selected by that Supreme Council as one of the three Brethren, who, with Ill.: Bro.: ROBERT MARSHALL, the Representative of the Supreme Council in the Maritime Provinces, constituted the Grand Council for the Maritime Provinces. His rank was accorded by letters-patent in the year named, and in 1873, in the Supreme Council for the Northern Jurisdiction of the United States, Bro.: Munko formally took the vows, and was crowned a Sovereign Grand Inspector-General. The Supreme Council for Canada was formed in 1874 at the City of Ottawa, and the office-bearers were there installed by Ill.'. Bro.'. ALBERT PIKE, Bro.'. His active membership continued until the year 1889, when, by reason of his removal into the United States, he was placed on the roll of Past Active Members. In all of the offices of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite our departed Brother took an active and earnest interest. He had served as Most Wise Sovereign of Moore Chapter and as Illustrious Commander-in-Chief of the Harington Sovereign Consistory, and as Deputy of the Supreme Council in the Province of New Brunswick. The early days of the Rite were days in which there was much of self-sacrifice, of patence, of zeal, of hope, and no one displayed more of these than the Illustrious Brother whose death we mourn.

Born in the City of Saint John, in the Province of New Brunswick, sixty-two years ago, almost the entire life of Brother Munro was there spent. For a number of years, and until it withdrew its offices from that city, he was the Local Secretary of the English Society of Lloyds Underwriters. He had taken an active part in the duties of Civic Government, had filled offices to which he was chosen by the popular vote and by the voice of representative bodies. He was a man of good natural powers, warm-hearted, loyal to friends, ever ready to help the distressed, always willing to assist in carrying out any laudable enterprise. In his family relations he was a kind husband, a loving father, a tender brother.

It is in the nature of things in a free community that there will be differences of opinion even among those who in many things are heartily together, but when the end comes there is nothing to remember but those higher qualities which display the best attributes of our race.

In all of our Lodges, Chapters and Consistories the name of Ill.. Brother DAVID RANSOM MUNRO will be intimately known to many members as that of a devoted Mason, and the announcement of his death will be received with sincere sorrow. As a mark of respect to his memory the usual badge of mourning will be worn for a period of sixty days from the reading of these letters, and may our Father in Heaven have you always in His holy keeping!

TO ALL MEMBERS AND BODIES OF THE OBEDIENCE OF THE SUPREME COUNCIL—GREETING:

BRETHREN :-

We are again called upon to announce with much sadness the death of another member of this Council, The Illustrious Brother Col. WM. J. B. MACLEOD MOORE, who passed to his eternal rest at his home in the Town of Prescott, on the thirty-first day of August, 1890.

But recently our Veteran Brother, who had attained the ripe age of 80, presided with his usual ability and more than usual energy over the deliberations of the Sov.: Great Priory of Knights Templar, and therefore the news of his sudden decease comes with all the more surprise.

Brother Moore was an Irishman by birth. He entered the Military College at Sandhurst in 1825, served for 20 years in the 69 Regiment of Foot, and in 1852 was sent to this country as Staff Officer, being appointed to the command of the active force at Ottawa, and at the time of his decease held a Government position at Prescott.

His name, with us, is more familiar as a mason than in any other character. For nearly 40 years he was so intimately identified with our order in its various branches, and more particularly as the head of the Knights Templar, that every member of the fraternity far and wide, not only in this Dominion, but in the neighboring Republic and Great Britain was familiar with the name of Col. Moore, and he was rightly considered one of the greatest authorities on Knights Templarism in the world.

Our Brother was initiated into Freemasonry at the early age of 17 years, in 1827, in Aberdeen, Scotland, received his Royal Aach Degree in the same place in 1837, and was installed a Knight Templar in Boyle County, Roscommon, Ireland, in 1844. In 1850 he established the first Templar Encampment in connection with Freemasonry in the Island of Malta, and after arriving in this country in 1854, revived an old dormant Templar warrant, and from this period may date the first establishment of the Templar Order in Canada upon a constituted basis. He received the degrees of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite in 1863, in the City of New York, under a Supreme Council in that city, which was afterwards merged in the Supreme Council 33° for the Northern Jurisdiction, U. S. A., and in 1868 was made an active member of the Supreme Council for England, Wales, etc., and appointed by that Council as their Deputy for the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec, and it was under his regime that the Rite was introduced here in 1868. Brother Moore was a warm-hearted, courteous gentleman of a kindly, loving disposition, always sympathetic with suffering and sorrow, and as a mason was beloved by all those who were privileged to become intimate with him. He ever manifested the genuineness of his masonic principles and his undying devotion to the Order, and his name will be long remembered as one of the most cultured masons of his day.

In all of our Lodges, Chapters and Consistories the announcement of the death of Ill.: Brother Col. William J. B. Macleod Moore will be received with sincere sorrow. As a mark of respect to his memory the usual badge of mourning will be worn for a period of sixty days from the reading of these letters, and may our Father in Heaven have you always in His holy keeping!
