There is probably no other occupation in life, excepting, perhaps, the stage, so much sought after by ambitious and romantic young men than that of the newspaper man, or, as the tyro likes to say, the "journalist." The similitude between the stage and the press does not end there however, for just as the eminent theatrical star always advises beginners from the stage, so the average newspaper man is never known to hold out bright hopes to the beginner. 


