ASTRONOMER MEASURES STARS' HEAT TO 100-MILLIONTH DEGREE

Little Vane, Like Spinning BLAZE THREATENS

Correct Theories.

Washington, Nov. 9—Using a radiometer based on the same principle as the little toy of black and silver vanes which revolves in the optician's window, Dr. C. G. Abbot, of the Smithsonian Institution, has succeeded in measuring the heat of the stars to the hundred millionth degree.

The experiments, carried on at Mount Wilson, Galif., with the aid of the great 100-lnch reflector there, began in July, and the results are regarded by Smithsonian officials here as of the highest importance to scientists.

Nine stars were observed—Rigel, Vega, Sirlus, Capella, Procyon, Aldebaran, Betelgeuse, Alpha Herculis and Beta Pegasi—representing the principal types from the blue down to the very red ones.

"Astronomers have a very definite impression," said an institution announcement, "based on other kinds of studies, as to what sort of results might be expected from these heat spectrum investigations. But the outcome proved a great surprise. For instance, Vega and Sirius are classed together as both blue-white hydrogen stars, with few lines showing in their photographic spectra, and both supposedly nearly twice as hot as the sún.

"Judge of the astonishment of the Mount Wilson observers to find Vega showing its maximum spectral heat a great way further toward the violet than Sirius, whose maximum heat is not very much nearer the violet than that of our sun. Still more remarkable is Rigel, for it shows two maximums. One occurs, as expected, quite as far toward the violet as that of Vega. But the other, the greater one, occurs very near that of the sun."

The new study, astronomers believe, will give a lever to attack the difficult task of learning the physical nature of the stars, although it was said that although the present device can measure one hundred millonth of a degree, the instrument for next year's work must be able to measure the billionth of a degree or better.

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The instrument used, known as the Nichols radiometer, consists of two vanes suspended by a thread of two quartz fibers, each one-ten-thousandth of an inch thick. When moved by a beam of light on one vane the torsion of the twisting thread was communicated to a microscopic mirror and a beam of light was reflected on a scale.

IMPROVEMENT IS SHOWN IN HEALTH

Board of Health Figures Indicate Lower Death Rate -Fewer Infants.

The statistics for St. John city which are now being tabulated at the office of the Sub-district Board of Health indicate some marked improvements in health conditions in the city during the period from November, 1922, to October 31, 1923. That statistical year was the first in 11 years in which no citizen died of typhoid. The infant death rate shows a decided serious and that in this way treatment with anti-toxin is more prompt—with a correspondingly smaller number of fatalities.

It has been proved repeatedly that cases of diphtheria treated with antitoxin within the first 24 hours show an extremely low death rate. Dr. William Warwick, medical health officer, said that the death rate for diphtheria was the lowest with one exception for the whole period of 11 years. Big Reduction in Typhoid.

Big Reduction in Typhoid.

It was the great reduction in the number of typhoid cases which he considered the most outstanding feature of the year's statistics as they have been prepared so far. The total number of typhoid cases for the year was 27 as against 82 for the previous year. During the six months, May 1 to Nov. 1 of this year, a period when typhoid is most prevalent, the figures show that there were only 15 cases this year as against 72 last year. The only death which occurred in St. John from typhoid was a case of a sailor brought to this port suffering with the disease. Although this death must figure in the statistics it should not be regarded as the death of a citizen. The average number of cases of tpyhoid each year in the 11-year period has ben 52. This year's small showing is an extremely pleasing feature of the statistics as the typhoid death rate is usually taken as an index of the sanitary conditions of a city, particularly its water and milk supply.

At no time in any locality was there a considerable number of cases of typhoid.

With regard to the number of infant deaths the figures showed that there had been a remarkably small number of deaths from acute respiratory diseases, a cause usually responsible for a larger number of deaths.
