Schuls, probation officer for Dedham, (Mass.), and six near-by towns, is constantly receiving as a result of his eadeavors toward keeping delinquents and grown men and women out of jail for minor offences. Mr. Schuls is at the Dufferin enjoying his yearly vacation in St. John.

To a Times' man Mr. Schuls described the method of operation of the probation officers of Massachusetts and incidentally suggested that all cities, and respecially ones the size of St. John, should have probation officers.

When a drunk or a delinquent—a delinquent is a child arrested under seven ten years—is arrested, Mr. Schuls is an otified.
