The present law indicates that when lobsters are exported they may be without labels, and this is not affected by the amend-tent. When shellfish are taken into Can-ida for consumption they must be label-




Notable Triumph is Scored By "The Little Digger"

Had Put Honor and National Life Before Party in the Empire Crisis Brought by War-His Fine Record.

(Christian Science Monitor) "From the day that the war broke out, ^aFrom the day that the war broke outs I put party interests aside, and put those of the nation in their place to follow a course which, in my opinion the welfare and honor of the nation demanded. I have severed the ties of a life time and have broken with the most powerful or-ganization ever established in Australia. I thought party a mean thing to consid-er when honor and national life were at stake." The attitude of Mr. Hughes, at stake." The attitude of Mr. Hughes, prime minister of Australia, outlined by him in the foregoing words in a famous speech delivered at Geelong in the De-cember of 1916, explains many things. It explains the tremendous enmities which he aroused against himself dur-ing the war and during the peace delib-erations in Paris. It explains also his final triumph and the veritable whirl-wind of acclamation with which Aus-tralia received him, all the way from Freemantle to Melbourne, when he re-cently returned to the great southern cently returned to the great southern commonwealth from the Peace Confer-

Those who knew Mr. Hughes and knew also the Anstralian people were not surprised at this outburst. Again and again, in the course of the last five



and again, in the course of the last five years, great numbers of peaople in Aus-tralia have disagreed with Mr. Hughes. They have growled at what they describ-ed as his autocrafic methods; they have denounced him as a traitor to his party; they have leagued themselves together against him to bring about his political overthrow; and they have made their valce so much heard that the careless listener might have thought that there was in Australia no other voice. In spite of it all, however, the real Austra-lia, the Australia that could rise to Mr. Hughes' high standard, and count it a mean thing to think of party when national life and honor were at stake, this Australia never doubted Mr. Hughes and Mr. Hughes never doubted this Ausand Mr. Hughes never doubted this Aus-

From the first moment that Mr. Hughes took over the reins of govern-ment from Mr. Fisher, in 1915, Austra-lia knew that it had a war leader indeed. tralia. lia knew that it had a war leader indeed. Every impediment went down before his tireless energy. Thus he found the Ger-man, naturalized or unnaturalized, in complete possession of the Australian metal industry, and he never rested un-til the whole vast industry, upon which so much depended for the Comonwealth and, indeed, for the world, had been swept clean of German influence. He threw himself into the work of recruit-ing with tremendous vigor, and as army threw himself into the work of technic ing with tremendous vigor, and as army corps after army corps crossed the 11,000 miles of sea to fight for the cause of righteousness in Europe, Mr. Hughes, and all Australia with him, could take righteousness in Europe, Mr. Hughes, and all Australia with him, could take pride in the fact that they went, as he put it on one occasion, "Australian from .e.d to heel." "ey went wearing clothes "woven in Australia from Australian wool, marching in boots of Australian leather, armed entirely from Australian factories, and fed with Australian ships." Then when Mr. Hughes had set the great machinery at home, he went to England, "home," as the Australian still fondly calls the mother country, to see for himself what needed to be done, and what further Australia could do. He was everywhere hailed with enthusiasm. Arriving at a time when the country, as be-ginning, for the first time, to realize the stupendous nature of the task before it, he fired the grim determination settling down upon the people with a new en-thusiasm. He plunged into the arena, as one writer at the time said about him, "bringing with him that atmosphere of energy, of capacity to get things done, of swiftness and decision, which is the supreme virtue in time of war." Then, having heard and seen all there was to be heard and seen, on the battlefield of France and in the council chamber in London, Mr. Hughes returned to Aus-tralia. The closing months of the war found him, once again, in England, helping to block at every turn, with all his old en-ergy, the machinations of the pacifist, disclosing the dangers of a "negotiated peace," and insisting on the importance of seeing the great struggle through to the very end. Then, after the signing of the armistice, in due time, Mr. Hughes went to Paris, and his record there is the story of yesterday. It was not exactly a peaceful record. 


One Criminal Case Before the County Court at Hampton and True Bill is Found on One Count.

Ottawa, Oct. 21.-Opposition objections to the adpotion by parliament at the present session of the Grand Trunk bill present session of the Grand Trunk bill was set forth in an amendment moved by D. D. McKenzie, Liberal house leader, at the close of a long speech tonight. It was seconded by Hon. W. S. Fielding. The amendment, which declares that it would be both improvident and in-expedient to put the legislatin through the house this session is as follows: "That the bill be not read a second time, but that the house do come to the following resolution:

following resolution: "That the bill proposes an uncertain but very large addition to the debt of the Dominion at a time when existing obligations, arising out of the war and from the average are on workly in average from other causes, are so vastly in excess of all previous obligations as to give much cause for anxiety on the part of all who are concerned in the financial position of the Dominion and the main-tenance of the public credit. "That a measure of such wide-reach-

"That a measure of such wide-reach-ing character and large importance re-quires a study by the house and the people that cannot possibly be given in the closing days of the session. "That the present session of paria-ment was called for a special purpose which has already been accomplished.


Rowell Defends Proposal. Replying to the opposition leader, Hon. N. W. Rowell declared that the whole reilway situation in Canada had arisen and of the "bedeviled condition of pri-rately owned roads." Public ownership, he said, was already an established fact in Canada, but the government has an incomplete system which made it a good business uroposition to acquire the Grand Trunk. By government ownership the country would escape the bad influences for which railway corporations have been responsible in the past. This would be a good thing for the country even if money was lost in connection with the operation of the roads. In closing Mr. Rowell said that delay would give opponents of the govern-ment's proposition time to organize thier opposition. There would, he said, be no advantage in delay. After Mr. Dennis had spoken in op-position to the bill and Francis McCrae of Sherbrook, had criticized government ownership. R. L. Richardson moved the adjournment of the debate. The division on Mr. McKenzie's amend-ment will take place tomorrow night or Thursday, after which it is said the op-position may move another amendment.

WILL TOLERATE NO NONSENSE

Sir Adam Beck, is Suggested by Mayor McBride, of Branford, to Lead Administration — Latter to Stay at Post For a Time—Will Not Talk About Leadership.

Toronto, Ont., Oct. 21.-H. Hartley Dewart, K.C., Liberal leader in Ontario, nanded out a statement this afterno n which he rapped the lieut-governor Sir John Henrdie, for having intimated to the evening newspapers here that His Honor "believed that under the circum-Honor "believed that under the circum-stances he could call anyone in the House or out of it and ask him to form a government." Mr. Dewart stated that the person to whom the lieut.-governor should look to form a government is him-self, "the succesful leader of the Liberal meet."

Dewart's Statement.

Mr. Dewart's statement follows: "The election returns clearly demon-strate that the people of the province of Ontario will no longer tolerate the Hearst administration. that there will be a larger Liberal con-tingent of members than in the past legislature. And with the U. F. O. numerically in the lead, its quite ap-parent that the Conservatives will not have as many members as the Liberals, and therefore have no representative to continue the business of the country. "When the House dissolved there were just two parites in the House. The Hearst administration has been over-whemingly beaten, and the principles that the Liberal party has fought for been vindicated by the election of a controlling group of Liberals, Soldiers, Farmers and Labor representatives. 
