

"The fight was a long and bitter one," said Mr. Murphy, "and involved no little personal risk at the hands of those who championed the cause of these helpless and pitiable women. The system permitted the sale of girls for immoral purposes, and was regarded by the gov-ernment as perfectly lawful, until we forced the home department to revise the laws and to recognize those of the executive. Japan is an imitative nation, so that it is necessary for missionaries to take the initiative. The native priests, however, were very intolerant of us, and the people in the locality in which I established myself were both immoral and superstitious. When we began the agitation the great daily papers fortunately

"The first opportunity to strike a decisive blow presented itself when Japan became one of the family of nations four years ago, and adopted a civil code, one clause of which fixes the age of anthe code prescribed that no immoral act

could be enforced by law. "At the time the code was adopted, its makers had little idea that it would ultimately be taken advantage of for the purpose of suppressing this national evil.

These provisions in the code we used, and the courts could do nothing else but uphold the law. The missionaries in Japan now have a very high standing under the new order of things, not on acount of their religious tendencies, but because they are regarded as the advance

agents of civilization. "When we opened the way legally for the abolition of the traffic in women, the Salvation Army opened rescue homes. Brothel keepers repeatedly attacked the Army officers, and more than one gave up his life to the cause. When the movement to abolish the traffic was started, immoral women were increasing from 5 to 10 per cent, more rapidly than the population itself. There were 52,000 human slaves who led legalized lives of shame when we began, and about 150,000 illicit women. The slave traffic has been reduced until now the women number less than 38,000, while the illicit ones. have decreased by 40 per cent."
