EXPLOSION IN CUMBERLAND MINE

TWELVE CHINAMEN WERE INSTANTLY KILLED

Eight Others Severely Burned—Bodies of All the Victims Have Been Recovered.

Nanaimo, July 16.—Twelve Chinamen dead and eight severely burned is the result of an explosion which occurred at 7:30 last night in No. 3 incline, shaft of the Wellington Colliery Company's mines at Cumberland.

The following dispatch was received by your correspondent at midnight: "Cumberland, July 15.—(Midnight).—An explosion of fire-damp occurred in No. 3 incline of six shaft here to-night. Fifty Chinese and one white boss were in the mine at the time. Thirty-one Chinese and the fire boss got out with safety, but several were badly burned."

The Work of Rescue. Nanaimo, July 16.—The explosion took place in the long wall section of No. 3 incline, and though so slight that next to no damage was done to the mine and no concussion was felt at a short distance from the scene, nevertheless it was deadly in nature, for as is usual in long wall workings it swept the face, killing and scorching as it went.

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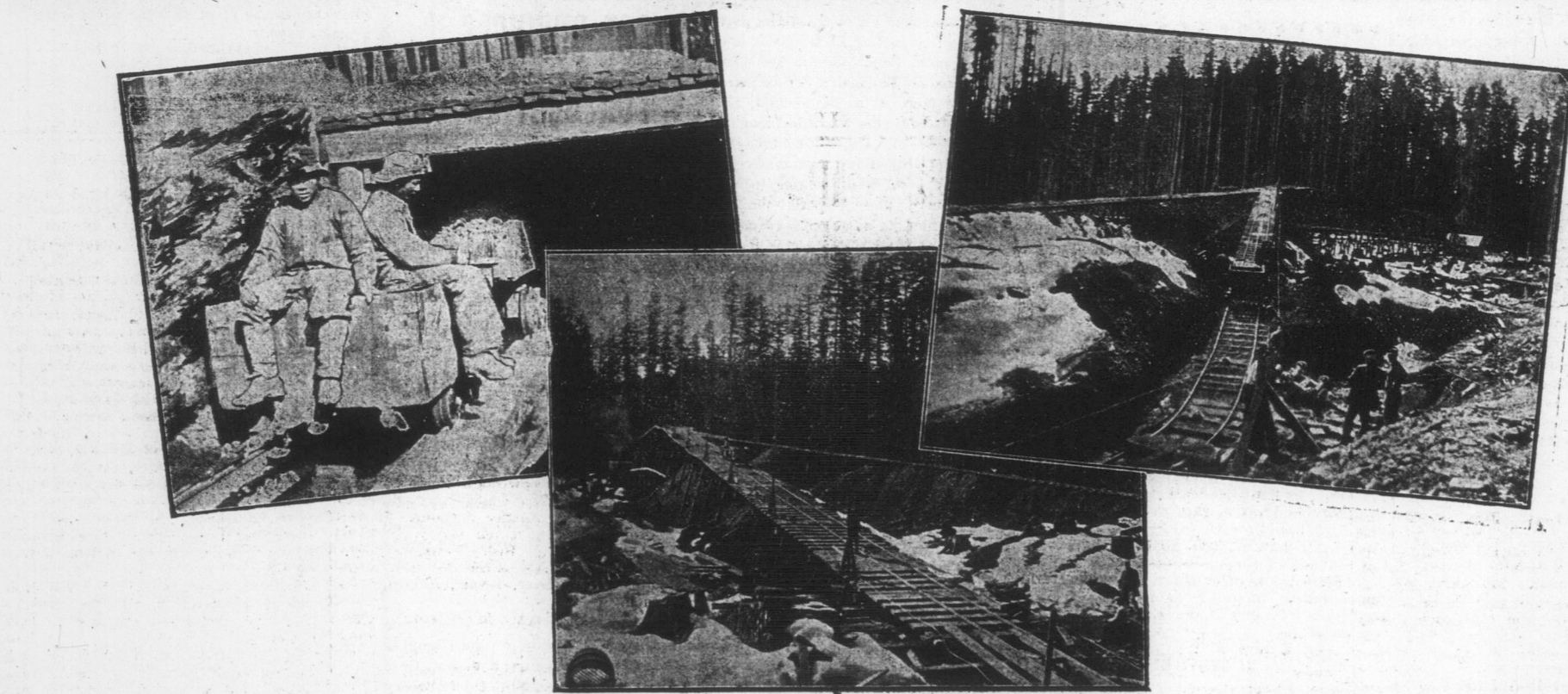
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ONE OF THE SLOPES, CUMBERLAND MINES. Twelve Chinamen were killed and a number burned in an explosion in these collieries Wednesday night.

REMOVING LOG JAM.

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SLAVERY IN JAPAN.

Illicit Traffic Has Been Done Away With to a Large Extent.

Rev. U. G. Murphy, formerly a minister of Seattle, but now president of the denominational Japanese annual conference, was among the arrivals on the Shihamo Maru from the Orient a few days ago.

"The first opportunity to strike a decisive blow presented itself when Japan became one of the family of nations four years ago, and adopted a civil code, one clause of which fixes the age of an adult at 20 years. Another clause of the code prescribed that no immoral act could be enforced by law.

"At the time the code was adopted, its makers had little idea that it would ultimately be taken advantage of for the purpose of suppressing this national evil. These provisions in the code we used, and the courts could do nothing else but uphold the law.

NEW WEAPON FOR ANALYST.

Immense Strides Recently Made in Science—Fastest Moving Matter.

The epoch-making discoveries in science described recently are being rapidly developed. Investigations by M. Curie, the French physicist, Sir William Thomson, Prof. Rutherford, and others, have carried them into an entirely unknown region in physics and chemistry, where all analogies fail and all accepted views of the nature of matter offer no assistance.

These particles emitted by radium are one thousand times more massive than negative electrons, which are also thrown off at a similar speed, and which have long been known under the name of radiant matter. They are positively instead of negatively charged, and, moving faster than the fastest flying star, are the most rapid moving matter known.

Every experiment yet made bears out the theory of the disintegration of the original elements into new elements. As an explanation of this newly discovered quality of radioactivity, it is found that the process continues without reference to any influence by ordinary physical or chemical forces.

SAILOR DROWNED FROM THE VIRAGO

RAPID INCREASE OF PLAGUE IN ORIENT

Over Thousand Cases Reported at Hong-kong—Alleged Violations of Russian-Korean Treaty.

A British seaman named Harvey, 24 years of age, belonging to the torpedo boat Virago, was drowned on the 14th June near the Kawasaki dockyard...

News comes by the Empress that there has been a disquieting increase in the number of plague cases among the European residents of Hongkong.

The returns up to the time the Empress sailed on route to Victoria brings the plague toll well over a thousand.

The returns for the week ended 13th May show a total of 123 cases and 103 deaths.

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A Seoul dispatch says: "Nothing had been heard of the Russo-Korean negotiations as to Russia's enterprise at Yon-bahoi, although an official note was sent to the Russian minister by the Korean government on the 10th of May 28th."

According to reliable intelligence received at Seoul from Antung prefecture, the Russians are buying up a vast tract of land stretching from the Chinese frontier down to the banks of the Amnokgang for the purpose of facilitating the timber cutting business in Korea.

The Seoul correspondent of the Jiji wire to that paper to the effect that the cabinet council has decided on a document was drawn up setting forth the violations of the treaty on the part of Russia in connection with the timber cutting business.

According to Shanghai advices of June 12th, a press has been issued by the Chinese government to the vicery of the Liao Kiang to send troops to Yunnan on there for some time past.

It is gratifying to note, says the Kobe paper, that both at Shanghai and Hong-kong, Mr. Wyatt, delegate to the Navy League, was given a reception which left him in a room for apprehension left.

Everywhere in the Orient Mr. Wyatt has gone he has been received with the same enthusiasm that marked the occasion of his visit to Victoria six months ago.

Details of the typhoon in the Philippines at the beginning of June are given in the Manila papers. On the 1st inst. the province of Capiz, Island of Pannay, was devastated by a severe storm.
