LIFE'S LONG SHADOWS THE STORY OF A SIBERIAN EXILE

The following story was related to me by a Russian gentleman, at whose house I spent a few weeks last summer. He had been in the employ of his government for some years as an inspector of prisons, and it was on the occasion of one of his official visits to the famous convict establishment at Tobolsk that he heard the story from the lips of an old man who had spent upward of 40 years in prison. Substantially it ran as follows:

"Many years ago—how many, I cannot tell you, sir—I was living on the outskirts of the thriving little town of Volna, in Russian Poland. I was a blacksmith by trade, and my forge stood at the angle of two streets, one of which was the center of the town. Adjoining it was my cottage, the neatest and prettiest in the place. Many there were who called on me, and, indeed, it was an old, and, as you could boast a happier home.

"I had been married two years when my wife gave birth to a boy—a faithful copy of his mother—who, as time went on, grew a sturdy, bright-eyed little fellow, the darling of our hearts, and the brightest jewel of our crown of happiness. What he was to me in words can tell. I know only that he became the very light of my life, and when his bright eyes almost checked for a brief space his mother's peace of mind, I was likely to get mad with grief and fear. Some day, perhaps, he might be taken from me.

"One day I was at work when I heard a tramp, who had been approved by the police at full gallop, laying aside his hammer I went over to the hall, and caught the thief as he was about to escape. The leading files had already passed when a piercing shriek rent the air, and I saw a very marrow in my bones—my heart stood still. Oh, God, can I ever forget the fearful sight that met my gaze. I see it now as plainly as that day—my darling, my heart's joy, my life, my wife's pride, my side on the dusty road, trampled to death by those cruel hoofs. With a man infuriated to the pitch of madness, can utter—I snatched up my hammer, and whirling it around my head, rushed among the soldiers, now dismounted and gathered about the prostrate and mangled forms of my darlings. A panic seized them, and they struggled furiously to get beyond the reach of my wild blows. One threw his hammer, and I hurled it close to me and went to my knees, and I fell on my head, which had fallen on the ground, and I had killed him. I was happy for him and for my future peace of mind, his upraised arm saved him, and before I could deal me a blow that stretched me beside him, bleeding and senseless. When I recovered consciousness I found myself lying on the floor of a cell on the Prison of Volna.

"Oh, the misery of that awakening! How shall I describe it to you, sir? How describe the awful horror that descended upon me, and the first dawning of consciousness, and so laid hold of me that I prayed, and prayed with my might, to die? How describe the tortures I suffered when the remembrance of all that had happened to me with redoubled force, and flooding my soul with anguish, cried to me a fierce thirst for revenge—but I cannot, I cannot. To realize my misery you must suffer as I suffered. Love as I loved—and that I pray you never will. But let me continue my story. The daylight had faded in my cell, when two soldiers, bringing with them food and drink, communicated to me the intelligence that I was to be tried on the morrow for attempting to kill one of His Majesty's guards. I paid little heed to what they said—or I was in the bitterness of my thoughts—and my indifference angered them. 'He is a sullen dog,' said one of them, and, spurning me with his foot, passed a cruel jest that sent the hot blood surging to my head. Had I not been bound I would have fallen upon him and torn him to pieces, but they had chained me to a ring in the wall, and strain as I would, I could not reach him. My fruitless struggles but served to amuse them, and they jeered at me and taunted me with the impotency of my rage, and so goaded me with the brutality of their jests that I was like to go mad. When at length they had satisfied themselves with the cruel sport they left me—left me to the torture of a sleepless night of a faint, filled with memories of my dear ones and of the cruel tragedy that had robbed me of them; and countless times through those long hours of darkness did I see them, side by side.

THE END OF THE LOG LINE

"You'd like to know what scared my hands so badly?" said the captain. "Well, take the tiller while I make the long reach to the mitering grounds, and I'll tell you. It's something that happened about 15 years ago, long before we settled down to shore fishing and taking city men out for a day's try at the mitering grounds."

"In the winter of '88 I went out on Gloucester to the Banks as 'first hand' on the schooner 'Never Tied.' When we pulled up our anchor for the last time, in March, and started for home, we were full of cod, and the deck beams, and sure to make board \$80 a man. Everybody on board was feeling good."

"Before dark we had a good lead on the nearest schooner, and when the fog came on, we were twirling well astern. The wind showed no signs of going down on the contrary, and seemed to be freshening every minute. This just suited us, for we had the best rough weather boat on the Banks, and we knew that, even if we did have to put in a single rope, our rivals behind would be putting in two."

WRIGHT'S GREAT PALACE SOME VAGARIES OF THE GREAT PROMOTER. His Mansion Cost More Than a Million and a Quarter of Dollars.

Mr. Whitaker Wright, the great company promoter, now in the arrest in New York for embezzlement, is one of those men at whom a passing glance is not made for nothing. He has a personality which is commonly called 'magnetic.' With a little effort, and with a few dupes approaching 250 pounds, he is a massive man, an impressive presence, a grand old fellow. There is nothing assertive in his appearance. He abhors that glitter of diamonds which impresses the casual beholder in his American circles. His YACHTING CAREER. Unassuming in dress and manner though he is, Mr. Whitaker Wright has proclaimed himself a millionaire in more substantial ways. His racing yacht, which was the craft of its season three years ago, beat the German Emperor's Meteor four races in succession. He purchased a steam yacht, one of the trimmest and daintiest that ever entered the Mediterranean, speedily convinced the postmistress to the identity of the applicant.

The New Brunswick Legislative Assembly morning at half-past eight o'clock by His Honor, Lieut.-Governor Snowball. Propagation at so early an hour is a new thing, and it is suggestive of the utilitarian tendencies of the times.

Of the new men, Mr. Jones, of Carleton, Mr. McLatchey, of Restigouche, and Mr. Tweedale, of Victoria, proved valuable debating acquisitions on the Government side.

Another opposition member who made a good impression in the House, as well as out of it, was Mr. Smith, of Carleton county. As new members, who displayed an unwavering unity in opposing anything the Government proposed.

A good many important measures were passed during the session. There were, altogether, one hundred and twenty-two bills assented to by the Lieutenant-Governor.

The Employees' Liability Act was a very important one. It protects every employer who may be injured in almost any work in which they engage, by holding the employer responsible therefor, if by reason of neglect or inactivity of those having the direction of their work or of

insufficient outfit, plant or supplies furnished by the employer. It was on this bill that Mr. Loggie—whose company owns a number of schooners and boats—made vigorous remarks on a motion which he made to withdraw from men on vessels the protection which the bill provided for them.

Resolved, That this legislature assembled do strongly urge upon the Administration that in any other way be granted to the said Grand Trunk Railway Company it be specifically expressed that the entire purchase of such transcontinental railroad lines be in the most remote provinces of Canada, and the railroad be an All-Canadian route from ocean to ocean, and that a copy of this resolution be forwarded by his honor, the Lieutenant-Governor, to the Government for general consideration through the secretary of state for Canada.

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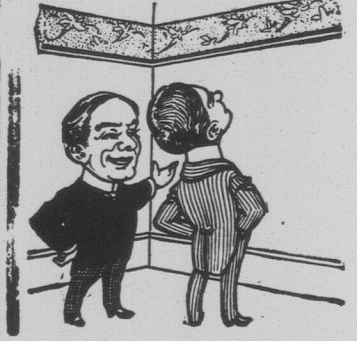
