London, Oct. 9.-The British Press Bureau gives out the following communication from sis under date of 7.20 this evening

"In spite of the enemy's artillery fire we have pushed our trenches steadily forward northeast of Loos, between Hill No. 70 and Hulluch, and gained ground varying from 500 to 1,000 yards in deph.
