The word, "the very name suggests much. The vast dimension from sea to sea, and the broad big expanse of sky so mysterious and endless. Developing the whole; the seasons, with their changing scenes of vegetation and loveliness, is apt to awaken awe and admiration in the soul of man. SANFORD HAS NEW SCHEME

ROCKLAND, Me. Aug. 30.—A chain of missions from Panama to the Arctic the evangelization of the American continent.

This is the announced purpose of Rev. Frank W. Sanford, leader of the famous sect known as The Holy Ghost and U., as outlined today to a Lewiston Sun reporter in the first extended interview that Mr. Sanford has granted anyone since departing on his famous world cruise over three years ago. Hours of prayer extending sometimes into the morning, have been spent by Mr. Sanford since returning to this country, and so confident is he that his prayers have been answered that his countenance fairly glows with enthusiasm whenever the topic is broached.

I have already knowledge that three more ships will be added to our fleet," said the leader. "Nine long years we have worked and waited, and the achievement of our aims is in sight. The tide has already turned in our favor, and when more disciples begin to seek our religion it will be not by the hundreds but by the thousands. I shall yet be a popular man in this State."

There was no display of vanity connected with that last statement—only that great manifestation of earnestness which so greatly impressed all who came into contact with this man's personality.

Interviews and newspaper notoriety form no part of Mr. Sanford's desires. He has declined all requests in every country that the Concord visited, and he has no need to the bombardment of criticism and abuse which that course brought down upon him. Early in his career, incensed by an alleged libelous statement which had appeared in a certain newspaper, Mr. Sanford was strongly tempted to sue for legal satisfaction. A season of prayer convinced him that while some material gain might result from such a course it would be no aid in his spiritual mission, and from that moment he has disregarded utterly whatever the newspapers might say, praying just as earnestly for the newspaper men who had assailed him as he did for the salvation of others.

Mr. Sanford, clad in a neat suit of blue, with gray hairs predominating in his hair, came aboard the ship, and he learned that one of his old baseball friends was in the laugh, and on the latter's recommendation consented to see the ship. Sanford, seated in the Kingdom's small, but comfortable cabin, Mr. Sanford entered upon a spiritual conversation with his caller, asking exactly after the manner of those whom he had met known in the summer of 1885, when fresh from Bates College, he was captain and catechist of Rockland's college team.

I remember that day at Northport when I sat on the platform with Dwight L. Moody and Ira D. Sinker," said Mr. Sanford. "The speaker was making an eloquent address on the work of foreign missions, and exhibited a chart on which the large black spaces indicated where the Christian religion was unknown. Before I had left that meeting, which was 23 years ago, I had made a solemn pledge that I would, as all in my power to help, move those lands into the light of the Christian faith. I have not forgotten that pledge, and it has been the dominating thought of my life. The millions of populations were increasing faster than the word of God could reach them by the efforts of a comparatively few missionaries. I do not mean to convey by this statement that I do not believe in this form of religious work; on the contrary, I approve of what is being done, but it is the necessity of broader and more sweeping movements than I see so clearly."

In response to that direction I constructed a Bible school at Shiloh, gathering such odds and ends for workers as I could rapidly gather, and sent them forth over the State that we might obey the God-given direction. In bitter cold they tramped the entire length of the State. Each one of the 16 counties and each township, had overcomers passing through their midst. Plans which I had drawn on a sheet of brown paper, and most home thinking he had encountered a new and strange freak. Complaints by the score come to us about the poor lighting of the I. C. R. yard in the vicinity of the station. Before the Board of Management took charge of the I. C. R., the yard was fairly well lighted but in their endeavor to economize the Board saw fit to remove several lights. At Mowat's corner the crossing is decidedly dangerous as there are now four tracks and some of these are in almost constant use. This is a matter which should be dealt with by the Board of Trade. Someone will be hurt at this crossing or at the station platform and the amount that the road would have to pay for damages would light the dark corners for a number of years. To the lay mind the removing of these lights was a small piece of business on the part of the Board of Management. The I. C. R. we understand, had a flat rate for the electricity furnished by the town for lighting purposes and now it is hoped that the town will charge the I. C. R. the same rate as the road is taxed in St. John and other cities.

THE INTERCOLONIAL

(Toronto Globe)
Hon. Mr. Graham sat at rest some of the rumors that have been afloat with regard to the Intercolonial. The brief experience with the Board of Management has been most encouraging, and it is hoped that the minister will be able to present an annual report to Parliament showing at least a perfect balance between revenue and expenditure. In a recent interview Mr. M. J. Butler, chairman of the Board of Management, said that this satisfactory state of affairs was being brought about without neglecting the maintenance of the road, and he hinted that the building of hotels at suitable points on the lower St. Lawrence,

and in the Maritime Provinces was being considered. This would increase the profitable summer tourist travel and add materially to the revenues of the railway.

These reforms are not being effected without protest. Nobody expected they could. Hon. Mr. Graham is too shrewd an administrator to hope that he could disturb existing conditions without eliciting cries of protest from some quarters. The country is indebted to him for going ahead with his reforms notwithstanding the unpleasantness that were sure to arise. That they involve the loss of employment to some men cannot be regretted. No one will say, however, that the improvement of the business position of the railway should be delayed on that account. It is the duty of those charged with the operation of the road to put it on a business basis, so far as revenue and expenditure are concerned. A return on the capital is not expected. The incurring of that expenditure was one of the conditions of Confederation that individuals should be maintaining on its staff when their services yielded no return.

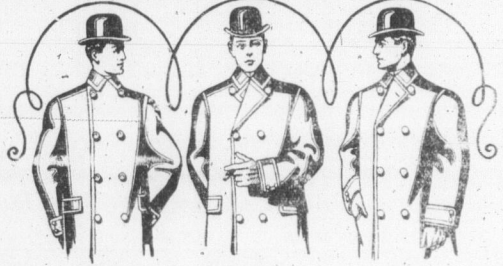
