Entombed by Explosion in Maypole Mine—Rescuers Find
Bodies Frightfully Mutilated and Many
Beyond Recognition.

NO HOPE OF ANY LIVING

(Special News Service)
WYMIAN, England.—It is not hoped
that a single man of the seventy
miners who were entombed by an ex-
plosion which occurred yesterday in
the Maypole Coal Mine here, have
survived the disaster. The four men
of the safety lighting bodies were
reported as rescued were engaged in
an adjoining building. The ventila-
tion fan which was put out of order
by the explosion was repaired this
morning and the other forty-six
miners were again descended.
The height which the bodies were
horribly. Not far from the bottom
of the shaft, eight bodies were
found, all frightfully mutilated, legs
and arms being blown off and heads
hattered almost beyond recognition.
The management of the mine de-
clares that between sixty and eighty
men were underground at the time
of the explosion and there is no hope
of anyone being brought out alive.
Women and children, however, who
remained at pit head all night refuse
to leave until the bodies of their
dead were brought to the surface.
Nothing else will convince them of
hopelessness of waiting.

DEATH SENTENCE PASSED ON TWENTY SIX IN ONE DAY

(Special News Service)
ST. PETERSBURG, Wednesday.—
Hanging down seven more sentences
of death was reported today making
a total for one day, yesterday, through-
out the empire twenty six and con-
stituting a sinister record.
Two of the men were former sailors
attached to the Black Sea fleet and
had been found guilty of taking a
leading part in an attempt to pillage
an estate.
Others were convicted of train ro-
bbery and murder.
There were two executions yester-
day at Waraw and one at Tiflis and
several at St. Petersburg. A second
unsuccessful attempt was made yes-
terday evening to assassinate the
Chief of Police. Assassins fired their
revolvers at the Chief point blank,
but failed to hit him. Police shot one
assassin, the other escaping.
A despatch from Tchernin tells of
armed collision between the insolent
gangs of neighboring villages over the
ownership of a piece of disputed land
by which two men were killed and
several severely wounded.

Scared.

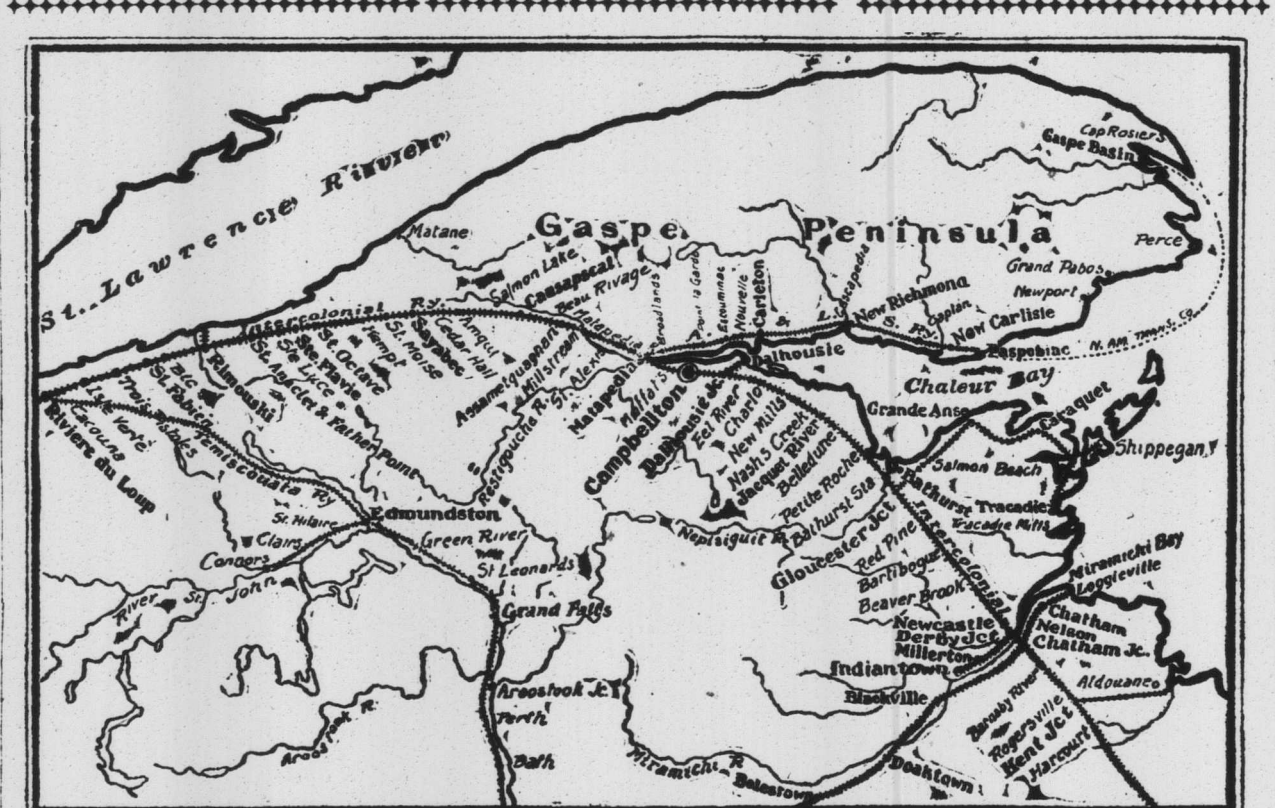
EUREKA, Calif., Wednesday.—Two

hospital at Fort William.

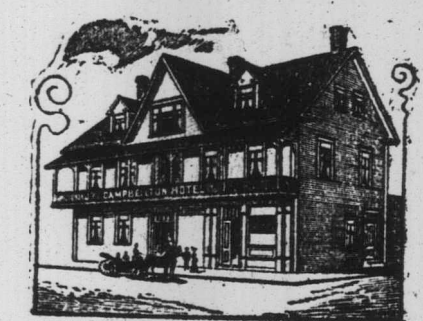

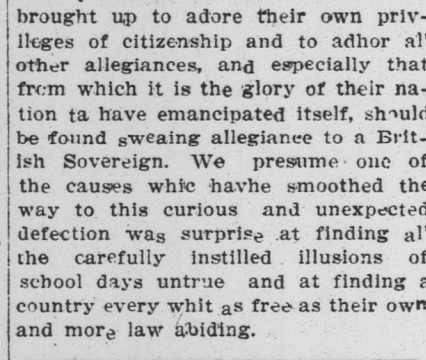

A financial report shows that there was a better feeling in the market with short covering. Now we have short covering at our boarding house, and we know we feel terrible with out feet sticking out in the cold night air.

Costs are to be added to the ten-dollar fines for exceeding the automobile speed limit in Toronto. The men who show this kind of disregard for the safety of the public can generally laugh at a dozen such fines. It was Vanderbilt who said: "The public be damned."

The owner of a large factory in Philadelphia makes the men on hot days shut down every window and turn on the steam heat. His theory is that protection is due to humidity, not to heat, and by drying the interior air while the moist air is excluded he makes the conditions more tolerable for the men. He says the results of his practice justify the theory.

To the New York Times it is easier to understand the causes of emigration of United States citizens to Canada than to be reconciled to it. But what the Times finds hardest of all is to believe that, for whatever reason, the feeling of American citizenship is weakening as shown by the immigrants becoming naturalized British Canadians as soon as possible after crossing the border. This would be more comprehensible to the Times if it were necessary to become naturalized to hold land in Canada. It might seem as though the immigrants were selling their birthright for a valuable consideration. As it is the change of citizenship appears an unnecessary, and therefore a gratuitous, selling out of what Americans have been accustomed to think almost priceless. It appears quite natural to the Times that Britons and Canadians coming into the United States should take a most offensive oath renouncing their own sovereign, but finds it altogether incomprehensible that Americans brought up to adore their own privileges of citizenship and to adore all other allegiances, and especially that from which it is the glory of their nation to have emancipated itself, should be found swearing allegiance to a British Sovereign. We presume one of the causes which have smoothed the way to this curious and unexpected defection was surprise at finding all the carefully instilled illusions of school days untrue, and at finding a country every whit as free as their own and more law abiding.

European monarchs are hugging and kissing each other. Diplomacy between sovereigns invariably indulges in these ceremonial caresses, which takes the place of the flag ordinary ambassadors are supposed to use.

Possibly because of the collapse of the Quebec bridge a doubt has been raised as to the ability of the new Blackwell's Island bridge at New York to stand the severe strain it will have to endure. The original plans of the bridge were prepared by a Mr. Lindenthal, but he has not been retained in the control of the undertaking, and now he urges that the final test should be made a very thorough one.

There are as yet no indications of any probability of an early strike settlement of the differences between the C. P. R. and its striking employees. Each side expresses confidence of ability to hold out until the other yields. Meantime the men are losing their wages, the company's business is badly hampered and the cost of the business done is enormously increased. The result must mean great loss to both parties.

The Scott Liberal Government seems to have been returned to power by a very good working majority of twelve in a house of forty. That is plenty as it is good neither for government nor a state to have a weak opposition. There have been lots of wild charges made in the Conservative papers about gangs of hooligans employed and all sorts of immoral promises being made on the government side so as to influence the elections; but the fact that three cabinet ministers were defeated in the constituencies not only is a feather in the cap of the Opposition but is also a pretty good indication that the freedom of the voters was little interfered with. On the other hand it is charged that Mr. Haultain and his merry men had plenty of assistance from Manitoba. He that as it may the province has shown sufficiently plainly that Mr. Scott's past rule has been appreciated and that they prefer a Liberal government for the next five years to men whose battle cry is "provincial rights" and whose boast is that they prefer to think provincially rather than patriotically and nationally.

SYRACUSE, N. Y., Monday—Fifteen men were instantly killed and several injured by the premature explosion of dynamite on Saturday at the plant of the Benson Mines Iron Ore Co. at Benson Mines. The dead are: Henry Bolger, William Donick, Evangelina King S. Bonger and an unknown work man all of Benson Mines.
All the dead are married and their wives were almost crazed with grief. The injured were some distance from the explosion. Joseph King was the only workman who escaped uninjured but he was rendered insane by the shock.

PAITHEM, N. J., Monday—In the presence of several thousand spectators at the Clifton Cycle Stadium last night, Sonny Bridges, a motor cyclist and former lightweight pugilist, was thrown on the track while testing his machine and instantly killed.

Householders are warned to keep their cellars free of foodstuffs locked at night if they wish to preserve their fresh eggs, butter, jam, etc.
During the past week a number of complaints have been made that houses with cellars have been entered and articles carried away. As yet these have been confined to houses on the hill, but no doubt the thieves will become bolder.

One young lady heard a noise in the middle of the night and upon getting up and looking out of his window saw a man on piazza roof a few feet away. The man saw her and made a hasty retreat. Needless to say the doors and windows in that house are now barred at night.

COONT ZEPPELIN WILL REBUILD NEW AIRSHIPS AT HIS OWN WORKS

Arrangements Being Made For Erection of Gigantic Balloon Halls as Well as Factories.

WANT HIGH PRICES

FRIEDRICHSHAFEN, Tuesday.—Count Zeppelin, who on Saturday declared his intention to manufacture material for the construction of a new airship at his own works intends to build three gigantic balloon halls as well as factories and workmen's quarters. QUEBEC BRIDGE DISASTER

QUEBEC, Monday.—Thirty-six ag- gressors for damages were indicted on Sat- urday against the Quebec Bridge Co. and the Phoenix Bridge Co., the plain- tiffs being the widows or tutors of some of the victims of the tragic acci- dent in August last. Most of them are from "Cahnavaga. The amounts claimed vary from fifteen hundred dol- lars to \$10,000.

ST. JOHN, Tuesday.—A despatch from St. John, N. B., states that the Boston schooner Three Sisters, from St. John, for Elizabethport, N. J., with a cargo of latus, struck on Baker Island late last night and will probably be a total wreck. The wreck- er was busy and the vessel off her course. The crew were assisted by the Bedford Life Savers and were landed in heavy seas out of the difficulty. Part of the cargo may be saved. The schooner registered 275 tons.

MONTREAL, Tuesday.—When noon came today the time when the C. P. R. ultimatum went into force, there had been but three or four applications from old men of the company. The strikers ranks are intact. The C. P. R. today announces that in engaging new men, preference will be given to the amalgamated society of engineers of England and as against International Union.

ST. JOHN, Tuesday.—C. P. R. time limit set by which strikers must re- turn to work or else lose their senior- ity ranking expired at noon today. So far as can be learned no move has been made by the strikers to go back to work or else lose their seniority ranking. This is likely to be a difficult matter to arrange in the set- tlement of the strike.

TORONTO, Tuesday.—Although many of them were reaching the time at which they would have to return and a couple were only six m. away, not one of the six hundred C. P. R. strikers at West Toronto went back to work in the shops today in res- ponsibility to General Manager Leonard's ultimatum that they must either re- turn or lose seniority standing. From North Bay, London and Havelock too, strikers held every man in good firm. The strikers held mass meet- ings today and on the whole seem quite optimistic. They say the com- pany's case has failed and has only left the men closer together. They say that strike breakers are leaving daily. Twenty new men were run in to the yards this morning, but pickets report the thirty came out.

Among the stories of the company's trouble floating about West Toronto is one that the company left a train of Amours meat cars standing in the yards for two days, being unable to move them and lost the big meat firm's carrying contract. Freight cars are stalled because freight engines are being used on passenger trains. For instance five harvesters spells which left for the West today were all drawn by freight engines.

LONDON, Tuesday.—According to a special despatch received here from Geneva this morning, leaders of the young Turkish party are to meet in that city at the end of this month to discuss the question of deposing the Sultan of Turkey and in case of an affirmative decision to select a suitable successor. No confirmation of this statement can be had here.

ST. JOHN, Monday.—In a dense fog on Wednesday night the Black Diamond liner Cacouna collided with the French fishing schooner Union, off St. Pierre. Prompt work by the collis- ioners saved the Union from going to the bottom and the Cacouna towed the disabled craft to St. Pierre, where she is now repairing. The collision oc- curred in a heavy fog and the crew of the Cacouna never saw the schooner until they were right on top of her. The steamer was only running at half speed when the engines were sent astern. The schooner was not badly damaged.
