—Mr. Gladstone has issued a circular notifying his supporters to attend the opening of Parliament, as he proposes at the earliest moment to submit to important and pressing business for the consideration of that body.

—Rutherford's resolution in favor of Greenwich as Prime Meridian was adopted by the Convention at Washington on Monday—twenty-one nations voting for it, one (San Domingo) against it, and France and Brazil abstaining from voting.

—Later advices show that the cyclone in Canada was more serious than at first imagined. The entire country about Canada is devastated. The vineyards and olive gardens have vanished and 3,000 dwellings are destroyed.

—It is rumored in London that Sir John Macdonald's visit to England will result in an arrangement whereby the West India colonies will be admitted into the Dominion of Canada, a confederation that, Earl Derby says, has the approval of the home Government.

—A meeting of Sabbath School workers is to be held at St. John on the 30th and 31st inst. for the purpose of organizing a Provincial Sabbath School Convention. All clergymen of New Brunswick are invited to be present, and each Sabbath School is requested to send its Superintendent and two delegates.

—Mr. Geo. Stephen, president of the C. P. R., has informed a reporter that the object of his present mission to England is to make arrangements for the establishment of a line of steamers to run between Port Moody, B. C., and Chikan and Japan, to connect with the railway. Other railway matters will occupy his attention in Europe.

—The deficiency in the funds of the St. John House is causing considerable excitement in the commercial capital. The members of the Alms House Commission have been served with a copy of the resolution of the City Council requiring the deposit of the missing money in some bank in St. John on or before the 8th November.

—This has been quite a year for cannibalism. First we had the survivors of the Greely expedition supporting life on the dead bodies of their comrades. This was bad enough, but sensible people soon came to the conclusion that, hideous as the occurrence was, it was after all a case of justifiable cannibalism. A still more terrible story comes to us from England. Three men and a boy of eighteen or nineteen were engaged to take to Australia a yacht of 52 tons. She foundered in a fearful storm and the crew had to take to a boat with no water and for food only two small cans of preserved turnip. For twenty days after leaving the ship they had nothing more in the shape of food save a turtle which they were fortunate enough to catch. The captain, Dudley, then killed the boy, whose name was Richard Parker, and the three survivors subsisted on his body for four days longer when they were rescued by a German tugboat. The men were in England the men were arrested, and before this their case is before the courts with the probability of a verdict in their favor.

THE REVENUE RETURNS.

An opportunity is now afforded for studying the estimates of Sir Leonard Tilley for the past fiscal year by the light of the actual receipts, and the results show that his calculations have been very closely verified. The following is the official statement of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year 1883-84, so far as received by the Department of Finance:

EXPENDITURE.

A comparison of these returns with the receipts of 1882-83 shows that there has been a falling off of \$2,079,692 from Customs, that the Excise receipts decreased \$500,807, that the Post Office receipts decreased \$41,000, and from Public Lands \$45,000. The diminution in the receipts from Customs has been caused almost equally by relief from taxation through changes in the tariff, by decreased values of nearly all imported goods, and by the increased production within the Dominion of articles formerly imported. The decrease in the receipts from Excise has chiefly arisen from the reduction of the excise duty on tobacco.

Turning to the estimates of Sir Leonard Tilley for the past fiscal year we find that he estimated that Customs would produce \$20,250,000, or only \$220,100 more than the actual yield; that Excise would give \$5,550,000, which was \$80,691 more than was derived from that source; that the Post Office would yield a revenue of \$1,800,000, which was \$40,562 more than the actual receipts; that Public Works would yield \$3,000,000, which was \$58,000 more than the returns; that the interest on investments would be \$800,000, which amount was exceeded by \$186,638, and that the revenue from other sources would be \$600,000, which was \$140,656 more than that produced. It will be seen therefore that the actual receipts on account of the Consolidated Fund are \$249,220 less than Sir Leonard estimated, which is a pretty close approximation and would have been closer only that the importation of an inferior class of sugar lessened the duty derived from that source by reducing the value. Sir Leonard estimated the sales of Dominion lands would amount to \$1,000,000, and they fell \$49,004 short of that sum, thus helping to reduce the surplus, which was estimated at \$2,000,000, to \$1,716,873.

In these times of depression it is certainly not a bad showing that the Government, while providing for the present wants and future expansion of Canada, have been able, even with a large reduction in the tariff, to put by a surplus of almost a million and three-quarters.
