

HURON AND OTTAWA RAILWAY.—A company with the above title has been organized and was incorporated during the recent session of the Ontario Legislature, having on the Board several of the leading Railway men of the Province. It is designed to form a trunk line from Montreal and Ottawa to Pary Sound, connecting at Carleton Place with the Canada Central, and by means of that route with the Quebec and Ottawa Junction and the Northern Colonization roads to Montreal. It would run direct from Carleton Place to Pary Sound, through the north of Addington, Hastings, Peterborough and Victoria, and opening up the heart of the Free Grant districts. It would be a direct line from Chicago to Montreal, and would be the shortest route from Fort William to Ottawa and Montreal, the distance being from the latter point to Pary Sound only 332 miles, and thence to Fort William 560, in all 842 miles.

The enormous military preparations of France have been recently called to the attention of the German Parliament by Count von Moltke. He asserts that where France in 1870 had eight army corps she now has nineteen, and that her native army consists of 1,200,000 men, with a territorial reserve force of 1,000,000 men. This army is plainly intended to wrest the Rhine provinces from Germany, and Von Moltke asserts "that Germany will be obliged to protect for fifty years to come what she gained in five months." The confidence of the great strategist in the discipline of German troops is shown in the fact that he only asks for a German army of 401,000 rank and file as a peace establishment. With this force he is content to await the moment when France is ready to launch her enormous army against the matchless German infantry.

The voyage from New York to Liverpool occupies from nine to twelve days. In the best of circumstance it has its inconveniences and dangers. Is it not worth while to shorten it to four days if it be possible to do so? Now this could be accomplished were the transatlantic steamers to run between Newfoundland and Valentia instead of New York and Liverpool. With very little difficulty a railway could be built across Newfoundland from St. John's to the Strait of Cansu, thus establishing an all-rail route between New York and the west coast of Newfoundland, broken only by the short sea-passage from Halifax to St. John's. The voyage across the Atlantic to Valentia would occupy only from three to four days, and the time and danger of crossing that boisterous sea could be thus reduced nearly two-thirds. Is not this worth trying? Are not the dangers and discomforts of the sea such that we are all interested in lessening them? Freight could of course be sent more cheaply by the old routes, but beyond any question the advantages offered by a four days sea voyage would be sufficient to secure for the Newfoundland route a monopoly of the first-class passenger business.

We have received the Third annual Report of the Ontario institution for the Deaf and Dumb, at Belleville, Ontario. We understand that this institution is in a prosperous condition. The number of pupils in attendance last year was 130 males and 63 females. According to the Census Returns of 1871 it appears that there are in the Province of Ontario, 1412 deaf and dumb persons of whom 778 are males and 636 females. There must be a great number of these who have never realized the advantages of such an institution as that in Belleville; and we think it is the duty of the friends of such unfortunate, as well as of Township and village councils, to look into the matter, and facilitate, in every way possible, their education in this establishment. HOW A NEWSBOY ROSE IN THE WORLD.—William Henry Smith, just appointed parliamentary secretary of the treasury, by Mr. Disraeli, the prime minister of England, was a newsboy, less than 25 years ago, on the streets from 5 in the morning till 8 at night. Presently he had a booth near the Strand, then he had to employ assistants, finally he hit upon the idea of buying the exclusive right to sell newspapers and other literature at the principal railroad stations in the British Isles, and that made his fortune. He has been in Parliament for five years, and made the reputation of a good speaker and thinker, and Mr. Disraeli puts him now in a place that is regarded as the stepping-stone to promotion.

While women by their prayers and exhortations have been successful to some extent in checking and limiting the sale of intoxicating drink in Ohio and other states, their sisters in Chicago have utterly failed in their petition against the contemplated repeal of the Sunday ordinance. A telegram informs us that by a vote of 22 to 14 the City Aldermen have repealed the Sunday Saloon-closing Law. The friends of temperance were yelled and booed at in the streets, and only saved from violence by the interposition of the police. It is to be hoped that the example of Chicago will not be contagious.

A Montreal Correspondent writes that the law against tavern-keepers having their bars opened on Sunday is being rigidly enforced. Four of them were fined on Tuesday last, and fifteen of them will be tried during the week.

A NATIVE VOLCANO.—North Carolina, envious of the earthquakes of California and the hurricanes of the Northwest, has in the most unexpected way set up a volcano, and challenged the Atlantic States to produce its equal. So far as can be learned the North Carolina volcano does not yet run very smoothly; in fact, its operations consist chiefly of subterranean groanings, accompanied by a general jerking of the surrounding country, and—though this is not established beyond dispute—a small display of smoke and steam. But we may expect it to improve in time. Nothing could be more unfair than to require a new volcano to equal, at the very start, volcanoes that have been in constant use for centuries. Only give the North Carolinians time to thoroughly comprehend the thing and they will doubtless produce as good an article of volcano as can be found in any of the effete monarchies of Europe.

Persons whose motives are plainly of the most patriotic and virtuous character, as in the North Carolina volcano, and insist that science has shown that all volcanoes are situated on the sea-coast, and are due to salt water leaking through the bottom of the sea, and coming in contact with hot rocks of potassium and jars of acids stored away in the heart of the neighboring mountains. But it is open to the North Carolinians to reply that in the centre of Thibet, at a distance of more than 1,000 miles from the sea, are two extraordinarily lively volcanoes. Now, if the degraded Thibetians can produce volcanoes without water, surely the free and enlightened citizens of North Carolina can do as much. There does not seem to be any sufficient answer to this argument and fair-minded men will have to admit that there is no scientific impossibility involved in setting up a volcano in the west of North Carolina and making it, if not a pecuniary, at all events a spectacular success. As to the rumor that the so-called volcano is the creation of the diseased mind of an illicit distiller who had consumed his own stock rather too recklessly, it is not deserving of contradiction. Every cultivated North Carolinian knows that whiskey may produce monkeys and snakes, but that by no possible process of evolution can it produce volcanoes.

Women are clearly proving their right to a perfect equality with men. Here is Miss Belle Murray, acting deputy clerk of the Circuit Court of McLean County, Illinois. Not only has she discharged the duties of the office as well as any man could have done, but it is charged that she has embezzled money with true masculine boldness. She is now on trial for the offence, and it will doubtless appear that her horses, wife, and respectable male companions have been the cause of her ruin.

A new aurora has sprung into existence which is supposed to be the dawn of a brighter day for women. It is located near Boston, where a woman's community is to be established. The property is to be owned and the affairs of the village managed exclusively by women. The first building has been erected, and others are to be speedily followed.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.—THE SPEECH FROM THE THRONE.—Ottawa, 27th March. His Excellency the Governor General, at 3 o'clock p. m. today, presided in state to the Senate Chamber, and having taken his seat upon the throne, commanded the attendance of the House of Commons. His Excellency was attended to the House by a most splendid staff. Upon the floor of the House, and in the galleries, there was such a galaxy of beauty and fashion as almost surpassed all previous occasions. The members of the body, preceded by their Speaker, the Hon. Timothy W. Anglin, proceeded at the Bar. The Hon. T. W. Anglin then informed His Excellency that the choice of the House of Commons had fallen upon him to be their Speaker, and he prayed for the members of customary Parliament. His Excellency was pleased to deliver the following Speech: Hon. Gentlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I have convened Parliament at the earliest moment consistent with the delay caused by the recent dissolution. Your attention will be invited during the present session to measures having reference to the representation of the people in Parliament, embracing the system now prevailing in Great Britain, and in most other countries enjoying constitutional government, of taking votes by ballot, and to the establishment of a General Court of Appeals. Measures will also be submitted to you for amendment of the law relating to Controversies Elections of the Militia, and Insolvency. A report of the Chief Engineer of the proposed canal between the Gulf of St. Lawrence and Bay of Fundy will be submitted for your consideration. With the progress already made in the construction of the Intercolonial Railway, another year will be required to complete it. A report, indicating its actual condition, will be introduced to vest in the Department of Public Works the powers now exercised by the Board of Railway Commissioners. The question of compensation due to the Dominion for the fishery privileges in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, under the Treaty of Washington, has given rise to a renewal of negotiations, tending to widen reciprocal trade relations with that country. At the instance of my Government, the Imperial authorities have given directions to the British Minister to the United States, to subject with the administration at Washington, and have associated with him for this purpose a Canadian Commissioner. The accounts of the last financial year will be laid before you, as well as a statement of the receipts and expenditures of the present year to the latest practicable period. I regret to state that the receipts of the current year will not be sufficient to meet the expenditure. It will therefore be necessary for you to consider the best means to be adopted for making good the anticipated deficiency. The estimates for the coming year will be laid before you. They have been prepared with as much regard to economy as is consistent with the efficiency of the public service. Hon.
