ANOTHER LONDON SCANDAL

Unenviable Notoriety Achieved by Aristocratic Gamblers.

Wealthy Baronet's "Shady" Game of Baccarat-The Prince of Wales Mixed Up in the Mess.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The Star says: The Prince of Wales will shortly appear as a witness in a court of law. During the St. Leger race week the Prince of Wales stayed at Arthur Wilson's house at Doncaster. The Prince seems to have played at baccarat with a wealthy military baronet and about twenty other players. The barenet and about twenty other players. carat with a weating military baronet and about twenty other players. The barenet was suspected of cheating, and after consultation among the other players the latter appointed a committee, composed of two ladies and three gentlemen to watch the baronet. This committee some time later deputed General Owen Williams and Lord Coventry to enter into communication. later deputed General Owen Williams and Lord Coventry to enter into communication with the baronet referred to. Gen. Williams and Lord Coventry, without personally indorsing the charges, fulfilled the unpleasant duty assigned them. When the baronet was informed that he was suspected of winning money at baccarat by unfair means he was extremely indignant, and flatly denied the charges.

The Prince of Wales, dreading the unpleasant notoriety and disagreeable compleasant notoriety and disagreeable com-

pleasant notoriety and disagreeable com-ments of the Radical press which would be sure to follow if the scandal were made public, interposed in the dispute. The re-sult was that an arrangement was arrived at by which the scandal was to be husbed up and every precaution taken to prevent the fact that the Prince of Wales had been connected with the baccarat dispute from

connected with the baccarat dispute from reaching the ears of the public.

One of the stipulations insisted on by the committee of the Prince's friends, and it is said by the Prince of Wales, was that the accused baronet should give a written agreement undertaking not to play cards agreement undertaking not to play cards for money in the future. On the other hand the baronet's accusers agreed to sign an undertaking that they would not mention the unfortunate dispute. These agreements were duly signed by the parties interested, but in spite of the silence imposed on all concerned, the accused baronet found that the charges made against him were on all concerned, the accused baroner found that the charges made against him were soon after the occurrence publicly discussed and commented on in the aristocratic London clubs.

The baronet was therefore left with but

The baronet was therefore left with but two courses to pursue. He had either to say nothing and practically admit the truth of the accusations or he must proclaim his innocence by taking legal action against his accusers. The baronet chose the latter course, and it is announced that he has served the members of the committee of inquiry, (who watched his actions while playing baccarat at Wilson's house, with writs in actions for libel, which he has brought against the committee.

The baronet has retained the services of Mr. Gellar, his counsel, and the committee has retained the services of Sir Charles Russell and George P. Lewis. In the meantime the military baronet's fellow-officers advised him to retire from the service reading the result of the trial. The vice pending the result of the trial. Hon. John Dryden's Motto for the Farmer-Proposal to Suppress the Senate.



SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 6.—Details have been received of the terrible floods and famine which have prevailed recently in the interior districts of Northern China. The people of Schuan have suffered terribly by floods, which destroyed temples, bridges and dwellings in the ten districts.



How Bees Recline in Their Little Beds at Night.

Best Kind of Cows. writer has never yet attended

dairy convention where some one didn't ask: "Which is the best breed of dairy cows?" Professors and other platform lights rarely commit themselves—in fact, how can they? A monopoly of bovine virtues are not wrapped within the skins of any breed. A man must breed or select his cows according to what he is aiming at. One of the neatest answers to the above conundrum was given at a New York institute by Col. Curtis, who said: "The cow that will make the most milk containing the largest amounts of solids for the food consumed."

The Clover Rust.

The clover rust should be distinguished from two other diseases of the red and white clovers of minor importance, one Phyllachora Trifolii, the other Phacidium white clovers of minor importance, one Phyllachora Trifolii, the other Phacidium Trifolii. Both of the latter produce black, smoothish discolorations, chiefly of the leaves; while the true "clover rust" infests the leaves, the leaf-stalk or petioles, and the stems. In appearance the spots of the rust proper are oblong, well defined, brown in color, and somewhat powdery on the surface. The disease has not been long known in America, but has prevailed to such an extent during the several wet, cool seasons preceding 1890, in many sections in the Northern States, that it must be regarded as a disease likely to affect seriously, under conditions favorable to its development, an agricultural crop.
Suggestions.—So far as present observations go: 1. The early crop of red clover is not likely to suffer injury from rust. 2. As the second crop is likely to suffer greatly if the midsummer is cool, and as clover becomes a valuable fertilizer when plowed in, the fields should be carefully watched in such seasons and the crop might be plowed under to advantage. 3. Burning the clover fields in the fall would probably have some effect in checking the spread of the disease during the next season; but the application of fungicides seems impracticable.—[From a Corhwall University experiment station bulletin.

Night Work in a Bee Hive.

Bees work all night, whenever there is work to be done; and there is always more or less to be done during almost every month in the year. Brood is fed at night, as much as in the daytime. Cells are prepared for the queen to lay in, and the queen goes on with egg-laying just the same. During the honey season more comb is built during the night than at any other time, and both pollen and honey are taken from the cells, where the workers deposit it during the day, placed where wanted, properly packed away and sealed over.—[Gleanings in Bee-Culture.

How to Catch Nitrogen. At a recent session of the Kent County

Farmers' Institute, held at Milford, Del. Mr. J. G. Brown stated that he had form torly paid as high as \$1,509 a year for phosphates. And now after growing crimson clover four years, he thinks he has bought his last commercial fertilizer. He will now depend on stable manure and crimson belover, of which he has 200 acres growing on his farms. Mr. J. S. Willis remarked: "I commenced its use in 1880, and now have 70 or 80 acres which I shall turn under as a green manure. My soil is sandy loam, or as some think, sand without loan. Pasuring killed out all the grass, and in the dry summer my fields were were dusty, and I was in danger of losing what sand I had, from blowing away. But now they are covered with a green carpet of scarlet clover. I have raised 50 bushels of corn legracere on the same sand." Several other will-known farmers expressed favorable actions of this clover. Like other leguminous plants this clover is able to appropriate from the air that most valuable of fertilizing elements, nitrogen. The Northern Rose Garden.

Mr. James F. Webster advised planting roses in beds by themselves rather than interspersed all through the garden. Soil should be somewhat heavy, but well drained. When sandy the surface may be mulched with several inches of rotted manure, to be left on during the season and dug in fall or spring. April or early in May is the best time for planting roses. Two-year old plants may be set 30 inches apart; one year old plants closer; but the latter must be replanted at wider distance two or three years later. For protection, mound up the earth about each plant to the height of ten inches. Prune closely, leaving only six or eight inches of wood on strong-growing varietes, and less on weak-growing ones. Many of the best sorts have stood the test of a quarter of a century, and will remain favorites for years to come.

Until further notice the association will recognize for notice the association will recognize for registration only such records as are made under the rules formerly enforced. This means that matters are just now in abeyance, and the resolution appointed a committee of three to confer with representatives of the National and American Associations, the purpose of such conference being to take united action on the subject of acquiring records. acquiring records.

The New York Sportsman devotes a page or more to the opinions of successful trainers on the early development of trotters. These opinions were elicited by the question, "Can a trotter be so trained or developed as to reach the limit of speed at years of age, without danger or injury?" In reply, Budd Doble says he does not think a trotter can be so developed without unduly endangering him. He thinks that the trotter constantly educated and trained until 5 or 6 years old would be far better and faster than at 3 years old. 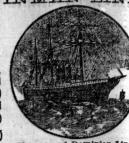
