What Are the Designs of France and Russia?

The Semi-Secret History of Recent Years.

British Possessions in the East Affected. An Attack on India Apparently Medi-

tated. No Aid Need be Looked for by Great

Britain from the Triple Alliance

[Specially Communicated to the London Advertiser.] In the beginning of 1889, M. Bonvalo was carnestly engaged in a discussion with M. Carnot, and one of his most influential advisers, as to the future of France. The subject was one of special interest to them, as it always must be, to ever intelligent Frenchman. France had tost much of her prestige by the Franco-German war, and, along with it, she lost two important provinces upon the banks of the Rhine. How was France to regain her lost influence, was one of the questions discussed at this important meeting. M. Bonvalot assurred the President that it was not only possible for France to regrain her lost influence, and, in time, her lost territory, but it was possible for her to acquire far greater influence and far greater prosperity than her people had ever dreamed of in the days of Napoleon the Great. France had days of Napoleon the Great. France had already extensive possessions, contiguous to herself, in Northern Africa. With the fall of the Ottoman Empire the whole of Northern Africa, up to the borders of Egypt, would be hers as a matter of course, and with the English out of Egypt that country, as well as Syria and the valley of the Euphrates, would become hers. Russia required an ally, and if she came into possession of Turkey in Europe and Asia Minor her ambition in respect to the Ottoman Empire would be satisfied. But to carry out such a policy care must be taken not to begin where they should end. It was the opinion of each that as long as the Triple Alliance continued there was no certainty that France could, even with the active aid of Russia,

could, even with the active aid of Russia, regain Alsace and Lorraine. M. Bonvalot ited strongly to the conviction—and he half converted the President and Ministers to his own way of thinking—that the hopes of France, could only be realized by greatly curtailing the wealth and commercial prosperity of the United Kingdom and reducing her to a second rate power. If the western portion of this programme were first attempted, France and Russia would have, not simply a Triple Alliance to contend with, but a large portion of Europe and all Turkey as well; but if France and Russia were to unite for the acquisition of the Indies, they would have to

M. Bonvalot gives a minute account of the country through which he passed, its resources, the character of its inhabitants, and the chances of marching an army from the borders of Russia to the sea shore in Tonquin. NOT A FINANCIAL SUCCESS!

World's Fair Returns Prove Disappointing.

The Management Eave Hard ork to Pay Debts-The Stockholders Will Get Nothing on Their Investment.

CHICAGO, Aug. 1.—A board of finance has been appointed to manage the monetary affairs of the World's Fair.

With the closing of the gates last night the first half of the Columbian Exposition passed into history. The number of paid admissions during the month was 2,755,971. The largest number of paid admissions was on July 4, when 283,273 people deposited the admission fee with the tacket sellers. The smallest number was on Sunday last. the admission fee with the ticket sellers. The smallest number was on Sunday last, when only 18,637 paid admissions were recorded. The paid attendance for May was 1,050,307, while that of June more than doubled this figure, reaching a total of 2,675,113

was 1,050,307, while that of June more than doubled this figure, reaching a total of 2,675,113.

Officials of the fair are greatly pleased with the artistic success of the great exposition, but this much cannot be said of the financial end of the enterprise. The Kent County Judge Dismisses the Charge Against Robert Mead of Train-Wrecking.

Had the ground been hard clay, the marks might have remained; but the witnesses, one and all, maintained that it was little better than a swamp. Translation of the Pope's Encyclica on the Subject.

The Poor Have a Right to be Assisted by the Rich.

Property the Essential Element of Social Order—Strikes Justified Only When an Individual Interest is Attacked.

New York, Aug. 1.—The World publishes a special from Rome, containing a translation of Pope Leo's forthcoming encyclical upon the labor question, of which this is an abstract:

Constitutions and laws have their foundation on the character and the traditions of nations and peoples. They are the work of God through the centuries, as the history of every country shows, but no law which wanders from religion or tends to subvert it can be otherwise than defective, and in time must come to naught.

Society is not a human better.

Society is not a human invention, but a divine inspiration for the real social contractors, not merely arrange between man and man, but between man and God, where the individual fuffilis his duty to God, but cannot fail in doing his duty to God, but cannot fail in doing his duty to God, property is the essential element to social order for the preservation and development of human life, and the divine law has declared property sacred and inviolable—"Cursed be he who removeth his neighbor's landmark." But the poor have nevertheless a right to be

Assisted by The Rich.

Not by indiscrimate shargiving, but by preparing such employment for them as will be useful. "If a man will not work neither shall he eat," but if he have no work it is plainly the duty of those who can do so to provide it for him. This legitimatizes property. Atheism and a departure from the Christian faith are the great aids and stimulants of anarchy and socialism. The Christian faith alone is the bulwark of social order. Where Christian institutions and customs are not maintained in State there must be disorder, bewilderment and decay. At this moment Europe is in the threes of an immense upheaval of society, in which one violent struggle succeeds another unceasingly. In many cases the reason is to be found in the fact that legislation has not been duly enacted, for every person should have his legitimate part in the benefits of society according to the order of providence.

This state of unrest is not confined to This state of unrest is not confined to the working classes properly so-called. It has taken root and is bearing nefarious fruit in the more cultivated part of society. The masses who do not perceive the neces-sities of light and shade, seeing those mov-ing in a superior condition of life, adherents of the principles of socialism allow them selves to be BLINDLY LED BY ACITATORS,
who have no real interest in the cause they
so loudly uphold beyond a sordid or a

And this is why strikes are so unproductive of beneficial results. Placed on a basis more social than economic, being more of a struggle than a spacification, more of a sgression than defense, the strike loses its natural aspectand hides itself and its essence. A strike can be justified only as a means of defense when an individual interest is attacked. Never can it be justified as a collective arm of aggression. Man has a natural right to live and to work as a means of procuring a living. He has a right to remove every obstacle to his work and to get the value of his labor, and therefore when his labor is neither productive nor remunerative he has a right to retuse to continue it. But an individual right cannot be transferred into a collective right; nor can an arm of defense be changed into an arm of aggression to cause changed into an arm of aggression to cause a means of good to degenerate into

a means of good to degenerate into

An aggressive strike is not reciprocal between operator and operative, but an instrument of attack upon the property and person. The operative on strike is a passive and dominated instrument, not an intelligent and free being. While his action lessens the capital of the employer, it puts no moncy into his own pocket. The right of protecting the operative, whether in after years or in the field, should be admitted, and for this purpose the maximum of labor, as well as the minimum of slary, should be fixed. The hours of labor should be arranged, giving due attention to days of rest and abstention from labor.

MORE POWER WANTED.

Plenty of Water, But Not Enough Machinery.

New Hydraulic Pumps Advocated-The G. T. R. Taking Water From the River-The Present Engines Working Ecyond Their Limit,

The question of more power for the pumps at Springbank came up at last night's meeting of the water commissioners. There is plenty of water at the springs, but not power enough to send the necessary supply to the city. With the power is wanted an extra main, and chairman Jones gave notice that the matter would be thoroughly threshed out at the next meeting. New hydraulic pumps are spoken of to be placed below the present ones and the same water used as a motive power. This year has been a phenomenal one. Only one day in July last year did the water cease to run over the dam, while at the present time water would not flow over it even with the spiash beards down. The G. T. R. began pumping from the river yeaterday. The pumping record for the last two weeks was 40,000,000 by the steam pumps and 20,000,000 by hydraulic pumps. The average daily pumping was 2,500,000 gallons with machinery that was sold at a 2,000,000 limit.

Minister Bowell Rushes to Rescue.

The "Insulted" Italian Admiral May Bo Molified by a Salute From Montreal's Guns.

Montreal's Guns.

Montreal, Que., Aug. 1.—This morning Rear Admiral Magnahi, of the Italian warship Etna, notified the city authorities that unless his salute, fired on entering Montreal harbor, was returned he would at once leave the harbor and proceed to sea. The failure to return the salute, he said, was an insult to his flag.

Acting Mayor Stornes at once telegraphed Acting Premier Bowell at Ottawa the facts of the case, and again requested that salute be fired, although the military anthorities at the capital yesterday declared that Montreal was not a saluting port and that the guns could not be fired.

Minister Bowell's reply has been received. It directs that the Italian warship's salute be returned at once, the expense of firing such a salute to be borne by the Government.

The Italian warship Etna was again visited by large crowds to-day. The threat of Admiral Magnaghi to leave port unless a salute was fired in return to he salute caused a sensation, but fortunately further unpleasantness was prevented by the receipt of the following message from the Minister of Militia, Hon. J. C. Paterson:

"Am quite willing to give the city the

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



THEY WORK TOGETHER.

An apparatus has been constructed for An apparatus has been constructed for telephoning simultaneously over telegraph wires. The system has been in operation for some time on the telephone line from Buda-Pesth to Szegedin, a distance of 121 miles. The results were satisfactory. The apparatus can easily be inserted in a telegraph circuit and used at once. It is said that simultaneous telegraphy along the wire does not in the least interfere with telephoning, and that the effects of induction and all disturbing noises are completely removed.

A MILKING EXPERIMENT. Knowledge and Ekill Made a Difference of 267 Pounds in One Week.

Knowledge and Skill Made a Difference of 267 Pounds in One Week.

Five cows were milked four weeks by two different persons, each milker serving two weeks, both being competent, one of them doing his average milking and not aware that an experiment was under way; the other was fully informed as to the nature of the experiment and expected to contribute his beat skill for the purpose in view. In the case of the one unaware of the experiment the yield of milk from the five cows for two weeks was 864 pounds. The yield of milk from the same cows for a corresponding period while in charge of the man aware of the experiment reached 1,131 pounds, the excess of 267 pounds in favor of the man who milked to dryness. The experiment proved that it pays to get all the cow has to deliver. Also that it is a matter of Importance that the udder be emptied as rapidly as possible in a manner acceptable to the as possible in a manner acceptable to the cow—this because of the effect on the richness of the milk in fat globules. Another ness of the milk in fat globules. Another important feature in milking to dryness is that first milk drawn is most squeeus, while the last contains most butter fat. While not strictly a result of this experiment, it demonstrates anew the teachings of the experience that proves that incompletely milked cows have a tendency to diminish their yield.—[British Dairy Farmer.
