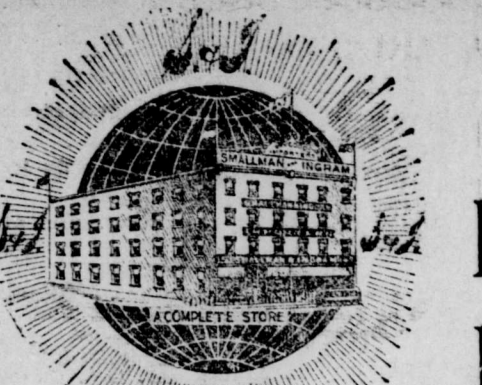

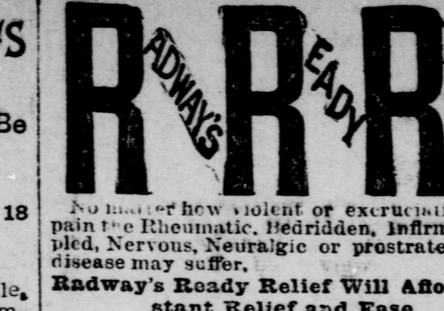

Maquire, the uncle of Byrne, reached Skaguay in a deplorable condition, having been seized with quick consumption on the way up. He was probably live long enough to reach his night in Chicago."

MINERS SAY THERE IS NO DANGER OF STARVATION. Juneau, Alaska, Jan. 3, via Seattle, Wash., Jan. 10.—Twenty men have arrived here from the interior of Alaska for ten years. They unhesitatingly state that there is no danger of starvation, and no necessity for a government relief expedition. They say that "Thirty-Mile River, between Lebarau and the Hootalinga is open water, and they were compelled to take to the side hills. Building operations are being pushed back as soon as possible with supplies for the coming year. The trail is estimated to cost \$1,500,000."

Goldensuppe, a bath rubber, at Woodside, L. I., in June of last year, was yesterday sentenced to fifteen years in the state prison at Auburn. The good time allowance attainable would reduce the term to ten years and five months.

CRIED IN ITS COFFIN. Parents Thought the Child Dead, and Were Preparing it for Burial. New York, Jan. 11.—The three-months old child of Henry Bothe, a milkman, living at No. 1128 Willow avenue, Hoboken, after being placed in a coffin Thursday night, uttered a cry. The infant had been ill two days, suffering from spasms. It would remain in an insensible state for hours at a time. On Thursday night the father sent for Dr. Clausen, the family physician. When the doctor arrived, the child, to all appearances, was dead. The parent understood Dr. Clausen to say that it was, and sent for Undertaker Volk, who arrived within an hour, to prepare the body for burial. The child stirred, and then cried out. It had another spasm immediately afterwards and lapsed into a comatose condition again, and at noon Friday was pronounced dead. Dr. Clausen stated that he had not said the child died. It was the father who insisted that it had expired. The father asked him to summon an undertaker and he did so, and he thought the child would die in a short time.

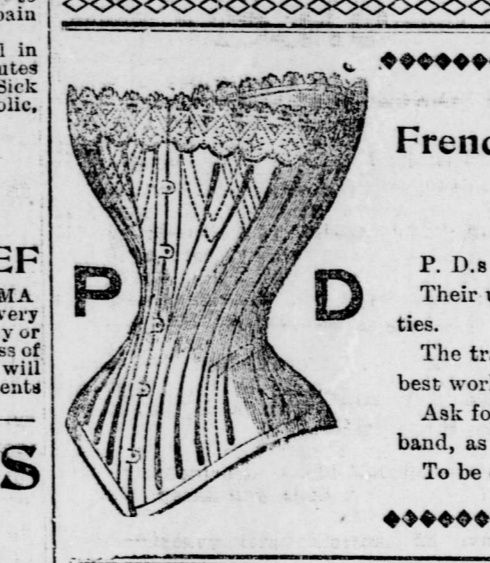
