Eleventh of President's Peace Conditions Means Blasting of Kaiser's Dream of German Europe and Liberation of Abused Balkans-More Wars if Eastern Question Is Not

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The eleventh of the fourteen conditions of peace laid down by President Wilson in his address to Congress touches upon one of the most intricate and difficult of all the obstacles to a general European settlement—the Balkan problem. In his historic speech, Mr. Wilson outlined the conditions of solving his question—the familiar old 'Eastern question," which has plagued states—men and diplomats for more than three centuries—as follows:

"The evacuation of Rumania, Serbia and Montenegro, with free access to the sea by Serbia, the restoration of occupied territories, the fixing of allegiance and nationality, and international gurantees of their political and economic independence and economic integrity."

Washington Believes Germany Ready To Make Bargain With Entente, But the Offer Would Not Be Considered If at Russia's Expense-Wilson To Make Early State-

Washington, March 16 .- There was Intimations in official circles today that President Wilson might make an early declaration on the Russian situation. It was not indicated what might be its form or its manner of delivery.





Money invested in public works is generally willing to work for less pay than money invested in private property, because the public authorities have always the right to levy taxes to pay interest (which is wages for money) if the public work in question does not pay its own way.

The street railway, like other companies, has no such power. It must pay the wages of the money it hires out of its earnings. It is, therefore, right and proper that wages to money invested in companies should be higher than wages to public enterprises.

Today money hired for public use by the city of London and by the Province of Ontario draws over 6 per cent interest (or wages). Should not money used for providing street railway transportation be entitled to wages at least equal to the wages (or interest) paid for money by the city of London and the Province of Ontario?





Monastir, the Greeks won at Yenidze-Vardar and occupied Saloniki; the Bul-gars were victorious at Kirk-Küllisse and Lule Brugas, their armies investing and Lule Brugas, their armies investing Adrianople and approaching the Chatalja lines, the last landmark defence of Constantinople. Turkey was beaten, and it had all happened so suddenly that the Great Powers had not had time to interfere. Expecting Turkish victory and a repetition of the events of the Greco-Turkish war of 1897, they had been confounded by the complete and apparent permanent destruction of Turkish rule in Europe, save in Constantinople.

It now remained for the victors to divide the spoils on the basis of their early agreements. But now the fatal influence of Austrian intrigue was felt. Bulgaria and Serbia had agreed upon a division of Macedonia which gave Uskub to Serbia and Monastir to Bulgaria. But they had also agreed that Northern Albania should fall to the Serbs. Austria now, at the conference of London, called by the Great Powers to settle the Balkan question with regard to the interests of the Great Powers, not the actual victors, vetoed the proposed expansion of Serbia to the seacoast; vetoed the acquisition of a window on the Adriatic, which is now represented in Mr. Wilson's demand for direct access for Serbia to the sea.

To avoid a general European war the great powers accepted Austria's view, and the free state of Albania was created—one of the most preposterous creations of history. Serbia was shut off from the seacoast. But when this had happened the Serbs demanded from their Bulgar allies compensations elsewhere, particularly as the Bulgars were demanding Serb aid to reduce Adrianople. From Bulgaria, Serbia demanded all of Macedonia west of the Vardar and north of the line occupied by the Greeks, and at the same time made an agreement with the Greeks by which in rearn for Greek aid in the Vardar Valley, they agreed to support the Greek claim to Saloniki. Bulgaria, under Austrian impulsion, resisted all these proposals. She insisted upon having Monastir, which the Greek claim to Saloniki. Bulgaria, under Austrian impulsion, resisted all these proposals. She insisted upon having Monastir, which the Greeks had captured and held. The result was the second Balkan war, in 1913. In this war Bulgaria was promptly beaten by the Serbs and te Greeks, Rumania entered the war and seized the Silistrian strip between the Danube and the Black Sea. Turkey reoccupied Adrianople, which had at last fallen to Serbo-Bulgar armie

and Greece drove Bulgar armiles out of all Macedonia.

Territory Taken Back.

By the treaty of Bucharest, which confirmed the Bulgar defeat, the Bulgarlan conquests of 1912 were practically all taken away, and in addition Bulgaria lost to Rumania the Silistrian strip, which had been hers before the first Balkan war. After two wars and terrible sacrifices, the Bulgarians found themselves but little better off in territory, and still lacking direct access to the free seas over their own territory. In this situation Bulgarian hatred of Serb, Greek and Rumanian knew no bounds, and Bulgaria threw herself into the arms of Austria and Germany without hesitation. Henceforth the Bulgaris merely waited their chance to strike back and abolish the wrangs of the treaty of Bucharest.

In 1914, when the world war broke out, Bulgaria remained quiet at the beginning, because there was no great usefulness for her friends in any other course. From the outset of the war the Allies sought to enlist Bulgaria. They saw that unless Bulgaria, were enlisted there would be a direct access to Turkey for the central powers across Rumania and Bulgaria, and if Serbia was crushed, across Serbia and Bulgaria. 



EING invisible and, in the ordinary sense, intangible, the air is one of the most difficult and illusive subjects for the scientists to investigate first hand. If one could only see the processes that go forward in its depths or could get outside of it and look upon it from a place apart! But no; we are immersed in it like the the sea, and we cannot even exist beyond its limits. In fact, man cannot go anywhere near its upper limits. He must remain forever immersed in it; forever barred from seeing it from the outside.

Thus we remain blind to the wonderful activities of the atmosphere that go on about us constantly, although the effects of many of those processes are seen or felt. We see smoke and dust floating in the air. We see the clouds, but cannot see the actions of the air in the formation of those clouds. We see the rain, snow and hail, but cannot ree the making of the raindrops, nor the fashioning of the snowflakes, nor the growth of hailstones. Probably a fish does not see the water in which It lives, but sees only the larger things that exist in the water. Man only sees some of the things that exist in the atmosphere, not the atmosphere itself.

As a matter of fact, man's sphere is a narrow one when we consider the vastness of the universe or even the immense mass of the earth, of which man claims to be the lord. Under our feet is a body of matter nearly 8000 miles thick, into which man has penetrated hardly more than a single mile. Overhead is the atmosphere extending upward 100 miles (in a very rarefied state possibly much farther), upward into which man has never gone more than about 61/2 miles.

It is worth while to try to get a

mental vision of the atmosphere as 10-10 a whole. Practically the entire layer of atmosphere is confined to a shell extending outward from the earth not more than 200 miles, according to the best evidence we 68 C have. Even at a distance of 50 miles above the earth, the quantity of air is thought to be almost inappreciable. The density of the atmosphere decreases rapidly as al-8 titude increases. If the atmosphere were of the present sea-level density from bottom to top, it would all be confined within five miles of the earth. One-half the mass of the atmosphere is found within 31/4 mues of the surface of the earth, three-fourths is below the sevenmile level, and seven-eighths be-

low the 10-mile level. Thus the solid earth has but a thin coating of air only about onefortieth as thick as the diameter of the earth at the most; or, if we consider the atmosphere only in its really appreciable extent (about 40 miles above the earth), only one two-hundredths as thick as the diameter of the earth-a mere coating, not thicker, relatively speaking, than the skin on an apple of ordinary size.

Consider further the fact that storms operate only in that part of the atmosphere lying within about seven miles of the earth-mainly within three miles-and it is truly wonderful what mighty forces are generated and vast energy expended within this thin film of gas. A storm condition may cover one-third of the United States, distinctly nated by forces round about a common centre: the disturbance may be 1000 to 1500 miles in diameter, while its thickness or upward extent is probably less than seven miles. In other words, we have tremendous forces at work in a body of air

WORLD'S LONGEST NOVEL

THE longest novel in the world belongs to Japan. Its author is Kiong Te Bakin. It was commenced in 1852, and published volume by volume as it came out over a period of 50 years. There are 106 volumes, 106,000 pages, 3.180. 000 lines, and about 38,000,000 words. A complete copy weighs 130 pounds.

Which is the longest poem in the world? One generally regards "Paradise Lost" as lengthy, and Thomson's "Seasons" and Cowper's "Task." But these are short compared with Spenser's "Faerie Queene," which is easily the longest poem in existence, even as it stands, and had he attained his object and reached the 24th book, no other poet would have equalled that record.

"A number of fires were burning in the vicin-

relation to the sun, which pours upon it a vast amount of heat that strikes only one-half of the surface of the body at any one time. As a result, the atmosphere as a whole is very irregularly and unevenly warmed and becomes the very symbol of instability. Yet there are certain general laws of the atmosphere that are detected amidst all the apparent confusion, and man has already reduced his atmospheric discoveries to a working basis.

The general circulation of the atmosphere might be made the theme of a profoundly interesting story. This vast movement—the exchange of air between the equator and the poles-is due to the fact that the equatorial regions and the polar regions are unequally heated. It has been found that the average difference in temperature between the equator and the poles is about 80 deg. Fahrenheit. The effect of such excess heat at the equator is tremendous. The equatorial region beceomes the engine that moves the machinery of the general circulation of the earth's atmosphere.

The lower stratum of air of the tropics expands on being heated and is forced aloft by the cooler and denser air from the neighboring temperate zones, thus establishing a flow toward the equator along the earth's surface; a flow that is maintained by the constant temperature difference. At a great elevation the equatorial air flows off to the north and to the south, finally reaches the polar regions, and there descends and returns toward the equator along the surface of the earth. (The explanation of this flowing of the upper air from equatorial to polar regions and its descent and return cannot be given here. In fact, many of the details of this general circulation are not well known.)

Thus are established the great primary movements of the general circulation. These primary movements are much disturbed by the rotation of the earth and by the mixture of land and water, the land being varied in elevation and the ocean currents varied in temperature. Numberless storms continually invade the general system and obscure its workings.

There is much evidence tending to show that the nucleus of every raindrop is dust. If it is true that the condensation of the moisture of the air is dependent upon dust motes, it can readily be seen how important the dust of the atmosphere is. The conclusions of investigators are that atmospheric dust plays an important part in at least four ways, and these are enumerated by Milham as follows: (1) It is one of the chief causes of haze; (2) it probably serves as centres of condensation for ail fog particles and raindrops (it was once thought that condensation was impossible without it); (3) it is the cause of the sunrise and sunset colors and, perhaps, of the blue color of the sky; (4) it is the cause of twilight

The sources of atmospheric dust are the dust

wind, the dust from volcanoes, the dust from meteors, which are burned and disintegrated in their swift passage through the atmosphere (sometimes at velocities of 40 to 50 miles a second), and the dust from ocean spray. In the case of the volcanic explosion in Krakatoa, between Sumatra and Java, in 1883, dust and steam were thrown into the air to an estimated height of nearly 20 miles, and, according to Milham, "the presence of this dust could be detected in sunset colors all over the world for more than three years."

It might be said also that the waters of all the oceans have visited every part of the earth, at some time in the history of the globe, so continually and upon such a vast scale are the winds and the forces of evaporation, condensation and precipitation at work. A continual circulation of water takes place betwen the hydrosphere (the water areas of the globe) and the atmosphere. The winds blow water vapor from over the seas to the land and ascending currents carry it into the upper atmosphere, where it condenses, is precipitated, and begins the return journey to the seas through springs and rivers. The amount of evaporation from the seas and the amount of precipitation on the land depend upon the temperature and the

CAMPHOR'S LIFE TOLL

HERE are few things which demand a heavier toll of lives than camphor. The reason for this is that the mountainous parts of the island of Formosa, from which the world gets most of its camphor, are inhabited by head-hunting savages whom the successive invaders of the island have been unable to subdue.

These savages are alive to the value of the camphor trees, and fiercely oppose all attempts to get possession of the forests. Their hostility makes the gathering of camphor a most hazardous occupation, and one in which a loaded rifle is the most Indispensable tool.

Since the Japanese took the island after their successful campaign against China in the 90s, they have been carrying on a carefully conceived plan of gradual penetration of the valuable camphor regions. They make paths six feet in width through the virgin forests. At intervals of every 120 yards stands a guard house, and every fourth or fifth guard house is a small fort, entrenched and defended by barbed-wire entanglements. Telephonic inter-communication, machine guns, and all the resources of western military science are employed, and the lines are pushed gradually for-



This glass is a chemical product, in that it has been produced solely by the ingenuity of the chemist in the compounding of the ingredients, and not by any method of
