Winnipeg, June 24.—Central strike committee decided tonight to call off the sympathetic strike at 11 o'clock Thursday morning and leave settlement to a Manitoba Government commission.

Former Judge Robson is to be chairman. He is now general counsel for the Union Bank. R. A. Rigg, former member in the Legislature representing labor, is to be a member. He returned recently from war and has held aloof from the present strike.

W. A. Pritchard arrested labor leader, whose home is in Vancouver, is confined in Stony Mountain Penitentiary without bail. The authorities claim he is a particularly dangerous man. Everywhere the strike leaders were today rallying their followers, but indications are that more strikers went back to work today than in the past seven weeks. Reinstatement of all strikers is what has been holding up all negotiations.

Senator Robertson, minister of labor, left for Ottawa today, feeling he could do nothing more to end the strike. The Government is firm in its stand not to take back the striking postal em-
