# **MOTORISTS OF CITY** LAX IN SIGNALLING, POLICEMEN STATE

Compare Them Unfavorably With Americans.

IS MATTER OF COURTESY

Not Enforced by Law Here As in the United States.

Traffic police report laxity displayed by local motor car drivers in signalling directions at street crossings, and the contrasting clearness of signals which they receive from American tourists who pass through this city.

Almost every phase of motor car traffic is dealt with in the amended regulations of the Ontario motor vehicles act copies of which were received by the police today, and become fully effective on Monday, with the exception of rules for signals from motor cars to traffic policeman.

Regulations requiring safety signals from motor cars for the warning of other motorists in the rear are also lacking, the police note.

Drivers' hand signals in Ontario are a matter of courtesy and are not encounted the laws that are in the United niatter of courtesy and are not en-orced by law as they are in the United

forced by law as they are in the States, police say.

Under the amended act, regulating motor cars, police call the attention of motorists to the increased penalty for reckless driving, whereby persons convicted of this offence are liable to a fine not exceeding \$56 or one week's imprisonment, or both; for second offences, fine not exceeding \$100 or six months imprisonment.

Every motor vehicle must be equipped with a noise muffler, and no contrivance for releasing the muffler shall be attached to the vehicle.

Commercial motor vehicles after Monday must be equipped with mirror, placed so that the driver may have a clear view of the roadway in the rear

RAILWAY SHOPMEN HERE AFFECTED BY AMERICAN PROPOSAL

Were Trying For Record of Pres. Wilson Has Offered a Slight Increase. System.

Winnipeg.
