GERMAN REDS MAKE THREAT TO DESTROY **INDUSTRIAL PLANTS**

GERMAN CABINET RESIGNS. Paris, March 26 .- The German cabinet, headed by Premier Bauer. has resigned, according to a message received here from Berlin to-

INDIAN ALLIANCE TO BE ESTABLISHED BY TRIBES IN DOMINION

Compulsory Enfranchisement Bill Is Fully Discussed.

WILL STAND TOGETHER

Most Influential Bodies in

Canada Meet At Ottawa. Ottawa, March 26. - (By Canadian Press) .- An informal meeting of the two most influential bodies of Indians n Canada was held yesterday at the Russell Hotel for mutual information and discussion. These bodies were a delegation of the council of the Six Nations of Brantford and a delegation of the allied tribes of British Columbia The meeting being for discussion only, no decisions were arrived at, but on agreement was reached to stand by each other's rights and interests. The proposal was received favorably to establish a general Canadian Indian elliance for mutual protection and advancement.

The principal subjects discussed were:

1. The present pending bill before
Parliament proposing compulsory enfranchisement of Indians.

2. The wrongs of the British Columbian Indians, arising from the complete
denial of that province of any land
rights or other tribal rights whatsoeve. to them.
3. The historical claim on the Six Nations to the Government of their own Nations to the Government of their own internal affairs.

The delegation of the council of Six Nations consisted of J. C. Marting chief of the Mohawks; Peter Isaac, chief of Senecas; Levi General, chief of the Cayugas; S. K. Lickers, chief of the Tuscaroras, and A. R. Hill, secretary of the Six Nations council.

The reason Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and naval affairs in the Borden Government had to admit after all these years that the Government has as yet no permanent naval policy, is directly traceable to the order sent forth by Sir George, and the campaigns which followed. Throughout the first years of the Borden Government's administration Nationalist influence dominated in the cabinet. So it was that the prime minister brought down a policy in 1912 not for a Canadian navy, but for the contribution of thirty-five million dollars to the British admiralty.

Permitted to Rust.

So it was that the Canadian navy was permitted to rust at its moorings. So it was that when the war broke out the Niobe and Ralnbow were not immediately fit for service, though they afterward did excellent service on the Atlantic and Pacific respectively. Now it is announced that the Canadian naval service is to be scrapped and that in place of the "obsolete and useless training ships," the Niobe and the Ralnbow, there is to be a new "tinpot" navy, consisting of one light cruiser and two torpedoboats. Whether these are obsolete and useless or not cannot be ascertained, but inasmuch as they are being given free by Great Britain, there may naturally be some doubt as to their effectiveness. In any case they cannot be said to compare at all favorably with the fleet which would have been built had the Laurier program been carried out.

"This is an important matter," said Mr. King. "The Government has at present no policy. If it intends to defer decision until after the imperial conference, then it cannot have any permanent policy at present. In view of that fact the question of my honorable friend, Mr. Devlin, is very pertinent, What policy does the Government intend to lay before the imperial conference."





RUM RUNNERS RING HAS BEEN BROKEN UP

Four Arrests Are Made in **Connection With Border** Seizure.

WINDSOR, March 25 .- With the arrest of four men in a big round-up in which local, provincial, county and Royal Canadian Mounted Police and License Inspector Mousseau co-operated in scouring the entire river front south of Sandwich, the authorities here and in Detroit believe they have broken up a ring of rum runners conducting operations on a wholesale scale. Four rowboats and two launches, a quantity of whiskey and gin were also confiscated in the raid, which was made west of the fish hatcheries at Sandwich.

Seizure of the first of a string of automobiles loaded with liquor which were directed towards the chain of boats waiting at anchor near the shore, warned others following, which turned around and escaped before the officers, who had formed a ring, could close in and prevent their escape.





SAYS ARMENIA MUST BEGIN TO DEFEND ITSELF

Lloyd George States Impossible For England To Send Armies.

TO LET SULTAN STAY

Premier Claims Expense Too Great To Administer Constantinople.

LONDON, March 25.-Replying to riticism of the Government's policy by Herbert H. Asquith, member of the House of Commons for Paisley, Mr. Lloyd George this afternoon gave a detailed explanation of the Turkish settlement. The premier said it would have been a blunder to settle the Turkish problem without giving the United States the most ample opportunity to decide whether it would accept a mandate, because it would have given rise to suspicions that Great Britain and France were taking advantage of the political dissensions in the United States to divide the whole of Turkey among themselves.

"It was only when America definitely refused the mandate that we proceeded without her," Lloyd George declared. The premier said the proposal to oust the sultain had been rejected as in-adequate, because it left the question the government of Constantinople indecided, and the Allies were anxious the administration of Constantin-

France Was Willing. With regard to Armenia, the premier ontinued, France would have been villing to hand Cilicia to the United States, if the latter had accepted the

'Up to the present we have only reerived requests from America to pro-ect Armenia, without any offer to issume responsibility." Mr. Lloyd George said. Curry, a wealthy land owner, with a fortune variously estimated at from one to four million dollars, committed suicide by sending several bullets through his head in his room at the Curry mansion in Highband Park. Curry, who was 33 years of age, was a son of the late John W. Curry, wealthy banker and land owner of Windsor, who at one time owned practically all of what now constitutes the business section of Windsor. He had received a letter from his brother-In-law, J. B. McLeod, of Windsor, referring to the Curry estate, which had made him melancholy throughout the day. At the time of his father's death he shared the state with his two sisters, Mrs. J. B. McLeod, Windsor, and Miss Gladys Curry of New York. He traveled extensively in the Southern States and Mexico in his early years, and at one time was missing for several months. He returned to Detroit and married five years ago.



Workmen in Industrial District Are Calling Off Strike.

LAYING DOWN ARMS

Many Killed Since March 17 -Eighty Workers Buried Thursday.

GOTHA, Saxe-Cobourg-Gotha, March 5.-(By the Associated Press) .- Order is slowly emerging out of the confusion and chaos of the last ten days in the industrial centres of Saxony. The workmen are capitulating and calling off the strike and the military are taking over control of the cities.

The strikers, who for several days had the upper hand in Gotha, laid down their arms yesterday. The garnson of fifty men who were driven out of the city last week, returned today.

Fighting has been going on continuously here since March 17. It is estimated that 90 persons were killed and several hundred wounded. Eighty workers were buried today.



hen happened. The workmen offered to co-operate with the police to guard the territory and posted notices up that looters would be shot. They then consulted the major commanding the garrison. He declared that the soldiers would support Kapp and proclaimed martial law. He sent to Erfurt, a few miles distant, where 2,000 troops were stationed for reinforcements.

Began To Converge.

The workmen from the munition plants in the outskirts of the city began to converge on Gotha, having seized quantities of arms and several armored motor cars. The forces engagd in fighting after the workmen had killed two soldiers who interfered with a boy tearing down the martial-law proclamation. The workmen lacked organization, but were strong enough to expel the small garrison. According to one of their leaders they realized they would be unable successfully to resist a massed attack by the soldiers coming in from Erfurt and yielded in order to prevent further bloodshed. 



BIGGS PROPOSES LOAN TO BETTER TOWNSHIP ROADS

Minister Introduces Bill To Create Two-Million-Dollar Fund.

HENRY VERSUS DRURY

Former Tory Minister Criticises Doherty and Farmers' Sun Statements.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, March 25 .- Another addition was made to the roads program of the Ontario Government today, when Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works and highways, introduced legislation which will set aside two million dollars as a fund from which oans may be made to the townships for improvements to roads within the municipalities. The loans will be repayable without interest within a period not exceeding five years.

This money to townships is plus the regular grants. The minister of highways will say how much will be loaned to any township, and it must not exceed an amount equal to ten mills on the equalized assessment of the townceed an amount equal to ten mills on, the equalized assessment of the township. The Government will undertake to accept municipal debentures as security, and these will not require the approval of the electors or be subject of other restrictions generally applied to debentures.

Reimburse Townships.

Reimburse Townships.

In addition to the proposed loans the new legislation would reimburse townships for twenty per cent of their own expenditure on township roads. The Government retains a right of supervision over the expenditure. The bill also gives assistance to the townships by making grants of forty per cent of the salaries of township overseers or forement on read construction. the salaries of township overseers or foremen on road grants are also fixed. In areas just outside the city limits thirty per cent will be paid by the county; thirty per cent by the city, and forty per cent by the province. The limit of expenditure is one-half mill on the dollar for the city, but provision is made that two mills on the dollar may be spent if the council approves by a two-thirds vote. The council of the county must be prepared to spend an amount proportionately.

NO END TO DEBATE.

Henry, former minister of agriculture referred to Premier Drury having foreeast an era of financial depression, and warned the people against "political cast an era of financial depression, and warned the people against "political pride." Mr. Henry asked: "Is it any crime for a citizen to be proud of Canada? It seems to me that it is the man who goes on his knees to the United States and suggests that the people of Canada, or of any portion of it, are rapidly approaching bankruptcy who is the criminal. 

STUDENTS DID NOT AT KANSAS SCHOOL

Whereupon the in-vestigation disclosed, Prof. Harvey and Prof. James Start, with a student named Lindquist, objected to this seeming interference with personal lib-erty, and refused to take any part in

the work.

In consequence, there were three splashes in the pond nearby, and Prof. Harvey, upon emerging from the water. Immediately hastened to his office and informed the state board of education by telegraph that the students had seized control of the institution and that a virtual "soylet" was in power, and that, said the county attorney in his report, was all there was to it. The track was built, the non-workers were ducked and the incident was closed—officially.

AMERICAN INDIANS SHOWING INCREASE

Not Dying Race, But a Flourishing One, Figures Show.

Washington, March 25 .- Despite the popular belief that the civilization forced upon him by the white man means his ultimate extinction, the North American Indian, reviving from a long period of decadence, has shown such substantial increase in population in recent years that he is probably scarcely less numer ous today than when Columbus discov-

ered America. ered America.
Startling as this assertion may be to those who have pictured American forests in the discoverer's time as swarming with red men, it is freely advanced by experts of the government's Indian bureau, who maintain that the Indian necessarily formed an exceedingly scant population, which probably at no period materially exceeded the total of 333,702 Indians reported by the bureau for last year.

"The Indian is no longer to be thought of as a dying race," declared Dr. Lawrence W. White, an Indian authority of the bureau. "In support of that statement it is necessary, in the first place, to disabuse the public mind of the tra-



She left Quebec on Thursday last at 6 in the morning, called at Eersimis, Godbout and Seven Islands, covered 650 miles, and docked again here after a trip of 4½ days. Caron states that from what he heard at the varous ports of call, the winter has been very severe, but there has been practically no sickness along the north shore and no sign of any epidemic. The north shore apparently did not suffer from the fact that last fall no government boat could make the usual trip with provisions.
