One Hundred and Fifty Insurgents Killed at Sarovitch.

TURKS SURROUND KRUSHEVO

Severe Fighting in Progress in Many Parts of the Balkans Albanians On the Warpath.

Constantinople, Aug. 12.—One hundred and fifty revolutionists were killed, according to official Turkish reports, in the fighting at Sorovitch on Aug. 9. The same dispatches, which A Magnificent Struggle Between have been communicated to the Russian and Austrina embassies, state that the insurrectionary movement is increasing daily. Hilmi Pasha, in spector-general of the Sultan's Macedonian reforms, reports that the young men in all the Bulgarian villages are fleeing to the mountains to join the insurgent bands. Many among the Bulgarian peasantry wished to remain neutral, but were compelled by threats to help the revolutionary

committees. IRISH MEASURE PASSES THE LORDS

Will Now Be Sent Back to the House of Commons.

EXPECT IT TO BE ACCEPTED

Despite Certain Amendments of the Landlords Adopted by the Peers.

London, Aug. 12. - The House of Lords has passed the Irish land bill, which now goes back to the House of Commons for the consideration of the amendments added in the upper house. One of the most important amendment was added at the instance of the Irish landlords. It increases the provision made for their legal expenses out of the British exchequer. The amendments will undoubtedly be adopted by the House of Commons. Prior to the third reading of the bill, the Duke of Devonshire said that while he was unable to forecast the ac-

tion of the House of Commons on landlord's amendments adopted by the House of Lords, he was confident that the position of the Government in the lower house would not be altogether irreconcilable.

Lord Aberdeen, on behalf of the landlords, thanked the duke for his courteous reception of the amendments, and said he believed the bill would benefit the whole of Ireland. He trusted that the amendments would be received by the House of Commons in the same spirit as they had been passed by the Lords.

London, Aug. 12.-The correspondent of the Morning Post, writing from Canada, says that the chief towns of the St. Lawrence valley still depend on American cablegrams for their news of the mother country. They are colored to suit the taste of the Americans. He hopes that the press will be able to accept the offer of the Canadian Government in the direction of a subsidy. The Canadian press, he continues, is much less like the American that like the English in its tone. "The best class of her citizens enters her political life. The Canadians look down on the Americans as being inferior in staying power. Their mood today is not one of imitation, but of A special Canadian correspondent of the Morning Post declares that Can-

adians, in spite of being long exposed at short range to Yankee influence, are in no way Americanized. He declares that a strong British sentiment exists throughout old and new Canada and says the pure Britishness at Montreal seemed to him almost incredible. The larger conception of a railway from ocean to ocean belongs to the Government, not to the promoters of the new line. The Government must be held responsible for the prolongation from the region of North Bay to Quebec, and Moncton. From the point of view of the Grand Trunk, this extension was not called for. But the Government feared that if it was not built, traffic to and from the Atlantic seaboard would go through American ports, particularly Portland, Me., the Grand Trunk's eastern terminus. Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues, excepting Mr. Blair, took the grounds that the diversion of this traffic to Canadian ports through Canadian channels was a great national object, to be attained if possible. It was an advantage to the country, for which the country should be willing to pay a price. 
