Fall Wheat Crop Badly Damaged by Severe Winter.

GROUND MUST BE REPLOWED

The Recent Big Snowstorm Proved To Be an Angel in Disguise to the Farmer.

Toronto, April 18.-The following reports have been received from correwheat throughout the Province, and of small fruits and fruit trees. The reports are generally optimistic, but in some counties, more particularly Kent and Brant, much of the land devoted to fall wheat will have to plowed up, the crop being a failure. The general condition, however, i probably decidedly better than in the United States, where the fall wheat is far below the average.

FALL WHEAT IN OXFORD.

Woodstock, April 18. - On the whole, the wheat in this district has come through the winter well. The only places where it has suffered have been on heavy land, where it was affected by recent severe frosts. The deep snow which lasted throughout the winter, afforded ample protection, though the high banks along some of the fences smothered the plants to some extent. The recent extraordinary snowfall of a foot and a half will not, it is believed, hurt the crop, but will tend to improve it, as the wheat will be protected from the injurious effect of warm sunshine in the day and frosts at night. This alternate freezing and thawing tends to expose the roots. Up to the present there has been little germination. If the snow disappears slowly and no trying weather follows the plant, it is thought, will get an excel-

It is true, too, that the jailer's place is not only not in the jail as a rule, but in his office, and not always, nor nearly always, even in his office. He has many duties away from the jail. Provisions and other supplies have to be daily selected, and ordered by the jailer. He has almost daily official business with the sheriff and other county officials; and the law allows him periods of twelve hours' absence at a time. He must live and eat and sleep like other men. Four years ago when the Legation was established in Berlin there came with the minister from the Far East a youth of eighteen who spoke German with great fluency. This accomplishment and the facility with which he conformed to his new surroundings quickly made young Hyensik Hong

popular in Berlin society. He became a great favorite with the vomen, whom he used to dazzle with the splendor of his Korean uniform. Then came a time when his interest in the fair sex lost its general character He fell in love with one woman, the secret of whose identity he guarded to secure his wife, the Harts left the closely. She must have been fond of the name Hans, for one day Hong discarded his good Korean name of Hynsik and adopted the German abbrev

iation of St. John.

But Hans Hong's happiness did not last long. Of late he had begun to look sad and dejected. His friends at first ascribed it to love trouble, but the young diplomatist succeeded in convincing them that he was only worrying about the fate of his country. On the morning of the suicide Hong appeared at the legation in Meinecke Strasse in a handsome new suit. ## LOST HIS BRIDE THROUGH DEBTS

Hungarian Noble Falls Into Money Lenders' Hands.

Tacacs wanted to follow them, and having no ready cash signed bills for \$60,000, for which he obtained from a Vienna broker \$4,000. In Moscow he met Charlotta by stealth.

One day Mr. Hart met him in the street and with his wife and daughter he immediately left Moscow. Charlotta found time to send the word "Paris" to her lover. Of course, he followed again, and in Paris his wooing became so very pressing that Charlotta wrote him that if he would get everything ready for a secret wedding in England she would run away and meet him

Tacacs' answer from London tha everything was in readiness for the wedding fell into Miss Hart's mother's hands, and she persuaded her husband to give up resistance and telegraph for racacs. THE FIRE DEPARTMENT. To the Editor of The Advertiser: When our city council went to a neighboring city in quest of a capable chief for our fire department, and brought back Mr. Clark from Hamilton, we assumed that they failed to find a man on the home force capable of taking the place of our late Chief Roe.

The principle involved in the new chief's first ruling that has been brought to the public notice, in the broken wagontongue, which he has charged up to Fireman Robinson, is a precedent that appears new in the rules of our fire department, and from the report in your Saturday evening's paper, under the heading of "Discipline," etc., arises the question as to whether he is really in touch with his first duty as fire chief.

It is surely not in imposing expense accounts for breakage, due to the indifferent performance of duty on the part of incapable and careless subording. ates, and still retaining them in office, nor yet in charging up to employes any damage done to equipment during the honest performance of duty.

Like himself, they are paid by this city to give their best service to our fire protection, and as chief it is his duty to recommend the maintenance of an efficient staff for that protection, or the removal of any whose ability and judg-ment, in his opinion, is not up to the

recessary standard.

The wisdom, however, on the part of some of our aldermen in withholding supreme power (as was suggested some time ago) from the hands of the chief of our fire department, in the matter of "Discipline," is already becoming apparent. Assume for a moment that the wagon Assume for a moment that the wagon was destroyed and the horses killed in the accident, would Chief Clark have possessed himself of the man's home, if he is so fortunate as to possess one, and turned it over to Mayor Beck and the council in part revenues for renairs? If such a precedent is to be established by our new chief, then what will be the salaries that it will be necessary to pay to secure capable men to drive our fire fighting outfits in the future? It may be a question as to whether our drivers be a question as to whether our drivers. do not at times drive too fast for safety more danger than protection affording more dan in the extra speed.

Accidents, however, will happen, both going to and at fires; costing not only wagon tongues, but valuable lives, in which no one is considered blameworthy. though the accident may be caused by an error in judgment.




