Trinidad, Col., April 23.—As the result of a dust explosion in a mine of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Co., 40 miles west of Trinidad, yesterday, 22 miners are known to be dead and one is missing.

There were 40 men in the mine at the time of the explosion. Seventeen miners who were working 700 feet from the entrance escaped through another opening. The explosion occurred in rooms 3 and 4 near the main entrance, and was the result of a windy shot which ignited the dust. An order for 22 coffins has been received by a local undertaker here. Many bodies were taken out during the afternoon. The mine was not badly damaged and work can be resumed in a couple of days.

The mine employed 180 men. Mines from adjacent camps are assisting the rescuers. General Superintendent Robert, O'Neil left here at noon and is directing the rescue. Among the dead is James E. Reed, fire boss. Most of the others are Italians and Japanese.



TROPICAL VERDURE.

Pelee's Scars Are Covered and Green Bushes Now Hide Havoc Wrought by the St. Pierre Disaster.

by the St. Pierre Disaster.

When on a May morning four years ago an expedition which had been hurried to the scene of the St. Pierre (Martindue) disaster brought the ruins into view, there was so much of utter desolation, such drifts of scoria and volcanic ash over all of the seared and blasted region that the generally expressed opinion was that never a green thing could ever grow there again. The writer, (special correspondent New York Herald), who was a member of that first expedition, has been afforded an opportunity of visiting the ruins again. And such marvels has this tropical nature wrought throughout these last four years! Greenness everywhere save on the slopes of Pelee itself and in the deep swales and elevations of that lava river whose turbulent brown billows look as though they had been suddenly stilled when in the moment of their most violent action. of their most violent action

Over the gray walls green things have crept, bushes—some of them twenty and thirty feet in height—have sprung up in such rank profusion as to make difficult a passage through them,

and which Pelee within a few moments converted into a cemetery of thirty thousand dead.

It was six o'clock on a breezy, cloudless morning when the little party of investigations and the control of the vestigators set out from Fort de France in the small coastal steamer which plies between Fort de France and the village of Carbet located – a short distance to the westward of the ruins. The tiny craft goes no further than Carbet, and those who wish to

visit the ruins must find some other means of completing the journey. To this end the surf boat of an American trading vessel was obtained, and the services of two brawny natives were engaged. It is but a thirte mile run to Carbet, and by nine o'clock the ruins were reached. The boatmen ran the boat well up on the silent beach, hampers were car-

on the silent beach, hampers were carried ashore, a rank undergrowth was cleared from a space at the base of an lyy covered wall and in the shadow of the green garlanded ruin the breakfast for the party was spread.

This disposed of, the party hoisted umbrellas, for the sun was beating flercely down, and in single file threaded its way through the dense growth to what was once the Rue Victor Hugo, the principal business street of the town, but what is now but a sunken roadway, edged about with grass roadway, edged about with grass grown walls.

A little distance and all that was left of the old cathedral came into view. Here, too, the vines and creepers had done their work of grace, and all the lower parts of the still standing walls are robed in flowers and verdure.

Aside from this omnipresent green Aside from this omnipresent green drapery and the sad gray walls which the rising green sea has not yet inundated, there is little in St. Pierre to attract the attention of the occasional sightseer and still less for the casual seeker of relics.

There are, of course, thousands of such relics to be had, but by reason of the dense growth and the thick matting of weeds and grass, these are effectually hidden from those who for a day roam aimlessly about the ruins of the buried city.

roam aimlessly about the ruins of the buried city.

The ground was long ago pretty thoroughly scratched over and from time to time some valuable relics have come to hand. Professor Helprin, he who recently made the ascent to the crater of Pelee, told me that he had been so fortunate as to obtain from a native a bronze bust of the first Napoleon, taken from the ruins, and which he says is the finest bust of the little Corsican that he ever saw.



How to Measure the Distance From Which It Is Reflected.

There is scarcely anything in nature that exerts the fascination over every one alike than does an echo, and common as it may become there is always a feeling of mystery about it that holds us as with a charm. Of course we all know that it is merely the reflection of a sound from some object, as the side of a house or a rock or a hill, but often we cannot tell how far away the object is that causes it. Here is a way

Holding a watch in your hand, shout a single syllable, as "Ho!" or "Ha!" and count the number of seconds from the time you shout till the sound comes back to you. Now, sound travels at the rate of 1,125 feet a second, so the number of seconds that elapse multiplied by 1,125 will give the distance in feet traveled by the voice in going to the object and back to you again, and one-half of that number will be the number of feet away that object is. Of course the object may be only a few hundred feet away, in which case the sound will come back in less than a second, but you may determine the distance, nevertheless, by calling a single syllable—"Ha!"—and calling it again as you hear the echo, not before again as you hear the echo, not before

or after it, but just with it. With a little practice you can do this. Repeat the call ten or twelve times, counting the seconds between the first call and the last echo. Suppose, for example, that the time is seven sec-onds and that you called the syllable ten times. Then each echo took seven tenths of a second, and the distance, found in the same way as before, is about 304 feet.-Exchange.

Put these ingredients together and place them where there is a moderate heat. Leave them for several days, shaking them occasionally. When nearly dissolved add three ounces of the best seed lac in rough powder. Let this stand until the lac is all dissolved, shaking it frequently. If the color is to be a bright yellow, use less annotto; if a deep orange, use more. Put the mix-ture on while warm. Apply with a brush as one would use paint. The number of coats depends entirely upon the article and the purpose for which it is used. For blue lacquer add prussian or aniline blue to white shellad varnish made very thin. In making acquer take great care not to use too much seed lac, as the mixture is likely to dry unevenly or in streaks.
