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Regulations for the Port of Quebec,

Extracted from an Ordinance of this Province, paffed the 30th. day of April, 1788.

XVII.

ND whereas for the fecurity of veffels in the harbour of Quebec, and to prevent accidents by fire, the following regulations are highly neceflary, be it therefore enacted, and it is hereby enacted by the authority aforefaid, That the mafters of all fhips or veffels that caft anchor before Quebec, and lay more than two tides without being moored, if the weather permit, caufing damage by fuch neglect to any other fhip or veffel in the harbour, fhall fuftain and pay the faid damage.

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- XVIII. That if any mafter of a veflel shall lay at any wharf or quay, or ground in the harbour of Quebec, with more than one pound of gun-powder on board, he shall incur a penalty of twenty pounds for every such offence.
- XIX. That if any mafter of a veffel throw overboard or caufe to be thrown overboard in the harbour of Quebec any ftone ballaft, he shall incur a penalty of five pounds for every such offence.
- XX. That if any mafter of a veffel or any perfon whatfoever, caule any veffel to be graved in the *Gul-de-Suc*, or at any wharf or quay in Quebec, and there make or caufe fire to be made for heating pitch, tar, turpentine, oil, or tallow, he shall incur a penalty of ten pounds for every such offence.
- XXI. That the mafter of every fhip or vefiel lying at anchor in the River before Quebec in dark nights, fhall fhew a light at the bowiprit-end, under the penalty of ten fhillings.
- XXII. That if any mafter of a veilel shall lay his vessel in the Cul-de-Sac, otherwise than with her head to the Shore and stern to the River, with an anchor laid down below the reef of rocks, or throw ballast of any kind overboard in the Cul-de-Sac, he shall incur a penalty of ten shillings, and be obliged to remove the same.
- XXIII. And all the fines and forfeitures by this ordinance imposed, may be fued for and recovered before any two of his Majesty's Justices of the Peace, on the oath of one or more credible witness, one half to be paid to the perfon who shall suffer the fame, the other half to the Receiver-general for his Majesty's use and the support of the Government, to be by him accounted for to the Lords Commissioners of his Majesty's Treasury, and audited by the Auditor-general of the Plantations or his Deputy. And it shall be the duty of the Captain of the Port and Superintendant of Pilots to see this ordinance carried into execution, under the penalty of twenty solutions for every wilful neglect, to be recovered and applied as aforelaid.
- XXIV. Provided nevertheless that nothing in this ordinance to the contrary notwithstanding, shall extend, or be construed to extend to any of his. Majesty's ships of war, that may come into or be stationed in the River St. Lawrence or harbour of Quebec.

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caufing damage by fuch neglect to any other ship or vessel in the harbour, shall suftain and pay the said damage.

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
