"An alleged discovery of Gold in American Territory near Vermilion Lake, in the Lake Superior District, has created considerable excitement at St. Paul. The gold is in quartz and slate rocks, which it is expected by some new process will be easily washed without machinery. It is said that the gold-bearing rocks across the country will be found in the Company's Territory near Lac La Pluic. I have no means of deciding how much credit is to be given to the accounts, but there is no doubt some truth in them, though I dare say speculators will make the most of it."

SIR,-I am directed by Mr. Secretary Cardwell to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 6th inst., enclosing a copy of one addressed to you by Mr. McEwen, enquiring if the Hudson's Bay Company are willing to dispose of such portion of their Territory as is capable of cultivation to a party of Anglo-American capitalists.

You also enclose a copy of the reply which the Company have returned to this enquiry. Having regard to the reference you have made in your letter to the probable concurrence of Her Majesty's Government in the establishment of some new government, Mr. Cardwell is desirous of reminding you that at the conferences which took place during last summer, between the Canadian Ministers and certain Members of Her Majesty's Government, the Provincial Ministers expressed their desire that the North Western Territory should be made over to Canada, and they undertook to negotiate with the Hudson's Bay Company for the termination of their rights, on condition that the indemnity, if any, should be paid by a loan to be raised by Canada under the Imperial guarantee. To this proposal, Her Majesty's Ministers assented, engaging that if the negotiation should be successful, they, on the part of the Crown, being satisfied that the amount of the indemnity was reasonable, and the security sufficient, would apply to the Imperial Parliament to sanction the arrangement, and guarantee the amount ..

Until this engagement shall have been disposed of, it will be necessary for Her Majesty's Government to keep it in view in any steps which they may be called upon to take in the matter.

HUDSON'S BAY HOUSE, London, March 1st, 1866.

SIR.—I have the honour to acknowledge your letter of the 20th instant.

I beg to assure the Secretary of State that the Committee of the Hudson's Bay Company have never lost sight of the fact, that an arrangement for transferring their rights to Canada was contemplated as possible, although no action or engagement has been yet taken on the part of the Company, except so far as to express a readiness to

consider any offer which may be made.

The letter to Mr. McEwen intended only to say that the Company would be ready to exercise its lawful powers for the protection of Colonists, and the organization of a settlement in their territory. If those powers shall have been previously purchased by Canada, or assumed by Her Majesty's Government their exercise will not be needed, because there will then be another government in existence. If such powers were still in the hands of the Company, the Committee ventures to think that the Right Honorable the Secretary of State would probably concur in any lawful exercise of them which might be necessary for the good of settlers.

Irrespective of any question of the Government of the Territory, the Committee presume that they are at the present time in nowise hampered in the disposal of their private property in lands by sale. At the same time I would venture most respectfully to enquire for how long a period the option, if it may be so called, which has been given to Canada, is supposed

to remain open.

On the 29th June, 1865, I assured the Secretary of State of our readiness to consider any offer made in pursuance of the agreement between Her Majesty's Government and the Canadian Deputation. Since that time, so far as the Committee know, the only step taken has been the publication of a report made to the Governor General of Canada, by one of the deputation, in which, as it appears to the Committee, the rights of the Company are disputed,

and the value of its property systematically depreciated.

If indeed the action of the Company with reference to its rights of private property (as distinguished from its rights of government), is in any degree fettered or suspended by the existence of the agreement of Her Majesty's Government with that of Canada, the question of delay, and the possibility of losing a favourable opportunity for sales may become a very grave one in a pecuniary point of view. This is more especially the case, because in the agreement the words "if any" are expressly inserted in connection with the proposed compensation.

So far therefore as that agreement is concerned, the Company, after all, may be be held entitled to no compensation for their rights, public or private. It is difficult to see how a stipulation of this very contingent character not entered into by the Company themselves can, with any fairness, be considered as interfering with its right to deal with its own pro-

It is scarcely necessary for me to say, that the final acceptance of any offer made by Canada or by any other party, would depend, not on the Committee, but on the body of

shareholders to whom that property belongs.

To the Right Hon. Ed. Cardwell, M.P., Secretary of State for Her Majesty's Colonies.

1. The enclosed copies of letters, which the undersigned have the honor of bringing under Your Excellency's notice, will explain to you the reasons for our addressing you as Minister for the Colonies.

2. For a short time we beg to occupy your attention with our affairs, connected with those of the Hudson's Bay Company, as we hold retired interests in their business, as Chief Factors of the Fur Trade, in which employment all the best portion of our lives

have been spent.

- 3. That the trusts committed to the gentlemen of the Fur Trade have been well and faithfully fulfilled, we have only to refer you to the declared testimony of every person of repute who has ever passed through the Indian country of North America; and more particularly to the evidence given before the Committee of the House of Commons, appointed to investigate the affairs of the Hudson's Bay Company in the year 1857. It will appear, by the report of the proceedings of that Committee, of which the present Prime Minister and the present Chancellor of the Exchequer, were members, that the unvaried evidence of such men as Colonel Lefroy, R.A., Colonel J. T. Crofton, and the late Sir John Richardson, (all serving under Her Majesty's Government) went to show that the Fur Traders were a most deserving class of Her Majesty's subjects. They were, also, by Governor Sir George Simpson's evidence, considered "Partners" in the Hudson's Bay concern.
 - 4. The Fur Trading Body, besides under the name of the North-West Company, had

explored and settled posts in all the central, northern and western portions of the Fur countries, thus bringing them under British sway; and the present Fur Trade, with your petitioners lately retired from its active duties, have held the same country in peace and good management ever since they entered into the charge left to them by their predecessors; for all which they are ready to meet any scrutiny that may be required by Her

Majesty's Government or the Legislature of the Realm.

5. In the present state of selling and change of the Hudson's Bay Company's affairs, we consider it required by justice, likely to prevent further evil, and tending towards a wiser and impartial course to place our interests under the immediate protection of Her Majesty's Government, we feel assured that better consideration will be had from it than The old Company sold their "Perpetual Succesfrom any board in Fenchurch Street. sion," and us along with it suddenly, and without previous notice to the Governor of the Territories or to the Trade, and by that act introduced a most disturbed state of feeling and business. General distress arose from the breach of the long-acknowledged understanding of the relations subsisting between the Company in London and the Trading Body on this side. The latter was treated as menials who could be transferred, wholesale, without explanation or notice, to different concerns, seeking objects not before contemplated in the business, objects likely to affect the Fur Traders more than any shareholders at home. Yet the home shareholders were given the opportunity of retiring with a high premium, while the Trade was forced to chew the cud in silence under the new order of things.

6. We would have apprised the late Duke of Newcastle of this danger, but a letter of assurance from the old Board, of which copy is herewith enclosed, lulled us into security, and enabled that concern to compass its purpose without representation on our part. Thus not one word of objection, as far as we can learn, reached the ears of the Duke. Her Majesty's Government we believe would most willingly, as it could most easily, have seen that our representations were attended to. Unfortunately for us, the Secretary for

the Colonies was prevented from gaining any information except from one source.

7. After the unexpected result of the transfer, we were in expectation that through Governor Dallas, the representative of the Company, and the sub-representative of Royalty in the Indian Countries, we should have obtained a settlement with the new concern, but Your Excellency will perceive by the enclosed correspondence that these, our well-grounded hopes have failed, and that Governor Dallas' suggestions were disregarded by the present board. His knowledge of the country, and intimate acquaintance with the relations that existed between the Fur Trade and the Company will, we trust, have proper weight

with Her Majesty's Government, and render his suggestions available to us.

8. Observing that the present shareholders are again seeking purchasers for their perpetual succession charter, government and trade, and that one of their number, in a late pamphlet, declares that they are "entitled to look for the highest bidder, whether British, Canadian, American, or Russian;" we, your petitioners, humbly enter our protest to Her Majesty's Government against such principles. We have full confidence in the disposition of Government to listen to our claims, seeing that our feelings and interests are concerned in the fate of the interior of this country. We are bound in honor and allegiance to resist the ideas and action of the shareholders, thus fully developed; and are constrained, also, to defend ourselves against the crushing, disloyal, and aggressive system secretly operating against us and the welfare of the State.

9. By the report of the last general meeting of the Hudson's Bay Board and Company, we learn that Sir Edmund Head informed the shareholders that their affairs were before Government. In this state of matters, we have additional reason for supposing that Her Majesty's advisers will approve of our furnishing them with information regarding the claims and position of all parties in the Indian country. Full knowledge on these points cannot fail to be of benefit in adjusting thoroughly and properly the difficulties that have

thickened around the policy of protecting exclusive rights and institutions.

Government now sees that protected privileges are become a matter of reckless and unprincipled speculation. We seek not to sell British territory, which we have so long cared for, to either Americans or Russians; but we seek fair hearing and fair play, which

are much more consonant with British honor, the name of our country, and the interests of our beloved Queen's Empire.

1. Letter from Retired Chief Factors of the Fur Trade to the Governor, Deputy Governor, and Committee of Hudson's Bay Company.

MONTREAL, 28th January, 1863.

GENTLEMEN,—Rumours, assuming daily more consistency and the appearance of being founded on facts, have reached us that negotiations are pending between the Imperial Government and the Hudson's Bay Company, for the surrender of the chartered rights of the Company, with a view to the opening up of their territory for settlement. Those negotiations, it is reported, have proceeded so far, that it is only now a question of the amount of indemnity to be paid for the surrender.

The Fur Trade in which we are partners, is based on the Charter, its surrender would, by leading to the loss of that trade, seriously affect our pecuniary interests. We, therefore, trust you will pardon the anxiety we feel to learn whether, in the reported negotiations, the claims of the wintering partners in the concern have received that consideration to

which we consider they are justly entitled.

Our interests are at present left unrepresented, but we may find it desirable to make arrangements for supplying that defect. In the meantime, we shall be glad to receive from you, at your early convenience, such information on these important matters, as you feel at liberty to communicate.

GENTLEMEN,—I am directed by the Governor and Committee to acknowledge the receipt of a Memorial (forwarded through Mr. Chief Factor Barnston), dated Montreal,

28th January, 1863, under date 7th February.

In reply, I have to state that communications have passed between the Company and Her Majesty's Secretary of State for the Colonies, on the subject of the surrender of the whole, or a part, of the lands held under the Charter; but that it is utterly at variance with the facts of the case, that "the only question remaining unsettled is the amount of indemnity to be paid for the surrender." On the contrary, the Governor and Committee have reason to believe that Her Majesty's Government have no intention of preferring any vote in Parliament for such a purpose.

The Governor and Committee are at a loss to conceive how the interests of the Com-

missioned Officers of the Company can be considered as unrepresented, and I am directed to express their surprise that such a statement should have emanated from gentlemen who have so long been connected with the service; and who ought to be satisfied that now, as ever, the Governor and Committee consider themselves equally bound to protect the interests of the Fur Trade as those of the proprietors.

The Chief Factors and Traders, whether on the active or retired list, may rest assured that should any surrender of the Charter be made, of which at present there is not the least probability, their interests will be at least as carefully protected by the Governor and Committee as they could be by any arrangements such as are shadowed forth in

the Memorial.

In all the communications with the Colonial office, in the evidence before the Committee of the House of Commons, and in any declaration made in the two Houses of Parliament by any friends of the Company, it has been invariably stated that should the Company surrender their Chartered Rights they would expect compensation for the officers and servants as well as to the proprietors.

Under these circumstances, the Governor and Committee while admitting the right of the memorialists to make enquires as to regulations supposed to affect their pecuniary interests, cannot refrain from expressing their regret that in the present instance they should have affixed their name to this document upon anything so unreliable as mere

newspaper reports.

Mr. Miles to Mr. Dallas.

Brockville, 14th August, 1867, Sir,—I am in receipt of my account current from the Hudson's Bay House of date 1st June last, and am somewhat surprised at not receiving therewith any communication respecting the proposition made by you when in Brockville two years ago, in your capacity of Governor in Chief of the territories and settlements of the Hudson's Bay Company, for the final settlement by them with the retired officers of the Company, which by you at that period was thought desirable, from the various changes that would and must occur under the new arrangements of the concern. The proposition agreed upon and accepted by us to be made was on a last ten year's average of the $\frac{1}{5}$ th dividends of the concern, which, commencing with the outfit 1853 and ending with the outfit 1862, give £426 5s. $6\frac{7}{2}$ 0d. The transfer of the Company took place in 1863, and whether you wait for the completion of that outfit to commence with outfit 1854 and end with the outfit 1863, by the tenor of the first dividend of 1863, and taking into consideration the returns which must have remained in the south from the loss of the ships, the result cannot vary much from this statement, viz.:

I therefore, as also do those of the undersigned retired officers, who have requested me to write to you thereon, wish to know, without reserve, if the Company close with us on these terms.

When the country on the west side of the mountains was claimed under Treaty by the American Government, the Northern and Southern Councils were advertised by our departed late friend, Governor Sir George Simpson, that a claim of one million pounds sterling would be made on that Government for the possessory rights acknowledged by Treaty, and that the proportion thereof would accrue to the commissioned officers conformable to their interests. We now see that the claims of British Companies on the American Government have been awarded as follows:—To the Bay Company \$4,000,000, and the Puget's Sound Agricultural Company \$1,100,000. We therefore beg to submit that our claim on the former is not cancelled by the transfer of the old Company to its

present possessors.

In reference to the affairs of the Puget's Sound Agricultural, those of us who held stock in that concern, and from its commencement only received two small dividends, rested satisfied that the agents then appointed by us, or their successors, would see us righted under whatever settlement the United States Government would make. When the Secretary of the Company asked us to dispose of our shares at par without interest, we think he should at the same time not have kept us in utter ignorance of the claims that would be submitted to the American Government therefor; and we are surprised we should have been treated in this ambiguous manner, after the solicitude held out by the Company to the officers of the Company at the period of its formation, of which I have copies in my possession. The Secretary of the Company, however, has now our stamped receipts, which deprives us of further claim, but which, at the same time, we look upon as a most illiberal transaction by the individuals that took this ungenerous advantage of our position.

The late Directors were very indignant (vide their letter of the 27th February, 1863,) that the retired officers should have even considered them unmindful of their interests, and even went so far as to tell us that there was no idea of a transfer of the concern being made; how these assertions have been verified the present Company can tell.

You are still, Sir, connected with the Company, and I await an early reply.

"Resolved, That the Governor and Committee decline to entertain the request of the gentlemen who sign this letter—no authority whatever was given to make any offer or proposal such as is recited by them—that at the time when the Governor and Committee offered to purchase the Puget's Sound shares referred to in their letter, no fresh action whatever had been taken by them with reference to the claim of the United States Go-

vernment. The offer was made in perfect fairness and good faith, and was accepted voluntarily by the parties concerned."

Whereas the co-partnership created by the Indenture of the 26th day of March, 1821, was thereby agreed to be continued for a term of 21 years, to end with the returns of the cutfit 1841, has been some years passed dissolved (save and except so far as related to the 40 shares appointed by a deed poll of the same date, and hereinafter referred to), and the whole of the partnership, effects and concern are and have for some time centered wholly in the Governor and Company of Adventurers of England trading into Hudson's Bay, and the trade and concern thereof has been and still is carried on by them exclusively and for their own benefit, save and except, and without prejudice to the rights and interests of the persons entitled to the 40 shares under the said deed poll; and whereas it is deemed expedient that the said trade and concern shall be continued for an unlimited period.

Copy of a Report of a Committee of the Honorable the Executive Council, approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the 22nd day of June, 1866.

The Committee of the Executive Council have given their careful consideration to the Despatches of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, bearing date the 24th February and 3rd March last, relative to a proposal made to the Hudson's Bay Company by a party of Anglo-American Capitalists, for the purchase "of such portion of the territory claimed by the Company, as may be capable of cultivation;" and they have the honor to submit to Your Excellency the following remarks on the subject:—

In the first place the Committee do not admit that the Company have a legal title to that portion of the North Western Territory which is fit for cultivation and settlement.

This fertile tract is a belt of land stretching along the Northern Frontier of the United States to the base of the Rocky Mountains, and Canada has always disputed the title of the Company to it.

Even if it be admitted that the Charter of 1670, recognized as it has been by several

Imperial Statutes, gives to the Company a freehold right in the soil in Rupert's Land, Canada contends that the cultivable tract in question forms no part of that land.

It is not now necessary to repeat the grounds on which this opinion is founded, as they have been already more than once submitted to Her Majesty's Government, and it is only alluded to lest silence on the subject might be assumed as an acquiescence on the part of Canada in the right of the Company to sell. Assuming, however, that such right exists, the Committee see grave objections to the proposition of Mr. McEwan being enter-Canadian experience has shown that sales of large tracts of land to individuals, or Commercial Corporations, have operated prejudicially to the best interests of the Province and retarded rather than promoted its settlement and progress. Companies or individuals purchasing for the purpose of speculation, are governed solely by the one view of obtaining a profitable return of the money invested in the purchase. All other considerations are set aside. No general or comprehensive system of settlement is or can be established. best tracts are withheld from settlement in order that their value may be increased by the improvement of the surrounding country, and by the labor of the settlers, and the price paid to the Company for the lands, instead of being expended in the opening up of roads and in developing the resources of the country, is divided among a number of non-resident shareholders having no interest in the prosperity of the country further than as such prosperity contributes to the value of their shares.

In the correspondence which took place in 1863 and 1864 between the Hudson's Bay Company and the Colonial Office, with reference to the introduction of the direct authority of Her Majesty's Government in Rupert's Land, it appears that the Company proposed as a condition of their assenting to the erection of a Crown Colony, that they should retain the ownership, in fee simple, of one-half of the lands of the Colony. This proposition was rejected by the Duke of Newcastle, in language which appears to the Committee to be

conclusive.

"In an unsettled Colony there is no effectual mode of taxation for purposes of Government and improvement, and the whole progress of the Colony depends on the liberal and prudent disposal of its land. These considerations afford decisive reasons against leaving that land in the possession of a Corporation. And I am to observe that these objections, conclusive in any case, are greatly enhanced in the case of the Hudson's Bay Company, as I learn from your letter that it has been 'the unvarying opinion' of the Committee on whose behalf you speak that the Company would 'lose fully as much as

they would gain, by the increase of settlement in the chartered Territory."

It is therefore, to say the least, a question whether the Company would not be under a direct inducement to use their proprietory rights to thwart the colonizing efforts of the Government. The conclusive objection to the scheme is that it would reproduce in a gigantic shape the inconveniences which, on a far smaller scale, were found intolerable in Canada. It is evident as a matter of reasoning, and notorious as a matter of fact, that the interposition of large blocks of property between tracts or districts of Crown Land must obstruct the opening up of those districts, unless it fortunately happens that the private proprietor is ready to expend money pari passu with the Government in the construction of roads and other improvements, and to conform his land policy to that of the authorities. It is also clear that Colonists of the Anglo-Saxon race look upon the Land Revenue as legitimately belonging to the community, and that the diversion of half or more than half of that revenue to the purpose of increasing the dividends of a private corporation would cause a continual and growing discontent, which could not be allayed by any abstract argument of right, and the full force of which the Government would be expected by the Company to sustain. His Grace cannot consent to make himself responsible for these consequences, and he is therefore obliged to treat as inadmissible any proposal for the proprictory partition of those territories which may be placed under the Government of the Crown."

If such objections exist to the tenure of large tracts of land by so ancient and responsible a Corporation as the Hudson's Bay Company, with large powers of Government, and a political as well as a Commercial Status, with how much greater pressure must they weigh against the transfer of such tracts to a private association of speculators.

The Committee are further of opinion that before any steps are taken to introduce a

large body of settlers into that country, provision should be made for the efficient admin-

istration of the Government there.

So long as the great North-West is only occupied by the Hudson's Bay Company's servants, and by the few scattered settlers at Fort Garry, the system of government now obtaining there may work sufficiently well, but whenever a large population shall settle in the country there is to be feared that the Company's power will be altogether insufficient to preserve order and good government, and that its authority will be set at naught.

It is evident that the old policy of exclusion of strangers from the Territory must

shortly be at an end.

The neighbouring territories belonging to the United States are fast being settled up to the boundary line, and if the statements as to the existence of gold in the Valley of Saskatchewan be at all verified, there will, ere long, be an influx of population which no power that can be exerted by the Hudson's Bay Company can either resist or control. This population will mainly come from the United States, and although there may be a good many of Her Majesty's subjects among them, by far the greater portion will be aliens, ignorant and regardless of the laws of England, and perhaps hostile to the British Government. They will utterly disregard the authority of the Company, will endeavour to establish a government and tribunals of their own, and as similar bodies have done elsewhere on this continent, assert their political independence.

Such a community would sever the British North American possessions in twain, and be the means of retarding, if not altogether preventing, the formation of a Railway

connecting the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans.

The future interests of Canada and all British North America are, therefore, vitally concerned in the immediate establishment of a strong Government there, and in its settle-

ment as a part of the British Colonial System.

Impressed with this conviction, Canada would ere this have opened negotiations with the Hudson's Bay Company for the extinction of their claims, had it not been for the prospect of her speedy absorption in the proposed Union of the British North American Colonies. It would obviously have been improper for the Canadian Government to commence negotiations which they could not hope to complete, or to enter into engagements, the fulfilment of which must fall on the whole Confederated Provinces. At the same time, the Committee beg leave to observe, that if the Company had thought proper to submit for consideration formal proposals for the transfer of their claims, the final settlement of the question would have been greatly advanced.

Recent events serve to shew that in a few months that Union will be effected, and the Committee have no doubt that the Confederate Government and Legislature will feel it to be one of their first duties to open negotiations with the Hudson's Bay Company, for the transfer of their claims to the territory. Meanwhile Canada invites the aid of Her Majesty's Government, in discountenancing and preventing any such sales of any portion

of the territory as is now applied for.

At page 26 the following passage occurs:

"Twenty years later, in 1865, the American territory of Montana adjoins the region which excited the enthusiasm of DeSmet. Its population of 25,000, to be increased during 1866, to 50,000, have been drawn to the sources of the Missouri, by discoveries of gold and silver mines close to the international border, and rumors of gulches and ledges in the Saskatchewan District, yielding even greater prizes to the prospector, are already rife, and will soon precipitate a strong, active and enterprising people into the spacious void What is called the 'Americanization' of the Red River settlements has been slow, although sure, since the era of steam navigation, but the Americanization of the Saskatchewan will rush suddenly and soon from the camps of treasure-seekers in Montana."

You, Sir, are aware of the correspondence which during the last three years has passed between myself as Governor of this Company and the Colonial Mr. Elliot to Office, on the subject of establishing in the Hudson's Bay Territory some Sir E. Head, government administered in the name of Her Majesty. You know also that 27thJune, 186 . Mr. Cardwell decided to offer to Canada, an option of acquiring the rights of Sir E. Head to this Company, and that so far back as the 1st of March last I ventured Mr. Forster, respectfully to ask the question (which has not yet been answered) how March 1st, 1866. long this option was to remain open. Mr. Forster to In a letter addressed to me by Mr. Forster, and dated the 20th February

Sir E. Head, Feb. 20th. 1866. last, we were told :—

"Having regard to the reference you have made in your letter, to the probable concurrence of Her Majesty's Government in the establishment of some new government, Mr. Cardwell is desirous of reminding you, that at the conferences which took place during last summer between the Canadian Ministers and certain Members of Her Majesty's Government, the Provincial Ministers expressed their desire that the North-Western territory should be made over to Canada, and they undertook to negotiate with the Hudson's Bay Company for the termination of their rights, on condition that the indemnity, if any, should be paid by a loan to be raised by Canada, under the Imperial guarantee. To this proposal Her Majesty's Ministers assented, engaging that if the negotiation should be successful, they, on the part of the Crown, being satisfied that the amount of the indemnity was reasonable and the security sufficient, would apply to the Imperial Parliament to sanction the arrangement and guarantee the amount.

"Until this arrangement shall have been disposed of, it will be necessary for Her Majesty's Government to keep it in view in any steps which they may be called upon to

take in the matter."

Under these circumstances, it is clear that the Company thus cautioned, can take no steps of themselves to meet any inroad or immigration within their territory, if it be on their territory that it will first take place—a point to which I shall afterwards revert.

Indeed the powers of the Charter were probably not given to be used for any such purpose, but if they were sufficient for such an emergency, our hands are at the present

moment tied by Mr. Forster's letter.

We think, therefore, that we are the more bound most respectfully to suggest whether, if it is intended to retain the territory north of the 49th parallel as British soil, some steps ought not to be taken for asserting its British character, and maintaining law and order within it.

This may, no doubt, either be effected by the direct action of the English Gov-

ernment, or be attempted by the agency of Canada; but as we understand the latter course to have been deliberately selected, the Committee, (provided this Company are fairly dealt with in the matter of compensation,) can have no right to offer any remarks on the subject.

In the face, however, of the confident predictions and statements contained in this report to the Secretary of the United States Treasury, we should not be justified if we

failed to point out the necessity of speedy action of some kind.

With regard to the particular strip of country where the first overflow of settlers or miners may be expected from the United States territory of Montana, I think it probable that the Hudson's Bay Company have no immediate interest or responsibility connected with it. So far as I can judge from the imperfect maps accessible to us, I believe that on the north of Montana there is a narrow belt running along the 49th parallel, watered by streams, which fall not into Hudson's Bay but into Milk River, a tributary of the Upper Missouri. If this be so, this strip of land though British ground, as being north of the 45th parallel, is not included in the grant made by the Charter of Charles II. to the Hudson's Bay Company.

SIR,—In my letter of July 17th, addressed to you, I observed that the Committee of the Hudson's Bay Company felt themselves bound again to suggest whether, if it is intended to retain the territory north of the 49th parallel as British territory, some steps ought not to be taken for asserting its British character and maintaing law and order within it.

The enclosed extract from recent despatches from the acting Governor of Rupert's Land, Mr. William Mactavish, unfortunately confirms the views already expressed. I ought to add that these inroads of the wilder tribes of Indians are, to a great extent, the result of a new state of things; that is to say, the partial but rapid settlement of new territories south of the 49th parallel, and consequent interference with these savages on the part of the United States troops and settlers.

Extract of Letter from Governor Mactavish to Thomas Fraser, Esq., Secretary, dated
Fort Garry, Red River, 31st July, 1866.

"I regret to have to inform you that events both here and at Saskatchewan of a most serious nature have occurred, a band of Saultaux from Red Lake having set upon and murdered four Sioux of a party who had visited this place, within sight of Fort Garry, and being American Indians, the culprits at once withdrew within the American This created great excitement in the settlement for some time, which has now very much died away, as nothing has been since heard from the Sioux, but will doubtless revive as soon as it is known that a party of them mean to come here. Some of the Indians belonging to the settlement were spectators of the murder and afterwards mutilated the bodies of the murdered. This has excited in the minds of the half-breeds a very strong feeling against the Indians of the settlement, and together with a disposition on the part of the latter to be turbulent may lead to future acts of violence. Indeed, to this I attribute the death of an Indian whose abdomen was cut open by a half-breed within the walls of this fort a few days before my return. The Indian died of the wound and the half-breed is now in gaol awaiting his trial for murder at the August quarterly Court. No attempt has as yet been made to set him free, but many are of opinion that the attempt will yet be made, and in the circumstances in which the Government here is place, will, if made, probably be successful, as for some time past the Government may be said to have existed on sufferance.

"At Fort Pitt, on the Saskatchewan, a band of about 200 Blackfeet came in on a trade in the early part of June, and while they were trading a number of them forced the inner gates and went into the men's houses whence they took the men's property which they wished, there being only five men in the establishment at the time. The Indians, however, did not then take any of the Company's property. On their way off they unfortunately met a small party of the Company's people returning from the plains with meat for the establishment. The Indians fired at the men, took eight horses and everything they wished from the carts; but fortunately all the men made their escape to Fort Pitt. Shortly afterwards, Mr. Donald Macdonald, a Clerk in the Company's service, was fired at and badly wounded, close to Carleton. When I last heard, Mr. Macdonald was doing well, but he has had a very narrow escape, as the ball fired at him ripped his side and passed through the upper part of his arm. No cause is assigned for those acts, but it is feared the Blackfeet have made up their minds to be troublesome and are likely to commit more acts of violence. Mr. Chastellain was to go to the Blackfeet camp and demand the surrender of the horses and property taken at Fort Pitt."

My LORD,—I have taken the liberty of addressing Your Lordship on a subject which has been frequently brought before the notice of the Government, and your predecessors in office, viz.: in part, that of the "Selkirk" or Red River Settlement, in the territory at present known as the "Hudson Bay Territory," and presuming on Your Lordship's familiarity with the immense and attractive resources of the soil and climate of that great valley of Lake Winnipeg—the rivers of which drain an area exceeding 350,000 square miles of rich arable land. It is unnecessary to enter into details.

Being about to proceed, in company with several other Canadian gentlemen of capital, to that territory, with a view to settlement there, and induce a system of immigration, we have deemed it advisable to communicate with Your Lordship for certain information in

consequence of the present peculiar position of that Territory, viz:-

1st. If the Hudson's Bay Company still retain the same power as formerly with

regard to tenure of land, &c.

2nd. The probability of the Crown, at an early date, creating the Territory a Colony of British North America, in order that it may share in the grand Confederation of the

Of the importance of this I would most respectfully refer Your Lordship to the official narrative of the "Canadian Red River, Assiniboine and Saskatchewan Expedition" of '57 and '58, by Professor Hind, published by Longman, Green & Co., London, 1860.

Great as has been the success which has attended the creation of British Columbia into a Crown Colony, I would only humbly observe, that the general opinion of those practically acquainted with the great agricultural resources of that beautiful and extensive country is, that as a Crown Colony its success and prosperity would exceed that of British Columbia, and would be the first step to develope its attractions to the enterprising emigrants of the world, and further secure an everlasting British Empire from the Atlantic to the Pacific.

I have to ask Your Lordship's pardon, for thus encroaching upon your valuable time; the only apology I can offer, is the importance to us of Your Lordship's reply.

MEMORANDUM ON RED RIVER SETTLEMENT.

EXTRACT from a despatch (No. 95) from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Governor General, dated 17th June, 1865.

"On the fourth point, the subject of the North-Western Territory, the Canadian Ministers desired that that territory should be made over to Canada, and undertook to negotiate

with the Hudson's Bay Company for the termination of their rights, on condition that the indemnity (if any) should be paid by a loan, to be raised by Canada under the Imperial guarantee. With the sanction of the Cabinet we assented to this proposal, undertaking that, if the negotiation should be successful, we, on the part of the Crown, being satisfied that the amount of the indemnity was reasonable and the security sufficient, would apply to the Imperial Parliament to sanction the agreement and to guarantee the amount."

1. By this extract it appears that the Canadian Government is willing to negotiate for

the acquirement of the rights of the Hudson's Bay Company, on certain conditions.

2. As Canada negotiates to take over the territory of the Company, under the protectorate of Great Britain, so it is expedient to consider what means the territory has of protecting itself from American encroachment, and what power Canada or Great Britain may have of aiding it to resist such encroachment; and, finally, what probability there is of such encroachment being made.

3. To understand this matter, the position of the Americans nearest the frontier, as

also that of the Hudson Bay settlers at Fort Garry, must be considered.

4. The nearest American post is at St. Paul's, some 430 miles from Pembina, the border British settlement. This latter place is 70 miles from Fort Garry.

American posiThe whole route is open prairie.

The American system of Railways has as yet only extended to La Crosse, about 270 miles from St. Paul's, and as from St. Paul's the advance by settlers towards the frontier is but slow, so it may be some years before a railroad reaches Pembina.

5. The Red River Settlement at Fort Garry, the present capital of the Hudson's Position of Hud- Bay Company's possessions, and their grand entrepot, consists of about son's Bay Co. at 10,000 inhabitants. The men being a race of hardy hunters, well accusfort Garry. tomed to the use of arms and each of them possessing gun or rifle. They are moreover accomplished horsemen.

They are reported to be a semi-barbarous race, but would no doubt fight well against an invading force, and at great advantage, from their habits of life and their knowledge of

the country.

6. The settlement may also at present reckon very largely for its defence on the Indian Allies. assistance of the Indians, who from the faithful dealings of the Company with them, have learned to put faith in the British name, and from this cause, and also from their hatred of the Americans would be trustworthy allies.

This state of things, however, may not last.

At present the Indians are protected from themselves by the prohibition and consequent absence of ardent spirits, except in such small quantities as can be surreptitiously introduced, and unfair dealing on the part of traders is also prevented by the system of

barter rigorously enforced by the Hudson's Bay Company.

But it appears probable, that if the rule of the Company is terminated by the union of its territory to Canada, partial freedom of trade leading to extreme license (with its concomitant evils to the unfortunate Indian) will be introduced, unscrupulous traders will then, soon, by their dishonest dealings, destroy, in the minds of the Indians, that feeling of attachment to England which at present would render them her faithful allies, and thus would lay them open to American seduction. In such case the Red River Settlement would be easily approached by a limited American force.

Routes to Fort Garry. 7. Three routes are at present used to Fort Garry.

1st. From Hudson's Bay at York.

By this route of 700 miles the furs, except Buffalo skins, are sent to England, and through York provisions are brought to supply all the Northern Trapper's Posts, but as this Bay is only open for about six weeks in the year, this port may be reckoned for general trade or defence purposes, useless.

2nd. From the head of Lake Superior, at Pidgeon's Bay.

This is a complete water-course of 700 miles, but so replete with rapids and consequent long portages, and so beset with natural difficulties as to make the construction of a water-communication by this line a matter of much difficulty, and at an expense that would probably be so enermous, as to render the adoption of this route almost out of the question.

The 3rd route is by the beaten track through the Prairies, from Fort Garry to St. Paul's. Its whole length, except the first seventy miles, being through American territory.

By this road, at present, all the buffalo skins are exported.

It may here be remakred, that in case of necessity, Fort Garry can supply itself with

provisions.

8. The result of this examination shows, that in the event of war, as Lake Superior would be held by the United States Navy, Fort Garry is effectually isolated from Canada, and that in any case, until canals or railways are constructed, the United States possess the only channel through which all the trade of the Red River settlement must pass.

9. With regard to the future can the Red River Settlement be released from this dependence on the United States? This question cannot be satisfactorily answered until

the country between Fort Garry and Lake Superior has been well surveyed.

According to what is known at present, water communication appears almost impossible.

One route, that from Pidgeon Bay, has been already discussed, but even were it practicable, the fact that it is close to the United States territory would render it useless for defensive purposes.

There is another water communication possible, commencing at Fort William, but

here again the difficulties of the first 50 miles are almost insurmountable.

10. Then as to Railways—A railway might probably be constructed from Pidgeon Bay north of the water communication, but this would be too close to American frontier.

A second, which is not liable to the last objection, might perhaps be projected from Fort William; but here there are vast natural difficulties. 1st, A rise of 800 feet in the first 50 miles. 2nd, 100 miles sterility and swamp, unfit for settlement.

11. The following conclusions are therefore arrived at:-

1st. That at present the channel of all the trade to and from the Red River Settlement is in the hands of the United States.

2ndly. That it is doubtful whether a water communication, safe for defensive purposes, can ever be made from the Settlement to Lake Superior.

3rdly. That until thorough surveys are made the possibility of the construction of a

remunerative line of railway to Lake Superior cannot be estimated.

4thly. That even supposing a water communication or a railway were opened from Fort Garry to Lake Superior, all use of it in time of war would be impossible, unless a a British gunboat fleet could enter that lake. This entrance could not be effected until the Ottawa and French River navigation to Lake Huron is opened, nor even then till a canal is constructed on the British side of the Sault Stc. Marie.

It is, however, reported that this latter work would be attended with no difficulty, and with but trifling expense, as it would not exceed a mile in length, but it must be recollected that such a canal would lie close to the American frontier, and that its destruction could not be prevented in winter, in case of hostilities with the United States,

without a strong military force to hold it.

On a careful consideration of the whole question, the opinion I have formed is, that until a safe communication for military purposes is completed between Canada and Fort Garry, either the union of the Budson's Bay Territory to Canada or the creation of a Crown Colony at the Red River Settlement would be a source of weakness and danger, both to Canada and England.

The Committee have had under consideration the annexed Memorandum of the Honorable the Commissioner of Crown Lands, on the subject of constructing a line of road from Thunder Bay to Dog Lake, and thence to Savanne River, for which an approximate estimate has been submitted by Mr. Simon Dawson, C.E., who had charge of the Exploring

party despatched to Red River in 1858-9; and they respectfully report their concurrence in the recommendation made by the Commissioner in his said annexed Memorandum, and submit the same for Your Excellency's approval.

The Commissioner of Crown Lands has the honor to submit to Your Excellency in Council, that in the year 1859, the section of country between Lake Superior and Dog Lake was thoroughly explored by Provincial Land Surveyors Lindsay, Russell and J. F. Gaudet, under the command of Mr. Simon Dawson, Civil Engineer, and a fair line of road marked out (shewn on the accompanying tracing), from Thunder Bay to Dog Lake, a distance of twenty-five miles.

2. It is reported to the Commissioner of Crown Lands, that this line was well marked out, and having been for some time used as a mail route, will not be difficult to trace, the bridging will be inconsiderable, and a good wagon road may be constructed for about

fourteen hundred dollars a mile.

3. The outlet of Dog Lake presents facilities for raising the waters thereof from seventeen to twenty feet, by means of dams across the two channels into which the outlet is divided—which increased elevation the banks of the Lake will, it is reported to the Commissioner, admit of. It is estimated that the necessary dams could be constructed for \$6,000. The effect of the work would be to render Dog River navigable for craft drawing, 6 feet of water as far as Jourdain's Rapid, about 37 miles by the windings of the river, or 20 in a direct line from Dog Lake

4. From Jourdain's Rapid, on Dog River, to the Depot, on Savanne River, is in a direct line eight miles and three-querters, and forms the height of land, dividing the waters which run to Lake Superior from those flowing to Lake Winnepeg. A good waggon road could be constructed for \$900 a mile; but as it would have to pass about two

miles beyond the Depot, the distance must be reckoned at eleven miles.

5. The drift flood-wood in the Savanne River would require to be cleared out, at a probable cost of \$1,000.

6. The total cost to reach the waters of the Savanne River would be, therefore, as follows :-Thunder Roy to Don Lake 25 miles at \$1 400 a mile

7. The above is the approximate estimate of Mr. Simon Dawson, C.E., who was in command of the Red River Exploring Expedition in 1858-9, and who now reports to the Commissioner of Crown Lands that he believes the necessary works, of suitable character and strength, can be constructed for the sums named; and that the materials, as well stone as wood, required therefore, can be readily procured in the neighborhood of the works, with hardly any transportation that cannot be done in scows, constructed on the spot.

8. The result of the improvements above estimated for, would be that 120 miles of the route, from Lake Superior to Red River, would be thrown open, giving easy access to Lac des Mine Lacs, the western extremity of which is within 70 miles of Rainy Lake, from whence the navigation is uninterrupted (save by a short portage at Fort Francis) to the north-west angle of the Lake of the Woods, a point distant about 90 miles from Fort Garry.

9. The Colonization Road Fund of Upper Canada, has a sum at its credit from Parliamentary votes, sufficient to meet the expenditure contemplated by this Memorandum, in case Your Excellency in Council should deem it expedient for the present to devote it to this object, on the assumption that the amount now expended will form a claim upon the new Dominion of Canada, and that proper accounting shall be had between the present Pro-

vinces of Upper and Lower Canada, as to the sum now taken from the Colonization funds of Upper Canada, for general purposes, the equivalent votes for Lower Canada having been heretofore therein expended.

10. The Commissioner of Crown Lands humbly recommends to Your Excellency, that the course above suggested be adopted, and that the improvements described be immediately

undertaken, and carried out during the present season.

"It appears there are a great many miners prospecting in Saskatchewan this summer, and a strong feeling of confidence exists that a strike will be made: if so, the whole of the district will be crowded with miners, as it appears in a few days they can get to Jasper's from the Big Bend of the Columbia, where the miners are very numerous, then from the Minomis crowds may be expected. It all, however, depends upon gold being found but a very slight success will suffice. Mr. Christic tells me that one miner showed him, privately, about £50 worth of gold he had got in a day or two's working near the Rocky Mountain House, but he could not remain at work for want of provisions."

SIR,—I have the honor to report to you my return from Thunder Bay, on Lake Superior, whither I had been directed to proceed by the former Commissioner of Crown Lands, the

Hon. Alex. Campbell.

My instructions from the above named Minister directed me to organize and supply a party of laborers, with overseers and assistants, for the purpose of commencing and forwarding a scheme of works, intended to open a regular transit line of communication between Thunder Bay, on Lake Superior, and Fort Garry, on the Red River, estimates and appropriations having been made for the above work, as far as the Savanne River, amounting to \$55,900.

My instructions further directed me to operate in concert with Mr. S. J. Dawson, who was charged specially with the construction of the dams necessary to raise the waters of Dog Lake and River, in order to complete the first navigable reach upon the said waters.

Mr. Dawson was decided to organize his own party, consisting of some 21 men, with the necessary foremen. My party for the road work, numbering some 50 men, all included, were principally secured from Penetanguishene. We left Toronto, with the necessary supplies and equipments, on Tuesday, the 6th day of August, en route by Collingwood per rail and steamboat for Fort William, at which latter place we arrived, without loss or accidents, on Saturday, the 10th August, and landed all our stores on the same day, having made temporary provision and shelter for our own men and goods.

On Monday, the 12th, after organizing the gangs, we equipped and started the Dog Lake Dam party, who proceeded under charge of Mr. Dawson, in the three large North-West

canoes up the Kamanistiquia River.

The road party I organized the same day, and commenced active operations forthwith. Some five or six men were drawn from the party to prepare timber and commence the building of a store-house for the more perfect preservation of the provisions and stores, while all the rest were systematically detailed in working gangs for the construction of the road.

My first care was to examine carefully the line located in 1859 by P. L. Surveyors Russell and Gaudet, and I am happy to be able to say that so far as the road-work has been proceeded with, we have succeeded in improving the site thereof to a very considerable extent by lateral deviations, without at all increasing the length of it.

There are a few short sections, chiefly near the commencement of the road, which have been expensive and difficult to make, nevertheless they now form some of the best and

most permanent portions of the road work.

The work has been vigorously pushed up to the present period, and has extended to completion over about four miles, and by the end of the present month will, I think, amount to the construction of six miles of an excellent turnpike road.

The line in the first instance has been cleared thoroughly to a width of 66 feet. Twenty-four feet in the centre of this opened belt has been carefully grubbed of all roots and stones.

The turnpike is formed in the centre of the grubbing, 16 feet wide—with well opened side ditches, save where it traverses, ridges or elevated and dry sections, where one road bed is simply cleared, grubbed, and formed with a sound and even surface.

Upon the distance alluded to, over which the present works extend, there are about

forty chains of facine work, crossing some peculiar, boggy swamps which could not be avoided without much increasing the length of the road and rendering it absurdly circuitous.

This work, difficult and expensive at all times, has been exceedingly so in these instances, owing to the almost total lack of timber suitable for a substratum for the brushwood.

The distance necessary to carry material for the above purpose, over spaces impassible for oxen or horses much increased the manual labor, and retarded the work.

All impediments, however, have been overcome and the facine road work forms a

portion of the very best roadway construed.

I have directed the party to return on the last of the present month, as the steamer will make but one trip in the month of November, and the date and time thereof is very uncertain, I judged it better to close the works as stated, rather than run any risk of a more expensive result by continuing the labor a few days longer. When the road party shall have returned and Mr. Dawson has reported the operations under his charge, I shall have the honor of submitting a final and complete report of the work of the season.

In the meantime, I feel it my duty to offer to your notice a few observations having reference to the character and capabilities of the country adjacent to the Dog Lake road.

And first, with reference to the agricultural quality of the soil, I was agreeably sur-

prised to find the same much better than I had anticipated.

Generally speaking the earth is of a loamy character, often underlaid with a gravelly substratum overlying a clay subsoil; but there are considerable section, to be seen on the line of road where a good clay soil predominates. Excellent crops of all kinds of spring grain and roots can be raised, of which fact proofs are not wanting at the Hudson's Bay Company's Post at Fort William, and at the few small improvements which have already been made upon the line of road and in its vicinity.

Another very encouraging feature which presents itself is the almost entire absence of surface boulders and out-cropping fixed rock. Of course there are places upon the hills and along ridgy elevations when exposed rock is found, but generally the whole surface

is hidden with a good deposit of soil.

Even in the boggy swamps which have been alluded to in this report, after passing through the moss and debris deposit underlying it, there is to be found frequently a stoneless bed of argillaceous soil.

From these observations of the favorable nature of the soil, I beg to suggest that a line of lots be laid off on either side of this road, of the usual dimensions, viz., 20 chains in

width, by 50 chains in depth, containing each 100 acres.

These lots, I would further suggest, should be given to settlers on the following conditions: 100 acres to each actual settler of the age of 21 years, actual occupation and settlement to take place within three months subsequent to grant being made, no lots, in any case, to be reserved for a longer period. Every lot so granted remaining beyond the above

period unoccupied by the grantee, to be declared forfeited.

Each settler to clear five acres of land during the first year's occupation on the front of his grant adjoining the road, and to remove from the road now made, or to be made, all obstructions (arising from fallen trees or any other cause) over one-half of the line thereof in front of his lot. Each settler to receive a Location-right Certificate at the time of proof of actual settlement, and a patent in fee simple at the expiry of the first year, having duly complied and then being in compliance with the regulations as herein set forth.

No conditions beyond the above to be imposed.

In this manner I apprehend this whole road line may be settled in the course of two years, with valuable settlers affording not only protection and assistance to travellers, when the road shall have been opened throughout, but also a class of available laborers for the

prosecution of further necessary works upon the route.

The adjoining country abounding in the richest mineral deposits of lead and silver, I would also suggest should be immediately surveyed by Government into mineral lots of 400 acres, and sold by auction one year after survey. The system of survey of these latter lots should be in accordance with that already begun and on which some patents have already issued. The lots should by all means be put up to public auction and competition, and sold to the highest bidder. In this manner I am satisfied this im-

portant region of country would be forthwith developed. Again, another necessary suggestion I have to make is this, that two large and substantial steamers be chartered and placed upon the route between Collingwood and Fort William, to make weekly trips between the above points. If this be not done the development of the country will most certainly be greatly retarded.

Indeed, it is scarcely possible to estimate the difference in this respect which would be experienced between a weekly and fortnightly communication. Two boats of adequate size and strength would deliver mail and freight between the above points with ease, cer-

tainty and safety, and allow a day at each terminus for preparation and loading.

Another subject which I would bring before your notice, closely allied to that last men-

tioned, is that of a safe and convenient harbor on Thunder Bay.

Although the bay is almost completely landlocked from the main lake, by points and islands, it is itself of such considerable dimensions as to render it subject to heavy swells when the wind is in-shore.

Nearly the whole north-western coast of Thunder Bay is shelterless, until you reach the

north-east end thereof.

The point from whence the road starts, some three miles north-eastward of the mouth of the Kamanistiquia, is quite unprotected by any natural feature of the coast.

For depth of water, it is equal to any point perhaps which could be chosen, as the

shores here are generally very low, and inclining to swamp.

Artificial breakwaters, and a substantial wharf could undoubtedly be made to resist the waves and ice-shoves, but they would be secured only by the expenditure of a large sum of money, especially as timber in the vicinity is entirely wanting, and even available stone is not abundant. I would, therefore, only recommend that at the commencement of the road a short substantial wharf be built sufficient to accommodate lighters or small steamers of light draught, which could approach and unload in moderate weather.

For a safe and convenient retreat in heavy weather, I would recommend that the clay bar stretching across the mouth of the Kamanistiquia River be dredged to a sufficient extent to admit steamers of large size, which could then either lie at the Hudson's Bay Company's wharf, at Fort William, or proceed up the river past the Mission, eight miles further, to Point des Meurons. A short branch road from one or other or from both could then be constructed to tap the main line some four or eight or ten miles from its commencement.

These branch roads would not be solely beneficial in rendering the main road available, but would tend also materially to enhance settlement of the country, and to develope other mining tracts in the Township of Nee-Bing, through which, if constructed, they will pass.

Accompanying this Report I append a sketch of the road and its environs, which will

illustrate at a glance all the topographical points referred to in my remarks.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit my final Report of the season's operations upon the

Dog Lake and Thunder Bay Road.

Having, in my former report (which I had the honor of transmitting to you in the month of October last) given a detailed account of the works performed upon the above road down to the 16th September, at which period I left the ground, having given the work into the charge of my chief assistant, Mr. John A. Snow, it only remains for me to inform you of the progress and success of the expedition down to the end of October, when the works were closed and the party returned by the last trip of the Algoma steamer.

I am happy to be able to state that the full amount of work anticipated in my former Report has been accomplished. Six miles of an excellent road have been constructed, of the same description throughout as that related in my former Report, and any reasonable load,

say from one to one and a half tons can be safely transported over it.

The Store-house, also spoken of, erected at the Thunder Bay terminus of the route,

has been well finished.

All our tools, utensils, and furnishings are snugly and safely stored therein, and I have, with the sanction of the Assistant Commissioner of Crown Lands, left one reliable

and capable man in charge thereof.

In addition, also, we have cleared, stumped, and burned three acres of land around the Store-house, and prepared it for early planting with potatoes in the spring, which latter labour will be conveniently performed by the man left in charge, who has instructions to do so. The requisite seed can be procured from the Hudson Bay Post at Fort William, and I have made the necessary arrangement with Mr. McIntyre to this end, and for the wintering of one yoke of the oxen taken up, so that they may be ready for our service another season.

All the party, including the men employed by Mr. Dawson at the Dam work at Dog Lake (with the exception of one man left, as stated above, in charge of the Store-house and Stores, and two who deserted from the works and joined the miners) returned in good

health and safety.

With reference to the operations of Mr. Dawson and his party, I cannot speak confidently, as Mr. Dawson has not yet made his Report. Mr. Snow, however, made a trip to the locality, before leaving the work, and informed me that a good deal of timber had been

prepared for the construction of the Dam, and two Barges for the purpose of floating stones and other materials, had been constructed.

In conclusion, I beg leave to remark that, considering all the disadvantages under which we have labored in commencing and carrying on this improvement, we have accomplished, in the short season of two and a half months, a large amount of labor.

The men upon the road works have scarcely averaged forty-five in number, as from

four to five were generally employed in the necessary work of building the Store-house.

Copy of a Report of a Committee of the Honorable the Executive Council, approved by His Excellency the Governor General in Council, on the 29th August, 1866.

On a communication dated 25th August, 1866, from the Honorable the Acting Minister of Finance, submitting for the consideration of Your Excellency in Council the following Memorandum, containing the terms and conditions of an arrangement proposed to be made with the Bank of Montreal for the surrender of its power to issue notes, and thereupon to be appointed the agents of the Province for the issue and redemption of Provincial Notes.

MEMOBANDUM of proposed arrangement between the Government and the Bank of Montreal for the surrender of its power to issue notes by the Bank, and thereupon being appointed the Agents of the Province for the issue and redemption of Provincial Notes.

1. The Bank of Montreal to surrender its power to issue notes, gradually, in terms of the Provincial Note Act, during a period extending over six months from the first issue of Provincial Notes, with the provise that such surrender shall be absolute, of the whole issue of Provincial Notes be delivered to the Bank, as hereafter provided, at an earlier period.

2. The compensation to be paid to the Bank to be at the rate of five per cent. per annum on its circulation at 30th April, 1866, computed in the manner provided by the

Provincial Note Act.

3. The Bank to be entitled to receive Provincial Notes in exchange for the Provincial Debentures held under its charter, and to be paid for its unissued notes as provided by the Provincial Note Act.

4. The Bank to receive a commission of one quarter of one per cent. upon the average amount of Provincial Notes in circulation according to the weekly returns during each

three months, as hereafter provided.

- 5. The Government to prepare and deliver to the Bank, as soon as practicable, the whole amount of Provincial Notes authorized to be issued under the Provincial Note Act, after deducting the amount realized from seven per cent. debentures, sold by the Government, to the 10th September, and upon receipt of such Notes the Bank shall credit the same to an account called "The Provincial Note Account," the balance of which shall at all times represent the amount of Provincial Notes in the hands of the Bank and in circulation. No debit entry in this account shall be made, except for notes cancelled or destroyed by order of the Government.
- 6. The Bank shall make a return, up to the Wednesday evening of each week, to the Receiver General, shewing the balance of Provincial Notes issued or redeemed during the

weekly period, and hall debit or credit the the Receiver General, in an account to be called "The Receiver General's Issue Account," with such balance, after deducting therefrom the proportion of specie reserve fixed by the Provincial Note Act, which reserve shall be debited or credited, as the case may be, to an account called "The Receiver General's Specie Reserve Account," the balance of which shall never be less than the amount of specie reserve fixed by the Provincial Note Act, and shall be represented by the same amount of specie in the hands of the Bank for the redemption of Provincial Notes.

7. The Receiver General will provide that his Issue Account shall never be overdrawn. 8. The Provincial Notes shall be held in reserve for account of the Government at the different offices of the Bank, in packages containing not less than one thousand dollars, and upwards, in sums of thousands of dollars, under the seals of two of the officers of the Bank, acting for the Receiver General as hereafter provided. The Bank shall make a return to the Receiver Generaul p to the close of business on each Wednesday, shewing the amount of such sealed reserves held at the different offices of the Bank when making the weekly entry to the Receiver General's Issue Account, and the Receiver General's Specie Reserve Account for the balance of Provincial Notes issued or redeemed during the week, and upon the first Wednesday in each month such return shall be verified under oath by the said Bank's officers acting for the Receiver General at each office, and shall be published by the Auditor in the Official Gazette under Clause 13 of the Provincial Note Act. The Commissioners to be appointed by the Government under the Provincial Note Act shall at all times, when chected by the Minister of Finance, have free access to the books of the Bank in which the Accounts of Provincial Notes are kept and also the vaults of the Bank to enable them freely and fully to examine and verify the correctness of said accounts, and to determine the amount of specie and notes on hand.

9. The Bank to continue to Act as the Provincial Financial Agents of the Province, in accordance with the terms of the existing arrangement, and in addition thereto to act as the agents of the Province for the issue and redemption of Provincial Notes (under and subject to the said Act), and for that purpose to have such officers of the Bank as may be required from time to time, made officers under and subject to account to the Receiver General, for the issue and redemption of Provincial Notes, the Bank retaining its right to remove and employ such officers wherever its business may require, when other officers shall be appointed to act under the Receiver General, such officers to be paid for their

services by the Bank.

10. The Bank will keep a record, as accurately as may be found possible, of the exact amount of Provincial Notes received or paid at each of its offices from day to day, and shall furnish the Receiver General, if desired, with a Statement shewing the total receipts and payments at its offices in Provincial Notes during any given period; but such statement shall be considered in confidence, as revealing the extent of the Bank's operations at its different offices.

11. The Minister of Finance will make arrangements for the custody of Provincial Debentures issued under the Provincial Note Act, either with the Bank, the Financial Agents in England, or otherwise, as may be found to be most convenient for the purpose of providing funds to meet heavy or unusual demands for the redemption of Provincial Notes

from time to time as they occur.

12. The Government agree to give six months' notice of the termination of the present arrangement for the issue and redemption of Provincial Notes, or of the intention to accept the surrender of the power to issue notes by any other Chartered Bank; and the Bank agrees to give six months' notice of its intention to resume its power to issue notes; and further agrees that, during the existence of the present arrangement, it will not issue or pay out the notes of any other Chartered Bank from any of its offices, except at such times as no Provincial Notes may be in possession of the said Bank of Montreal.

The Acting Finance Minister recommends that he be authorized to enter into an arrangement with the Bank of Montreal, in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in the above Memorandum.

He further recommends that, for the purpose of affording security to the Government and to the public, that all Provincial notes, before being delivered to the Bank of Montreal,

as hereinbefore provided, shall be signed or initialed, on behalf of the Receiver General, by one of the following persons, viz.:-

> Thomas R. Christian, John Rogers, Maurice Dunsford, John W. Tempest,

Robert G. Hebden. Wm. M. M'Donald, John A. Torrance;

and he recommends that the said persons be appointed and authorized to attach his or their signature to such notes, and further, that the said officers, before the delivery of any of the said notes to the said Bank of Montreal, shall seal up, with the seal and signature of two of the said officers, all notes so signed by any or either of them, in packages of one thousand dollars, and upwards in sums of thousands of dollars, and enter a correct account of the same in a Note Register Book, specifying the number and denomination of each note so signed by them; and, upon delivery, obtain a receipt from the Bank of Montreal for all such notes delivered to them; and further, that the said Provincial notes shall not be issued, or be a legal tender, until so signed as above, and until again signed by some officer or officers to be appointed by the Bank of Montreal for that purpose, who shall keep a Register of all Provincial Notes so signed by him or them.

And also that he, the Acting Minister of Finance, be authorized to make such further orders and regulations respecting the signing, issuing, redeeming or printing, of Provincial Notes, and the keeping of proper books of account and registration of the same, as he may

deem necessary for the public interest.

The Committee advise that the several recommendations above submitted be approved and acted on.

The Committee have had before them a Memorandum dated 11th September, 1866. from the Honorable the Minister of Finance, reporting that he communicated to the Bank of Montreal the report of the Executive Council of the 25th August, approved by Your Excellency on the 29th of that month, laying down the terms of the proposed arrangement with that Bank for the surrender of its power to issue Notes, and of its being thereupon appointed the agent for the Province for the issue and redemption of Provincial Notes. That the General Manager of the Bank replied on the 31st that the Directors had authorized him to accept the proposal. That he stipulated, however, that the Bank was to receive payment of the actual cost of the notes of the Bank, which are to be stamped as Provincial Notes, and that any new officers, who by the terms of the Memorandum may be appointed to act under the Receiver General instead of those now appointed, who may be removed or employed elsewhere, shall be officers of the Bank.

The Minister of Finance recommends that these stipulations be acceded to.

The proposed arrangements having been assented to by both parties, he recommends :-

1st. That the gradual surrender of its right to issue notes by the Bank of Montreal be formally accepted, and that the Bank be appointed the agent of the Province for the issue and redemption of Provincial Notes, in accordance with the Act 29 and 30 Vic., cap. 10.

2nd That the issue of Provincial Notes be authorized to commence on the 15th day of September, the whole amount to be issued not to exceed \$8,000,000, as provided by the Act, less such amount as shall be ascertained to have been paid up to September 10, inclusive, on tenders for Debentures bearing 7 per cent. interest.

3rd. That pending the completion of the Provincial Notes now in the course of

execution, notes of the Bank of Montreal, stamped and initialed as herein described, shall be declared to be Provincial Notes within the meaning of the Act.

The undersigned has the honor respectfully to submit, for the consideration of His Excellency the Governor General in Council, the following Rules and Regulations for the registration, delivery and signing of Provincial Notes on behalf of the Provincial Agents, and to recommend the adoption of the same, viz.:—

1. The office having the supervision of the execution of the Provincial Notes by the British American Bank Note Company, shall keep a register in the annexed form marked A. Each separate parcel of notes completed and delivered by the Company shall be entered on a separate page, and that page shall be signed by the officer in charge, and by an officer of the Company, and a duplicate of each entry shall be made, and shall be taken with the parcel when delivered to the Receiver General, and shall be signed on his behalf, and the duplicate shall then be taken to be filed in the Audit office.

2. When the Provincial Notes are delivered to the Receiver General, they shall be entered according to their numbers and denominations in a register to be kept for that purpose in the annexed form marked B, and the date of receipt, and the signature of the Deputy Receiver General, or other officer of the Department, shall be affixed to the page or to those pages of the Register on which they are recorded. If then umbers entered do not occupy a whole page, the officer shall affix his initials at the last number received, or at the first number received if they do not commence at the beginning of a page, the rest of the page in both cases being cancelled.

3. When the Notes are ready for delivery to the Provincial Agents they shall be sent to Montreal in sealed parcels, endorsed with the numbers and value of the Notes in each. A Register shall be kept in the Receiver General's office in the annexed form, marked C, of each such parcel and its contents, and a duplicate of each entry shall accompany the parcel, in which the receipt for the Notes specified therein shall be acknow-

ledged on behalf of Provincial Agents.

- 4. Before they can go into circulation and become a legal tender, the notes shall be countersigned, on behalf of the Provincial Agents, by certain persons who shall be named by the agents, and reported to Government, and the notes thus countersigned shall be made up into parcels of one thousand, or any other number of thousands of dollars, and each such parcel shall be sealed with the seal of the Provincial Agents and the Receiver General, endorsed with the value of the contents, and signed on behalf of the Provincial Agents and the Receiver General, and an entry of each such parcel shall be made in a Register, in the annexed form, marked D, to be kept by the officer of the Receiver General resident at Montreal, and a duplicate of each entry shall be made out and signed by the officer of the Receiver General, and for the Provincial Agents, and shall be transmitted to the Receiver General.
- 5. In case the Provincial Agents shall find it necessary, at first, to send notes to the different agencies through the country, to be countersigned there, a statement of each such parcel, with its contents and destination, shall be sent to the Receiver General by his officer at Montreal, and the officers of the Bark at the agencies, who may be authorized to make up and sign parcels on behalf of the Receiver General, shall make returns to the Receiver General of the notes so by them countersigned, which returns shall be made in the forms marked D, blanks of which shall be furnished to them.
 - 6. An entry shall be made in the Receiver General's Register, from the duplicates

of notes countersigned as above, in the form D, with the date and the number of the parcel, and the name of the person countersigning, and the page or pages of the Register where the numbers are recorded, shall be signed by the officer making the entry. In case the numbers entered as countersigned do not occupy a whole page of the Register, the officer in charge shall draw a line under the last number, and he shall enter at the head of the page:-

"Countersigned by A B, from No. — to No. —,"

with the date and the number of the parcel, and affix his signature, making a separate entry and signature for each entry which does not occupy a whole page. And if the same countersignature does not apply to the whole page, he shall enter in the blank column adjoining the numbers :-

"Countersigned by A B, from No. —— to No. ——."

7. A similar Register shall be kept in the Audit office, compiled from the receipts given by the Receiver General, on file in the Audit office in accordance with Rule 1, and it shall be the duty of the Auditor, from time to time, to cause such duplicates to be compared with the original entries in the Register kept at the Company's offices, and the officer making this comparison shall affix his signature to each of such entries in the Register when compared.

8. A separate Register shall be made out, upon the same principle, of the notes of the Bank of Montreal, countersigned for the Province, one copy of which shall be in the Re-

ceiver General's office, and another in the Audit office.

9. When any notes, whether Provincial Notes or notes of the Bank of Montreal, countersigned for the Province, are to be cancelled, they shall be delivered by the Provincial Agents to the Receiver General, who shall cause them to be checked and crossed out in his Register, and shall then transmit them to the Audit office, where they shall be checked and crossed out in the Auditor's Register. They shall then be destroyed in the presence of an officer of the Receiver General's Department, and of one of the Audit office, and an entry shall be made of such destruction in the minutes of the Board of Audit, signed by the parties present.

10. When a sufficient number of the Provincial Notes shall have been delivered to the Provincial Agents, the notes of the Bank of Montreal, countersigned on behalf of the Province, shall not be re-issued, but they shall be sent from time to time as they come

in to the Receiver General to be cancelled and destroyed.

11. Whenever the notes in the hands of the Provincial Agents at any of the branches other than notes in sealed parcels, shall amount to more than is required for the purpose of immediate circulation, such superfluous notes shall be made up into parcels of one thousand dollars, or other number of thousands of dollars, sealed, endorsed with their value, and signed on behalf of the Provincial Agents, and on behalf of the Receiver General, by the officer appointed for that purpose, by the Order in Council of September 4th.

SIR,-I beg to inform you that the resolutions proposed to be submitted to Parliament, authorizing the issue of Provincial Notes, were considered by the Directors of this Bank, at their meeting, yesterday, when I reported the substance of your communications to the Bank Managers at the recent meetings held at the Bank of British North America in this city.

The Directors approve of the view I expressed with reference to the unfairness to the Bank of Montreal as compared with other Banks, of the mode of computing the average circulation, for the surrender of which the Government propose to pay compensation. I am at the same time to express the gratification of the Directors at finding that the Government do not contemplate assuming the functions of bankers as lenders of money in any way. With reference to the suggestions made at the last meeting, that the banks should contribute in proportion to their paid-up capital by taking six per cent. Debentures from the Government, payable in one and two years, and that the issue of Provincial Notes should thereupon be abandoned. You are aware that I consider it hopeless to expect such unanimity from the banks, but in case I am mistaken, I am authorized to say that the Bank of Montreal has so large an interest in the maintenance of the Provincial credit apart from the temporary and short loans maturing during this year, that it will willingly contribute its proportion to such a scheme, if the other banks do likewise.

If all the banks contribute fifteen per cent. of their paid-up capital, it will yield about \$4,500,000, and I am further authorized to say that this bank will make up the additional half million of dollars that you require, when the other banks have actually paid their contributions, Failing this arrangement, my opinion remains unchanged, that if this money must be obtained from Canadian sources, the only prospect the Government has of securing it is by an issue of Provincial Notes redeemable in specie. It is quite the same to the banks whether the money is obtained from their circulation, or their deposits, and by the issue of notes the Government deprives the banks of an effectual opposition they could offer by paying higher rates of interest for their deposits rather than allow them to be withdrawn for investment in Provincial Debentures. The directors are aware that the easiest solution of the present difficulty would be found in the surrender by the Bank of Montreal of its probable circulation of between three and four millions of dollars after harvest, and the obtainment of the balance without inconvenience to the other Banks by absorbing a portion of their natural increase of circulation at the same period. I am, however, to state that the Directors cannot see their way to such an arrangement under the proposed resolutions, nor would they feel justified in entertaining it even were the terms of the proposed resolutions modified, unless there was a proviso leaving it open to any Bank surrendering its circulation, to resume it again after reasonable notice, upon repayment of the Provincial Notes obtained for debentures and surrender of its compensation, in case such Bank should consider it expedient for the maintenance of its business.

I take the liberty of strongly urging this alteration. I believe it would lead all the Banks to acknowledge the disposition of the Government to afford them every opportunity of testing the measure, and would induce them likewise to give greater consideration to the

necessity that compels the Government to obtain relief in this direction.

DEAR SIR,—I send you herewith Copy of the Memorandum of arrangement between the Bank and the Government, as finally agreed on between us.

I think it would facilitate you to obtain a general power under Order in Council, to-morrow, to make arrangements for the temporary issue of Bank of Montreal Notes, stamped as Provincial Notes, in such manner as you may direct, and power to appoint such officers of the Bank as may be necessary for the purposes of the Receiver General, to sign or initial such notes before they are handed to the Bank for circulation. I hope you will get that done to-morrow; and, if you telegraph me that it is so arranged, I will set the under noted officers to work, initialing the notes for the Receiver General, as fast as we get them out of the engraver's hands. I will also expect an officer of the Government here by Saturday, who can assist in the initialing, and make delivery to the Bank as the notes are completed.

I think it would be well to arrange also that the Bank would not issue the notes before 15th September, say unless in an emergency; but, that if such occurred we should issue the notes, and the Government, would on the same day issue a proclamation, through an extra of the Official Gazette, authorizing the Provincial Notes. As we are engaged in

a race against time, I should not like to fail for want of readiness at all points, if the necessity arose. I shall of course be anxious to know the real state of affairs with the bank or banks from day to day, and if you can possibly keep me advised, it will enable me to be of all the more service to the Government. I subjoin the officers' names I propose you should authorize to initial the Provincial Notes.

I submitted the Memorandum agreed upon with you yesterday as the basis of an agreement between the Government and the Bank, under the Provincial Note Act, to the Board of Directors this morning, and I am authorized to say that they are prepared to pass a resolution, coming under the proposed arrangement, when the Government approve thereof by Order in Council.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of the 27th instant, enclosing a copy of the Memorandum of the Committee of the Honorable Executive Council, authorizing you to enter into arrangements with the Bank, for the surrender of its power to issue notes, and defining the terms of a proposed agreement with this Bank to act as the agents of the Province, for the issue and redemption of Provincial Notes.

I am authorized to inform you that the Directors of the Bank of Montreal do accept the terms of the proposed agreement, as detailed in the Memorandum above acknowledged, with the condition that the arrangement to issue Provincial Notes is not to take effect or go into operation until after 10th September next, unless some exigency should arise in the money market or otherwise, that may cause the Government to deem it advisable that it should take effect at an earlier period. The Directors understand that the officers to be appointed to act under the Receiver General, instead of those officers who may be removed or employed elsewhere by the Bank, are officers of the Bank. This you are aware was the intention, but I am desired to refer to it in case of misconception. The Directors also desire me to state that they will expect payment of the actual cost of the new notes of the Bank, which are now being stamped as Provincial Notes, and thereby becoming the property of the Government. The Directors will be glad to receive your assent to these two points.

I have now to ask whether the Government consider it necessary to issue a proclamation after 10th September, announcing the issue of Provincial Notes, or whether the Bank will be at liberty to commence the issue as soon after that day as a sufficient number of

Provincial Notes are delivered.

It appears to me that it will be a convenience and an advantage if the three accounts, viz.: Provincial Note Account, Receiver General's Issue Account, and Receiver General's Specie Reserve Account are kept at the Head Office of the Bank in Montreal, where they can have my more immediate attention in case of sudden demands, when it would be an advantage to the Government that I should be aware of the position of the Specie Reserve without waiting for advices from Ottawa.

I have to advise that £100,000 stg., will be remitted to the English Financial Agents by the Mail of Monday, from the loan of \$1,500,000 recently made by the Bank in anticipation of the arrangement now concluded with the Government, and the balance of

£320,000 stg. will be furnished within the time agreed upon.

SIR,—I am this moment in receipt of a telegram from you, as follows: "Returned There to-day, you will not, of course, issue any Povincial Notes, until specially authorized."

I am surprised at this message. I have no intention of issuing any Provincial Notes, until authorized; and all the Notes that have been delivered to the Bank, up to the present time, are held in packages, sealed with the Seal of the Minister of Finance, and the Seal of the Bank; and my instructions to the Bank Officers, are not to break such Seals without my orders.

These orders will not be given until I receive the authorization of the Government. Having now placed myself as the representative of the Bank, in a proper position, I have to ask you to be good enough to telegraph me, on Monday, if the views of the Government are in any way changed respecting the issue of Provincial Notes or the period of such issue.

The agreement accepted by the Bank, provided that the issue of Provincial Notes should not take effect or go into "operation until after the 10th September, unless some exigency should arise in the money market, or otherwise, that may cause the Government

to deem it advisable that it should take effect at an earlier date."

The Bank supposed that the necessary authority, or Proclamation, would be given by the Government to issue Provincial Notes after the 10th September. As stated on other occasions, I beg now to say that the Bank is not desirous of commencing the issue of Provincial Notes one day sooner than is found to be necessary; but in view of the arrangements the Bank has made, and the engagements it has entered into for remittances to England, it is essential that the powers to issue Provincial Notes after the 10th September, should be in its hands.

If, therefore, there be any change in the views of the Government, I beg to be in-

formed by telegram, on Monday.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of your letter of 22nd instant, enclosing Copy of Order in Council passed on 24th September last, appointing certain Officers of the Bank, Officers of the Receiver General's Department, for the purposes therein stated; also, Copy of Rules and Regulations for the registration and delivery of Provincial Notes; also, list of names of Government Officers for appointment by the Bank to countersign the notes for the Provincial Agents. As stated in my telegram of yesterday the Directors considered it of so much importance that every precaution should be taken to guard the issues of Provincial Notes from abuse in any way, that they desired me to consider the matter more fully before they came to a decision, with a view to making such suggestions as might be useful to the Government.

The Directors were of opinion that it would be safer for the Government and more satisfactory to the public, if it were arranged that the Notes after Departmental examination and registration, according to your rules, were delivered to the Bank as Agents, in an incomplete state, requiring a signature before they became Provincial Notes, and represen-

tatives of value.

I would suggest therefore that the Provincial Notes be delivered to the Bank for signature by its own Officers on behalf of the Provincial Agents. Although it will be very laborious it will be a safeguard against any improper issue of notes; and if it be agreeable to the Government, instead of employing Government Officers, as proposed, to sign the notes, the Bank will undertake the signature at a cost of 75 cents per thousand notes.

This will be found a much more economical arrangement for the Government than the employment of Officers unaccustomed to sign notes, and from whom but little progress

could be expected.

An average of 3,500 to 4,000 signatures daily would require some practice.

If the Government consider it unnecessary to adopt the safeguard I have suggested the Bank will appoint the officers you have named and receive the Provincial Notes completed before delivery as proposed; but in this case I hope the Government will be able to suggest some means by which the Provincial Agents can more readily detect any notes that may get into circulation without having passed through their hands.

SIR,-I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your favor of the 24th inst., in reference to my suggestion that the signing of Provincial Notes, on behalf of the Bank, should be done here.

Upon further reflection I fully accord with the decision come to by your Board and

yourself, in reference to that matter, and think that greater security will be obtained by having them signed at the Bank, and as to the charge which you propose to make, to wit: 75 cents per thousand notes signed, is reasonable. I am prepared to accede to that proposition also, and to agree that the same rate of remuneration shall be paid to you for the notes of the Bank of Montreal, which have been signed by your officers on behalf of the Province.

I now enclose herewith a copy of the Rules and Regulations sanctioned by Council

for the registration, delivery and signing of Provincial Notes.

You will notice that the Rules which are specified in the copy previously sent to you,

applicable to the signing on behalf of the Provincial Agents here, have been omitted.

I shall send you the first parcel of new notes by special messenger to-morrow, and apprehend no difficulty in being able to forward them henceforth as fast as you may require them.

CANADA.

DEAFT OF A COMMISSION TO BE PASSED UNDER THE GREAT SEAL OF THE UNITED KINGDOM, APPOINTING VISCOUNT MONCK TO BE GOVERNOR GENERAL OF CANADA, ON AND AFTER THE FIRST DAY OF JULY, 1867.

VICTORIA, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, to our Right Trusty and Well-beloved Cousin, Charles Stanley, Viscount Monck,—GREETING:

I. Whereas We did, by divers Letters Patent, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing date severally at Westminster the second day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, in the Twenty-fifth year of Our Reign, constitute and appoint you, Our Right Trusty and Well-beloved Cousin, Charles Stanley, Viscount Monck, to be, during Our pleasure, Our Captain General and Governor in Chief in and over Our Province of Canada, and in and over the Province of Nova Scotia and its Dependencies, and in and over the Province of New Brunswick, and also Governor General of all Our Provinces in North America and of the Island of Prince Edward, as by the said several recited Letters Patent, relation being thereunto had, may more fully and at large appear:

And whereas by an Act of Parliament passed in the Thirtieth year of Our Reign, intituled, "The British North America Act, 1867," it is, amongst other things, enacted that it shall be lawful for Us, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to declare, by Proclamation, that, on and after a day therein appointed, not being more than Six Months after the passing of the said Act, the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, shall form and be One Dominion, under the name of Canada; and on and after that day those three Provinces shall form and be One Dominion under that name, accordingly, and that Canada shall be divided into Four Provinces, named Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia

and New Brunswick:

And whereas We did, on the twenty-second day of May, one thousand eight hundred

and sixty-seven, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, declare by Proclamation that, on and after the first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, being within six months after the passing of the said Act, the Provinces of Canada, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, should form and be One Dominion, under the name of Canada:

Now know You, that We do by these Presents declare Our pleasure to be, that the said recited Letters Patent, and every clause, article and thing therein contained, shall be, and they are hereby declared to be Revoked and Determined, on the said first day of July,

one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven:

And further Know You, that We, reposing especial Trust and Confidence in the prudence, courage and loyalty of you, the said Charles Stanley, Viscount Monck, of Our special Grace, certain knowledge and mere motion, have thought fit to constitute and appoint, and do by these Presents constitute and appoint you to be, on and after the said first day of July, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, during Our pleasure, Our Governor General of Canada; and We do hereby authorize, empower, require and command you thereafter, in due manner to do and execute all things that shall belong to your said Command and the Trust We have reposed in you, according to the several powers, provisions, and directions granted or appointed you by virtue of this Our Commission, and of the said recited Act of Parliament, and according to such instructions as are herewith given to you, or which may from time to time hereafter be given to you, in respect of the said Dominion of Canada, under Our Sign Manual and Signet, or by Our Order in Our Privy Council, or by Us, through one of Our principal Secretaries of State, and according to such laws as are or shall be in force within Our said Dominion.

- II. And We do hereby authorize and empower you to keep and use the Great Seal of Canada, for the sealing of all things whatsoever that shall pass the said Seal.
- III. And We do further authorize and empower you to exercise all such powers as We may be at any time entitled to exercise, in respect of the constitution and appointment of Judges; and, in cases requisite, Commissioners of Oyer and Terminer, Justices of the Peace, and other necessary Officers and Ministers of Our said Dominion of Canada, for the better administration of Justice, and putting the Laws into execution.
- IV. And We do hereby give and grant unto you, so far as We lawfully may, full power and authority, upon sufficient cause to you appearing, to remove from his Office, or to suspend from the exercise of the same, any person exercising any office or place within Our said Dominion, under or by virtue of any Commission or Warrant granted, or which may be granted by Us, in Our name or under Our authority.
- V. And We do hereby give and grant unto you full power and authority, when you shall see cause, in Our name and on Our behalf, to grant to any offender convicted of any crime in any Court, or before any Judge, Justice or Magistrate within Our said Dominion, a Pardon, either free or subject to lawful conditions, or any respite of the execution of the sentence of any such offender, for such period as to you may seem fit; and to remit any fines, penalties or forfeitures, which may become due and payable to Us.
- VI. And We do hereby authorize you to exercise, from time to time, as you may judge necessary, all powers belonging to Us, in respect of Assembling or Proroguing the Senate or the House of Commons of Our said Dominion, and of Dissolving the said House of Commons; and We do hereby give the like authority to the several Lieutenant Governors for the time being, of the Four Provinces in Our said Dominion, with respect to the Legislative Councils or the Legislative or General Assemblies of those Provinces respectively.
- VII. And We do by these Presents authorize and empower you, within our said Dominion, to exercise all such powers as We may be entitled to exercise therein, in respect of granting Licenses for Marriages, Letters of Administration and Probates of Wills, and with respect to the custody and management of Idiots and Lunatics, and their Estates; and to Present any person or persons to any Churches, Chapels or other Ecclesiastical Benefices, within Our said Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, to which We shall from time to time be entitled to Present.

VIII. And whereas, by the said recited Act, it is amongst other things enacted, that

it shall be lawful for Us, if We think fit, to authorize the Governor General of Canada to appoint any person or persons jointly or severally to be his Deputy or Deputies within any part or parts of Canada, and in that capacity to exercise, during the pleasure of the Governor General, such of the powers, authorities and functions of the Governor General as he may deem it necessary or expedient to assign to him or them, subject to any limitations or directions from time to time expressed or given by Us; now We do hereby authorize and empower you, subject to such limitations and directions as aforesaid, to appoint any person or persons jointly or severally, to be your Deputy or Deputies within any part or parts of Our Dominion of Canada, and in that capacity to exercise, during your pleasure, such of your powers, functions and authorities as you may deem it necessary or expedient to assign to him or them: Provided always, that the appointment of such a Deputy or Deputies shall not affect the exercise of any such power, authority, or function by you, the said Charles Stanley, Viscount Monck, in person.

IX. And in case of your death, incapacity, or absence out of Our said Dominion of Canada, We do by these Presents give and grant, all and singular, the powers and authorities herein to you granted to Our Lieutenant Governor for the time being of Our said Dominion of Canada, or in the absence of any such Lieutenant Gevernor to such person as we may by Warrant under Our Sign Manual and Signet, appointed to be the Administrator of the Government of Our said Dominion, or in the absence of any such Lieutenant Governor or person as aforesaid, to the senior Military Officer for the time being in command of Our regular forces in Our said Dominion, such powers and authorities to be by him executed and enjoyed during Our pleasure.

X. And We do hereby require and command all Our Officers and Ministers, civil and military, and all other the inhabitants of Our said Dominion of Canada, to be obedient, aiding, and assisting unto you in the execution of this Our Commission, and of the powers and authorities herein contained.

CANADA.

Draft of Instructions to be passed under the Royal Sign Manual and Signet to Viscount Monck, Governor General of Canada.

INSTRUCTIONS to Our Right Trusty and Well-beloved Cousin, Charles Stanley, Viscount Monck, Our Governor General of Canada, or, in his absence, to Our Lieutenant Governor or the Officer Administering the Government of Our Dominion of Canada for the time being. Given at Our Court at Balmoral, this First day of June, 1867, in the Thirtieth Year of Our Reign.

I. Whereas, by Our Commission, under the Great Seal of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, bearing even date herewith, We have constituted and appointed you, the said Charles Stanley, Viscount Monck, to be, on and after the first day of July, 1867, during Our pleasure, Our Governor General of Canada: And have required you to do and execute all things that shall belong to your said command, according to the several powers, provisions, directions, and instructions therein mentioned, and particularly

according to such instructions as should be therewith given to you.

Now, therefore, by these Our instructions, under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, being the said last-mentioned instructions, We do declare Our will and pleasure to be, that on or immediately after the said First day of July, 1867, you do publish Our said Commission in Our Dominion of Canada, and do take the Oath appointed to be taken by an Act passed in the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Year of Our Reign, intituled, "An Act to substitute one Oath for the Oaths of Allegiance, Supremacy, and Abjuration, and for the relief of Her Majesty's subjects professing the Jewish religion"; and likewise that you take the usual Oath for the due execution and performance of the Office and Trust of Our Governor General of Our said Dominion, and for the due and impartial Administration of Justice; which said Oaths the Judges of Our Supreme Courts of Record within our said Dominion,

or any three or more of such Judges, have hereby full power and authority, and are required to tender and administer unto you.

II. And We do hereby give and grant unto you full power and authority from time to time, and at any time hereafter, by yourself or by any other person to be authorized by you in that behalf, to administer to all and every person or persons as you shall think fit, who shall hold any office or place of trust or profit, or who shall at any time or times pass into Our said Dominion of Canada, or who shall be resident or abiding therein, the Oath commonly called the Oath of Allegiance, together with such other Oath or Oaths as may from time to time be prescribed by any Laws or Statutes in that behalf made and provided.

III. And to the end that Our Privy Council for Canada may be assisting to you in all affairs relating to Our Service, you are to communicate to them these Our Instructions, and any additional instructions which may be in like manner hereafter given to you by Us.

IV. And We do hereby declare, and it is Our Pleasure, that Our said Privy Council shall not proceed to the despatch of business unless duly summoned by your authority, nor unless four Members of the said Council be present and assisting at the meetings at which any such business shall be despatched. And We do further direct, that if, in any case you see sufficient cause to dissent from the opinion of the major part or of the whole of Our said Privy Council so present, it shall be competent to you to execute the powers and authorities vested in you by Our said Commission, and by these Our Instructions, in opposition to such their opinion; it being, nevertheless, Our Pleasure, that in every case it shall be competent to any Member of Our said Privy Council to record at length, on the Minutes of Our said Council, the grounds and reasons of any advice or opinion he may give upon any question brought under the consideration of such Council.

V. And it is Our Pleasure and you are hereby authorized to appoint by an instrument under the Great Seal of Canada, one Member of our said Privy Council to preside in your absence, and to remove him and appoint another in his stead. And if, during your absence, the Member so appointed shall also be absent, then the senior Member of the Privy Council, actually present shall preside, the seniority of the Menbers of the said Council being regulated according to the date or order of their respective appointment thereto.

VI. And We do further direct and command that a full and exact Journal or Minute be kept of all the Deliberations, Acts, Proceedings, Votes, and Resolutions of Our said Privy Council; and that at each Meeting of the said Council the Minutes of the last preceding Meeting shall be read over, confirmed, or amended, as the case may require before proceeding to the despatch of any other business.

VII. And for the execution of so much of the Powers vested in you by virtue of the "British North America Act, 1867," as relates to the declaring either that you Assent in Our Name to Bills passed by the Houses of the Parliament, or that you withold Our Assent therefrom, or that you Reserve such Bills for the signification of Our pleasure thereon, it is Our Will and Pleasure that when any Bill is presented to you for Our Assent of either of the classes hereinafter specified, you shall (unless you shall think proper to withhold Our Assent from the same) Reserve the same for the signification of Our pleasure thereon; Subject, nevertheless, to your discretion, in case you should be of opinion that an Urgent Necessity exists, requiring that such Bill be brought into immediate operation; in which case you are Authorized to Assent to such Bill in Our Name, transmitting to Us by the earliest opportunity the Bill so Assented to, together with your reasons for assenting thereto; that is to say:

1. Any Bill for the Divorce of Persons joined together in Holy Matrimony.

2. Any Bill whereby any Grant of Land or Money, or other Donation of Gratuity, may be made to yourself.

3. Any Bill whereby any Paper or other Currency may be made a Legal Tender, except the Coin of the Realm, or other Gold or Silver Coin.

4. Any Bill imposing Differential Duties.

5. Any Bill, the Provisions of which shall appear inconsistent with obligations imposed upon Us by Treaty.

6. Any Bill interfering with the discipline or control of Our Forces in Our said Dominion by land and sea.

7. Any Bill of an extraordinary nature and importance, whereby Our Prerogative, or the rights and property of Our subjects not residing in Our said Dominion, or the trade and shipping of the United Kingdom and its Dependencies, may be prejudiced.

8. Any Bill containing provisions to which Our Assent has been once refused, or

which has been disallowed by Us.

- VIII. You shall take care that all laws assented to by you in Our name, or reserved for the signification of Our pleasure thereon, be duly transmitted to Us with such explanatory observations as the nature of each law may require, and you are also to transmit fair Copies of the Journals and Minutes of the Proceedings of the said Houses of the Parliament, which you are to require from the Clerks or other proper Officers in that behalf of the said Houses of the Parliament.
- IX. And whereas We have by Our said Commission given and granted unto you full power and authority, when you shall see cause, to pardon offenders convicted of any crime, and to remit Fines, Penalties, and Forfeitures; Now We do hereby enjoin you to call upon the Judge presiding at the trial of any offenders to make to you a written report of the cases of all persons who may from time to time be condemned to suffer death by the sentence of any Court within Our said Dominion, and such reports of the said Judge shall by you be taken into consideration at the first meeting thereafter which may be conveniently held of Our said Privy Council for Canada; and you shall not pardon any such offender unless it shall appear to you expedient so to do, upon receiving the advice of Our said Privy Council therein, but in all such cases you are to decide whether to extend or withhold a pardon, according to your own deliberate judgment whether the Members of Our said Privy Council concur therein, or otherwise; Entering, nevertheless, on the Minutes of the said Council, a Minute of your reasons at length, in case you should decide any such question in opposition to the judgment of the majority of Members thereof.
- X. It is Our further will and pleasure that all commissions to be granted by you to any person or persons to be Judge, Justice of the Peace, or other necessary Officer, unless otherwise provided by law, be granted during Our pleasure only.
- XI. And whereas by Our said Commission We have authorized you to present any person or persons to any Church, Chapel, or other Ecclesiastical Benefice, within Our said Provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, to which We may from time to time be entitled to present, We do declare Our will and pleasure to be that you do not present any Minister of the United Church of England and Ireland to any Ecclesiastical Benefice without a Certificate from the Bishop for the time being of the Diocese in which such presentation is made, or his Commissary, of his being conformable to the doctrine and discipline of the said Church. And it is Our will and pleasure that the person so presented shall be instituted by the said Bishop, or his Commissary duly authorized by him.

XII. And whereas you will receive through one of Our principal Secretaries of State a Book of Tables in blank (commonly called the "Blue Book") to be annually filled up with certain Returns relative to the Revenue and Expenditure, Militia, Public Works, Legislation, Civil Establishment, Pensions, Population, Schools, Course of Exchange, Imports and Exports, Agricultural Produce, Manufactures, and other matters in the said "Blue Book" more particularly specified, with reference to the state and condition of Our said Dominion of Canada; Now We do hereby signify Our pleasure that all such Returns be accurately prepared and punctually transmitted to Us through one of Our principal Secretaries of State.

XIII. And whereas great prejudice may happen to Our service and to the security of Our said Dominion by the absence of the Governor General, you shall not, upon any pretence whatever, quit the said Dominion without having first obtained leave from Us for so doing, under Our Sign-Manual and Signet, or through one of Our principal Secretaries of State.

- 5. The contract for the Departmental Buildings is closed. The contractors profess to have a claim for interest on the amount awarded to them by arbitration.
 - 6. The contract for heating and ventilating the Public Buildings is not yet closed.
- 7. The cost of completing the Main Tower and Library of the Parliament Buildings is estimated at \$185,000.

QUARTERMASTER GENERAL'S OFFICE, Montreal, 20th December, 1866.

To the Adjutant-General of Militia, Montreal.

SIR,—I have the honor to report that I assumed command of the Camp of Observation at Thorold, on Wednesday, the 22nd August last.

The position had been selected by Colonel Peacocke, then in command of the 1st Military District, and was admirably suited for the purpose for which it was intended.

The only objection in any way to it was a scarcity of water. I caused four good wells to be sunk by the Regular Troops, which afforded an ample supply. Until they came into operation, water was brought daily to camp by contract.

The strength of the Force ranged at times from four guns of Royal Artillery, three Companies of Regular Infantry, one Troop of Volunteer Cavalry, and three Battalions of Volunteer Infantry, to four guns Royal Artillery, a wing of Regular Infantry with four guns of Volunteer Artillery, two Troops of Volunteer Cavalry, and two or three Battalions of Volunteer Infantry.

Latterly there was also an outpost of 200 Regular Infantry in addition stationed at

Port Robinson.

One Troop of Volunteer Cavalry, the Governor General's Body Guard, commanded by Lieut.-Col. Denison, was distributed into small posts from Ridgway to Chippawa, following the Lake Shore and River. By them that extent of frontier was patrolled every night, at uncertain hours. This important and arduous duty was most efficiently performed and reflects the greatest credit upon that Troop and the officer commanding it.

With the exception of the Governor General's Body Guard, no Corps remained longer than a week in camp, so that really there were only five days available for drill. On each of those days the men were drilled three times; twice a week I had field-days, when both Regular and Volunteer troops were manœuvred together, and moved across country to the attack of the strong positions which are common in the neighborhood of Thorold.

Once the Force marched to Allanburg, and once to Niagara Falls, encamping at both

places for the day, cooking dinners, and retiring to Thorold the same evening.

My chief aim was to afford officers and men instruction in the practical work which real war presents, and to avoid repeating drill-book manœuvres which never could be required in Canada, such as forming square, &c.

In compliance with your orders, I was enabled to obtain the use of a field suitable for

ball practice, where firing was carried on three times a day.

I regret to say that a large proportion of the arms would not go off, for although

clean outside, the nipples of many were clogged with dirt.

In marching, I found that the Volunteers were soon knocked up from sore feet, owing to the Wellington boots, with small high heels, being in common use amongst them.

With regard to the relative efficiency of Battalions, it is most striking that such was generally in direct proportion to the number of old army officers, and of those who had graduated at the Military Schools in them, thus proving the immense advantage which those institutions have been to the Militia Force of Canada.

In conclusion, I have to add that the Force was always ready to march upon the shortest notice. The arrangements for carrying four days' rations with us having been made by Assistant-Commissary General Rogers, to whom, and to Captain Grant, 17th Regiment, the Brigade-Major, and to Major Wadsworth, Volunteer Militia, who latterly acted as Camp Quartermaster, every praise is due for their zeal and energy.

SIR,—In obedience to instructions conveyed in your letter of this date, I have now the honor to submit the following modifications of my Report to the Commissioner of Customs and Excise, made on the 24th April, respecting the re-organization of the Excise Branch of your Department.

1st. It is now recommended that the division of Lower Canada into two and Upper Canada into three Inspection Districts be made, without disturbing the Inland Revenue Divisions, as established in the Schedule attached to the above mentioned Report, by grouping these divisions into Inspection Districts, as shewn in the amended Schedule herewith submitted.

2nd. The number of officers to be appointed may be reduced in accordance with your request, by omitting such as it was proposed to appoint for the supervision of the Distilleries which have ceased working since the former report was submitted. But it is proper to state, that any, or all of these Distilleries may at any time resume work, and that in order to protect the Revenue, it may become necessary to increase proportionately the number of that class of officers whom it is contemplated to employ in that service.

Having these considerations in view, I have prepared an amended Schedule, which, should it meet your approval, may take the place of that submitted with my previous Report on this subject.

SIR,—In obedience to your instructions, I have now the honor to submit, for your consideration, the following project for the organization of the Excise Branch of your

Department:

The increase of the Duties of Excise to a point sufficiently high to offer a great premium to those who can successfully evade them, makes the application of more effective machinery for counteracting the designs of fraudulent manufacturers a necessity, which cannot be neglected without injustice to the honest trader, nor without loss to the revenue.

It is equally necessary that, while a more rigid supervision is had over the licensed manufacturer, an effective preventive service should be organized in sections of the country where the manufacture of Excisable goods is not known to be carried on, but where, in the absence of such a preventive service, illicit manufactures may be established.

While, however, the considerations above advanced makes an increase in the number of Excise officers necessary, it is not desirable to give to each of them the status of Collectors of Inland Revenue, which involves such a multiplication of accounts as must necessarily occupy much of the officer's time. On the contrary, it is proposed to diminish the

number of Collection Districts, and thereby reduce the number of accounts.

Under the existing system of paying Collectors by a per-centage, every increase in the number of such officers involves a new set of accounts, and the removal of goods in bond, from one division to another, has a tendency to complicate them to a degree which makes them difficult to keep, and renders it especially difficult to settle how the Collector is to receive his percentage on the business passing through his division. This, together with the great fluctuations in the revenue accruing in any division, and in connection with the fact, that in many instances, the divisions yielding the largest revenues to the Collectors, involve the smallest amount of labour in collecting, appear to over-balance the advantages presented by payment by a percentage, and to afford a sufficient reason for paying all Officers by a regular salary: a system which the long experience of the British Government has shown to be most satisfactory.

To secure a proper degree of vigilance on the part of the Officers intrusted with the collection of this important branch of the revenue, it is proposed to establish a rigid system of inspection, so arranged, that in all important matters, at least two Officers must become parties to each transaction, the one acting as a check on the other. On reference to the British practice it is found that the supervision of manufactures, subject to the Excise, is conducted by a class of Officers distinct from those who collect the duties, the one class acting as a check on the other. There, however, the duties are only collected eight times within the year, while here they are collected semi-monthly, and the areas over which the collection extends are so great, and the circumstances of the country so different, that the application of the British practices, in this respect, would hardly be found practicable without incurring the expense of a great multiplicity of officers.

It is believed that an effective series of checks can be established by the proposed inspections, extending through the several grades of officers, of which the basis will be the Exciseman, an officer to be placed in manufactories liable to Excise, and who will be subject to removal from place to place as may be directed. Above these, will be the Deputy Collectors, of whom it is proposed to institute three classes, in order to make a gradation of salaries corresponding with the importance of the duties they are respectively

charged with.

It is proposed that the *Deputy Collectors* shall be inspected by and report to the *Collectors* of *Inland Revenue*, who, for the convenience of arranging their salaries will be

divided into five classes.

The Collectors will keep all the accounts of their respective divisions, and will be subject to the inspection of District Inspectors, who will also be required to inspect the operations of all subordinate Officers, and to report to the Department through the Chief Inspector. This last named Officer will also take such tours of Inspection as may be necessary for enquiry into the manner in which all the grades of Officers perform their duties, and also for enquiry into such special cases as may demand his personal attention.

The importance of the duties which the Officers of Excise are required to perform makes it exceedingly desirable that their qualifications for the correct performance of those

duties should be tested by a careful examination. The necessity for such an examination is fully recognized in the British Excise Service, where also the RIGHT of the competent. trustworthy Officer to promotion from one grade to another, as vacancies occur, is fully admitted and acted upon. This RIGHT to promotion constitutes one of the most powerful incentives to the faithful performance of duty, and to the acquirement of such qualifications as will enable the Officer to pass the examinations which precede all promotions. There, every admission into the service is into the lowest grade; but to those Officers who can pass the required Examinations, and whose character will stand the test of the rigid scrutiny to which all are subjected, a gradual rise in the service is assured.

At the outset, here, a process of educating Officers of Excise in their duties will be necessary, and some must, of course, at once take the highest position, for it is not probable that many will present themselves who already possess all the necessary qualifications. Yet it is essential to the efficiency of the service that there should be a careful examination of all Candidates, in order that those who are manifestly unfit may be rejected, and that the best material available may be selected and classified. It is also desirable that examinations for promotions should be established, and that promotion should follow

efficiency and good conduct as a matter of BIGHT.

It is submitted, therefore, that an Excise Board of Examiners be constituted, consisting of :-

The Commissioner of Customs and Excise.

The Assistant Commissioner of Customs and Excise.

The Inspector of Excise,

All as ex-officio members, and any two of whom may form a quorum.

For the convenience of Candidates, it is proposed that a local member of the Board shall be appointed at QUEBEC, one at MONTREAL, one at KINGSTON, one at TORONTO, and one at London. One of the ex-officio members, with one of the local members, may then form a board for the local examinations.

Before, however, the candidates are examined by the Excise Board, constituted as above, it is submitted that such as desire appointments as Collectors, Deputy Collectors or District Inspectors, should pass the usual examination for the Civil Service, and it is further submitted, that all candidates for employment in the Excise shall produce, before

being admitted to any examination, satisfactory credentials as to character.

With a view to placing the Officers already holding appointments in the Excise, in the positions for which they are best qualified, and in order that those who are manifestly unsuited to the service may be otherwise disposed of, it is proposed that six months' notice of the intention of the Department to call upon them to submit to an examination be given, intimating also, that all such as then fail to establish their qualification for holding office will be superseded. It is believed that every Officer who is worthy of holding his appointment will, with such notice, be able to qualify himself sufficiently to retain employment in one or other of the grades of the service.

The following course of examination is proposed :-

District Collectors, Collectors and Deputy Collectors of Inland Revenue, to pass an examination by the Civil Service Board of Examiners, and in addition thereto, an examination in the following subjects by the Excise Board of Examiners:-

1. Book-keeping by double entry. 2. Arithmetic including Decimals.

- 3. As to their knowledge of the Excise Laws.
- 4. In computing the contents of vessels.

5. Gauging.

6. Mensuration of Superficies and Solids.

7. Computing the quantities of commodities in bulk.

8. The use of Sykes' Hydrometer.

- 9. Use of the Slide Rule.
- 10. General knowledge of the processes of:-

Distillation, Brewing, and Manufacturing Tobacco. For candidates for appointment as Excisemen:-

The examination by the Civil Service Board, and in Book-keeping by double entry,

to be dispensed with, unless the candidates desire to be so examined.

It is not proposed to insist that in order to be qualified for the subordinate appointments, the candidates must be *proficients* in all the above-mentioned subjects, but that they shall be classified in each in accordance with the degree of proficiency they exhibit, and that such proficiency—all other things being equal—shall determine their claim to receive appointments, and (at the outset) the grade in which they may be employed.

The Map and Schedule accompanying this Report will shew the manner in which the several Inland Revenue Divisions and Inspection Districts are proposed to be formed. The Schedule now submitted divides Upper Canada into eighteen and Lower Canada into seventeen Inland Revenue Divisions or Collection Districts, and each Province into four Inspection Districts. These divisions have been made with reference to facilities of intercourse.

For the purpose of determining the grade of officers to be appointed, it may be useful to consider the Inland Revenue Divisions as of two classes. First, Those which will yield a Revenue over the cost of collection; and, Second, Those wherein the cost of collection may be expected to exceed the Gross Revenue, and where, therefore, the officers will be appointed chiefly for preventive service. Hereafter this distinction may be found to be sufficiently marked to justify some distinctive designation. At present I have distinguished it in the accompanying Schedule (in accordance with the information now available), by the letters R & P, signifying respectively Revenue and Preventive Districts.

Bearing in mind the various circumstances attending the duties which the several grades of officers may be called upon to perform, the following Schedule of Salaries is

submitted for your consideration :-

To the Schedule of Inland Revenue Divisions I have attached appropriate columns shewing the number and grade of Officers which it is proposed to appoint in each division. These have been distributed with reference—so far as possible—to the magnitude of the business, as shewn by previous returns, existing in each division, taking also into account the nature of the business and the difficulties attending its performance. In the distribution of Officers here suggested, I have included a sufficient number of Excisemen to maintain an unremitted surveillance over the operations of all distilleries, and a greatly increased attendance at breweries and tobacco manufactories.

The final column in schedule C shows the total of the proposed salaries, calculated by the scale above submitted, but the cost thus arrived at does not include travelling expenses, office rent, nor contingencies, which, at present, can hardly be estimated with any great degree of precision. It is submitted, that in order to arrive at a knowledge of the travelling expenses actually necessary for working each division, the respective Collectors, and District Inspectors, may for the present be paid the expenses actually incurred, the statements of accounts being in each case verified by a solemn declaration, and subjected to the audit of the Collectors, and Inspecting Officer, as the case may be, and finally to the audit of the Department. The accounts would thus be subjected to a series of checks sufficient to prevent improper or unreasonable payments. At a future day it may be found expedient to allow a specific amount per diem, to each District Inspector, Collector, or Deputy Collector, for

each day on which they travel on duty, but it is believed that, for the present, the method first suggested should prevail, and that it will be found more satisfactory and equitable than an annual allowance, which is, in fact, a premium for travelling as little as possible.

Such Officers as are removed from place to place by order of the Department, or in the

routine of the service, should, of course, be allowed the actual cost of such removal.

It is difficult if not impossible to frame any reliable estimate for Office Rent. In Hamilton, Kingston, and Windsor, sufficient accommodation for the Excise exists in the respective Custom Houses, and I think it might also be had in the Custom House at Quebec. At present a suite of Offices is urgently required at Montreal, and can hardly be obtained, of suitable dimensions, at a less rental than \$800, perhaps \$1000. In Toronto, a suite of offices has been secured at a cost of \$180 per annum. Should no suitable room be available in the Custom House at Quebec, it will be necessary to incur a rental there of from \$400 to \$500. In the minor divisions, an average of \$60 will, I think, be a sufficient allowance.

Hitherto, so far as I am informed, Officers of Excise have not invariably been sworn into office. It is submitted that in future all such Officers should be required to take the oath prescribed by the Act 22nd Vic., cap. 16, section 5.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR GENERAL IN COUNCIL.

On the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Finance, and under and in virtue of the 7th section of the Act 29-30 Vic., Cap. 7, intituled, "An Act to amend the Acts respecting Duties of Excise, and to alter the duty thereby imposed on spirits," His Excellency in Council has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the following regulations respecting permits for the removal of spirits from the Distillery in which they have been manufactured, or from any warehouse in which they have been bonded or stored—together with the forms and explanations accompanying the same, be, and the same are hereby sanctioned and adopted, that is to say:

1. Permits for the removal of spirits from any Distillery wherein they have been manufactured, or from any warehouse wherein they have been bonded or stored, may be granted on the application of the owner of such spirits, or of his duly authorized agent by the collector, or the assistant collector, of Inland Revenue, for the Inland Revenue Division

in which the spirits then are.

2. Every application for such a permit shall state:

(a) The number and description of the packages in which the spirits are contained.
(b) The marks and numbers on each of the packages.

(c) The quantity, in wine gallons, in each package and its strength.

(d) The equivalent in wine gallons of the strength of proof.
(e) The place wherein it is then stored.

(f) The place which it is to be removed.
(g) The conveyance by which the removal is to be made.
(h) Whether the duty has been paid, and, if not, how secured.

(i) The time at which it is to be removed.

(j) The name, occupation and place of business of the owner.

(k) The name, place of business and occupation of the person into whose possession the spirits is to be transferred, and

(1) The name of the person or corporation in whose custody it will be during its

removal.

3. Every application for a permit shall be made on a printed form, in conformity with that hereunto annexed, and marked A, and shall be signed by the person making it

4. Every permit granted shall be on the printed forms supplied by the Department of Finance, which forms shall be in conformity with the form B hereunto annexed, and shall be printed on paper especially prepared for the purpose, with such type or engravings as may be approved by the Minister of Finance.

5. Every permit shall state the period for which it is to remain in force, which period shall not be more than will, in the opinion of the officer granting it, be sufficient for effect-

ing the removal of the spirits to which it relates.

6. The permit shall accompany the spirits to which it relates, and remain in the possession of the person having charge thereof, but it shall be produced for examination as often as may be required by any officer having authority thereto, and it shall be delivered to the collector, or assistant collector, of Inland Revenue for the Inland Revenue Division into which the spirits are to be removed, or wherein they are removed from one place to another, within the period mentioned in the permit.

7. Every endorsation of the examination of any permitshall be made on the back thereof,

and every permit shall be defaced by writing the word "cancelled" across the face of it,

on the expiration of the period for which it has been granted.

8. Permits shall not be granted for the removal of spirits unless the packages in which they are contained have been marked and numbered in conformity with the Warehousing Regulations approved on the 17th March, 1865.

On the recommendation of the Honorable the Minister of Finance, and under and in virtue of the authority given and conferred by the Act 29-30 Vic., Cap. 7, His Excellency in Council has been pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered that the following Regulations respecting the manufacture of the undermentioned dutiable goods in Bond, be and the same are hereby approved and adopted—that is to say:

1. That subject to the provisions of the Act above cited, to these Regulations, and to such further Regulations as may hereafter be made by competent authority, Licenses

may be granted to manufacture in Bond the articles herein enumerated, viz:

Drugs-including Essences and Extracts.

Perfumery, Vinegar, Varnishes, Starch.

2. That any Bonded manufactory licensed under the above recited Act, may be closed and the License forfeited, whenever it is shewn to the satisfaction of the Minister of Finance that there is just cause for believing that frauds upon the Revenue are perpetrated in

connection with such manufactory.

- 3. That in addition to the License fee named in the Act above cited, every person to whom a "Bonded Manufacturing License" is granted, shall pay to the Collector of Inland Revenue, in monthly instalments, such sums of money as shall be sufficient for the payment of the expenses incurred by the Finance Department for the effective supervision of the manufactures carried on under such license, and for taking account of the dutiable articles consumed in such manufacture, and of the articles produced therefrom. And the maximum sum to be so paid by the party aforesaid shall be from time to time determined by the Minister of Finance, as he may deem necessary, and shall, as nearly as may be, be in proportion to the magnitude and general character of the business carried on under such license.
- 4. That goods manufactured in Bond shall be removed from the apartments of the manufactory wherein they are manufactured as soon as the whole process of manufacture is completed, and shall then be placed in apartments or store-rooms set apart for that purpose, wherein they shall be bonded in the manner required by the Excise Bonding Regulations made by Order in Council, dated the 17th day of May, 1865; and they shall be dealt with, in respect of their subsequent removal, exportation or entry for consumption, in accordance with the said Regulations.

The expense of the establishment is fixed at a stated sum, varying only for repairs of building, bedding, and according to number of inmates; the keeper boarding herself, and

receiving a stipulated sum for board of inmates.

I have therefore, in making up the statement, selected as well as I could, what charges should properly belong to the year ending 30th June, 1867. I now give, for your

information, cost for years ending October 31st, 1865 and 1866.

In case of infectious diseases, the expenses are largely increased. There is no Pest House attached to the Hospital, and I have always used the Quarantine Station, but the buildings are now unfit for occupancy, and are not under my control.

> CANADIAN GOVERNMENT EMIGRATION OFFICE, Wolverhampton, 13th February, 1868.

A. C. Buchanan, Esq., Quebec,

DEAR SIR,—I did not receive letters from you last week, and the incoming mail will

not be here before morning.

I went down to Liverpool last week to endeavour to make special arrangements with the Steam Company, for the passage of female servants. Representatives of all the Steam Companies, trading to America, had a meeting the evening after. They decided that no exceptions should be made, and a legal arrangement was come to that they would not underself tickets during the season. Conventions are to be occasionally held to regulate the rate. By book post I give you the price to April. The intention is to charge £6. 6s. 0d., by the Quebec steamers. By the same post I enclose you a copy of the Brazilian scheme; also, a Virginian and a New Zealand pamphlet on emigration.

After leaving Liverpool, I proceeded to Dublin, and spent four days in the Midland Counties. I had introductions to persons in Longford, which is a very important market town, and had the apportunity of making the acquaintance of several farmers, whom I had I went down to Liverpool last week to endeavour to make special arrangements with

town, and had the opportunity of making the acquaintance of several farmers, whom I had

much conversation about Canada. I found that Lord Longford (who owns much of the district) had appointed a new agent, and he was notifying the tenants of an increase of the rents after March. One holder of four acres, let for £12 per annum, was to be raised to £18, and other farms in nearly as great a ratio. I then went to Newtown-Forbes, Granard and Mullingar, and found, in every instance, a great desire for information. I explained the scheme of free lands, as proposed by the Province of Ontario, and arranged for a considerable distribution of the next issue of the Gazette, and am in hopes that we shall get some good settlers from this district. I spent a week in this manner, and felt much regret that I was not at liberty to prolong my stay. I am sadly in want of an addition of the Gazette for this year. I am almost out of the November lot, and several agents, who distribute for me, are asking for more. I think it very desirable that the date should not be given in them. I can distribute well, in March, April and May, 70,000 copies, as I shall be able to procure a list of names of the bulk of the tenant farmers in Ireland, a large number can be well-placed; but this will depend on the assistance allowed me. The Liverpool passenger brokers, engaged in the Continental trade, are extremely anxious to be made acquainted with the free land system, that they may advise their correspondents. I can arrange with about a dozen of good agents on the Continent without going over there, but it will be desirable to have parts of the Gazette translated for use there.

I am in hopes of receiving liberty to remove to London, with full particulars for my guidance. I do not think it would be desirable to send office assistance from Canada Canadians are easily found here. Mr. Champion, a grandson of the late Col. Thomson, President of the Canada West Agricultural Society, is here, and would make a good clerk. I could also get others without difficulty. We would not require officers in Scotland or Ireland, but if we had good lecturers, they would be very beneficial. It is unfortunate the present delay, and we shall lose heavily by it, as farmers cannot give up their holdings after said time until they reap. I think, however, that my former statement of 50,000 a year will be reached in the course of two or three years, with earnest

attention.

Waiting anxiously for the morning mail, that I may hear the state of your health, which I pray may be much restored.

SIR,—In consequence of the death of my esteemed friend, Mr. Buchanan, who instructed me to report only to him, at the Quebec office, and not having been advised of the course I should pursue for the future, I enclosed to the acting Agent, Mr. Stafford, a memoranda of accounts to February 29th, with an approximate statement of expenditure for March, requesting a remittance of £80 which would leave me an amount of about £60 for emigration purposes after paying liabilities up to the 31st instant.

Some six weeks since, I received permission from Quebec to remove my office to London, as that is without question the most proper place in which to conduct an emigration business, and while in London, some three weeks since, I endeavored to find a suitable position. I saw several offices near Charing Cross well adapted to the purpose, but I thought it injudicous to secure any of them until further advised—supposing it not improbable that our Government might desire them of a capacity suited to the requirements of any deputation which may visit England on political business.

I frequently made suggestions to the late Mr. Buchanan concerning emigration matters that more satisfactory results might be attained. In every instance he approved of my views and promised to bring them forward at a proper time. I presume they will be em-

bodied in the fourthcoming report.

Mr. Outram, one of the Halifax Immigration Agents, is at present in Liverpool, I arranged to distribute their pamphlets and to act in concert with him on his return to Nova Scotia. The New Brunswick agent also supplied me with the rates of wages in that

There are 1,324 journals published in the United Kingdom and I think it would be desirable to advertise in about 200 of them, which I have selected. The bulk of them are

issued either weekly or semi-weekly.

Mr. Stafford advised me, by last mail, that they were preparing matter for an issue of the Emigration Gazette, of which I am much in want, I am also in need of a supply of maps, as I find it difficult to explain to persons at a distance the position of the free grant lands in Ontario.

As the season in which I should be most beneficially employed is fast slipping away, I would feel much obliged by you advising me, at an early date, about what amount of expenses I may incur for office rent, &c., in London, should my removal be approved of; also, about the amount I may expend in advertisements. I have had very considerable experience in these matters the past two years and will endeavor to keep my expenditure at the lowest limits compatible with due efficiency.

I wrote last week to the Honorable Mr. McGee, with full particulars of the Irish emigration from the English manufacturing towns (recently noticed in the newspapers) to

Brazil.

SIR,—I have the honor to inform you a considerable number of immigrants have arrived late, via Portland, and there are quite a number waiting for employment here until the spring opens which is now close at hand.

It is necessary a short tour should be made in the district adjoining this Agency, for the purpose of ascertaining where parties can be sent where they may find ready em-

ployment.

Wardens, Reeves, Deputy Reeves and Mayors of towns and cities, changed from year to year, and then found some experience that a personal return with those parties is of immense benefit in placing immigants, when they come here in large numbers, as they always do in the the last three months of the season.

This answers a great saving in not having to provide for those people for a period of

perhaps a week at a time, as we had to do in some cases last year.

We would also require to give notices, say for a month at least, in a few of the leading papers, calling on parties to apply at this Agency for hands as they require them.

In fact we require to be sustained and assisted by the public at large as well as the Department, to enable us to discharge our duty as it ought to be done.

All of which I submit for your consideration.

GOVERNMENT IMMIGRATION OFFICE, Quebec, 4th April, 1868.

SIR,—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 31st ult., informing me "that the expenses for transport of immigrants are to be in future curtailed so far as to become a mere incidental to be entertained in only few and exceptional cases."

Under the present system and until some means are found, either to prevent or restrict the influx of foreign pauper immigrants to our shores, the annual expenditure at this Agency for transport and relief must necessarily be large, and will always, as a matter of course, be regulated by the character and extent of the immigration, so that in any estimate I might send you it would be totally out of my power to state, with any degree of accuracy, what the amount of such expenditure would probably be.

The whole question of granting transport assistance to foreign immigrants has been so thoroughly canvassed by the late Chief Immigration Agent, in some of his recent reports, and more particularly in his official letter, dated 13th September, 1866 (an extract from which I beg to enclose), that I beg most respectfully to refer you to his views given therein, based as they were upon the experience of many years' service, and to ask for them that consideration which my own knowledge of the question convinces me they deserve.

In connection with this subject, I may perhaps be permitted to observe that, from

In connection with this subject, I may perhaps be permitted to observe that, from reports I have already received, the foreign emigration to this port during the approaching season promises to be larger than usual, and will also set in earlier, for passenger ships are expected to arrive in the St. Lawrence from Germany and Norway, in the beginning

of next month.

It can well be imagined that if upon the arrival of a batch of 2,000 or 3,000 in one day, fully one-fifth of whom will most certainly be landed at Point Levi without food and without money to take them onward, we have no shelter to give them, and if we have no power to assist them to reach their relatives in the west, or to places where they can obtain immediate employment amongst those who speak their own language, that they will, in a few days, crowd our wharves and city as beggars, and perhaps from want and exposure become the means of introducing epidemic disease amongst us. In such a case the Government, but more particularly the Immigration Department, would be exposed to much public censure. Therefore, supposing even that these people had been landed here without having paid any Capitation Tax (which the laws say is to be applied in assisting them), we should in se f-defence, and as a means of public safety, be compelled to assist them, and until legislation is had on the subject, I see no means of curtailing this expenditure at the Port of Quebec.

I hope, therefore, that you will not accuse me of overstepping the strict limits of my duty when I humbly but respectfully request that this subject may be re-considered, and that whilst keeping in view the necessity of exercising the most searching economy in the matter, in order to keep the expenditure for immigration purposes within the limits of the appropriation, the Minister will be pleased to confer upon this Office the discretionary

power it has hitherto held in dealing with the exigencies of the case.

EXTRACT from a letter to the Bureau of Agriculture, dated 13th September, 1866, from A. C. Buchanan, Esq., Chief Emigration Agent.

"From this you will see that nearly the whole expenditure has been incurred on our foreign immigrants, and chiefly on those who have passed through the Province. Still the outlay has been less than half the amount received for immigrant tax. As the law imposing this tax to a certain extent defines its application, and with the system at present in force, I do not see how it can be otherwise; as if we cannot offer them suitable employment, and they are without the means of support, they must be provided for in some way, and the cheapest and most effectual way is by enabling them to reach their friends. If we were to pass a law making the ships liable we we will put a stop to this trade, and drive them to New York and other American Ports, who are making every exertion now to try and secure them, and so long as the head money they pay more than covers our expenditure, on their account, I consider it is our interest to encourage the traffic in consideration of the benefit the country derives indirectly from it.

"Up to the 1st of July the amount received for the inland transport alone, cannot have been less than from \$50,000 to \$60,000, and if we have not, up to the present, been able to offer (at least to the Norwegian portion) sufficient inducements to remain with us, let us endeavour to secure as much benefit as possible from their transit through our

country."

SIR,-I acknowledge the receipt of your letter of the 21st March, and in answer I am directed to request you not, until otherwise instructed, to incur any expenses of any sort, and to stop all proceedings requiring expenses, with the exception, however, of the ordinary circulation of maps, pamphlets, and papers now in your possession, at the same time not to cease your personal efforts to foster Emigration to Canada.

As soon as the New Government policy is adopted, the Honorable Minister of Agriculture will cause it to be communicated to you so far as you are concerned, but at the present moment it is impossible to give out any expectation and less definite instructions.

SIR,—Herewith I forward to you copy of a letter addressed to the Honorable Minister of Agriculture, which, as you will see, speaks for itself. It came from the St. George's Society of Toronto. I have been directed, by the Honorable Minister of Agriculture, to communicate such information to you in order that you should take care not to induce such immigration, which may prove to result in hardship for the immigrants and serious embarrassment for the people of this country. It has been repeatedly said in documents emanating from this office that the main object of our Immigration Agents is to bring forth a current of such immigration as can be furnished by agricultural populations, and specially of farmers of some means.

ST. GEORGE'S SOCIETY OF TORONTO, Toronto, March 21st, 1868.

To the Honorable the Minister of Agriculture, Government Immigration Department.

SIR,—The representation of the Canadian Emigration Agent in England, by handbills posted up at the sea-ports, and other places in England, and otherwise to the effect that boiler-makers, fitters, blacksmiths, all descriptions of workers in iron, and competent hands acquainted with woollen and linen manufactures, could find employment in Canada, at good wages, led to the shipment to Canada, last summer, by the ships Thames and St. Lawrence, of between five and six hundred English emigrants, composed chiefly of machinists, boiler-makers, fitters, moulders, ship-blacksmiths, and labourers in the dockyards, and others connected with iron works.

The greater part of these men were sent out by subscriptions raised for the purpose, and arrived here without funds at a time when business in these branches of trade was and is still very dull, very many found their way to this city destitute and totally unable to find

employment of any kind.

The Government Immigration Agent here being restricted in his relief, to giving them passes to other points, and to furnishing them with a few loaves of bread, these starving operatives fell upon the hands of the St. George's Society, whose Committee relieved them with money to buy food and fuel: several of these families were found by that Committee to have pawned the greater part of their clothing and bedding to obtain food, and were consequently at the commencement of a severe winter, not only without sufficient food but without fuel and sufficient clothing to protect them from the cold.

Of course the object of this Society is to give to English Emigrants such assistance as their funds will allow; but the circumstances above mentioned have led to an unusual demand upon their funds, and to an extra expenditure of at least \$150, and this has not ceased; for immigrants of the above character are applying for relief, and the Society feel that under the circumstances they have a fair claim to that amount upon the funds at the disposal of the Immigration Department.

That Department should make good to this Society an extra expenditure caused by the representation of its own Agent, and I have respectfully to request that you will give such directions in the premises as will lead to this Society being reimbursed the above

amount out of the funds at the disposal of the Immigration Department.

SIR,—I received by yesterday's mail, from Mr. Stafford of Quebec, a copy of a communication addressed to him for you, from the President of the St. George's Society of Toronto, requesting that the Department would reimburse them a sum of about \$150, advanced for the assistance of iron-workers, whom he states were advised by me to emigrate to Canada, on board the Thames and St. Lawrence, and that to attain that purpose I issued handbills, which were posted up in the sea-ports and other places. To save time I thought it desirable to reply by this mail instead of waiting for a communication from you on the

subject.

I have to state that I issued 10,000 copies of the posting bill referred to on the 27th February, 1867. The subject-matter was taken from the *Emigration Gazette*, carefully compiled, was approved of by the Chief Agent at Quebec, and I cannot perceive a word that could be considered objectionable for the season in which they were issued; at the foot of the bill I invited intending emigrants to apply to me for information. Five hundred of these bills were distributed in London, at the above date, it was not decided to ship any of these men from the East End until July, none of them applied to me for information, and I think it questionable if they ever saw a copy of the posting bill until they arrived in Toronto. The facts of the case are these: owing to the dreadful destitution existing in London, a Committee was formed to alleviate the distress, and Mr. Kingscote published an address in the *Times*, asking for funds to send some of these out of work to Canada, and quoting from the late Mr. Buchanan's report, that iron-workers were wanted in Canada West, a copy of this letter I enclose to you with the passage marked.

On the 10th July, 1867, I received a note from Mr. Haly, the Honorary Secretary, advising me of their intention to send out a number of distressed operatives, I replied to this note on the same day, and clearly pointed out the classes who could find employment, and explained that Mr. Buchanan's remarks would not apply to iron ship-builders, shinglers, &c. I also requested Mr. Haley to supply me with a list of the avocations of those the Society proposed sending out, and would refer you to the copy of my letter of July 10th. I received an incomplete list of the names and trades of the families from Mr. Haley, on the 20th July. The selection seemed to me to have been made with considerable care, and I advised Mr. Haly that, in my opinion, there would be no difficulty in settling them on arrival. The list of names and trades, with the number of women and children, I posted to the Chief Agent. I have requested Mr. Stafford to enclose you the

copy, the one I retained I was obliged to send down to Mr. Haly, and he did not return

The number stated as shipped by the Thames was 147 souls.

As the Committee proposed to make a further shipment, I wrote requesting them to send young women (aged between 15 and 25 years, accustomed to household work, &c., and that we could find employment for five or six hundred shipped during the season. This the Committee declined, but they decided to send out 170 souls by the St. Lawrence, of a similar class to those shipped by the Thames, a list of names, &c., I posted to Mr. Buchanan, August 15th, 1867. I have requested Mr. Stafford to analyze the list, shewing the number of men (with their calling), women and children; several of the girls were of an age to go into service, and a large number of the families were, judging by the names, Irish who would have no claim on the St. George's Society. According to the list furnished me by the Secretary, the Committee shipped in all, 317 souls, and not between five and six hundred as stated by the President. The Secretary, however, avised me that his lists were not perfect, and possibly there may have been a trifling addition to those named. I was assured by members of the Committee (and they are all gent'emen of the highest standing), that the greatest care would be taken that those only of good character should be selected.

You will perceive, by the reports of our inland Agents (published in the November number of the Emigration Gazette, copies of which I beg to enclose), that they refer to the families sent out by the London Committee, and state that they were profitably

employed with but little delay.

I would respectfully say, in addition, that I feel surprised at the President of the Toronto St. George's Society, making so great a charge against an absent man, without some little investigation. That I cannot charge myself with any of the acts of indiscretion which he has imputed to me, in the discharge of my emigration duties, and that unless he has other charges to bring forward. I am unable to see the justice of the claim he has made against the Department.

SIR, —I have to thank you for your note of yesterday, in reference to the East End

Emigration Association, a prospectus of which appears in to-day's London papers.

Uarpenters, masons, bricklayers, plasterers, painters, black and white smiths, tailors, shoemakers, sewing girls, girls who have been accustomed to any description of household work, boiler-makers, labourers (more particularly those acquainted with farm work), and persons having a knowledge of woollen and flax manufactures, would be certain to find profitable employment immediately on their arrival in Canada.

Our Government would not grant assistance towards the passage of persons emigrating, but on arrival the Immigration Agents, whose names you will see in the paper I send, would give the new comers every advice and assistance in their power to find employment

and comfortable homes.

Mr. Buchanan's remarks concerning iron-workers, would be rather wide as understood in England, iron ship builders could not find employment at their business in Canada, as Works of that class are not carried on, nor could "saddlers," "shinglers," or men engaged in iron-rolling find employment in any number, I would not advise them to go out without first endeavouring to arrange work for them.

For young females the demand is so great, that in the early part of the season, I was desired to make application to Irish Unions to ascertain if the Guardians would be willing to send out a few hundreds, the Carlow Guardians only sent out a few (13). I received letters from Toronto, a few days ago, announcing their arrival, and that they were placed in comfortable situations immediately, at wages varying from 16s. to 20s. stg. a month.

The price of passage by the Montreal Company Mail Steamers, from Liverpool, to

The price of passage by the Montreal Company Mail Steamers, from Liverpool, to Quebec, has been reduced to £4 each adult, according to the bill I enclose. When the Committee have decided on the number to be sent it would be very desirable that Mr. Buchanan, the Chief Agent, should be advised a week or two before their shipment, in

order to give him an opportunity to arrange for their settlement.

I will be very pleased if you would furnish me with the calling of those proposed to be sent out, that none may be shipped but those whose trades would enable them to materially benefit their condition.

SIR,—In conformity with your instructions, I have now the honor to forward herewith a partial estimate of the probable expenditure at this Agency, during the quarter ending 30th June, 1868, as correctly as, with a due regard to economy, I am enabled to make it out.

I leave the estimate for transport blank, because the assistance to be afforded in that shape must always depend upon the number of pauper immigrants arriving. I may remark, however, that hitherto the bulk of the Foreign Emigration has reached us in the months of May, June and July, and that this year a much larger number of emigrants than last year may be expected. The cost of transport for the quarter ending 30th June, 1867, was \$6,478.00.

The Grosse Isle Expenditure (also left blank) will, I presume, be paid through this office. The expenditure to 30th June last year was \$5,185.25. I believe considerable repairs are needed, and I know the late Chief Agent, shortly before he died, applied to the Government for an appropriation for that purpose.

Mr. Dixon, in his recent correspondence, expresses a strong desire for a further supply of *Emigration Gazettes*, probably, if from 30,000 to 50,000 copies of a new edition

were sent to him, they might suffice and keep him employed until the fall.

SIR,—In answer to your communication relating to the land transport of immigrants at the expense of the Government, I am particularly instructed to direct you to adhere strictly to the orders already given.

It is the adopted policy of the Government not to pay land transport of immigrants, nor any transport, except in very few extraordinary cases, and that only on a special

anthorization having been obtained from this Department.

Therefore, you shall not incur any expenses on that account, and you shall not pay any other Agencies' expense for the same beyond the amount entered in the accepted estimates of each quarter, unless you are specially authorized by this Department.

Be kind enough to forward copies of the present letter to all the Agents in commu-

nication with your office, as a renewed intimation of the determined decision of the Honorable Minister of Agriculture to carry on the said policy.

SIR,—I have now the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your several favors, dated the 31st ultimo, 1st and 3rd instant, with instructions, which will be carefully carried out

to the utmost of my power.

From your report there is likely to be a large influx of immigrants to Canada this coming season; but fancy they will be a class so utterly destitute as the Lancashire, Paisley and Glasgow cotton operatives who arrived in such numbers during the American rebellion in 1863 and '64. I was then directed to take frequent journeys through the section of country under this Agency, which was at that time most essential; as I formed the acquaintance of the Reeves, Mayors and many influential men who took an interest in immigration, who were settled in places of easy access by railway. It proved of great advantage to me in facilitating the distribution of a great many that I could not otherwise have found employment for in the immediate neighborhood here. As it is most unlikely that many of that class will reach here this summer, I do not consider it necessary to incur the expense of a trip through the country.

With respect to the messenger being dispensed with at the close of the season, may I be allowed to remark that there is little or no cessation at this Agency during the year; Wm. Clever acts as German Interpreter and my only assistant, whose services are daily required as the arrivals are continued both summer and winter, as the enclosed statement

for the last six months will fully verify.

I was pleased to learn my estimate for the present quarter was satisfactory, and only hope I may not be obliged to apply for authority to extend it, the most rigid economy will be strictly observed.

SIR,—I have the honor to forward you, herewith, for the information of the Honorable Minister of Agriculture and Immigration, a letter I have this day received from Mr. J. S. Haly, Secretary of the London East End Emigration Committee (a Society formed for the purpose of affording relief by emigration to distressed iron-workers in the London ship-yards), informing me that a party of these mechanics numbering, with their families, 126 souls in all (as per enclosed list) were to be shipped by the Steamship St. Lawrence for Quebec, on the 16th instant, as the St. Lawrence may be expected to arrive in port in a very few days, and as it is also plain from Mr. Haly's letter, that these people will be landed here destitute of means and, moreover, with the expectation of being forwarded by the Department to the best fields for their labor; I should be glad to know whether, in the absence of any employment for them in this city, you desire me to grant them land transport, or am I, contrary to precedent, to refuse them any assistance of this nature. I may mention that a much larger number of iron-workers was emigrated by the same Committee

last year, and they were disposed of by the late Chief Agent in the usual manner. I have forwarded a copy of the list referred to to each of the inland Agents, requesting him to make the necessary enquiries as to what demand exists in his neighborhood for this particular class of mechanic, and what proportion of the present lot his district can absorb? Upon receiving the several Agents' replies I shall, if you require it, be able to give you a proper idea of the manner in which these people are to be disposed of.

I had already, prior to the receipt of Mr. Haly's letter, in consequence of hearing through the English papers that an emigration of this kind was contemplated, written to our Agent, Mr. Dixon, begging of him to discountenance the scheme by every effort in his power, as the demand for iron-workers in this country is, at present, extremely limited, so that I think there need be no fear of our being troubled with another batch of emigrants

of a similar character again this season.

EAST END EMIGRATION RELIEF FUND, 8 St. Martin's Place, London, 11th April, 1868.

DEAR SIR,—Enclosed I beg to send you lists of emigrants selected by the Committee of this Fund, who are proceeding to Quebec in the steamship St. Lawrence, leaving on the 16th instant.

The Committee will be much obliged by your making the necessary arrangements for the reception of these people, and by your forwarding them to those towns and stations in

the colony where their labor may be required.

The emigrants have been selected with great care—their characters have been strictly enquired into. They are not paupers or persons in receipt of parochial relief, and therefore it will not be necessary for you to give them the £1 per head, per adult, which the Poor Law Board requires to be given to such persons as are paid for or assisted by

the guardians.

I think from the reports which have reached me, that it is better that the emigrants should not have such a sum handed to them indiscriminately. Nevertheless the Committee would much regret that the poor people should suffer from the want of this allowance or be left destitute thereby, and they will cheerfully defray any small charges which may be incurred in supporting them until they can be forwarded to the places at which their labor is required. The Committee will be glad to receive from you a report respecting immigration and the requirements of the colony.

It hoping to hear from you that the emigrants arrived out safely, and that you

approve of them, and that they are of service to Canada.

DEAR SIR,—I have to thank you for your letter of the 9th. After I had the pleasure of seeing you, on the 22nd February, I wrote to the Acting Chief Agent, at Quebec, to make enquiry at each of the inland offices as to the probable demand for mechanics similar to those sent out last year from London. By the mail which was delivered this morning, I received a reply. I enclose you extracts from the reports of each of the agents, which I regret to say are not satisfactory as regards the great bulk of the poor creatures without employment at the East End of London. The Acting Agent begged me to request the Committee not to send any more iron-ship builders or dock laborers. Men following the other avocations could be easily disposed of.

I hope those booked for the St. Lawrence may prove more suited to their wants than those shipped last season, and that Mr. Donaldson's complaint may not be repeated. Since Mr. Buchanan's death, in February, Mr. L. Stafford of Quebec has been the Acting Chief Agent. Would you kindly send him a list of those going on Thursday, with their trades, by to-morrow night's mail, if possible, that he may be prepared to receive them on

arrival.

SIR,—I have at this moment received a letter from Quebec stating the St. Lawrence is expected to arrive in a few days, from London, with a number of emigrants on board, sent out by the East End Emigration Society, composed of a class, I fear, very similar to

those we had last year.

I see by the list they are composed principally of mechanics and labourers, men with large families, and few of the children over ten years old. I have written Mr. Stafford to send our proportion of them, and he will endeavor to do the best he can for them, but before incurring any expense, I thought best to have the benefit of your advice. On their arrival here I have no doubt they will be penniless, and last year I found the most ready plan of finding them employment was by sending them to the nearest towns and rural districts, but under the new regulations I will not be able to do so this season, and if those people are to be allowed into the premises they must be fed in some way, and I thought best to write you in time, as I do not wish to incur any displeasure in the discharge of my duty.

I think if a notice was put into the Globe or Leader for a short time it would have the effect in assisting, in a great measure, in providing places for them,—not only this batch, but immigrants generally. In this, too, I will await your advice. I must say I think it unfortunate this class of people should come here at all, more especially at this season of the year, as it will be likely to create a bad impression. However, we will do the best for them and only hope they will be a more moral lot than we had last season.

They are the parties to which the St. George's Society referred, in their application that a portion of the fund they had paid them should be refunded by the Immigration Department.

poor destitutes, makes a call on this Department for an overplus of expenditure.

The Honorable Minister of Agriculture hopes that the present course will be sufficient to stop proceedings which has proved to be no relief for the sufferers and a great burden to our Colony.

SIR,—I am in receilt of your favor of 26th instant, requesting me to furnish an estimate of all the sums required for the service of immigration at my agency for the next quarter, and I have now to enclose herewith an estimate of the sums required, amounting in all to \$355; this is exclusive of medical aid, in case of an epidemic breaking out among the immigrants on their way to the west, or for travelling expenses, in case it becomes necessary for me to visit the distant places of my agency to obtain information as to the number of immigrants that would find employment.

Of course it is all guess work, this estimate; it may amount to more or it may not amount to so much, all will depend upon the number of indigent immigrants forwarded from the cities and towns of the Old Country by benevolent societies; when they come without means they must be cared for until employment is obtained for them, and forwarded

to nearest point where their services may be required.

On examining the expenses for some years past, I find the lowest expenditure in quarter, ending 30th June, to be \$93.58, and the highest amount expended during that quarter in any one year to be \$437.29, but the average from 1862 to 1867, inclusive, would be about \$350, for quarter ending 30th June, in each year.

I have always striven to keep down the expenses of the Agency as low as possible, and will continue to do so for the future, as long as I continue the Agent; but, as I said

.

before, the expenses of the Agency beyond fixed salaries will altogether depend upon the number of indigent immigrants that may be forwarded to my agency to dispose of.

Trusting to be advised at an early date that my estimate has passed to enable me to assist any indigent immigrant that may arrive (and some have arrived already via Portland and New York).

SIR,—I have now the honor of answering your letter of the 20th instant, and beg to say that through the month of March, before farming operations had fairly commenced in this district, a large number of immigrants arriving from Portland, and others unemployed for some time before, were thrown on our shoulders, and unless we either found them in bread, or kept them at a boarding-house, there was no remedy unless to send them to the country where they would find work.

During this month, now nearly closed, I have not given a single pass except three, and they were extreme cases, and only a short distance from Toronto. I found some difficulty to change a system so long carried on all at once. However, I may be allowed to state that I have no desire whatever to exceed the limit of my instruction, and will adhere to them to the letter in future. This Agency, it will be observed, differs from most of the others, as all the immigrants arriving at Portland for Canada, during the winter months,

make their way to Toronto without stopping at any of the Eastern Agencies, and of course they never see them at all at Quebec; this involves a much larger amount of duty than elsewhere, and those people have to be provided with employment at a season of the year when work is not plenty. If, therefore, I have erred in my anxiety to discharge the duties devolving upon me in endeavouring to do everything for the benefit of the Department, I certainly am guilty, but under all the circumstances, and the new changes of things, I have done the best I could, and at the least expense.

I did not intend making the tour of enquiry before first putting the matter before you, but one of the Directors of the Nipissing Railway Company came to me late in the afternoon of Wednesday, and said they were some going with the train, leaving at 5 p.m., and I did not like to lose so good a chance of collecting a large amount of valuable information as I did, and when I started I fully expected to return on Saturday evening, but finding a great demand for labourers at the different meetings, I was induced to go through to the end of the route, and where I had an opportunity of seeing where lands could be had by parties wishing to purchase, and where labourers would find employment. Mr. O'Donohoe, my Assistant, was attending to the office in my absence, and on my return I found all right.

Trusting these explanations may be satisfactory,

REPORT.

Since the spring of 1866 the Volunteer force of Ontario and Quebec has increased from 348 Companies, with a nominal strength of 19,597 men, to 569 Companies with a nominal strength of 33,754 men.

Great inconvenience had been experienced during the preceding year from the fact that the force consisted for the most part of isolated Companies; the Volunteers of the principal cities having been alone formed in battalions. Thus, when in the spring of 1866 a sudden call was made for the service of the whole force, it became necessary to form the isolated Companies into provisional battalions, nd to appoint a provisional staff to each battalion in a hurry, and at an obvious disadvantage. The Adjutant General therefore obtained the authority of the Commander-in-Chief to form the isolated companies into permanent battalions with permanent commanding and staff officers. This has been effected, wherever possible, by forming the isolated companies into battalions by counties. The strength and composition of the force will be found in the Appendix 4, page 57, where those companies which have not yet been incorporated into battalions are enumerated separately.

The force is for the most part fairly efficient, and animated by a good spirit; but it is a fact, with which Your Excellency should be acquainted, that the volunteers generally are looking forward with hopeful expectation to the removal, by Legislature, of those inequalities in the pressure of military service from which they consider themselves to suffer.

The experience acquired during the last two years and nine months of the working of the Volunteer system, has convinced the Adjutant General that of the several weak points which are inherent in an organization which is neither altogether civil nor altogether military, that which is most opposed to its success, is the feeling entertained by the men that their military service subjects them to a burthen of expense and inconvenience, which is not shared by other classes of the community. A volunteer contributes in the same proportion with those other classes towards the expense of the military establishments of the country, but he gives his personal service in addition. In peaceful times, this personal service, under the system hitherto pursued, is as little onerous as possible. But it is far otherwise when, owing to any emergency, the volunteer is placed on active service for a continuous period. The pay he receives in return for his continuous service is, without doubt, in most cases, a very inadequate compensation for the loss of his usual employment. It is an axiom which few will dispute, that all citizens should contribute equally in proportion to their powers towards the burthens imposed for the defence of their country; and those who do not contribute their personal service should be forced to compensate for their exemption by a money payment. The State has a right to require that every citizen should make some sacrifice of his ease and comfort towards the object of providing for the common defence: and the volunteer or militia man may equitably be required to give his personal service when, but not unless, the other classes of the community are compelled to make a pecuniary sacrifice from which the volunteer or militia man is exempt. And the only sound basis on which, in a country like Canada, any successful system of compulsory Militia service can be erected, is the practical recognition of the principle, that every man not actually contributing his personal service during any one year, should pay a tax in money which should bear some proportion to the property for which the military force of the country is to afford protection. Without the practical recognition of this principle it is impossible that the compulsory militia service of the country can ever be cheerfully performed by those on whom it is imposed.

In order to obtain the cheerful performance of militia service, therefore,

Either, a general tax proportioned to property must be imposed on all not actually serving, supposing the service to be compulsory;

Or, in the case where the service is by voluntary enlistment, the rate of pay awarded to the militia man must be a real compensation for the loss of time entailed on him by his military duties.

In addition to the foregoing, some of the other weak points of the present volunteer system may be stated as follows:

1. The absence of proper power for enforcing discipline and obedience to orders.

In connection with this point the Adjutant General respectfully requests Your Excellency's consideration of the following paragraph in Colonel Wolseley's report of the Camp at Thorold (printed in the Appendix, page .)

"I regret to say that a large proportion of the arms would not go off, for although elean outside, the nipples of many were clogged with dirt."

It is very difficult to enforce the proper cleaning of their arms by volunteers; they take a pride in turning out on parade smart and clean and soldierlike so far as regards the outward appearance; but it is too often the case, as reported by Colonel Wolseley, that their rifles are so foul within that they cannot be fired. Yet it is upon the serviceable condition of his weapon at any moment that the value of a volunteer depends. Unless it is kept constantly in a state for immediate use the volunteer is only a sham soldier, and his external trappings are but an useless expense to the country. By the liberality of Great Britain the Volunteer force of Canada has been lately supplied with the best breech loading military weapon now in existence, but these will infallibly deteriorate in the hands of the volunteers, unless some powers are given by the law greater than have hitherto existed, for ensuring that they shall be properly cared for. The captains of the different companies must be the immediate agents through whom this object must be attained; and every captain should be made responsible, both in property and military position, for the due care and preservation of the arms, as well as of the stores, which may have been issued to his company.

But before such an obligation can be imposed on the captain, equity requires.

(a) That safe and proper storage should be provided by the public.

At present it is unfortunately true that in many localities the valuable arms are kept in places so damp that they must inevitably suffer great damage. This is notably the case in the two principal cities in Canada. By Lieut-Col. Durie's report, annexed, it will be

seen that he complains urgently of the damp condition of the armories attached to the drill shed in Toronto.

But of all places in Quebec and Ontario; Montreal, which, on account of its importance and of the number of battalions it nominally supports, should furnish the best storage for the arms and stores which have been issued to the force, in reality supplies the worst. There is positively no safe storage in Montreal for arms and equipment, and the country has suffered great loss from this circumstance. The losses of clothing and accountements have been enormous; and the city battalions have, for the most part, received far more than their proper allowance on the ground that the deficiencies, as represented by the officers in command, have been occasioned by the insecurity of the storage. Many of these deficiencies were reported to have arisen from deliberate robbery.

- (b) That a yearly contingent allowance, as in the regular service, be paid to each captain of a company, to cover losses; in return for which he may equitably be required to make good all loss or damage to the arms and stores which have been issued to his company, except such as may have arisen from fair wear and tear, or unavoidable accident.
- (c) That penalties easily recoverable by the captain shall be imposed on every volunteer or militia man who may lose or damage any article of public property committed to his keeping.
- 2. The weakness of the volunteer companies, by reason of which a battalion of six companies numbers on paper only 330 non-commissioned officers and men, requiring the same number of staff and other officers as a battalion of 540 men, and thereby entailing on the country a disproportionate expense for officers in the event of the force being placed on service. Even though the minimum strength of battalions were fixed at 500 men, there would be found great difficulty at the outset in providing the proper supply of officers for any militia force of respectable numbers.
 - 3. The absence of a properly paid battalion staff.

In order that a battalion should be efficient, it is indispensable that it should be provided with an Adjutant and Sergeant-Major, who should give up their whole time to their military duties; and the rate of pay awarded them should be such as to offer some inducement to young men of intelligence and social position to qualify themselves for those posts. It is a delusion to imagine that an efficient military force can be kept up without a properly paid permanent staff, and the attempt to do so can only lead to an unprofitable expenditure of the public money.

Early in August, 1866, intelligence having been received that the Fenians were preparing a second raid on the Niagara frontier, the Adjutant-General received orders to form a Volunteer Camp of Exercise at Thorold; and, at the request of Your Excellency the Lieutenant-General Commanding sent there a wing of the 16th Regiment, with a demibattery of Royal Artillery, to form a permanent brigade nucleus for the different volunteer battalions which were limited each to one week's residence in camp. During the whole duration of the camp, the Governor General's Body Guard for Western Canada was employed in patrolling the shores of Lake Erie and the Niagara River from Port Colborne to Chippewa; and it is due to Lieut-Col. Denison, who commanded that troop, to make men-

tion here of the ability and energy with which that service was performed under his direction.

The chief command of the camp, to which Lieut.-Colonel Denison's troop formed an advanced post, was confided to Colonel Wolseley, whose Report is printed in the Appendix, page , and it is enough to say that his duties were performed with that completeness and efficiency which were to be anticipated from his well known tact, energy, and military ability.

A Return shewing the different volunteer companies which attended the Camp, with the detail of camp duties, will be found in the Appendix, page

The behavior of the troops in camp was good and soldier-like, and all who attended derived benefit from their experience of the daily routine of a soldier's life, although for so short a period.

In the month of October, 1866, the threatening of Fenian attack on the frontier covering Montreal, led to Your Excellency's ordering the formation of a camp, of similar composition to that of Thorold, at St. Johns on the Richelieu. All arrangements were completed; battalions and camp staff detailed; tents and all other requisites collected at St. Johns, but the assembly of the troops was postponed from week to week by reason of the continuous bad weather, until the project was at length necessarily abandoned, owing to the lateness of the season.

In the month of December, 1866, the Adjutant-General received orders to place two companies of Volunteer infantry on actual service at Sweetsburg, to oppose any possible attempts which might be made from the United States frontier, only a few miles distant, to rescue the Fenian prisoners whose trial was being conducted at that place. Two Companies of the Montreal Light Infantry, under Major Kenneth Campbell, were employed in this service; and much credit is due to Major Campbell for the success with which he performed a duty demanding considerable discretion, and involving no little watchfulness and anxiety. The behaviour of the men was generally soldier-like and exemplary.

On the removal of the convicted prisoners to the Kingston Penitentiary, the Adjutant-General was instructed to place on actual service in that city one company of volunteer infantry. The company first selected was that of Captain Daly, of the 47th battalion, which was relieved at the end of a month by Captain Horsey's Company of the 14th battalion, which was discharged, without relief, at the end of a month's service.

The behaviour of both Companies was excellent, and the reports as to their smartness and efficiency were highly satisfactory.

The apprehension of further hostile intentions by the Fenians, which existed generally along the frontier of Canada during the Spring of 1867, led to the adoption of the following measures of precaution.

Three thousand Peabody breech-loading rifles were purchased by the Government; and these, together with four thousand five hundred Spencer repeating rifles which were at the disposition of the Government, were distributed to the volunteer corps in the localities most exposed to attack; that is to say, generally along the frontier from Lake Memphramagog on the east, to London on the west.

As the Spencer cartridge could be fired from the Peabody rifle, while the Peabody

cartridge could not be fired from the Spencer rifle, and it being of importance not to multiply different sorts of ammunition, the Adjutant-General ordered a supply of Spencer cartridges to serve for both arms. And although the Peabody rifle with the Spencer cartridge does not make accurate shooting over six hundred yards, in consequence of the cartridge, though of the same calibre, not being so long and consequently not holding so large a charge as the Peabody cartridge; still for all practical purposes of warfare against Fenians it would be sufficiently effective.

In addition to the above, the whole of the Montreal brigade was supplied with the Westley-Richards breech-loading rifle from the Imperial stores.

The corps which were supplied with these new weapons were ordered to drill twice every week to accustom the volunteers to their use, which they did accordingly between the 20th March and the 30th June, 1867.

These have all been exchanged for the Snider rifle, and the Adjutant-General has the satisfaction to report that 30,000 of these rifles are now in the hands of the volunteers of Ontario and Quebec.

During the past year the whole of the Volunteer infantry corps have been completed in the articles of haversacks, water bottles, and great-coat straps as a substitute for knapsacks. Reserve stores of these articles, as well as of boots, knapsacks, and ammunition were formed at the headquarters of the different districts.

The field batteries have each received a complete new equipment in guns, carriages, harness and stores—and each is now supplied with three nine pounder guns with one twenty-four pounder howitzer.

Most of the cavalry troops have been armed with the Spencer repeating rifle, and have received thirty-five sets of saddlery per troop

SPECIAL INSTRUCTION TO GARRISON ARTILLERY.

The Adjutant-General respectfully recommends that this fine force should receive special instruction, and that at least two eighteen-pounder guns should be supplied to each garrison artillery corps.

In order to ensure the efficiency of this most important arm, it is, in the opinion of the Adjutant-General indispensable that one Deputy and one Assistant Adjutant-General of Artillery should be appointed, to superintend the organization of the artillery force of the Dominion, who shall have obtained the rank of Lieut.-Colonel in the Royal Artillery, and will thereby bring to the service of the country that knowledge of all the details of artillery science which none but an educated artillery officer can possess.

MILITARY SCHOOLS.

The Schools of Military Instruction, established in connection with the Service Militia of the Province of Canada, and at present in operation, are four in number, established respectively in the cities of Quebec and Montreal, in the Province of Quebec; and Kingston and Toronto, in the Province of Ontario; and the Adjutant-General gladly avails himself of this opportunity to express his high sense of the efficient manner in which the duties of instruction have continued to be performed by the respective Commandants and Staff

The average attendance of Cadets at the Schools of Military Instruction continues much the same as it has been throughout, since their first establishment, although a considerable decrease in the proportionate number of 1st Class Certificates taken during the last two years, more particularly in the Province of Quebec, is apparent.

The names of all Cadets who obtained Certificates between the 1st February, 1866, and the 31st December, 1867; together with a Return of Regimental Divisions, shewing

the number of Cadets contributed by each, between the dates above specified; will be found in Appendix.

In addition to the Schools above reported on, two Schools of Gunnery, one at Montreal and the other at Toronto, as also a Cavalry School in the latter city, have been temporarily formed, and are at present in operation, affording every facility to officers and non-commissioned officers of Militia, and candidates for commissions therein, to acquire a knowledge of the duties connected with those arms of the Service. And, the Adjutant-General desires to record his acknowledgements to Colonel Anderson and to Lieut-Colonel Pipon, of the Royal Artillery, and to Colonel Jenyns, of the 13th Hussars, for the able, indefatigable and kindly manner in which they have carried out the instruction of the graduates in the above named Schools, respectively committed to their superintendence.

RIFLE MATCHES.

Since last Report, there have been thirty two Rifle Meetings, at which there were assembled 4,455 competitors. The prizes distributed at these meetings amounted to 581, representing a cash value of \$5,121.25. Quebec and Ontario have each furnished the following quota, viz:—

With reference to the foregoing, it is worthy of note, and deserves honorable mention, that the 2nd Brigade Division, Lieutenant-Colonel Fletcher's, has far surpassed all the others in its efforts to promote good Rifle shooting, giving as its quota to the above table, 1,255 Competitors, and distributing in Prizes the sum of \$946, or nearly one half of the whole numbers and amount reported by the Province of Quebec.

In the Province of Ontario, the 1st Brigade Division, Lieutenant-Colonel Jackson's, has the honor of precedence, having furnished no less than 1,237 Competitors, and distributed \$1,723.25 in Prizes, or somewhat more than one half of the whole, as above reported.

Appendix No. 1, page 2, numbered as above, gives full details and particulars of each match. It is reported that in the later matches of the year, when the Snider Enfield came into use, a marked improvement was evident in the general average of the shooting, and their possession was a subject of congratulation with the Volunteers.

It is to be hoped that before another year elapses, a Dominion Rifle Association, towards the formation of which preliminary steps have been taken, may have become firmly established. An association of this nature, somewhat analogous in its character to the National Rifle Association of England, would give cohesion and unity of action to the different Rifle Associations, and other cognate bodies, at present existing throughout the country. A proper system, duly developed, by a governing body such as that proposed, would stimulate and develop rifle shooting here to its fullest capacity, and would, no doubt, be productive of the same extraordinary results as have followed the establishment of the parent institution in England, and which has given that country a rare preeminence in expert marksmen.

TARGET PRACTICE.

Appendix No. 2, page 52, supplies the details in relation to this branch, extending over a period of eighteen months, and representing the work of a Force that has trebled in strength since last Report. The results are not as satisfactory as they ought to be. Only 10,288 men are reported as having practised during that period, expending a little over 100,000 rounds of ammunition, which gives an average of about three rounds per man for the whole Force. A reference to that Appendix will show that many Corps make no sign whatever, it must not be inferred from this, however, that they have totally neglected this important part of their instruction, but havebeen simply negligent in reporting what has been done.

This apparent falling off may be attributed to various causes, which interfered with Rifle practice, as well as the ordinary routine of a Volunteer's duty in his normal state-Foremost of these hindrances, was the call to arms caused by the Fenian raid of June, 1866, which took the Volunteers from their homes for immediate service, and kept many of them subsequently for a lengthened period on Frontier duty. In the fall of the same year, the formation of a Camp at Thorold, militated also somewhat against Rifle practice, which at that season of the year generally most prevails. It is a noticeable fact too, that with Volunteers, a great reaction almost invariably follows periods of intense excitement, and those who come forward in throngs at the first call, and submit themselves cheerfully and readily to the wholesome restraints of military discipline and the regular routine of a soldier's life, on their return to their homes on disbandment, become singularly inactive, and do not probably for months resume that regular routine of parades, drills, &c., to which they had accustomed themselves previously.

In the summer of 1867, another interruption was caused by the exchange of the muzzle-loading rifles then in use for the Sniders. Many corps having collected them for delivery immediately on the publication of the general order to that effect of the 14th June, and having done so, and put them in proper order to be returned into store, hesitated about their re-issue for any purpose afterwards. It was not until the latter end of August and beginning of September, that the breech-loaders arrived from England, and their issue to the Force commenced.

Officers commanding Corps are also somewhat lax in keeping proper records of the Target practice of their respective Corps, or having done so, fail in their transmission to Head Quarters. Of the large number of blank forms annually issued from the Department for this purpose, hardly one third of them ever return to it in a completed form, and many of those that are sent in, are so defective, as to be valueless.

The most zealous Officers, nevertheless, cannot do all that they would desire, from the insufficiency in the supply of Targets. Those first issued in 1861, after six years service, are now worthless. The subsequent issue of 1864, are much the same, being of cast iron, they did not stand the strain of a season's service. With the exception of 24, obtained from the military stores, and issued in September last, to some of the Brigade Divisions of Quebec, the Force may be said to be now entirely wanting in Targets. Steps have however been taken to remedy this deficiency, and it is proposed that each Battalion should be supplied with three, to enable it to carry on its Rifle practice, up to at least 600 yards. With this provision, and the possession of a good range at the Head Quarters of each Battalion, the full value of the excellent arms lately issued will become more appreciated, and the youth of the country become trained as efficient marksmen.

Appendix 5, page 55, gives the quantity of extra ammunition sold, with the amount realised thereby. This has been largely in excess of the previous year. Although the Snider ammunition is more costly than the old ammunition previously used, the excess in price has not, so far, exercised an appreciable difference in its demand and sale.

DRILL SHEDS.

One hundred and seven Drill sheds have been built or are building in Ontario and Quebec, a tabular statement of which is printed in the Appendix, page 141.

The following regulations have been adopted respecting the construction of drill sheds entitled to Government aid:—

- 1. The Government will in no case give more in aid of Military Drill Sheds than the sum equal to that which is bond fide expended by the locality in the actual building of the shed.
- 2. The extent of the aid to be granted by Government will be according to the following fixed proportionate scale in each instance, which amounts cannot be exceeded, even although the locality may contribute a larger sum:
- 8. All Drill Sheds towards the construction of which the Government aid is given shall become exclusively Government property, as well as the ground on which they are built, of which latter a proper title shall be made to Her Majesty, before such aid is given.
- 9. All Drill Sheds are to be constructed on one general plan to be provided by the Militia Department.
- 10. The plans are arranged for the erection of Drill Sheds of five different sizes, according to the number of Companies to be provided for and the amount of the aid to be contributed by the Government.
- 11. All Battalion Drill Sheds shall comprise Store Room for the Battalion stores and Caretaker's residence and Orderly room.
 - 12. Every Drill Shed shall have an Armoury attached.
- 13. The Militia Department will not undertake to let out the contracts for the erection of these Drill Sheds, nor to superintend the work during construction of the buildings, but the payment of the Government Grant in aid, will, in all cases, be subject to such inspection of the Drill Sheds, when completed, as the Government may think proper to prescribe.
- 14. When the authorities of any locality ask for payment of the Government aid, there must be sent with the application a certificate signed by the Government Inspector, to the effect that he has inspected the building and finds it has been erected and completed according to the pattern plan supplied by the Militia Department; also a certificate signed by the County Crown Attorney to the effect that he has examined the title to the land upon which the Drill Shed at has been erected, and finds it and the conveyance sufficient to vest the legal title of the same in the Crown—accompanying these certificates must also be sent in each instance the Vouchers of Expenditure in the erection and completion of the buildings.

As a preparative against any further emergency requiring the volunteer force to take the field, the whole force was, in the autumn of 1866, told off in field brigades and garrisons of posts, and the following arrangement for combining in the most useful manner the action of that force with that of the regular troops was made by the Lieutenant-General Commanding. This arrangement, originally suggested by Lieutenant-Colonel Earle. still holds good.

The nucleus of each field brigade consists of one regular regiment, and its composition is as follows:-

be necessary......Volunteer Officers or N. C. Officers. Of these field brigades three were formed in Western Canada, four in Eastern Canada. The component corps and brigade staff were detailed, and the points of assembly fixed.

The staff officers are provided with a list of the stores which are required to enable each brigade to take the field, and will draw them from the storekeepers who have orders to issue them on the shortest notice.

Similarly the Commissariat officer of each brigade is prepared to provide the necessary transport to enable it to move at the shortest notice.

Those volunteer corps which do not form part of the above moveable columns are formed into brigades by districts, of which each will have its Volunteer Commandant and These corps will be employed in garrison duty, in guarding frontier towns and villages, and important points on the lines of canal or railroad communication. The duties of the Commandant and Brigade Major will be to organize a system of look-out parties and patrols suited to the localities; and to visit constantly all the posts within their respective Brigade districts.

The adoption of these measures enables Canadians to laugh at the grandiloquent plans of the Fenians for the invasion of their territory. One or more of the field brigades above described could be assembled with certainty at any point threatened by an enemy having any pretence to military organization before that enemy could reach the same point; and supposing the Fenians to be able to bring up to any point on the frontier 5,000 men at one time with any semblance of military array, which is a gratuitous and even preposterous supposition, any such force opposed to one of the field brigades above described would be like a child in the hands of a giant.

It is probable, and much to be desired, that a diffusion of the knowledge that we are thoroughly prepared against any possible action of the Fenian Brotherhood, may serve to prevent the recurrence of the fever fits of apprehension, from which the country has suffered in a way more or less intermittent ever since the month of June, 1866; as a curious evidence of which the Adjutant-General thinks it his duty to request Your Excellency's attention to the letter addressed by Mr. Thomas Oliver to the Adjutant-General, printed in the Appendix at page 128. In that letter the writer states, with reference to the Oxford battalion of volunteers, "that the feeling existing and entertained at present is anything but favorable to the Minister of Militia and the Department of which you are chief; and this feeling is not confined to the privates, but is entertained by the whole staff of officers." The writer goes on to state the cause of this feeling, viz., "they are now neglected and allowed to go to the front without the proper outfit, arms and ammunition. * * How would it be possible for the volunteers to leave their homes without overcoats or knapsacks, which they have not at present, or how could they with confidence meet the enemy with their old rifles, knowing the enemy to be provided with Repeating Rifles of the very best description."

Now for facts. The issue of great-coats which has been made this battalion, represented as destitute, is as follows:—

On the 15th August, 1866, were issued 325 great-coats; on the 15th March, 1867, were issued 225 great-coats, making 540 great-coats in all. The battalion, moreover, received a complete new outfit of uniforms in the autumn of 1866. It is true that knapsacks were not issued, because a general issue to the whole force would have been very expensive and was, besides, quite unnecessary. But a depot of knapsacks was formed at London and at the other centres of districts ready to supply any corps which might be required to take the field—and as a substitute for knapsacks (and in the opinion of experienced soldiers a beneficial substitute for a limited time of service) great-coat straps had been issued to every man.

As to rifles, the Enfield rifles with which the volunteers were then armed were infinitely superior to the weapons with which the Fenians ever have been, or, in all human probability, ever will be provided.

During the period of active service by the volunteer force in the summer of 1866, much inconvenience was occasioned by the inexperience of the officers and men generally, and by the absence of specific instructions for their guidance, and by Your Excellency's command the Adjutant-General prepared and circulated a code of Regulations for the Volunteer Militia, which is printed in the Appendix.

REPORT BY LIEUT.-COL. CASAULT.

OTTAWA, 1st January, 1868.

SIR,—In compliance with your memorandum, dated 20th ultimo, I have the honor to submit this, my report, for the Quebec District.

The Volunteer Force of this District consists of:-

QUEBEC.

One Squadron of Cavalry (2 Troops).

One Field Battery of Artillery.

One Provisional Brigade of Garrison Artillery (4 Batteries).

The 8th Battalion Volunteer Rifles (6 Companies).

The 9th Battalion Volunteer Rifles (7 Companies).

LEVIS.

The 17th Battalion, Light Infantry (4 Companies).

The St. Sylvester Light Infantry (1 Company).

The River du Loup Light Infantry (1 Company).

The Rimouski Light Infantry (1 Company).

The three last have, during the present year, been attached to the 17th Battalion.

One Company of the 9th Battalion, composed of the pupils of the Laval Normal School, have been disbanded and formed into a Drill Association, according to certain rules and regulations for the furthering of drill instruction in Normal Schools, framed by the Board of Education for Lower Canada, and sanctioned by Order in Council.

Two Companies have been transferred from the 9th to the 8th Battalion, under the command of Lieut.-Col. Thos. J. Reeve. To replace these, two Companies have been raised for the 9th Battalion, under command of Lieut.-Col. E. Panet.

The whole of the Volunteer Force in this District, with the exception of two Companies of Infantry (No. 5 Company of 8th Battalion, and No. 4 Company of 17th), have been reported effective by the Inspecting Field Officers for 1867, who expressed themselves much pleased with their appearance on parade and general efficiency.

Many Companies, formed by gentlemen in rural districts, have offered their services, which, however, could not be accepted. Had circumstances allowed of more Companies being accepted, I feel confident that the Volunteer Force in this District would have been very considerably increased.

The men generally have shewn great readiness and attention, as well as intelligence, and considerable aptitude for soldiering. As an instance of the zeal and alacrity displayed by officers and men, I may mention that the two Companies raised last spring for the 9th Battalion, gazetted on the 5th of April, were ready for annual inspection on the 6th and 10th of May, respectively, and were then reported effective.

The Commanding Officers and Officers generally have spared no expense or trouble to ensure the efficiency of their man, under circumstances of much difficulty. The scarcity of remunerative labor in Quebec, during the past year, forcing a great many men to seek employment elsewhere.

The zeal and efforts of the Officers has, however, succeeded in keeping up the numerical strength and increasing the efficiency of the different Companies.

The Drill Associations, formed by the pupils of the Quebec and Ste. Anne's College, have discontinued their drill for some time past, owing, I believe, to want of encouragement. These institutions were put to some expense for care of arms, &c. A Drill Association, at the College of Rimouski, is in course of formation.

BATTALIONIZING.

The Battalionizing of Companies produces much good by creating unity of action, emulation, greater supervision and control; ensuring a better understanding by all ranks of their respective duties. It gives greater confidence to the men, and creates a system and method, which will prove very beneficial whenever Volunteers are called out.

DRILL INSTRUCTORS.

The appointment of Adjutants and Assistant-Adjutants as Drill Instructors has also proved very beneficial. It secures better instruction and a more zealous discharge of duty. These Officers, belonging to the Battalions, take a greater interest in, and derive greater credit from, the improvement of their respective corps, and their greater efficiency, than could possibly be the case with any other class of instructors. In the case of rural Companies, however, which in this District are so far from one another, I would recommend that Company Instructors be continued, it being impossible for one Instructor to satisfactorily perform his duty, if responsible for the three.

DRILL SHEDS.

There is at present only one Drill Shed in the whole District, viz.: A Battalion Drill Shed at Quebec. It is used in turn by all the Volunteer Corps of that place. The want of a convenient Armoury near it is severely felt by the Force; causes great suffering and annoyance to Volunteers during the winter months, and sometimes leads to irregularities. It entails much loss of time and useless marching to and fro. The men have to go to the building at present used as an Armoury, in Upper Town, then to proceed to the Drill Shed, on the St. Louis Road. Again, after drill, they have to return their arms, &c., to the Upper Town Armoury. This Armoury does not admit of more than one Company being armed at one time; thus, when for Battalion Drill, the men have to stand in the cold outside for a considerable time. This, together with the marching to the Drill Shed and back, takes nearly as much time and is a greater tax on the good will and endurance of the men than the drill itself. To avoid this unnecessary and very trying exposure of the men to the very severe cold of a Quebec winter, I would recommend that a proper Armoury be built close to and in rear of the Drill Shed, with a double entrance into it.

The men of the Quebec Squadron of Cavalry owe to the liberality of their Officers a spacious and well built Riding School and Gymnasium, which, from the facilities and encouragement it afforded, has in a great measure contributed to the present efficiency and splendid appearance of the Corps.

In rural Districts the want of proper Armouries and Drill Sheds makes military training and drill during the winter months a matter of very great difficulty, if not an utter impossibility.

The Municipality of Lévis has very kindly allowed the 17th Vol. Battalion the use of a room in the Town Hall. This admits of manual and platoon exercise and some attempt at squad drill being got through, but this room is not large enough for company drill.

These rural Companies have to contend with many obstacles to their efficiency. Detached, at long distances from one another, they are debarred from facilities of acquiring a proper knowledge of battalion drill. Had they proper ranges and targets they might compensate by a greater efficiency in that most important part of a soldier's training—rife shooting—but having no inducement to devote much attention to this special branch of training, and the absence of Drill Sheds making winter drill almost impossible, and battalion drill being out of the question, cannot but have a very dispiriting influence on the men. It is only by the untiring exertions of the Officers that these Companies are kept together after the first two or three years of experience, and attain to their present state of efficiency.

SNIDER-ENFIELD.

The Snider-Enfield Rifles received from England have been distributed to the different Corps and Companies of this District, and have given great satisfaction and proved a great encouragement to the men. I regret to say that the late issue and the early setting in of the cold weather in this part of the country have not allowed of these arms being used at target practice as yet.

Towards the end of 1866 two officers were added to the Quebec Staff, viz.:—Captain Forrest, District Paymaster, and Captain Voyer, District Quartermaster.

The accounts of the District have been very well kept, and the District Paymaster has at all times given universal satisfaction and shewn great punctuality. The District Quartermaster has also performed the duties of his office to my entire satisfaction.

I take with pleasure this opportunity of bearing testimony to the zeal and alacrity with which the different Staff Officers of this District have performed their duties.

REPORT BY LIEUT.-COL. MACPHERSON.

MONTREAL, 1st January, 1868.

SIR,—In compliance with your instructions, I have the honor to report upon the state of the District under my charge, which embraces two Brigade Divisions, viz., the 4th Brigade Division, late Lieut.-Col. Masson's, and the 5th Brigade Division, Lieut.-Col. Hanson's.

In the former, which comprises the Counties of Terrebonne, Montcalm, Joliette, Berthier, Maskinongé and St. Maurice, there are three Volunteer Companies, viz.: two Infantry Companies at Three Rivers, and one Rifle Company at Ste. Thérèse.

In the latter, which comprises the Counties of Prescott, part of Ottawa, Argenteuil, Two Mountains, Vaudreuil, Soulanges and Jacques Cartier, there are two Battalions of Infantry, one Troop of Cavalry, and four Independent Companies, viz., the 11th Battalion "Argenteuil Rangers," with headquarters of Companies at St. Andrews, Carillon, Chatham, Grenville, Lachute (East and West Gore), and Mille Isle; the 18th Battalion, Prescott Infantry, with Company headquarters at Hawkesbury Mills, Vankleek Hill, East Hawkesbury, Henry's Corners, L'Orignal, and Plantagenet; one Cavalry Troop at St. Andrews; one Infantry Company at Thurso, and one at Lachine, and one Rifle Company at Como, and another at St. Eustache.

With exception of a few Companies, I can report favorably on the state of the Force in my District: the Monthly Reports of the Brigade-Majers, for the past year, show a fair average attendance at drill, and although the drills have not been as frequent as might be expected, there is evidence of some progress, and that a good military spirit exists, particularly in the 5th Brigade Division, and considering the disadvantages under which many of

the Corps labor, owing to the distance which the men have to travel to attend drill, in this respect the devotion manifested to the Service is worthy of commendation.

In certain localities where no drill sheds have been erected, drill has partially been suspended at present, owing to the impossibility of drilling, with advantage, out of doors, in winter: the absence of a General Order, for the Force to proceed with the annual drill for the present year, has caused some hesitation on the part of Commanding Officers to order out their Companies for drill.

Referring to my inspection report on the various Corps in the District, I have now to state, that the St. Eustache Rifle Company having become disorganized, its removal from the list of Volunteer Militia has been recommended. No. 5 Company of the 11th Battalion, which failed to parade for my inspection, has not yet been re-organized, but efforts are now being made to resuscitate the Company, with prospects of success.

The 4th Brigade Division, which represents a very small Volunteer Force in proportion to the population, is chiefly composed of French Canadians. From my experience, and the conversations I have had with Volunteer Officers in the District, I am led to believe that the French Canadians, although most loyal and willing to defend their country as any other British subject, have no inclination for voluntary service: they appear to hold to the French system, which, when the Government thinks it necessary, orders the service of a part of the male population, calling on the whole for an equal share of risks and actual service: they seem to think that when the country requires them, it will not call for Volunteers, but will order a certain proportion of men for service, and were a compulsory military service introduced, I believe they would cheerfully perform their duties.

"RURAL BATTALIONS."

The system of Battalionizing Companies in country districts, when properly carried out, must be attended with beneficial results, the importance and extent of which will be fully realized and appreciated when the Corps are called out for service.

Under this head I would take the liberty of suggesting that inducements be held out to Corps to perform part of the Annual Drill, either by wings or in battalion, at such a season of the year as would secure good musters in the several localities; and that the independent Companies contiguous to the stations be attached to the battalion for purposes of drill.

DRILL INSTRUCTORS.

There are two Battalion Drill Instructors employed in the District, viz., Captain Smith of the 11th Battalion, and Lieut.-Adjutant Robertson of the 18th Battalion. Both officers are well qualified for the duty, having 1st Class Certificates from the Military School.

The Cavalry Troop, and several Independent Companies in the District, with exception of the "Thurso" Company, are instructed by their respective Commanding Officers, the "Thurso" Company being instructed by the Lieutenant, all of whom are competent for this duty by holding Certificates from the Military School and Volunteer Boards. There are also four instructors (passed Cadets of the Military School) attached to the everal College Drill Associations.

DRILL SHEDS.

There are six Drill Sheds erected in the District, at the following Stations, viz:

St. Andrews.—The Drill Shed at this place is a wooden building, 60 by 35 feet, erected at the expense of the Municipality and by private contributions; as it has been found inadequate for the force, an addition is now being built, with Armouries and Store rooms attached, and when completed will be in accordance with the dimensions for a two company shed.

Lachute.—The building at this Station is of wood, 60 by 35 feet. No Armouries or Store rooms attached. Was erected by the Volunteers, and through contributions from other sources in the locality.

Carillon.—The Drill Shed at this Station is a good substantial building of wood, creeted during the past year, in accordance with the Government plan, for one Company. The contribution from the locality towards this object, was obtained from Volunteers and other sources, through Captain Forbes, of the Carillon Company.

Vankleek Hill.—The Drill Shed at this Station is 70 by 36 feet, and has recently been completed with the necessary Armouries and Store-rooms for two Companies; the reported cost of the building is \$890, of which \$90 was contributed by the Township Council, \$500 collected from Volunteers and other sources, and \$300 to be granted by the Government.

Chatham, P. Q.—The Drill Shed at this place has recently been completed, in accordance with Government plan for one company, is a good building, with Armouries and Store-rooms, and will be formally opened for drill on the 9th instant; the cost of the building is about \$500, of which \$250 has been granted by Government, the remainder collected from various sources, through Captain Cushing, of the Chatham Company.

Como.—This Drill Shed was erected by Captain R. W. Shepherd, the former Captain of the Vaudreuil Rifle Company, and from its small size is inadequate for the purpose. I believe steps are being taken with a view of erecting a building of the required dimensions for one Company.

It is also intended to erect a Drill Shed at Thurso for the Company at that Station.

At Hawkesbury Mills, East Hawkesbury and L'Orignal, the County Councils grant the use of the Town Halls for drilling purposes.

DRILL ASSOCIATIONS.

There are five Drill Associations in the District, viz.:—The College Masson, Terrebonne; Colleges at L'Assomption, St. Thérèse, Joliette, and Three Rivers. The value of Drill Associations, in connection with Colleges and Universities, is very great, and it is highly desirable to afford every encouragement possible to such associations. The youths attending these institutions are being quietly prepared for our future Volunteers, and the knowledge thus acquired must be of great advantage in fitting the young men to take a leading part in the military organization of the country.

ARMS, &C

The issue of Snider Rifles, in exchange for the old Enfields, was halled with pleasure

by the Volunteers in the District, and much interest is now manifested by the various Corps, in acquiring a knowledge to handle efficiently this valuable weapon.

The arms and accountrements are stored in the Armouries attached to the Drill Sheds, and in Private Armouries at the several Company headquarters, and are reported to be kept in good condition.

CLOTHING AND EQUIPMENT.

The several Corps previously reported as being in want of new clothing, have since then been supplied by the Department—the Force in the District may now be reported as complete in this respect, as well as with knapsacks, great-coat straps, and haversacks (the 18th Battalion, with great-coat straps instead of knapsacks), and a supply of water bottles and tin mugs, which are stored at the Battalion or Company Headquarters, together with an allowance of ammunition in reserve, and for target practice.

REVIEWS

The Volunteer Force in the District assembled on the 1st July, to inaugurate the New Dominion: a wing of the 11th Battalion paraded at Lachute; a wing of the 18th Battalion in the vicinity of Hawkesbury; and the other various Companies at their respective head-quarters;—these parades were well attended. I might also state, under this head, that as usual, on Her Majesty's Birthday, each Company had its local review.

TARGET PRACTICE.

Very few returns of target practice have as yet been received from the District, and as these do not appear to have been regularly forwarded by Commanding Officers, it is impossible to furnish correct information as to the number of Volunteers who have attended practice, and the progress made by the several Corps.

Instructions have been issued directing that these returns may be transmitted with more regularity in future.

With a view of encouraging rifle practice, a small allowance annually is recommended to be made for the purpose of providing safe and convenient ranges—as the want of these, in some places, is felt. Iron targets are also required, there being only two sets in the District, viz: one set (3) at St. Andrews; and one set at Three Rivers. I would recommend, that two additional sets be supplied: one for the 18th Battalion, at Hawkesbury; and one to be placed in a central locality for use of Companies at out stations.

RIFLE MATCHES.

A series of rifle matches in the 5th Brigade Division, was held at St. Andrews, on the 6th, 7th, 8th, 9th, and 11th November last, and was largely attended by the Volunteers in the District; as an indication of the interest centered in these matches, a number of valuable prizes were presented for competition, which, with money prizes, amounted to \$463.

The success of this rifle meeting was complete, as will be observed by the Report of the Brigade-Major hereto annexed, with detailed returns.

In concluding this report, I have much pleasure in making favourable mention of the efficient services rendered by the several Staff Officers in the District, to Lt.-Colonel Hanson, Brigade Major, and Lt.-Colonel Masson (lately Brigade Major), and also to Major

Barnard, District Quarter-master, at Montreal, I am much indebted; these officers have been most active and zealous in the discharge of their duties.

REPORT OF LIEUT.-COL. W. OSBORNE SMITH.

Assistant Adjutant General of Militia, Montreal, January 1st, 1868.

SIR,—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to report to you on the general state of the Militia District under my charge.

There is but little change to note since my Report to you in July last, to which I beg to refer you for details of the relative strength and efficiency of the various Corps at my last inspection.

But little drill has been performed during the past six months, in consequence of the necessary authorization not having been as yet notified.

The reports I receive, and personal observation in some instances, show that the Corps in the Rural Districts maintain their satisfactory condition.

The same causes which I noted to you in my July report, still exist, to impair the efficiency of the Montreal Battalions with respect to strength; their organization, however, remains intact, and I have no doubt that in the event of their services being actively required the same zeal would be manifested which has heretofore characterized the Volunteers of Montreal.

The opportunities afforded by the Military School, to improve and perfect their military education, have been largely taken advantage of during the past half year by officers of the Rural Corps in this District. I discourage, as far as I am enabled, officers commanding Battalions from forwarding the names of gentlemen for appointment or promotion in their Corps, unless with the understanding that those so promoted or appointed, engage within a reasonable time to attend the Military School.

In Montreal a Volunteer Association of Volunteer Militia Officers, and passed Cadets of the Military School, for the purpose of mutual instruction and practice in drill, was formed in the winter of 1866-67. This association still maintains its organization, and is productive of good results. Under the energetic supervision of Lt.-Colonel King, Brigade Major, I am now endeavouring to form a similar society at Sherbrooke.

Although the instruction and practice in rifle shooting, is still of a more desultory nature than could be wished; the general efficiency amongst the Corps with the weapon, is greatly improved; but a further supply of iron targets is much needed. A number of rifle meetings have been held, at which a surprising proficiency as marksmen has been shewn by the men who have competed at the matches.

The appointment of Battalion Drill Instructors and Adjutants in the Country Corps, has been attended with the most happy results; the actual drudgery of the detail work is taken off the hands of the Commanding Officers, and instruction in drill and duty is assimilated amongst the scattered Companies in a manner that could hardly have been established otherwise.

I would respectfully suggest, however, that, at an early date, the Instructors and Adjutants should be directed to proceed to Montreal for a short course of instruction in details of Regimental and Staff Duties, which their limited period of instruction at the Military School has not enabled them to become thoroughly proficient in; this could readily be attained by permission being grantèd to attach them, say for one month, to one of the Regular Regiments quartered here, for the purpose of perfecting their knowledge of interior economy, and detail of Regimental duty; and by their daily attendance at the office of the District Staff Officer, for instruction in Staff Duties. The expense involved would be comparatively trivial; and the efficiency which would be gained, would be most advantageous to the public service.

Drill Sheds during the past six months have been completed at Sherbrooke, Marbleton, Knowlton, Sutton, Abercorn, and St. Armands. At Ste. Martine a Company Shed is in course of erection, and tenders are issued for the construction of buildings for the purpose, at Robinson and Lake Megantic. In Montreal, it is expected that the costly erection which the City Corporation is building for the use of the Volunteer Militia, will be completed during the course of the present year.

I have prepared, with as great accuracy as feasible, a tabulated statement of the names, nationality, average service, age, and occupation of every officer and man of the Corps in my District, and I annex for your information a synopsis of the same.

Every Corps in the District is now completely armed with the Snider Enfield Rifle, and the reports of the Brigade-Majors, as to the condition of the arms and equipment, are satisfactory.

REPORT OF LIEUT.-COL. ATCHERLEY.

BROCKVILLE, 1st January, 1868.

SIR,—In obedience to your orders, and the Memorandum dated Ottawa, 20th Nov., 1867, I have the honor to submit this, my Report, upon the state of this District.

The District is composed of the following Corps:-

One Field Battery of Artillery, under the command of Captain Forsyth, comprising:

Three 9-pounder guns, One 24- do howitzer,

also eight Batteries of Garrison Artillery; the eight Batteries being formed into two Provisional Brigades, the "Ottawa" and the "Prescott." The four composing the Ottawa Provisional Brigade, are Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4, Batteries, with their Head-quarters at Ottawa, the whole under the command of Major A. G. Forest.

The different Companies which have been formed into Battalions in the District appear as far as I can at present ascertain, to have benefited by being thus organized. But with the exception of three Companies of the 56th Battalion at Prescott, and the different Corps at Ottawa, there have not been two Companies of the same Corps together at the same station, but they have nevertheless acquired a system, which, when brought together, will be found to be most necessary and desirable.

There are no Assistant Adjutants in any of the Battalions in the District, and at present only one Adjutant, who is also paid Drill Instructor, (Capt. Welch, 56th Battalion).

This Battalion has much improved since the appointment of an Adjutant and Drill Instructor.

The rest of this number are built, or are being built, according to the Government plan and specifications. The remainder were erected before these plans were given out. These Sheds are found to be most beneficial and useful, as the want of a place to drill, in bad weather has long been felt by many Companies. All the Drill Sheds would be improved in appearance by being painted outside, which would tend much to their preservation.

The Snider Rifles, which have been issued to all the Battalions and Companies, are very much appreciated, and, with few exceptions, the opinion generally seems to be, that they are the best description of rifle that could be used, being so simple to load, so strong in their manufacture, and so unlikely to get out of order, if fairly used. The possession of these rifles by the different Companies, appears to have given, in many instances, a fresh stimulus to the men, and the beneficial results attending their being issued, is daily becoming more apparent. The want of targets at several of the stations in the District, is much felt—in order to more effectually carry on rifle practice.

The difficulty experienced by Officers commanding Companies, in "recruiting" to their full strength, has been greatly felt, and is partly owing to the unwillingness of many employers to allow their men to join Volunteer Companies, and partly owing to many of the men having left the different neighborhoods to seek better employment and wages. In many of the Companies, several of the men have been employed on the lakes and rivers, and, therefore, absent for some months; but since the close of navigation, and the part

suspension of out-door employment, the men are beginning to return, and the Captains able to recommence drill. The Companies though in many instances weak, are, with some few exceptions, efficient—and, if required on service, would have little difficulty in being completed to their full strength. Too much praise cannot be given to the majority of Officers in the District, for their endeavors to keep up the efficiency, as far as possible, of their several Battalions, Batteries, and Companies; and I feel greatly indebted to them especially, as also, in a great measure, to the N.C. Officers and men, for their hearty co-operation in carrying out the different orders I may from time to time receive for promulgation to them.

FORCE IN THE DISTRICT.

SIR,—In compliance with your memorandum, dated 20th November, 1867, calling upon District Staff Officers to forward a Report upon the state of their respective Districts, and as to whether the system of Battalionizing Companies and appointing Assistant Adjutants and Drill Instructors has been found to work efficiently, I have now the honor to submit that the District under my charge consists of the 2nd and 3rd Brigade Divisions.

The 3rd Brigade Division is composed of the Counties of Durham, Northumberland, Peterborough and Victoria. The three first named Counties furnish two Troops of Cavalry, two Garrison Batteries, and four Battalions of Infantry, while Victoria has three Independent Companies, not yet Battalionized. The total number of Infantry Companies in this Division is twenty-nine.

The strength, per Company, is from 55 to 65 non-commissioned officers and men.

FIELD BATTERY.

The Kingston Field Battery is a very important branch of the Volunteer Force in this District, and the only Field Battery between Toronto and Ottawa. It has been in existence eleven years, having been organized in May, 1856. The men and horses are from the City of Kingston and from the Township of Pittsburgh. Major Drummond, who commands, is popular with his officers and men, and his personal influence conduces largely to keep the establishment complete. The supply, last summer, of three new 9-pounder guns and a 12-pounder howitzer, with new carriages, limbers, harness and saddlery of the latest pattern has increased the esprit de corps, and the officers have taken every opportunity to get the Battery out for exercise.

It turned out on the 24th May, in honor of Her Majesty's birthday, and again on the 1st July to celebrate the inauguration of the New Dominion. On both these occasions it was brigaded with the troops in garrison, and took its part in a sham-fight with éclat, engaging, by a lively fire, the gunboat *Hercules*, which sided with the defenders of the Fort, attacked by the Regulars and Volunteers.

GARRISON BATTERIES.

The four Garrison Batteries are all clothed as Artillery, but are armed and drilled as Infantry. They have had no opportunity of learning gun-drill as yet, for want of guns to work and gunnery instructors to teach them.

The Cobourg Battery is attached to the 40th Battalion; the Port Hope Battery to the 46th Battalion; the Trenton Battery to the 49th Battalion; the Napanee Battery is independent.

CAVALRY.

The Cavalry of the District comprises the Northumberland and Durham Squadron, composed of the Cobourg and Port Hope Troops, the 1st and 2nd Frontenac Troops of Kingston and Loughborough, and the Napanee Troop. These Troops have all been formed since 1855-6. They are well horsed and equipped. New saddlery, new breech loading carbines, and new Hussar uniforms have been issued to them within the year, and they make a very gallant appearance, when mustered for field exercise. The men are stout yeomen of a superior class of farmers. They all own the horses they ride, and they ride well. They perform the sword exercise respectably; are intelligent, hardy and conversant with the back roads and passes throughout their respective localities, and would be found useful as patrols or escorts, should necessity ever arise for their services against an invading army. Many of the officers and non-commissioned officers have taken advantage of the Cavalry School of Instruction, opened this year at Toronto, at the headquarters of Her Majesty's 13th Hussars, and have returned well pleased with the attention bestowed upon them by the Officers of the School, and highly satisfied with their newly acquired proficiency in Cavalry Drill and Tactics. The 1st Frontenac Troop, commanded by Capt. John Duff, was out on active service in June, 1866, with two officers and 47 troopers, and has been twice brigaded during the past summer with the regular garrison of Kingston, on the same occasions referred to in the remarks on the Kingston Field Battery. Duff obtained a 1st class Cavalry certificate from a Board of Officers in August, 1866, and has also a 1st class certificate in all the branches from the Cavalry School at Toronto. Lieutenant White has a 2nd class certificate from the Military School and Cavalry Board. The Troop-Sergeant-Major has also passed through the Cavalry School at Toronto, and three of the non-commissioned officers have applied for admission. The ages of the men in this Troop are between 18 and 30 years. The 2nd Frontenac Troop and the Napanee Troop were also out on active service in June, 1866.

The Squadron at Cobourg and Port Hope, commanded by Lieut.-Col. Boulton, has also been brigaded for review exercise on the 24th May and 1st July of this year. Lieut.-Col. Boulton, Major Smart, and Sergeant Ashford have obtained 1st class, and Cornet Williams, 2nd class certificates from the Commandant of the Cavalry School at Toronto. Three other non-commissioned officers have attended the School, and several more have applied to go during the winter.

INFANTRY.

Of the Infantry, the only Corps in Battalion in March, 1866, were the 14th Volunteer Rifles, at Kingston, the 15th Battalion, at Belleville, and the 16th, at Picton.

The 40th was battalionized in October, 1866.

The 45th was battalioned in November, 1866.

The 47th, 48th and 49th were battalionized in November, 1866, but ante-dated to September.

The 57th was battalionized in May, 1867.

BATTALIONIZING.

The system of Battalionizing all the Companies is a source of strength, and conduces to unity of action and equipment, as well as to confidence amongst the men, when called out for active service. The Battalion is a more efficient body in every respect than the same number of men would be in independent Companies, for it can always produce a certain quota by filling up some Companies from others, when the independent Company might be too weak to take the field alone, without augmentation; and, moreover, the central authority vested in the Lieutenant-Colonel of a Battalion, with mounted officers to assist him in the field, an Adjutant and other Regimental Staff attached, is undoubtedly a more powerful and moveable organization than that of single Companies acting independently, each of which would require a staff of its own on service, in addition to its Company officers.

DRILL.

As to the matter of drill, I do not think that any Company now in Battalion in this District is more perfectly drilled than the Independent Company at Lindsay, in Victoria, from which I infer that to obtain a well drilled Company it is not absolutely necessary to Battalionize it. Every Company in each Battalion in this District is sufficiently drilled to act independently, but their proficiency in Battalion drill is by no means equal to their known proficiency as Companies. I attribute this to the great difficulty in getting them all together for drill. Many Companies of the rural Battalions have never been assembled with others, and the occasions on which any of them have been so assembled were limited to a few hours duration, a great portion of that time being consumed in telling off and preparing to march past or for other review operations.

TARGET PRACTICE.

An opinion has been expressed that sufficient attention is not paid to rifle shooting and that if three days out of the number allotted to annual drills were devoted solely to target practice, each one counting for drill pay, and ten rounds a man fired on each occasion, we should have a guarantee that every man, who was paid for annual drills, had fired thirty rounds in the year.

ACTUAL SERVICE.

In accordance with G. O., 9th January, 1867, a Company of the 47th Battalion was called out for actual service at Kingston, and was attached for duty and discipline to the Royal Canadian Rifles, with whom it paraded daily and shared the guards and fatigues of the garrison. The Company selected for this duty was the Inverary Company, from the Township of Storrington, and was commanded by Captain Daly. Its strength was 55 non-commissioned officers and men, and 3 officers, with a Quartermaster Sergeant, and an acting Pay-Sergeant, from the Royal Canadian Rifles. An hotel in the Market Square, provided by the Mayor and City Council of Kingston, free of rent and taxes, was fitted up and furnished as barracks, with similar articles of furniture and utensils to those supplied to Her Majesty's troops.

On the 11th February, this Company was relieved by No. 1 Company, of the 14th Volunteer Rifles, under the command of Captain Horsey, which remained out until the 11th March, when its services being no longer required, the men were sent to their homes.

Each of these Companies had thus a month of garrison duty, and the accompanying testimonials* were issued, expressive of satisfaction with their good conduct and improvement during their periods of service.

FIELD DAYS.

In the Second Brigade Division, on the 24th May, 1867, in honor of Her Majesty's birthday, the 1st Frontenac Troop of Cavalry, the Kingston Field Battery, the 14th Volunteer Rifles, and two Companies of the 47th Battalion of Frontenac, assembled at Kingston, and joined the regular garrison in the celebration of the day. They fired a feu de joie, marched past in review order, and took part in a sham-fight.

On the 1st of July, 1867, the 1st Frontenac Troop, the Kingston Field Battery, and the 14th and 47th Battalions were again brigaded with Her Majesty's troops, to celebrate the Dominion of Canada. The evolutions required of them were performed in a satisfactory manner. The Cavalry and Field Battery being the only troops of these arms on the ground.

In the Third Brigade Division, both on the 24th May and 1st July, 1867, the 40th Battalion assembled at Cobourg, the 46th at Port Hope, the 57th at Peterborough, and the 45th met at Bowmanville, on the 1st July.

ISSUES.

Between the months of March and December, of the present year, in addition to much new clothing, haversacks, water-bottles, great coats and forage caps, there have been issued to the Force in this District, 95 Carbines, 4,085 breech-loading Rifles, and 241,056

rounds of ball ammunition. Of these Rifles, 2,380 have been distributed amongst the 2nd Brigade Division, and 1,705 amongst the 3rd Brigade Division.

We have now in the hands of our Infantry Volunteers a total of 4,085 breech-loading Rifles, with an ample supply of ammunition for any contingency.

STAFF.

In the early part of the year 1866, the only Staff Officers in this District were the two Brigade-Majors, Lieut.-Cols. Shaw and Patterson, who appear to have exerted themselves to keep alive the spirit of volunteering in their respective Divisions. In the summer of 1866 I took up my duties as Assistant-Adjutant-General, at Kingston, and on the 1st December, 1866, a District Paymaster, Lieut.-Col. Strange, and a District Quartermaster, Major Phillips, were added to the District Staff. These Officers were well selected, and have given me every aid in their respective departments. The public accounts have been correctly kept and payments regularly made by the former, while the latter has been fully employed in receiving and issuing the numerous equipments of arms, clothing, accourtements and ammunition, which have been liberally supplied to the Force by the Department during the present year. They also performed, in a satisfactory manner, the active duties imposed upon them by the calling out for service, in the early part of the year, of the Companies of Volunteers before alluded to, to increase the strength of the regular garrison, when threats of a Fenian invasion rendered necessary an addition to the guards, and armed parties defending the various posts in and about the city.

DRILL ASSOCIATIONS.

The following Drill Associations have been established in this District, viz .:-

January 18th, 1867—"Kingston Cadets," Kingston, composed of pupils attending the Grammar School. These Cadets are well uniformed, armed and drilled, and took part in two Brigade field-days this summer, on the 24th May and 1st July, on which occasions they led the column when marching past with Her Majesty's troops. They number 52 on the roll, and their average attendance at drill has been about 43.

March 22nd, 1867—" Queen's University," Kingston, composed of students and others connected with Queen's College, but they are not yet fairly organized.

April 19th, 1867-" Cataraqui," Kingston, composed of cadets of Common Schools.

June 7th, 1867—"Belleville Cadets," Belleville, composed of passed candidates of the Military Schools.

DRILL SHEDS.

The Drill Sheds completed and in use throughout the District are as follows:—
Battalion Sheds at Kingston, Cobourg, Port Hope, Bowmanville and Peterborough.
Two Company Sheds at Milford and Lindsay.

One Company Sheds at Cold Springs, Lifford, Janetville, Orono, Cartwright, Omemee, Ashburnham, and Springville, while there are others in course of erection at Norwood, Hastings and Grafton. Newcastle and Millbrook have each a shed, built some years ago, before the Government plans were published. These are small, have no armouries attached to them, and have never had any assistance from Government.

In conclusion, I append an estimate of the enrolled and probable available strength of the District, as gathered from the Brigade-Majors' Reports.

REPORT OF LIEUT.-COL. DURIE.

Assistant Adjutant General's Office, Militia, Toronto, 4th January, 1868.

SIR,—I have the honor to report, in accordance with the instructions contained in your Circular of the 20th November last, and I feel it at the same time an agreeable duty to be able to state that a very marked change for the better has taken place, not only in the increase of strength, but also in the efficiency of the Volunteer Force in my district since the date of my last report to you, on the same subject, made by your order, on the 1st May, 1866.

Although since that period the Third Brigade Division has been detached from me and attached to the District under Lieut.-Col. Jarvis, A.A.G.M., still I have the gratification of reporting a large increase in the strength of the Volunteer Force.

In May, 1866, the Force consisted as follows:-

- 6 Troops of Cavalry,
- 2 Field Batteries,
- 2 Garrison Batteries,
- 2 Naval Companies,
- 1 Battalion of Rifles,
- 2 Battalions of Infantry,
- 25 Companies of Rifles.
- 39 Companies of Infantry.

a force of about 5,000 men, of all arms and ranks. Deducting the strength of the 3rd Brigade Division, at that time of about 500 men, leaves the strength of my District at 4,500 men, all arms and ranks.

The present strength now stands at :-

- 6 Troops of Cavalry,
- 3 Field Batteries,
- 3 Garrison Batteries,
- 1 Naval Company,
- 3 Mounted Infantry Companies,
- 4 Battalions of Rifles,
- 9 Battalions of Infantry,
- *5 Independent Companies.

The above rated at 7,000 men, thus shewing an increase of 2,500 men, all arms and ranks. This force is irrespective of the Grand Trunk Brigade, of which there is one fine Battalion of Garrison Artillery, consisting of six Batteries, in Toronto, and another Battalion of Rifles, whose headquarters are at Brantford, its strength being seven Companies.

This accession of strength is chiefly due to the encouragement which the Force has received during the past eighteen months, the permission to raise new Corps, and to the loyal and patriotic spirit which prompts men to turn out in defence of their country on the approach of danger.

COUNTY BATTALIONS.

The formation of County Battalions has also been of great benefit, imparting a true esprit de corps, a closer union, and far greater efficiency into the force of each County.

My District comprises eleven Counties, independent of the Cities of Toronto and Hamilton, and each County, with the exception of Wentworth, has its County Battalian. There are four Independent Companies in the County of Wentworth, and there is no doubt, if permission were granted, that other Companies would be raised and a County organization effected.

Each Battalion is composed of six to ten Companies—complete in its Staff and Regimental organization—commanded, with one or two exceptions, by duly qualified officers, the exceptions being one or two officers who only require to appear before the Board of Officers, in order to have their qualifications tested, as required by the General Order relative thereto; each man equipped, in addition to his arms, accountrements, clothing, &c., with haversack, great coat, straps, and water bottle. I would strongly recommend, in addition to the above, that a complete set of pioneer tools, blankets and camp kettles, be issued to each Battalion—it would be a most important addition—to be kept at the head-quarters of each Battalion, in case of need for drill or other purposes.

BATTALION DRILL INSTRUCTOR.

The appointment of a paid Staff Officer, or Battalion Drill Instructor, is, and will be, of the greatest value not only in upholding the same uniformity of drill practised in each Battalion, but also in assisting the Commanding Officer in the general interior economy—furnishing Returns and other details connected with the Regiment. In fact no step is more likely to conduce more towards increased efficiency than the above appointment.

DRILL SHEDS.

The construction of Battalion and Company Drill Sheds by Government aid, in conjunction with the Local, County and Township Municipalities, will be of great value to the Force in the future, giving Officers commanding Battalions and Companies an opportunity of bringing their men together for drill during the winter months, either for the performance of their weekly drills, or for the drill required by law. The only time available for voluntary drill, is in the evening. The greatest difficulty has hitherto been felt in obtaining the necessary accommodation, and many Corps otherwise desirous, have been unable to perform such drill in consequence. I have therefore much pleasure to report that in my District the Government proposition with regard to the erection of both Battalion and Company Sheds, has been very universally taken advantage of, and that the following Drill Sheds have been erected, while others are in course of construction. In the 4th Brigade Division—Lieut.-Col. Dennis, Brigade Major—consisting of four Counties, there are:—

- 1 Battalion and 20 Company Sheds erected,
- 3 " '5 Company " in course of construction.

Thus, in this Division, each Battalion will have its headquarter drill shed.

In the 6th Brigade Division-Lieut.-Col. Villiers, Brigade Major-of seven Counties, there are:-

- 4 Battalion and 16 Company Sheds erected, including the 13th Batt. headquarters Drill Shed at Hamilton.
- 4 Battalion and 4 Company Sheds in course of construction,

In all probability, from the steps now taken, two out of the three remaining Counties will have their County or Battalion headquarter Drill Shed. In Toronto and Hamilton there are two large Drill Sheds, with gunsheds for the artillery. In reference to the above, I would strongly recommend that steps be taken in order to provide suitable armouries, with small brick or stone magazines, where there are Battalion headquarter Drill Sheds, for the purpose of storing service and reserve ammunition, and might be attached to these Drill Sheds—especially Toronto—the present ones being quite unfit either for the care or protection of such a valuable arm now in the hands of the Volunteers, as the "Snider Enfield," as it is almost impossible to take that care which this arm requires in the present armouries, and I much fear that this arm will sustain an injury unless some steps as above recommended be taken. While upon this subject it is scarcely necessary for me to say how very requisite it is to have suitable storehouses, and a magazine for the Provincial stores and ammunition, provided in Toronto.

CAVALRY AND GUNNERY SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION.

The formation of the Schools of Cavalry and Gunnery, under your instructions, and in conjunction with Colonel Jenyns, C.B., commanding 13th Hussars, and Colonel Anderson, C.B., Royal Artillery, has been very successful. A great desire has been evinced (especially among the Officers and non-commisssioned Officers of the Volunteer Cavalry) to take advantage of the thorough instruction which is imparted at such Schools in all the branches of drill and duties appertaining thereto, under such able and distinguished Officers as the commandants of these Schools, whose kindness and attention to the candidates is thoroughly appreciated, and shewn by the high certificates obtained by them. In addition to these Schools, instruction has also been given to the Batteries composing the Grand Trunk Battalion at Toronto, by Drill Instructors from the Royal Artillery, under the supervision of Colonel Anderson, C.B., R.A., with marked success, all of which cannot but prove to be of the greatest value to both these services of the Volunteer Force.

EFFICIENCY.

The period of Active Service in 1866, and the presence at the camp of instruction at Thorold, of most of the Battalions in my District, has imparted decidedly a higher state of efficiency to the Force, rendering them more capable of performing camp or garrison duty, and relative thereto, several of the Battalions have already prepared themselves for such an emergency by instituting "Standing Orders" defining the duties which would be required in ordinary camp or barrack life. I must also allude to the great number of officers and non-commissioned Officers who have taken advantage of that valuable School of military instruction for the Infantry at Toronto. A large proportion of the former have thus qualified themselves, becoming thereby efficient and useful members of the Force.

I may add the issue of the new armament in every respect to the Volunteer Field Batteries, Saddlery and the Spencer Carbine to the Cavalry, and the Snider Enfield to the Infantry, which has of late taken place, is also a most important addition in the equipment of the Force, giving a tone of confidence as well as an increased efficiency which, in my opinion, certainly did not exist before. It gives me much pleasure in bringing favorably

before your notice, that I have received active and efficient aid on all occasions, when required, from all the Staff Officers of my District.

REPORT OF LIEUT.-COL. TAYLOR.

LONDON MILITIA DISTRICT, Headquarters, London, Ontario, Jan. 1st, 1868.

Sir,—I have the honor to submit the following report of the state of the Volunteer Force in this District, which consists of the 5th and 7th Brigade Divisions, and comprises the following twelve Counties, viz., Essex, Kent, Lambton, Elgin, Middlesex, Oxford, Perth, Waterloo, Wellington, Grey, Bruce and Huron, which, together with the City of London, have a population (according to the census of 1861) of 467,113.

The Volunteer Force in this District, as compiled from the nominal rolls of Companies as they actually exist at this date, consists of:—

- 1 Squadron Cavalry (St. Thomas and London Troops), strength, 5 Officers, 72 Troopers, 72 Horses,
- 1 Field Battery of Artillery, strength, 4 Officers, 40 non-commissioned Officers and Drivers, 35 Horses,
- *11 Battalions Infantry. \ 93 Companies, strength, 351 Officers, and 4,321 non-commis*2 "Rifles.... \ sioned Officers and men.

Being a total force of 4,793 Volunteers, and slightly in excess of one Volunteer to every 100 population. The County with highest per centage of Volunteers is Lambton, which gives 15 per 1,000 population. The County with lowest proportion of Volunteers is Huron, which gives 6_{100}^{37} per 1,000 population. The City of London gives 25 Volunteers for every 1,000 population.

There are in this District:-

243 Volunteers who have served five years and over, and whose term of service has consequently expired,

230 "who will have completed their five years' service during 1868.

During 1867 - 767 Volunteers have resigned,

838 " have been enrolled,

28 " have died.

There are in the Force in this District: — 887 Married Men,

114 Military School Cadets,

112 who have served in the British Army,

23 Field Officers who have qualified by obtaining 1st class certificates from Military School or Volunteer Board,

151 Captains and Subalterns who have not qualified.

30 Companies have no efficient bugler,

10 " have no Rifle Range,

69 "have no Iron Targets; a supply of which is much

There are 37 Company Drill Sheds, and

6 Battalion Drill Sheds, three of which are private property.

DRILL.

With regard to the attendance at Drill during this year, the greater portion of the Force having performed their sixteen days annual pay drill at the Camp, Thorold, during 1866, there was not that inducement for them to drill during the present year, and consequently (with the exception of the new Companies, which have drilled very regularly and with good attendance) the number of drills has been few and the attendance very small, but as far as the rank and file are concerned, there is only one Company that is not well enough drilled to take its place in Battalion.

I believe that their experience of camp has to a great extent given to the Volunteers a distaste for evening Drills; and upon asking every Captain in the District as to which his Company would prefer, "Drill in camp" or "evening Drills," thirteen only were in favor of evening Drills.

I have to report that the Brigade Majors inform me that during the present year there has been a great falling off in the numbers present at their inspections, a fact which I have noticed also, and the Battalion Drill Instructors complain of the difficulty of getting the men out for drill in sufficient numbers to be of any use.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

With regard to Rifle practice, generally speaking, the usual Target practice was post-poned in summer waiting the issue of the new Rifles, and their not having been issued until October, had the effect of causing many Companies to postpone their practice until next Spring. The Volunteers have had 30 rounds of "Snider Enfield" ammunition issued per man for practice, but the Target Practice Returns have not yet been received.

There have been thirty-five Company Rifle Matches, and ten Battalion Rifle Matches. There was a Rifle Match between ten men of the 7th Light Infantry, and ten men of the 22nd Battalion Rifles, the former winning by eight points.

There was also a Rifle Match between twenty-five men of the 4th Battalion 60th Rifles and an equal number of Volunteers from this District; the Volunteers were beaten by twenty-five points, they having scored 885 points, and their opponents 910. And there was a District Rifle Match held in London last November, over sixty prizes, value from \$2 to \$35 were competed for. This was a most successful match, an unusually large numbers of competitors taking part in it.

During this Match I called a meeting for the formation of a District Branch of a Dominion Rifle Association, which was well attended by representatives from nearly all the Battalions in the District, and at which Delegates were chosen to attend at Ottawa for the formation of the Head Association, a copy of the proceedings of which meeting I had the honor to forward you.

ARTILLERY.

The only Field Battery in this District is that commanded by Lieut.-Col. Shanly, and while by no means up to its full strength, it is still very efficient in its equipment, having lately received new guns and harness, and was highly complimented by Major-General Stisted at his Inspection.

The Artillery force of this District is far below the customary proportion of guns to Infantry, there being only one Field Battery of four guns to an Infantry force which would be over 5,000 when called out; the Batteries of Garrison Artillery, four in number, being only Artillery in name and uniform, and they complain very much of being without guns wherewith to learn and practice their Drill; and I beg to represent that when guns are supplied to them, it would appear advisable to have a supply of harness issued to each Battery, without which they would, in all probability, be useless when wanted in action as guns of position, and although Artillery is an expensive force compared with other arms, still as it cannot be rendered at all serviceable in the short time that Infantry can, it would appear prudent to have so necessary an aid to Infantry kept up to its proper proportionate strength.

CAVALRÝ.

The Cavalry consists of the St. Thomas and London Squadron, composed of the Troops above named. They have received new saddlery, and I am happy to be able to report a marked improvement in the class of horses and in their Drill. Two of the officers and several men of the London Troop have taken advantage of the opportunity of learning their Drill and duties at the Cavalry School.

There are two companies of mounted Infantry, one at Mooretown, on the St. Clair River, the other at Iona, near Port Stanley. This is a very useful class of men, as they have a good knowledge of their locality and can perform the outpost duties required from Cavalry, than which they are a much less expensive force.

MARINES.

There is a Company of Marines at Port Stanley, whose term of service has now expired. Were this Corps made Marine Artillery, the men say they would re-engage, and this would become a most useful force at such a station.

INFANTRY.

The Infantry have all received the new Snider Enfield Rifles, which were all marked and numbered previous to their issue; their accountrements are in good order and they are well uniformed.

Previous to the end of last year there were but two Battalions in this District, the remainder of the Force being Independent Companies, and in this latter form required a much greater degree of correspondence and overlooking than those in Battalions, and at

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the time of the Fenian raid in June, 1866, the Companies were ready but were without Regimental Staff of any kind, which consequently had to be improvised, and those Officers taken from Companies had to commence learning their duties as Staff Officers on an emergency when an efficient Regimental Staff was much required for actual service. The whole of the District is now formed into thirteen Battalions, with Regimental Staff, and is consequently in a far more efficient state than previously.

I have to state that upon the question being put to every Captain in the District, as to his preference for being in Battalion or an Independent Company, so great is the evident advantage of being in Battalion that only six Captains (irrespective of Garrison Artillery) were opposed to Battalions.

The formation of the force into Battalions renders it absolutely necessary that there should be some paid Staff Officer to each Battalion, whose duty it is personally to see that the General and District orders are fully carried out, to attend to instruction in Battalion Drill, the formation of Drill Classes, Correspondence, Returns, Target Practice, supervision of Arms and Stores, and generally to perform the duties of Adjutant, Quartermaster and Paymaster during such time as the Battalion is not out in camp or on service; such an officer is the Battalion Drill Instructor, and each Battalion in this District has now a Battalion Drill Instructor, who is either the Adjutant or Assistant Adjutant. I find that this officer is also of great use in carrying on the interior management of the Battalion, saving much expense to Government in travelling expenses of the Brigade Majors, who, with their largely increased number of Companies, had such a considerable portion of their time occupied in performing their quarterly inspections, that other important duties had to be neglected, and now that the Force is supplied with Breach-loaders, they require the supervision of some Staff Officer near at hand, independent of Company Officers, as the neglect of a few weeks would cause considerable damage to the new arms.

CAMP.

In August, September and October, 1866, forty-eight Companies from this District performed their annual paid Drills in camp at Thorold, being fully equipped for active service, and were formed into such temporary Battalions as could be most conveniently arranged, and there learnt many practical lessons in discipline, drill, and duty as if on service, and it is to be hoped that a further opportunity will be afforded the Force of increasing such knowledge.

The 23rd or Essex Battalion were permitted to form a Regimental camp at Sandwich in October, 1866, and the Battalion turned out 25 Officers and 297 men, and Staff complete; the Regiment made great progress in drill during the seven days in camp, and a large majority offered to remain for another week without pay, provided rations only were supplied. But certainly a Battalion which is camped by itself has not the same emulation to improvement in drill and discipline that is engendered by two or three Battalions being camped together, neither can Brigade Drill, a practical knowledge of which is so important to officers, be practiced.

PROVINCIAL STORES.

The Provincial Store here is a rented building, too small for any large amount of stores, and not being detached, would be in great danger of being destroyed should the

adjoining houses take fire. However, buildings of the class required are so few in the town, that there are none vacant.

During the Fenian excitement, as the Field Battery had not a sufficient supply of reserve shot, I had 214 round shot cast and 48 case made under the superintendence of the Provincial Storekeeper, and at so moderate a cost (viz., 49½ cents for 9-pounder shot, 82 cents for 9-pounder case, \$1.05 for 24-pounder case) that it would appear a saving of expense to have them for the future made here.

I had also Pouches and Swivels, &c., for Cavalry Troop made here of excellent quality, and I have the honor to submit to your notice that by the manufacture of these and other stores and munitions of war on the spot, not only would the expense of freight be saved, but also the artizans would be accustomed to their manufacture, and in case of war this District would not be compelled to depend upon distant Storehouses—probably with the communications cut off—for equipments and ammunition which it might be of the greatest importance to have when wanted; and this being the District most remote from the ocean, there is the greatest reason that it should be, as far as possible, able to manufacture ammunition and stores, should they be required on an emergency.

REPORT OF LIEUT.-COL. GALLWEY.

GRAND TRUNK RAILWAY BRIGADE OFFICE, February 12th, 1868.

SIR,—I have the honor to submit the following Report of the Grand Trunk Railway Brigade, under the command of Lieut.-Col. Brydges.

ORGANIZATION.

The employés of the Grand Trunk Railway Company, supplying 36 (thirty-six) Companies, were formed into five Battalions, viz., two Battalions of Garrison Artillery, and three Battalions of Rifles, and were gazetted in April, 1866.

The value of the organization, extending from Rivière du Loup to Sarnia, Buffalo to Goderich, Richmond to Island Pond, &c., &c., cannot well be over-estimated. Military service being exacted from all men in the Company's employment, a comparatively large force is at all times available, men who, from the discipline maintained in Railway management, inured to danger, in fact the larger portion almost carrying their lives in their hands, cannot fail, with the instruction provided by Government, to make good and steady soldiers, a force (living in the immediate vicinity of the respective headquarters, with armories and magazines at hand) which can be moved with almost the same despatch as regular troops.

STRENGTH.

The present strength of the Brigade, 1st January, 1868, as shewn by following Return, is 2,315 (two thousand three hundred and fifteen), of all ranks:—

A Company of Engineers is attached to the 1st Battalion.

RESERVE.

In addition to the above there is a reserve of two hundred men, sworn in, and regularly drilled but not gazetted. Should the Volunteer Force be increased, I would recommend that Engineer Companies should be formed, and one Company attached to each Battalion.

This distribution of the Force, although regulated without regard to Military Service, is, considering the facility of the immediate movement of any portion of it, about as good a one as could be made, with the view of protecting the approaches East and West, and keeping the road as far as possible intact.

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EQUIPMENT.

The Equipment of the Brigade is complete, with the exception of some stores, for which a requisition has been sent in.

The clothing is in very good order.

Hospital Field Equipment is stored at Toronto, including all necessary supplies.

DRILL INSTRUCTORS.

There are four permanent Drill Instructors; the allowance for the fifth, I considered it advisable to apportion between the outlying Companies, from time to time, as most required.

The Instructors are detailed as follows:-

MONTREAL.—Lieutenant and Adjutant Prendergast, 1st Battalion of Artillery (holds certificate from School of Gunnery at Shoeburyness). Ensign and Adjutant Atkinson, 2nd and 3rd Battalion (Head Quarters),—late Sorgeant H.M. 60th Regiment.

TORONTO.—Sergeant-Major Anderson, 4th Battalion of Artillery (late Sergeant H. M. 60th Regiment), holds 1st Class Certificate, School of Gunnery at Toronto.

BRANTFORD.—Sergeant-Major Smith, 5th Battalion; late Sergeant H.M. 60th Regiment.

I have to report favorably of all, their time has been fully and well occupied.

DRILL.

The following return shews the drills performed by the several Battalions during the six months ending December 31st, 1867.

TARGET PRACTICE.

The target practice for the past season was limited by the number of rounds (20) per man allowed to be expended, (40 rounds per man being kept in reserve), as well as by the General Order of 14th June, ordering the Muzzle Loaders to be called in preparatory to being sent to Quebec.

The Suider ammunition was not issued to the Brigade until November, and the season was then too far advanced for much practice.

MUZZLE LOADING AMMUNITION.

Of muzzle loading ammunition 22,560 (twenty-two thousand five hundred and sixty) rounds have been expended in practice, 1867. A synopsis of Target Practice has been forwarded to Head Quarters.

SNIDER AMMUNITION.

Although the practice with the Snider Rifle has been only 5,000 (five thousand) rounds, there is a marked increase in the averages at 200 and 400 yards, to which ranges practice had been confined (up to 31st December)—the averages being,

The recruits in particular make better firing, and attributed by them to the recoil being less.

Target Practice has been carried on as nearly as possible agreeably to General Orders on the subject, and under the superintendance of the Drill Instructors, at the several Head Quarters of Regiments.

RIFLE MATCHES.

The Annual Brigade Match took place at Point St. Charles in July. Total number of competitors, 839. A return of which has been forwarded.

There were also several Company Matches, some of them with men of Her Majesty's Troops, as well as of other Volunteer Regiments; the results have been embodied in the Synopsis of Target Practice.

ARMS.

At my several Inspections, after a careful examination, I have always found the arms in capital order, and I am glad to say the men appear fully to understand the value of the arms lately served out to them.

MILITARY INSTRUCTION.

I have to state that the officers of the Brigade, generally, have not availed themselves, as much as they might have, of the opportunities afforded at all times, to qualify themselves by appearing before a Board of officers for certificates; at the same time many of them have done so, at much personal inconvenience.

Of 128 combatant Officers, only 66 hold certificates.

SCHOOLS OF GUNNERY.

As the men of the 1st Battalion (Artillery) could not without great inconvenience attend the School of Gunnery last Summer at Montreal, the Regiment was much indebted to Col. Pipon, R.A., who detailed two non-commissioned officers to attend three times a week at Point St. Charles, to act as Instructors, and allowed them to continue until, from his own examination, he was satisfied that the Sergeant-Major of the Grand Trunk Battalion was sufficiently qualified to instruct. The drill was limited to heavy guns (the equipment being confined to two 24-pounder guns.)

Col. Pipon was also good enough to allow the men target practice at St. Helen's Island, under his own superintendence, but it is to be regretted that from pressure of business, only two gun detachments were able to attend.

At Toronto, the officers and men of the 4th Battalion (Artillery) have taken advantage of the School there, and already have obtained five first-class certificates. They report that their Regiment is much indebted to the untiring exertions of Col. Anderson, R.A.

I would in conclusion respectfully suggest that the efficiency of the Brigade would be increased, firstly, by converting two Garrison Batteries of the 1st Battalion into a Field Battery, the facilities for which are very great, taking into account the superior class of horses in the Company's Service; and, secondly, by forming into a half Battalion of Engineers the available men (alluded to under the head "Reserve"), thereby giving an additional Company at Toronto, Brantford, and Cornwall, where the men are respectively stationed.

REPORT BY COL. WOLSELEY.

QUARTERMASTER GENERAL'S OFFICE, Montreal, 20th December, 1866.

SIR,—I have the honor to report that I assumed command of the Camp of Observation at Thorold, on Wednesday, the 22nd August last.

The position had been selected by Colonel Peacocke, then in command of the 1st Military District, and was admirably suited for the purposes for which it was intended.

The only objection in any way to it was a scarcity of water. I caused four good wells to be sunk by the Regular Troops, which afforded an ample supply. Until they came into

operation, water was brought daily to camp by contract.

The strength of the Force ranged at times from four guns of Royal Artillery, three Companies of Regular Infantry, one Troop of Volunteer Cavalry, and three Battalions of Volunteer Infantry, to four guns Royal Artillery, a wing of Regular Infantry with four guns of Volunteer Artillery, two Troops of Volunteer Cavalry, and two or three Battalions of Volunteer Infantry.

Latterly there was also an outpost of 200 Regular Infantry in addition stationed at

Port Robinson.

One Troop of Volunteer Cavalry, the Governor General's Body Guard, commanded by Lieut.-Col. Denison, was distributed into small posts from Ridgeway to Chippewa, following the Lake Shore and River. By them that extent of frontier was patrolled every night, at uncertain hours. This important and arduous duty was most efficiently performed and

reflects the greatest credit upon that Troop and the officer commanding it.

With the exception of the Governor General's Body Guard, no Corps remained longer than a week in camp, so that really there were only five days available for drill. On each of those days the men were drilled three times; twice a week I had field-days, when both Regular and Volunteer troops were manœuvred together, and moved across country to the attack of the strong positions which are common in the neighborhood of

Thorold.

Once the Force marched to Allanburg, and once to Niagara Falls, encamping at both

places for the day, cooking dinners, and returning to Thorold the same evening.

My chief aim was to afford officers and men instruction in the practical work which real war presents, and to avoid repeating drill-book manœuvres which never could be required in Canada, such as forming square, &c.

In compliance with your orders, I was enabled to obtain the use of a field suitable for

ball practice, where firing was carried on three times a day.

I regret to say that a large proportion of the arms would not go off, for although

clean outside, the nipples of many were clogged with dirt.

In marching, I found that the Volunteers were soon knocked up from sore feet, owing to the Wellington boots, with small high heels, being in common use amongst them.

With regard to the relative efficiency of Battalions, it is most striking that such was generally in direct proportion to the number of old army officers, and of those who had graduated at the Military Schools in them, thus proving the immense advantage which those institutions have been to the Militia Force of Canada.

In conclusion, I have to add that the Force was always ready to march upon the shortest notice. The arrangements for carrying four days' rations with us having been made by Assistant-Commissary-General Rogers, to whom, and to Captain Grant, 17th Regiment, the Brigade-Major, and to Major Wadsworth, Volunteer Militia, who latterly acted as Camp Quartermaster, every praise is due for their zeal and energy.

SIR,—The Volunteers of this County have rendered valuable services in the defence of the Frontier, both in Eastern and Western Canada; at all times and on every emergency ready in any numbers to respond to the call of their country; and, as they

have done, die in defence of British connection and Canada.

I believe it is conceded that the Oxford volunteers are, in discipline, patriotism and devotion to their country, second to none in this Country. But, Sir, I am sorry to say that the feeling existing and entertained at present is anything but favorable to the Minister of Militia and the Department of which you are Chief; and this feeling is not confined to the Privates, but is entertained by the whole staff of Officers. The cause of this feeling is, that, although they have conscientiously done their duty in defence of the country, they are now neglected and allowed to go without the proper outfit, arms and ammunition. They are so thoroughly discouraged at the neglect, that I am doubtful if they could be mustered in anything like strength at present, which is not unlikely to be the case. How would it be possible for the volunteers to leave their homes without overcoats or knapsacks-which they have not at present? or how could they, with confidence, meet the enemy with their old rifles, knowing the enemy to be provided with Repeating Rifles of the most approved description? Now, Sir, I wish distinctly to state to you, what you must already know, that the whole people are thoroughly loyal and determined to fight, if need be, for the protection of their country until the last inch of Canadian soil will be the last Canadian's grave. And more, that the people of Canada are willing to be taxed for the support and proper equipment of the volunteers; and, as one of the People, and as one of their representatives, I call upon you to equip them properly and put into their hands such defensive weapons as will give them confidence and put them on an equal footing with the enemy.

This feeling is not confined to the volunteers and their officers alone, but the people, as a whole, feel, that as their representatives at the last meeting of Parliament willingly voted all the money which the Government asked for the defence of the country, that it is

trifling with them not to properly equip and arm the defenders of the soil.

APPENDIX, No. 10.

REGULATIONS RESPECTING THE VOLUNTEER MILITIA.—PUBLISHED BY COMMAND OF HIS EXCELLENCY THE COMMANDER IN CHIEF.

MILITIA DEPARTMENT,

Ottawa, 6th September, 1866.

These Regulations are published in the conviction that Officers of the Canadian Volunteer Force are most anxious to learn their duties—and that it only needs, to ensure the correct performance of those duties, that they shall be clearly defined. All existing Codes of Instruction with their several Forms are hereby cancelled.

ACTUAL SERVICE.

1. All regularly enrolled Volunteers who refuse or neglect to turn out with their corps when properly warned for actual service, are liable to be tried by a Court Martial for such refusal or neglect which amounts to desertion.

2. All that is necessary to constitute notice to a Volunteer to join his Company on actual service, is that he shall be duly notified either by the Captain personally or by one of the Officers or Serjeants of the Company under his orders.

3. The manner of notifying shall be as follows, viz:

The Officer or Serjeant whose duty is to warn the men of his Company shall be provided with a blank roll, the heading of which shall be as follows:

H. E. the Commander-in-Chief has been pleased to order the Battalion Company, as the case may be) to be placed on actual service, and to muster at o'clock at

This heading will be read to every man, who will then sign his name in acknowledgment of his having received notice. Should he refuse to sign his name, a remark will be made to that effect by the notifying Officer or Serjeant, and signed by a witness who will invariably accompany him.

4. The Officer Commanding will lose no time in arresting all such Volunteers belonging to his Company or Battalion, as the case may be, and reporting the same to the District

Staff Officer.

5. The District Staff Officer will be at the disposal of the M. General for Militia purposes, and will be the channel of communication between the Volunteers and the M. General on all matters relating to discipline; and between the Volunteers and the Adjutant General's Department on all matters relating to equipment, finance, appointments and promotions.

6. It must be distinctly understood that the Adjutant General is solely responsible to the Government for all expenditure on Militia account, and that he alone under the Minister of Militia, has power to authorize such expenditure. Whenever therefore any unauthorized expense is incurred on an emergency it must be immediately reported for the approval of the Adjt. General; and it would be well that the report should always be accompanied by a minute of the M. General of the district that in his opinion the service for which the expense had been incurred was absolutely necessary.

7. District Staff Officers are authorized on an emergency to make requisition by order on the imperial stores for articles which may be indispensable to the proper equipment of the men of their divisions, should the local Provincial stores be unable to supply them. But a Duplicate of such requisition must invariably be forwarded to the Adjutant General's Department at Ottawa, and must invariably specify the corps to which the several articles

have been issued.

8 When a volunteer corps is placed on service the C. O. will, immediately after the

Note.—District Staff Officers signify the Assistants or Deputy Assistants Adjutant General of the District; and the letters C. O. signify Commanding Officer.

first muster parade, forward to the District Staff Officer an exact return of strength in officers and men, so that no time may be lost in forwarding the pay and subsistence money

of his corps, and no pay can be issued until such return has been received.

9. The District Staff Officers will, on receipt of the returns from the volunteer corps on service in their districts, forward to the Adjutant General at Ottawa, with the least possible delay, a general return shewing the strength of these corps by stations, and will immediately notify any changes of station that may take place. They will require the district paymasters to attend daily at their office to obtain the strength and stations of the different corps, and the alterations which may take place from day to day.

10. In the event of a portion of a Battalion being called out in future, no Regimental

Staff Officer will accompany it without a special order.

Notz.--1. No Regimental Staff Officer can, under any circumstances, receive pay unless he has been regularly appointed to the Battalion or Provisional Battaliou.

- 1. The N. C. O. and privates shall receive free lodgings and rations. All officers and men of mounted corps will receive a daily allowance of 25 cents in lieu of forage for each horse.
- 2. Where a corps placed on service remains at its permanent headquarters, a daily allowance will be credited to each man, not exceeding, and in lieu of, the prescribed rate of ration allowance. unless some of the men live at such a distance as to render it necessary to billet them at the headquarters of their company, in which case a daily sum of 40 cents will be allowed for each man so billeted.
- 3. And wherever Volunteers are accommodated in billets by agreement with householders the daily rate of such billet shall not exceed 40 cents.

DUTIES OF DISTRICT PAYMASTERS.

Mode of Payment.

1. The mode of paying corps called out on actual service, will be by making weekly advances on account, as heretofore, (vide Form B) the same to be deducted from the fina

issue of pay when the corps is released from duty.

2. To this end a covering pay-list (Form C) will be made up in duplicate, from the day the corps was called out until the day of its release from service—both days inclusive—and sent to the District Paymaster, who will examine and certify it, and after deducting all advances from it, will then issue a cheque for the balance due. One copy of said pay-list will be retained by the District Paymaster, and the other will be sent to the Department in support of his accounts.

3. In the event of a corps being kept on service for more than one month, the cover-

ing pay-lists will be rendered as above, at the end of every month.

4. It must be distinctly understood that the covering pay-list has no reference to billet allowance or rations for the men, the weekly Abstract Receipt (Form G) for that service, duly completed, being all that is required from the District Paymasters in support of their accounts.

5. Simultaneously with the calling out of the force for service the Militia Department will immediately telegraph to some Bank in the District to credit the District Paymaster with a sum of not less than one week's pay and subsistence for the estimated force placed on duty in that District, based on the estimate which should be immediately transmitted by telegram by the District Staff Officer, in anticipation of the corrected requisition (Form

A) by Post.

6. The District Paymaster will then distribute by cheque, either to the different Battalion or Detachment Paymasters, or to the C. O's of detached Companies, weekly in advance, a sum of money equal to one week's pay of his men. This will be done immediately on, and not until, the receipt by the District Paymaster of Form B, properly filled in, and signed by the C. O. and Paymaster of the Battalion or Detachment, or by the Officer commanding the detached Company.

7. Receipts (Form H) should be taken, in duplicate, for all such advances—one to be retained by the Paymaster as his own voucher, the other to be forwarded to the Dept.

in support of his accounts.

8. The District Paymaster will similarly, on the receipt of (Form D) properly filled in, send cheques to the different Paymasters or Captains, as the case may be, for payment in arrear of one week's billet money, if the men are in billets, or of one week's subsistence (Form K) if the men are in camp or barracks.

9. The account current (Form E) will be completed by the District Paymaster at the end of the month, and immediately sent to Head Quarters with all necessary vouchers to enable the Department to check and compare it with the advances made to him during

the month in question.

10. For any contingent expenses which C. O's may be authorized to incur, the C. O. will forward weekly an account direct to the District Staff Officer, who will authorize the

payment of the same by the District Paymaster.

11. Accounts for any unauthorized contingent expenses incurred by Officers on their own responsibility, will be forwarded for consideration through the District Staff Officers to the Deputy Adjutant General of Militia at Ottawa.

12. When corps are moved from one District to another, the Commanding Officer should take with him a certificate from the District Paymaster shewing the date up to which the corps has been paid, which certificate should be attached to the pay-list for the first issue of a pay made by the Paymaster of the District to which the corps has been sent.

DUTIES OF BATTALION OR DETACHMENT PAYMASTERS.

1. Every Battalion will, of course, be provided with a Regular Paymaster. In every *Detachment of not less than five Companies, an Officer will be appointed to act as Paymaster, with a Sergeant as Clerk, and will receive Paymasters' pay: * Where two and not more than four Companies are quartered together, an Officer will be detailed to act as both pay and quarter-master, with Paymaster's pay, and will be responsible for the correct and punctual fulfilment of the duties prescribed for each. Where a post consists of one Company only or a part of a Company, the Officer in Command is responsible for the due performance of the duties prescribed for the Paymaster and Quarter-Master.

Every Paymaster will immediately on being placed on actual service draw up an accurate nominal and numerical roll of the men of his Battalion or Detachment, with a

column of remarks shewing when any man becomes non-effective.

3. He will lose no time in forwarding to the District Paymaster form B. for a week's

pay in advance.

- 4. He will notify the District Paymaster at the same time whether there is a Branch Bank at the post where Government cheques can be cashed, or, if not, of the nearest place where such Branch Bank exists.
- 5. If no Bank exists at the post, he will ascertain whether the principal storekeepers are able and willing to cash the Government cheques; and if no one storekeeper is able to do so, whether two or more storekeepers are together able and willing to supply money sufficient for the purpose; and he will request the District Paymaster to send the total amount in two or more different cheques as the case may be.

6. Where it is impossible to obtain money on the spot the paymaster must make a weekly journey to the nearest place where money is obtainable in exchange for the cheques.

7. A week's pay in advance for his men should thus be in possession of the Paymaster, who will on receiving the money distribute it to the Officers commanding companies in two payments each week.

8. The Paymaster will keep a regular book account with each Captain of a Company,

and will obtain the Captain's signature in the book opposite to every payment.

9. When rations are supplied to Volunteers by the regular Commissariat, the charges for rations against each Battalion will be paid by the Paymaster, on the vouchers of the Ration returns or requisitions. †

10. Similarly where transport is provided for Volunteers by the Commissariat, the charges for the transport against each Battalion will be paid by the Paymaster on the

vouchers of the requisitions. †

11. The Paymaster will forward at the end of each week to the District Paymaster a requisition (Form D.) approved by the Commanding Officer and certified by the Paymaster and Quarter Master, for money sufficient to pay for the board and lodging of the force, if the men have been boarded and lodged by agreement, or for the mere Billet money if the men have been Billetted under the Act; and on the receipt of the money the Paymaster will hand it over to the Captains of Companies in their proper respective proportions, who will personally pay the amounts due to the several house-holders, one witness per Company being invariably present and witnessing the receipts, an abstract of which (Form G.) will be forwarded to the District Paymasters.

12. Similarly if the men are in camp or barracks, the Paymaster will forward a weekly requisition for money on Form K sufficient to pay the different contractors for provisions,

^{*} Note. - This will not be in addition to his regimental pay, but inclusive thereof.

[†]Note.—If it should not be convenient for the regular Commissariat to make up their accounts for rations or transport against Volunteer Battalions weekly, these charges will be paid in the gross either by the District Paymasters or by the Militia Department at Ottawa, as may hereafter be determined.

and he will immediately on the receipt of the money settle with each contractor in presence of an Officer or Sergeant as witness, and will forward to the district Paymaster an abstract (Form G) with accounts attached in full; the abstract will thus shew a receipted weekly account from each contractor, duly witnessed.

13. A duplicate of the above receipt (Form G) will invariably be kept by the

Paymaster.

14. If District or other Paymasters choose to employ, for the purpose of paying Volunteers in their districts, Agents who are not duly authorized for that service, they will do so on their own responsibility and at their own risk; any loss which they may incur by such a proceeding will fall on themselves alone.

DUTIES OF QUARTER MASTERS.

1. The appointment of Quarter Master is one of at least as great importance to the comfort and health of the soldier as that of Surgeon. The services of the latter are only required in exceptional cases, to repair health which has been injured. The labors of the former concern every man in the battalion, and are directed to maintaining him in health and vigour; and his duties require a clear head and untiring assiduity: Commanding Officers should therefore be most careful in the selection they make for the post of Quarter Master.

2. In all cases where there is no regular Commissariat, all necessary transport will be provided by the Quarter Master, under the directions of the Commanding Officer, as

prescribed elsewhere under the head of Instructions to Commanding Officers.

3. In all cases where there is a regular Commissariat Officer, he will provide transport on the requisition of the Quarter Master of each battalion approved by the Commanding Officer.

4. When a Battalion or detachment is ordered to proceed to any post away from its own head quarters, it should invariably be preceded by a Field Officer or experienced Captain accompanied by the Quarter Master, and by a steady non-commissioned officer, with one man per company, who will make arrangements for sheltering the men if unprovided with tents, as well as for the necessary supplies of food.

5. Where the men are to be in billets, the Quarter Master will endeavour in all cases to procure them by agreement with the householders, at a rate, for the board and lodging of each man, not exceeding 40 cents per day; should this be impracticable, recourse must be had to compulsory billeting in the manner prescribed by the Militia Law (See sections

69, 70 and 71 Volunteer Militia Act, page 27, Appendix 1).

6. Care must be taken that the billets are not too widely scattered, and that they are as nearly as possible grouped within a circle of which the alarm post is the centre. The

commanding officer's quarters should always, if possible, be the alarm post.

7. The billet arrangements should be completed before the arrival of the force, so that the men may not be kept waiting. The one man previously detached from each Company would show the billets allotted for his Company.

8. In all cases the officer charged with the billet arrangements should wait first on the Chief Magistrate of the place, and request his assistance and influence with the householders, which will much simplify the work.

9. Every Captain should have a list of his Company billets so that if suddenly moved

no delay in payment should occur.

10. Where the men are boarded and lodged by agreement, a bed and sufficient cover-

ing must invariably be provided.

11. Where recourse is had to compulsory billeting, the Officer charged with the arrangement shall make requisition according to Form F on the Chief Magistrate or any Justice of the Peace for billets for the required number of men.

12. Each householder is obliged under the Act to furnish house room, candles, and fire and utensils for cooking, for which he is entitled to be paid at the rate of 10 cents per day for each man, (See sections 69, 70, 71, Volunteer Militia Act, page 27, Appendix 1.)

13. Where the men are billeted under the Act, or when they are in camp or barracks,

the Quarter Master must provide daily rations.

14. Where Volunteers are serving in the field with regulars as will most commonly

be the case, the Commissariat Department will supply Volunteer Quarter-Masters, in bulk,

who will distribute to their different corps.

15. For this purpose the Quarter Master will prepare and forward such requisitions, approved by the Commanding Officer, as may be prescribed by the Commissariat Officer.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR COMMANDING OFFICERS OF CORPS.

1. When a Volunteer Corps is ordered to be placed on actual service, the Officer commanding shall immediately notify or cause to be notified the men under his command in the manner prescribed on the first page of these regulations.

2. The Commanding officer will immediately, after the first parade, forward to the District Staff Officer an exact return of his strength in officers and men, without the receipt

of which no pay can be issued. *

- 3. He will require the Paymaster to draw up a nominal roll of the men under his command, with a column of remarks which shall shew when any man became non-effective.
- 4. He will, at the first muster parade, personally ascertain that each man is in possession of the articles of equipment below enumerated, and will immediately report any deficiencies to the District Staff Officer.

1 rifle, with small stores complete.

1 set of accoutrements capable of carrying 60 rounds.

1 knapsack and straps complete, with canteen. †

1 haversack.

60 rounds of ball ammunition, with the proper proportion of caps.

1 water bottle or canteen.

1 great coat.

1 change shirt, flannel or cotton,

1 do pair socks,

1 do boots or shoes,

Needle and thread, Knife, fork, spoon, tin plate,

Piece of soft soap,

Towel, brush and comb.

Should be in every man's knapsack, provided by the men themselves.

5. Where a corps placed on actual service is ordered away from its permanent Head Quarters, if the men be furnished with knapsacks, the Commanding Officer will not allow, any of his men to take with them any article of baggage beyond their knapsacks.

6. Where a corps placed on actual service remains at its permanent Head Quarters, the Commanding Officer will see that the regulations with respect to the payment of the men, and the payment of the billets and rations, laid down in the instructions to Paymasters and Quarter-masters, are strictly observed.

7. When a corps is moved from its permanent Head Quarters, by Steamboat, Railroad or by marching: Commanding Officers will observe the regulations prescribed for

those cases on page 19.

8. The prime necessities of a soldier on service, supposing him to be otherwise

properly equipped, are food and ammunition.

9. In the Volunteer service where no regular Commissariat and transport departments exist, a great deal must depend on the individual zeal and intelligence of Volunteer Officers in Command.

10. On being suddenly detached to any place where there is no certainty of obtaining immediate supplies, the Commanding Officer must always take with him one day's supply

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[•] Note —In country districts, the Captains of Companies not present at the Head Quarters of their Battalion, will be responsible for due performance of the duties prescribed in this and the foregoing paragraph. The return of their strength will be forwarded to the Commanding Officer of the Battalion, if they form part of a Battalion, or to the District Staff Officer direct, if they do not.

[†] Note.—Until the arrival of knapsacks from England, those corps not now provided with knapsacks will have one set of great coat straps for each man instead, in this case the canteen will be deficient, and its place must be supplied by the pint mug with handle.

of bread and cooked meat* in the men's haversacks; and a supply of bread and meat for at least one day in addition, in waggons.

11. Each man's food for one day weighs 2½ lbs.; the food for one Company of 55 men would weigh 132 lbs.; and as the meat ought not to be too closely packed, one ordinary

waggon should be apportioned to carry one day's food for 8 such Companies.

12. In hot weather it would be difficult to carry meat without spoiling, salt pork or beef should be taken instead of fresh meat; where this cannot be procured bread alone should be carried.

13. In the last case one waggon should carry one day's consumption of bread for 16

companies.

14. The Quarter-master should invariably precede the column by one day, if possible, to

make arrangement for a regular supply of bread and meat at the place of destination.

15. The Rations must be examined by the "Orderly Officer" every morning, who will report to the Commanding Officer if the same or any part thereof be not according to contract, and the Commanding officer will forthwith appoint a Board who will have power to condemn all or any part of them if found not according to contract, and a similar quantity in their stead will be purchased at the expense of the Contractor; a provise to this effect should be made in all the local contracts.

16. Any Commanding Officer detached, with any probability of meeting an enemy, should invariably carry with him in waggons a reserve supply of ammunition, over and

above the 60 rounds per man in the pouches, of at least 50 rounds per man.

17. A company of 55 men would require a reserve of 2,750 rounds packed in 6 boxes, each weighing 55 lbs; or in 4 quarter barrels, each weighing 74 lbs, and each waggon

should, therefore, on the average, carry the reserve ammunition for 5 companies.

18. Every officer detached on an independent command must procure the amount of transport he may require for any or all of the above services, as the case may be, either by private agreement or in the manner prescribed by the Volunteer Militia Act, sections 76 77. (See page 28, Appendix 2.) †

19. Commanding Officers may also provide transport for camp equipage (when furnished), at the rate of one waggon for every 26 tents complete. Also for officers' light

baggage, at the rate of one waggon for each battalion of 8 companies. ‡

20. And for any other purpose which, in their discretion may be required, but the officer will be held pecuniarily responsible that that he does not engage more transport than is absolutely necessary.

21. Parties furnishing transport will be paid for the same by requisition (Form I), on the District Staff Officer, who will, after examining the claims, order them to be paid,

if he approves, by the District Paymaster.

22. The Officer commanding a Battalion or Detachment is responsible for the proper performance of the duties of the Paymaster and Quarter-master as laid down elsewhere in these instructions, as well as for those of all the Officers under his command.

23. Captains of Companies will personally pay the men of their Companies twice

every week.

24. Captains of Companies will personally pay the billet accounts of the men of their Companies punctually every Saturday, or before marching away.

25. The money for these purposes will be handed them by the Paymaster.

26. Commanding Officers are never to receive supplies of any description either from individuals or communities, without giving a formal receipt for the same, of which they

will immediately forward a duplicate to the District Staff Officer.

27. Commanding Officers accepting of any supplies which do not fairly come under the head of those which should be furnished by the Government, will do so on their own responsibility. No claim for such supplies will be entertained by the Militia Department.

28. Where no deficiency exists in the supplies which the Government should furnish,

^{*} Note.—It must be remembered that cooked meat freezes in winter.

[†] Norm.—In all cases where there is a regular Commissariat Officer, he will supply the necessary transport on requisition certified by the Quarter-master and approved by the Commanding Officer.

[‡] Notz,-Each Officer's baggage shall not exceed 1 roll of bedding, 1 small value.

Commanding Officers will not accept of any supplies from other sources except as a gift or on their own responsibility.

29. Commanding Officers are responsible for the safety and preservation of all public

stores which have been issued to their corps.

30. Commanding Officers, and under them the Captains of Companies, are responsible that the arms of their men are kept at all times in clean and serviceable condition. It is not to be permitted on any pretext whatever that a single rifle shall be returned to the Company's arm-racks after firing, until it has been properly cleaned.

31. When Volunteer Corps are relieved from actual service, Commanding Officers will take all articles of public property, such as knapsacks, haversacks, water canteens &c., into the Battalion or Company store; and will forward a return to the District Staff Officer which shall shew in one column the articles received, in a second, articles in possession, and in a third, the cause of deficiencies.

32. No Field Officer is on any account to accompany his Battalion on actual service

unless he is provided with a horse.

33. When any force leaves its own Head Quarters, the Officer Commanding will at the end of its journey send to the District Staff Officer a "Marching in State" as per Form L.

WHEN ON THE MARCH.

1. The men composing any column of march, to march at attention when passing through towns and villages.

2. At other times, although marching at ease, they will strictly keep their ranks.

3. A party in proportion to the strength of the column to be detailed invariably as an

advanced and rear guard.

4. An uniform steady pace, about three miles an hour, to be kept up.

5. The column to halt for five minutes at the end of the first half hour; and after that at the end of every hour's march.

that at the end of every hour's march.

6. An Officer or non-Commissioned Officer with a party of one man per Company to be sent in advance to choose a convenient spot at which to halt for meals, and to light fires for cooking if necessary.

7. An intelligent Officer with party similarly to be sent in advance to select a spot for camp or bivouac if necessary.

8. Under no pretence are the men to be allowed to enter taverns to drink on the line

of march.

9. No man is to fall behind during the march but by leave of the Captain of his

9. No man is to fall behind during the march but by leave of the Captain of his Company, and then, always to have a non-Commissioned Officer left with him to bring him on

10. If the march is to extend beyond one day, Officers should pay particular attention to the condition of the feet of their men. The subaltern officers should personally see that the men wash their feet on arriving at a halting place for the night, and should satisfy themselves by personal inspection that the nails are properly cut. A good Officer will attend to this injunction. A careless Officer will probably turn it into ridicule to cover his own laziness. It is impossible for men to march for many days consecutively without following this prescription, and the fate of a battle may very easily depend on the men being in good marching condition. Every man should have in his possession a piece of soft soap, and should soap the inside of the heel of his stocking before commencing each day's march, and the Officers should see that this is done by every man. The men should be cautioned to drink on the march no more than is necessary to satisfy thirst, as over indulgence in this respect increases the craving it is intended to allay.

11. The men on arriving at the night's halting place should never be kept waiting. The camp or bivouac or the billets should be already prepared for them, and they should be dismissed to their rest with the least possible delay consistent with discipline. If the men are to be in billets every man must be acquainted with the locality of the alarm post

before being dismissed to his billet.

12. The alarm post of each company should be the Captain's billet from whence it should be marched by the Captain to the general rendezvous.

13. A guard is to be established immediately on arriving at the halting place for the night. All men required for duty to be warned before they are dismissed to their billets

or camp.

14. The officer in command of a column will, on arriving at any post where a senior officer may be stationed, report to the senior officer for orders—and the billet party sent on to provide billets at such a post will in the first place report to the senior officer, on whom will devolve the responsibility of making requisitions for billets on the chief magistrate, or of superintending the arrangement of billets by agreement with the householders.

DISCIPLINE.

1. The Volunteer Force when on actual service, is placed, for all matters of discipline, and for the arrangement of all parades and duties, under the orders of the Officer Commanding Her Majesty's troops; and is subject to the Queen's Regulations and Orders for the Army; to the Rules and Articles of War; to the Act for punishing mutiny and desertion.

WHEN VOLUNTEERS ARE TRAVELLING BY RAILROAD OR STEAMBOAT.

1. The men are to be regularly seated in the carriages or disposed of in the steamer according to the directions of the Captain.

2. A guard to be established with such sentinels as may be necessary.

3. Any spirituous liquors in possession of the men to be taken away and destroyed. The men should have been forbidden to take any liquor with them before starting.

4. In steamers, no man should be allowed to tipple at the bar, and a non-commissioned

officer should be placed over the bar to prevent it.

5. No men are to be allowed to get out of the carriages during a railroad journey except by special permission; or to get off a steamer at intermediate landing places.

6. The officer commanding is to see that the railway cars are provided with an ample

supply of drinking water.

7. The officers should constantly go among the men during a railway or steamboat journey, to attend to their wants, and to enforce orderly behaviour; and during night journeys at least one officer per Company should always be up, in addition to the officer

detailed for duty, and visit the men frequently.

8. Complaints have been frequent that Volunteers travelling by railway have committed wanton damage to the cars. It is certainly in the power of an attentive officer to prevent this. The commanding officer should observe the condition of the cars before entering and again immediately before leaving. If any damage has been committed, the Station Master should be requested to assess it, and if the individuals who have committed the damage are not known, it should be charged against the pay of the occupants of the damaged car. Before entering a railroad carriage the men should always be warned of this regulation.

9. If the officer commanding troops moving by railway or steamer is unprovided with a regular requisition, he will invariably give the conductor or purser a voucher for the service performed, specifying the places and hours of departure and arrival, and stating

the number of officers and men conveyed.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

- 1. The Militia Department will in no case recognize any claim, on the part either of individuals or communities, for supplies of any description furnished to Volunteers, unless they can produce a receipt or requisition for the articles furnished, signed by a responsible officer.
- 2. Loss of private property incurred by Volunteers on service will not be made good by the public, unless it can be clearly shown that the loss was not in any manner attributable to carelessness, that it was unavoidable, and that the articles lost were part of their necessary equipment as soldiers.
- 3. Claims for compensation on account of injury or loss of time from illness contracted on actual service, must always be accompanied by a certificate of the Surgeon of the claimant's Battalion or Detachment, that the injury or illness was bond fide contracted on

actual service; as well as by a certificate of the home medical attendant as to the period during which, after discharge from actual service, the claimant was actually and necessarily incapacitated from following his usual employment, the nature and emoluments of which shall also be accurately stated.

4. When Volunteers are confined in any local Prison for a civil offence, no charge

will be included for either pay or rations during the period of such confinement.

5. In the event of a Volunteer losing or damaging any of the Government property with which he is entrusted, a Report thereof should immediately be made to the Department by his Commanding Officer, in order that the value of the said property may be deducted from his pay in the next Monthly Pay-List; and, with the view of carrying this order into effect, a *pecial* Inspection will be made once a Month or at the termination of service by the Officer Commanding at each Post of all Barracks occupied by the Volunteers, as well as of all the Public property in their possession, and a Report thereof shewing the expense of all damages and deficiencies should be made to the District Staff Officer immediately after such inspections.

6. Officers are not entitled to rations of any kind at the Government expense, the rate of "allowances," above fixed being intended to cover their Lodging, Rations, Forage,

Fuel and Light.

7. Requisitions will be forwarded from time to time, approved by the Commanding Officer of the Post, for such Books and Stationery as may be absolutely required for the Orderly Room and Paymaster's Office, and the same will be duly provided by the Department; and all necessary forms and Company Books will be forwarded on Requisition being sent to the Depy. Adjt. Genl. at Ottawa; an allowance of \$2.00 per Company per month for Stationary, will be included in the Pay-List and paid by the Paymaster to the Captain and charged in his Monthly account.

8. When Volunteers are sent away from their post to any other, singly or in small parties, on escort or other detached duty, a special marching allowance, to be hereafter determined, will be made to each man so detached, for the day or days on which he is actually and necessarily detained on the journey. If Volunteers are on actual service in camp or barracks at the post to which he is detached, he will be attached to one of the companies during his stay, and be taken on the ration list of that Company. Otherwise the marching allowance will be continued, and he will find his own board and lodging during his stay.

9. When any Volunteer Corps placed on actual service is sent away from its permanent head quarters, every man will be supplied with a good pair of boots, on application being made for the same by the Commanding Officer to the District Staff Officer; for which a stoppage will be made from his pay, of 25 cents a week for short boots (price \$1.50), or of 35 cents a week for long boots (price \$2.50), solong as he remains on service,

until the cost price be made good.

IN BARRACKS.

Light.

10. One coal oil lamp will be allowed for every ten men, with such an allowance of coal oil and wick as may be absolutely necessary. The allowance of oil must be left to the personal supervision of the Commanding Officer, who is hereby enjoined to take care that it is used only for the non-commissioned officers and men, and in such quantities as may be absolutely necessary. One coal oil lamp will also be allowed for each Guard Room.

11. The expense of the first supply of coal oil lamps will be charged to the Govern-

ment, but all subsequent charges must be borne by the Volunteers.

Fuel.

12. In making contracts for supplying Fuel wood, it must be stipulated that the cord of wood shall measure 128 cubic feet, i. e. 8 feet (or 96 rations or inches) long, 4 feet high, and 4 feet wide; if the sticks are shorter than 4 feet, the necessary quantity must be added by the contractor, so as to make up the cord to 128 cubic feet.

N. B.—96 Rations or inches of fuel are equal to one cord of wood.

DUTIES OF ADVANCED GUARDS.

The general composition of an advanced guard is to be found in the drill book.
 The duty of an advanced guard is simply to feel the way for the column of march,

and to give timely notice of approaching danger.

3. Its strength must depend on the strength of the column.

4. The distance of the leading files of the advanced guard from the head of the column of march must be regulated, in general terms, by the necessity of affording such timely notice of any danger as will enable the column of march to form line of battle to meet that danger.

5. The number of connecting files between the leading files of the advanced guard and the column, must depend on the nature of the ground. In an open country where there is a clear view, there is obviously need of fewer connecting files than in a hilly

country, or in a wooded country when the road is not straight.

6. An advanced guard is never to engage with the enemy unless it is necessary, in

order to enable the column to form line of battle, to oppose the enemy's advance.

7. All ground on either side of a road where an enemy could remain concealed, must be examined by extending a sufficient number of files for that purpose, before the column advances.

8. The heights bordering defiles must be similarly examined.

HINTS ON SKIRMISHING.

1. When skirmishing, men should remember that in the field an enemy will be opposed to them, whose business is to keep himself as much as possible under cover at the

same time that he fires upon them whenever they expose themselves.

2. Two lines of skirmishers opposed to each other on smooth ground, and keeping their lines properly dressed, are never seen in a real fight. All that is required is that the men of a line of skirmishers should be in such communication that they are able to afford each other a mutual support.

3. In advancing across open and unbroken ground, the line will be maintained with

more or less regularity, because there is no inducement to break the order.

4. Where ground is broken, so as to afford cover in some parts and not in others, the files advancing over the unbroken ground, should observe a regular line; but those files which may have in front of them any ground where cover is to be obtained, such as a hillock, a clump of trees, or rocks, should dash forward to seize it at their utmost speed, notwithstanding that by so doing they may place themselves in advance of the general line

by 30 or 40 paces.

5. If the enemy is in possession of this vantage ground, a dash to dispossess him of it should be made, by the converging at full speed of such a number of files as will serve to drive him out. If you succeed in doing so, you establish a post in the midst of the enemy's line, and he must fall back, because you flank him on both sides, while your general line advancing occupies him in front. If the enemy's skirmishers are sheltered by a hedge, ditch, bank or any other line affording cover, a quick officer will select the weakest point in the enemy's line for attack, and will direct a number of files to converge on that point at full speed sufficient to overcome resistance. In this way again a post will have been established in the midst of the enemy's line, which will flank him to right and left, while your general line advancing will occupy him in front.

6. Skirmishers advancing in the open should consider no inequality or accident of ground too insignificant to afford shelter of some sort. If it does not protect one part of the body, it will another. Thus even a large stone should be made use of, and a small tree

stump may save a man's life.

7. In wood fighting no man should fire except from close behind a tree; after delivering his fire, he must load under cover of the same tree; and when loaded, he will first select a tree in advance, and then dash up to it suddenly—and so on. Experienced skirmishers in a wood will establish a footing in this way often close to the enemy's general line. And if this is done and maintained, the enemy's line must go back.

GENERAL DIRECTIONS.

1. If an Officer Commanding a column of march finds himself suddenly in presence

of an enemy strongly posted, he is not to take the bull by the horns by attacking that strong position in front unless circumstances should render that course imperative. This can never be the case where the enemy is a foreign invader of the soil; for the enemy has only one direction in which he can safely retreat, while the column being in its own country can move safely in any direction. In such a case a movement round one flank or other of the enemy will oblige him to quit his vantage ground for fear of having his line of retreat intercepted; and that flank should be chosen which actual circumstances indicate as the most advantageous. For instance, if a column, marching to effect a concerted junction with another force, should find its way suddenly barred by an enemy in a strong position, the column should move round that flank of the enemy which will bring it most quickly in communication with the force it is intended to join. Otherwise that flank should be chosen which will place the column most quickly on the line of the enemy's retreat.

2. Such a flank march must never be made under fire. The column must withdraw beyond range before commencing it, and the flank march must be covered by a strong skirmish line.

1. If Volunteer Officers or non-Commissioned Officers or men, whether on actual service or otherwise, have any complaint or accusation to bring against a superior or other Officer, on account of misconduct, such complaint must be forwarded through the complainant's Commanding Officer, who will transmit the same with his remarks through the District Staff Officer for the consideration of the Commander in Chief. It cannot be permitted that Volunteers shall bring accusations against superior Officers or comrades before the tribunal of public opinion, either by speeches or letters. Such a proceeding would be in glaring violation of the rules of military discipline, and in contempt of the authority of the Commander in Chief.

2. One of the fundamental and most necessary rules of military discipline is to forbid anything bearing the appearance of combination, to obtain redress of grievances, among individuals composing a military force. If Officers or men, whether on actual service or otherwise, have any grievance, their complaint should be laid before their Commanding Officer in respectful language, each individual speaking for himself alone. Appeals for redress by "round robins," or by means of any document bearing the signature of more

than one complainant, are strictly forbidden.

REPORT

OF THE

ADJUTANT GENERAL

ON THE

MILITIA OF NOVA SCOTIA.

Office of Adjutant General of Militia, Halifax, December 31, 1867.

My LORD,—I have the honor to submit to your Excellency the Annual Reports of the state of the Militia forces of Nova Scotia, together with the information subjoined.

The organization is the result of about six years' work, commencing first with the military instruction of volunteers and militia officers, the men not being called out till the latter were fit to instruct, in 1863.

The whole available militia force has now been called out for five days' training for five successive years, and the result has been more favorable than anticipated from such a limited period of drill.

By far the most valuable effect has been on the officers of the force, all of whom passed examinations in field exercise before receiving commissions, and besides had a good deal of training to qualify themselves to command.

Officers promoted also passed the higher grades of examination.

The adjutants all had to pass the highest grade of examination, as well as the commanding and field officers.

Of 230 officers from the country, thoroughly trained at head quarters, during the last

two years, a considerable proportion were adjutants of regiments.

The Provincial Army List gives a fair idea of the state of the organization. Officers are nominated to serve, with acting rank, as cadets, until they pass the required examination for commissions. Hitherto these examinations have been limited to field exercise.

Light infantry has been as yet little practised, as, irrespective of the body of the militia force being only lately armed to any considerable extent, five days only suffices for heavy drill. Light infantry was, however, taught to the officers trained at head quarters, and the regiments armed were trained in it to a limited extent, during the Fenian alarm.

In several previous reports I have represented the good results which would be derived from establishing a reasonable amount of military instruction with prizes in all schools; far less training will have greater effect as soon as the benefits of early training begin to operate. The College at Windsor and the Normal School at Truro have adopted military training.

The Inspecting Field Officers report favorably of the organization of the regiments under their immediate supervision, the regimental books and accounts being properly kept,

and the government property, wherever in charge, as a rule, being in good order. The summaries, commencing page 17, indicate the state of the different regiments.

Of course, in a Province differing in local circumstances so materially as this, the state of every regiment in training and other particulars cannot be alike. Some districts are both remote and scattered; in others, from one-third to over half the population are

away from home during the summer season.

It is my duty to represent to your Excellency that the annual five days' training of the whole force has now fully attained the object originally aimed at,—the complete organization of the whole force of men of martial age for administrative purposes, and giving them a tolerable idea of parade, discipline and marching, while the more intelligent have gained an amount of military knowledge which would be useful if required.

It affords me sincere pleasure to be able to report that nothing could exceed the willing and loyal spirit of the Militia of Nova Scotia during the five years they have been

called on to render gratuitous services, which must have been heavily felt.

As the final returns are not complete at the date of commencing this report, I take the returns of 1866 as a base for remarking, that the aggregate training for that year (45,767 men for five days) was equivalent to 223,835 days. This is equal to training 5,720 men for six weeks.

From drill experience, I can safely submit, that, with intelligent officers and men, six weeks' consecutive drill of five hours a day, per annum, is the most advantageous period

of training.

By a system of service men and reserves, the service would be relieved of much that now weighs on individuals with inconvenience, and no advantage to the service. For instance, during the constructive organization of the whole force, all under forty-five, in families, commercial, and other establishments, had to be called out for drill at the same time, and business and private convenience had to suffer in a way that is now avoidable.

Whatever be the periods of training hereafter, should it not conflict with general plans, I venture to recommend to your Excellency's consideration that this year, subject to such further orders as may be deemed expedient, the whole of the militia force of all arms, excepting those between the ages of 18 and 22 (attained), be formed into

reserve for muster only during peace.

This would give about 15,000 young men, minus those too remote to join, for Militia, Artillery and Naval Brigade services, together with such volunteers as could be induced to join, subject to such training as may be decided on. The Halifax Volunteer Battalion and the Halifax Volunteer Artillery to remain constituted as at present; other volunteers to remain attached to militia commands, and to comprise all non-commissioned officers and men, either individually or in companies, serving or continuing to serve the same as the young men after a nominated period of service, or till their age entitling them to join the reserve.

These young men, from 18 to 22 years of age, to be subject to four years' service, or such period as may be deemed best for administrative purposes and preliminary drill, to be

formed into squads and companies attached to their own corps.

In districts where it may be convenient, contingents of the above to be formed into six or eight company battalions, under the senior commanding officers and staff of the respective regiments, affording contingents for such battalions, for camp instruction or drill

and review in places of general muster.

I have the honor to represent that experience is in favor of small battalions in regiments not permanently embodied—they are steadier and more easily handled; the only objection being some proportional increase in the expense of officers' pay. This, however, would be fully compensated by having the officers ready trained in case of emergency re-

quiring an increase of force.

After the service men get organized under the senior commanding officers and staff, the very best effects would result by making the appointments of all officers and non-commissioned officers strictly competitive, and allotting such a reasonable rate of remuneration for their annual services as to make their posts worth having. I have further to recommend that each Inspecting Field Officer be aided by a Major of Brigade, appointed from the Militia, and paid during his term of service.

This or any other really effective measure necessitates special pay to officers and men

performing special services. Very remote districts could be dispensed with in peace. would be no hardship on the young men to relieve the older ones of the five days' training, by devoting much more time and attention to the parade ground. Employers, however, sometimes object to their business being interfered with, and I believe it is true that many youths would gladly train more frequently were they not deterred by apprehending dis-

charge from their situations.

There is a remedy for this; in summer, the drill parade could be formed so early in the morning as to allow of drill before breakfast. This, with one hour at noon, and two hours after business hours, should put no one to really serious inconvenience, nor the country to serious expense. A service force organized as proposed would also relieve the Officers of being called on all together, as during preliminary drill they could command in turn by roster, with the advantage of exchanging duty. The services of the militia staff would also go much further than at present. On "Battalion days," the officers and men would require sufficient pay for lodging and subsistence, the latter only if in camp.

Were a neat suit of uniform supplied to the effectives, and a reasonable bonus at the end of training, there would be little need to enforce the law. After sufficient squad and company training in the mode proposed, two or three days battalion drill would have an

immeasurably greater effect than the present five days for the whole force.

There are very extensive districts on the South or Atlantic shore without any available drill grounds; in many, from the rocky formation of the country, it would be next to impossible to make them. At such posts the men could be formed into component parts of Naval Brigades, inexpensive gun-sheds being erected for gunnery instruction, where

detachments could be trained when at home.

The fisheries are precarious, and it is impossible so to arrange the routine details of the ordinary militia business as not to interfere with these fisheries, the preparation for them, or the business following them, -missing, losing, or spoiling "a take" of mackerel or herring whilst all abler hands are at five days consecutive militia drill may make all the difference of starvation instead of comfort for a whole settlement during winter. When it is considered that the subsistence of whole families so seriously depends on the uncertain success of short fishing seasons, it is highly creditable to this numerous class, that they have borne considerable inconvenience, and in some instances loss, during five years, when no special arrangements could be made to suit their peculiar circumstances, and made no serious remonstrance nor complaints. It is my duty to report that they have well earned any favorable consideration which it may please your Excellency to extend to them, in permitting them to form a force which will admit of their industry not being materially interfered with.

I subjoin a special mention of the state of the Naval Brigade, and particulars connected with it.

NAVAL BRIGADE.

The formation of this force has not been completed, the reason being principally the want of means to employ competent instructors, with an Inspector from the Royal Navy or Marine Artillery at outposts. Should these means be afforded, and the numerical strength of the force warrant it, I would recommend the subdivision of the men into dif-

ferent brigades under separate commands.

I would also submit that the administrative business of the Naval Brigade, such as the collecting returns, making expedient divisions, and other details not interfering with the executive management of Naval Instructors, remain vested in the Militia Department, with directions to communicate all needful information to Naval Inspectors and Instructors, who will find it difficult if not impossible to get it in any other way; nor can the Inspecting Field Officers of Militia know what men belong to their own force unless accurate returns or their duplicates be filed in this office. Should a Naval Inspector or Instructor proceed to any post, without information or warning the post, the chances are he would find neither officers nor men, the majority of that class being absent at sea at particular seasons.

If practicable, it would be highly advantageous to put the Naval Brigades and Militia

Artillery under the same Inspecting Officer.

During the past season a good deal has militated against militia training. Amongst other things, unavoidable political excitement—which I need not further advert to—and a misconception raised in some districts that the militia law was suspended. This put Inspecting Field Officers in a very disagreeable dilemma, as the line was very fine between urging the men to their duty, and incurring the risk of being supposed to interfere unduly in political matters. I have, however, to report that those officers executed their duty as well as possible under the circumstances, and with a discretion meriting Your Excellency's approval.

The militia regiments, which from the above causes, and the advanced season, could

not be called out, will be observed in returns.

I have reason to notice that the amount of drill performed by the Halifax Volunteer Battalion under the Militia Staff, has been equal to former years. The corps was not officially inspected by His Excellency Sir Fenwick Williams or his order.

The Volunteer Artillery, and 1st, 2nd and 3rd Brigades Halifax Militia Artillery. being inspected by Lieut.-Colonel Hardy, and the 4th Brigade by Lieut.-Colonel Sawyer, are in a good state of discipline and training. The Volunteer Artillery have learned the Armstrong gun exercise, having a battery of six of those guns.

The service was unfortunately deprived of the able aid of Lieut.-Colonel Hardy (Captain Royal Artillery) at a time when he could be ill-spared. The great efficiency of the metropolitan artillery is attributable to his exertions, which were extended equally to

the country artillery corps.

The printed proceedings of the Provincial Rifle Association for 1867 contain the

details of musketry, and show an encouraging improvement.

The annexed reports by the Inspecting Field Officers, the Chief of the Medical Department, and the D. A. Q. M. G., contain details which I have the honor to submit to Your Excellency, together with this report.

I have the honor to notice the Surgeon-General's remarks, reporting the frequently conflicting opinions between medical officers and Boards of Appeal. The section of militia law taken alone was explicit enough, but many of these Boards cannot be expected to understand medical technicalities. Were their certificates plainly headed "Permanent" or "Temporary Certificate of Exemption," and the disorder, when practicable, stated in English instead of Greek or Latin, few such questions would arise.

I have to note for your Excellency's consideration, Colonel Laurie's suggestion that volunteers be hereafter subsidized according to the year's work performed (shown by

Diaries), and their consequent efficiency.

DISTRICT C.

COLONEL LAURIE'S REPORT.

OAKFIELD, N. S., 31st December, 1867.

SIR,—I have the honor herewith to forward the accompanying reports of inspection of regiments in the district under my supervision; also, lists of 165 officers for promotion and appointment, and of serjeants recommended for pay. I am happy to be able to report that, in general, the progress made and the behaviour of the men at drill has been satisfactory, although the late time of political excitement has been a severe test to the working of the system.

I feel it my duty again to bring to notice how desirable it would be that some acknowledgment should be made to effective officers of militia, who often, at considerable inconvenience, attend their annual 28 days' training, and carry out all the duties connected with the organization. I do not think it would be well to reduce the number of days' training required of them under the present system, and would again suggest that they obtain the same exemptions as effective volunteers, from whom far less duty is required.

I would also bring to notice that almost without exception the regiments of this District applied for uniform under the conditions laid down by the late House of Assembly, and I found that wherever the uniform was obtained and worn the companies so uniformed both actually and apparently drilled better than those without it. In many cases I have recommended companies to receive arms, and by teaching only the platoon, and a modification of the manual exercise, the men so trained manœuvred very creditably under arms. I would, therefore, suggest that some inducement be held out to militia companies which, owing to distance of travel, &c., are unable to undertake the responsibilities of volunteers, and yet show great interest in their drill; this might be met by an allowance of ammunition annually, and, perhaps, a small subsidy to cover the expense of uniform.

The volunteer companies were this year inspected with the regiments to which they are attached—thus gaining some knowledge of battalion drill. A system of classifying the volunteer companies so that their subsidy should be proportioned to their efficiency is most desirable; at present all, whether highly or indifferently trained, are classed under one rate.

I am happy to state that in each County in this District a County Rifle Association has been formed, and competitions have been held, thus carrying the interest in rifle shooting much more home to the people.

These meetings were in each case most successful.

DISTRICT D.

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL MILSOM'S REPORT.

HALIFAX, N. S., 31st Dec., 1867.

SIR,—I have the honor to report that I have inspected the Local Forces in the Western District D, and found them in a favorable state of discipline and organization, but not at all improved in drill.

The brigades of artillery at Yarmouth, Digby, and Annapolis, made a very creditable appearance upon parade, and a few detachments from each were drilled at gun drill by their officers and non-commissioned officers. Great credit is due to Colonel Rowley and the officers and men of the Yarmouth Brigade for their good conduct during training, and uniform appearance upon parade.

The two remaining volunteer companies in the Counties of Kings and Shelburne maintain their number of effectives, and perform the stipulated number of drills during the

year, but make no progress in drill or discipline.

The number of trained and uniformed serjeants continue to increase. This year 65 officers have passed and 178 non-commissioned officers, and several of the latter are qualified

for Instructors. They are also generally well up in company and battalion drill.

The whole of the arms and other Government property in charge is in a serviceable condition, except the rifles of the 1st Regiment, Annapolis County, which I found in a very discreditable state, and they have since been ordered to head quarters for examination and repairs.

Rifle Associations have been formed in the Counties of Kings and Digby during the

year, thereby considerably increasing the number of marksmen.

In the County of Kings nearly all the officers and serjeants subscribed one dollar each towards the funds of the Association, in order to meet the necessary outlay consequent upon the formation and existence of the same.

As there are few counties that have formed Rifle Associations at present, I would suggest that the annual grant be increased so as to cover all expenses, and give a larger

amount in prizes.

DISTRICT B.

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL READE'S REPORT.

SYDNEY, C. B., 31st December, 1867.

SIR,—I have the honor to forward, for submission to His Excellency the Commanderin-Chief, the following Annual Report of the District under my supervision.

I have found that the several regiments have maintained a good state of discipline

since last year, and the general progress of the District has been satisfactory.

No material difference has been made in the distribution of corps. In Cape Breton County the districts of the 1st, 3rd and 9th Regiments have been slightly changed to

suit local convenience and curtail distances.

Much inconvenience and vexatious delay in forwarding Annual Returns from this office to Head Quarters has been again caused—though in a slighter degree than reported last year—by officers commanding certain regiments failing to send in their Annual Regimental Returns in proper form and time.

On this head, I must observe, that I have neglected no means to secure a proper return, having, when pointing out to commanding officers the urgent necessity of a prompt performance of this duty, entered into the most minute detail of all particulars required.

I have observed a general improvement in the drill of the officers, numbers of whom are entitled to praise for the creditable manner in which they have performed their duties, in many instances at much personal inconvenience and expense.

The conduct of the men at the several inspections has been highly commendable, and

no instance of insubordination in the ranks has occurred.

From the nature of the various employments of the population in this District, many are necessarily absent during the training season, and the parade exhibit states a large number of absentees for this reason,

Comparatively few of this number are wilful defaulters; but in the 2nd and 8th Cape Breton Regiments, a few ill-advised men, believing that the militia law of Nova Scotia was invalid, absented themselves during part of the training.

The law has been enforced against these men in such a manner that similar cases are

not likely to occur again.

The rifles issued to the several regiments are well kept, and secured in suitable buildings, and all the Government property in this District is in good order and preservation.

I beg leave to report that the conduct of the Staff Serjeants attached to this District has been remarkably good, and they have performed their duties to my entire satisfaction.

DISTRICT A.

LIEUTENANT-COLONEL SAWYER'S REPORT.

HALIFAX, N. S., December 31, 1867.

SIR,—I beg leave to report as follows, for the information of His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief, upon the present state as well as the progress in drill and efficiency during the past year, of the Militia Force of the counties of Halitax, Lunenburg, Guysboro', and Antigonish,—these four counties comprising that District of the Province under my especial superintendence as Inspecting Field Officer.

It will be remembered that early in the summer a general order was issued suspending all militia drill, and that this order continued in force until pretty late in the autumn. Previous to its issue the 1st Halifax Regiment (Lieut. Col. Bremner), 10th Halifax Regiment (Lieut. Col. Gladwin), 11th Halifax Regiment (Lieut. Col. Hamilton), and 13th Halifax Regiment (Major Lordly), had already been called out, and had performed their full five days' annual drill as required by law. In the case of these Regiments I found upon inspection, as I have had occasion to say before, that the officers were efficient and zealous in the discharge of their duties, and the men well behaved and well grounded in their drill-at least so far as could be expected from the limited time they were required to give to that dut. I may add that the 1st Halifax regiment was fully uniformed, and presented a fine soldier-like appearance. The 11th Regiment had applied for uniforms some months previously, but, as in the case of several other regiments in my District, no uniforms could then be had. As to the remainder of the Halifax infantry, it was late in the season when they were turned out for training, and owing to this fact, and the consequent inclemency of the weather, the full term of drill was in most instances curtailed. The present condition of the force of this county, comprising four brigades of artillery and fourteen regiments of infantry, is, everything considered, satisfactory.

The 6th Halitax regiment has been converted into a brigade of artillery (the 4th), and, in reference to the progress made, Lieut. Col. Belcher states "he has great confidence in expressing his belief that the change will be beneficial to the District under his command." The big gun drill is much preferred by the men, and the annual training was very satisfactory. The officers of the brigade take an interest in their work, and are pleased with the change. Lieut. Col. Belcher sincerely trusts his application for sixty suits of uniform will be granted, as it will tend greatly to induce young men of the District to qualify themselves for and undertake the duties of non-commissioned officers.

In the County of Lunenburg the men generally turned out willingly and with alacrity for the performance of their annual drill and I neither saw nor heard of any notable instance of misbehaviour on their part. The officers as a rule, exhibit a fair degree of efficiency in the discharge of their duty. Owing to causes already mentioned, the 1st, 3rd, and 5th regiments, after one day's muster and roll-call, were severally dismissed. I attended the muster in each case. Owing mainly to the exertions of Lieut. Col. Kaulback, a first class drill-shed has been erected at Lunenburg, and is now being used for drill purposes both by the infantry and artillery.

I must make special mention of the creditable degree of efficiency of the artillery companies attached to the 1st and 6th Lunenburg regiments; and beg leave to recommend the carrying out of the suggestions of Lieut. Col. Hardy, late Inspecting Field Officer of

Militia Artillery.

The Militia of Guysboro county have performed their drill for the year, in most cases Two companies of the 1st (Lieut. Col. Marshall's) Regiment, absented satisfactorily. themselves from training; the reasons specified were, the unseasonable time of the year at which they were called out for drill, and the consequent loss which must ensue to persons His Excellency the Commander-in-Chief was pleased to take the of their vocation. peculiar circumstances of the case into consideration, and to order that the drill of these companies should take place at a time which would better suit the men. The 4th Regiment (Lieut. Col. Stewart Campbell's) appeared at my previous inspection to have attained a very creditable degree of efficiency. I regret that I cannot make so satisfactory a report of it this year, more especially as I am aware that its commanding officer has always taken a great interest in his regiment, and spared no pains to promote its efficiency. On inspection day, the movements that might have been made were prevented, and the day's drill abbreviated, through the insubordination of some men belonging to a detached company (that of Wine Harbour).

In consequence of the lateness of the season when it was called out, the 5th Regiment

was mustered one day only, when it was dismissed for the year.

In Antigonish county I regret my inability to report a more satisfactory state of affairs—large numbers of men belonging to the 2nd and 4th Regiments absented themselves from drill in utter defiance of the law. The supposed cause was, the men being led to suppose that the militia law of the Province was in abeyance.

The officers of these regiments have always paid due attention to the training of their

corps, and their style of command and treatment of their men I have never had reason to

consider other than satisfactory.

Whilst in the foregoing remarks I have shown that, as a rule, I have no reason to be otherwise than satisfied with the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of my District, I must nevertheless say, that I have seen little evidence of improvement during the year. Nor, indeed, could it be otherwise; the state of the law and existing regulations, with respect to the militia, has sufficed to effect an organization of the whole Provincial Force,—to accustom the men to habits of subordination,—to qualify most of the officers for the duties required of them, and to enable the men to go creditably through all the more simple and useful field exercises. Further than this I conceive we cannot go, with five days' annual drill, in a sparsely populated country. To render the militia, or any considerable portion of it, effective for active service, a modification of the present system seems quite indispensable.

I must not close this report without making some special reference to the peculiarly annoying circumstances under which commanding officers of regiments, and, indeed, their subordinate officers as well, labor in the Gold Districts; owing, first, to the transient and fluctuating character of the population; and, secondly, to the entire absence of any place suitable to drill in or upon. These facts point to the necessity for refraining from dividing a regimental district which embraces a gold mining district, even although the regiment itself should be for a time a numerically large one. And they also indicate that if a militia force is to be kept up in such districts, suitable drill sheds, or parade grounds should

be provided in each of them where men can be properly drilled.

I have found the arms and Government property in good order, with the exception of one rifle missing in the 8th Halifax, and one with burrel burst in the 11th Halifax Regimental District.

The Staff Serjeants in my district have behaved well, and have evinced a laudable

desire to promote the efficiency of those under their instruction.

${f SURGEON ext{-}GENERAL'S}$ REPORT.

HALIFAX, N.S., Jan. 9th, 1868.

SIR,-Being desirous of placing the Medical Department of the Local Forces of the Province in as efficient a state as possible in the month of August, 1866, a Circular was despatched from this office to the Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons of regiments, asking for information as to the date of their Commissions, their qualifications, &c., &c. Satisfactory answers were received, and I have the honor to inform you, that, with one or two exceptions of individuals holding Provincial licenses, the medical officers attached to the different regiments of Nova Scotia Militia hold diplomas from recognized colleges, either European or American. All appointments since that time have been made subject to my recommendation, and no appointment has been recommended unless the diploma of the applicant has been found duly registered at the Provincial Secretary's office.

I would respectfully suggest that, as a new Militia Act is now in course of preparation at Ottawa, a clause or clauses be introduced defining the powers of Surgeons and Assistant Surgeons as regards certificates, as instances of collision are frequent between these officers

and the Boards of Appeal.

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY :-

In accordance with Your Excellency's commands, I have the honor to submit the

annual Report on the State of the Militia of New Brunswick.

As this Province now forms an integral part of the Dominion, and assuming that a Militia Law will ere long be enacted, assimilated as far as possible for every District, that rules shall be framed for the Force of the United Provinces, and that privileges shall be shared alike by all, I will endeavor, previous to treating of each Class of the Militia in detail, briefly to recapitulate facts connected with the successive steps of progress in this Province, the object in view being to render at least one branch of the Service (the Volunteers) as effective as possible, and to prepare, in some measure, the remaining portion of the Active Militia to accept the advantages of a general system for its better training; but while it will be my pleasing duty to report upon the proficiency attained, the zealous energy, and desire to acquire a knowledge of military duties of many in both branches of the Service, and the unquestionable loyalty and patriotism of all, I must not omit the necessary task to refer emphatically to the short comings of the existing system, and to the many requirements of the Force: these are but too well known to its individual components, and have been frequently reported.

It is true that liberal sums were placed at the disposal of their Excellencies the Honorable A. H. Gordon and Major General Doyle for Militia purposes during the past two years, by the Provincial Government, and doubtless more beneficial results would have accrued from the expenditure, but from the large disbursements consequent upon the pay of the Force, on Service, during the threatened Fenian invasion, and the purchase of much needed Stores, but I consider that the Store Department is now on better footing than it

has been, though still far from perfect, as regards supply.

The Volunteers have hitherto been considered the "Advance Guard" of the Local Forces, well drilled, as a rule, and when drilled every man is furnished with a uniform coat and cap by Government; they attend a number of drills annually to entitle them to a capitation allowance, which is intended to provide for the proper care of the arms and accoutrements issued to them, but unhappily, in consequence of the absence of Government drill sheds, this allowance is inadequate, and has frequently to be expended in obtaining insufficient accommodation for drill purposes in such buildings as are available, and

Officers commanding have had, at their own cost, to defray the other necessary expenses of their corps. Hence, I would remark, it is highly creditable that Volunteers retain the efficiency for which they been justly commended. I must admit that, in some cases when Volunteers serve their time of engagement, they appear unwilling to re-engage, and in consequence of the inability of the officers to recruit to the strength required by law, the services of the consequence of the strength required by law, the services of the consequence of the strength required by law, the services of the consequence of the strength required by law, the services of the consequence of the strength required by law, the services

vices of the corps are dispensed with.

It is not my intention to urge this as an argument against the voluntary system. I hold the opinion that each corps serves as a School of Instruction on a small scale in its own district. The number of well-drilled Officers the Volunteers have furnihsed to the Militia, proves the truth of my assertion; and as the services of one corps are dispensed with, another has been speedily organised, a knowledge of drill and military ardour being thus diffused over a large portion of the Province. I grant that under the existing Law, which is admitted to be defective in many important particulars, and the consequent impossibility of success attending the organization of a corps in any but a thickly settled district, or town, there is a limit to the progress of the Volunteer system, and although I can with truth state that our Volunteers generally are in a satisfactory condition, probably that limit has been attained under the present system. I may state that the men composing the Force are, as a general rule, taken but from one class of the community, all are engaged in industrial pursuits, and when the Volunteers were called out on service during the past year, the absence of the men from the usual avocations was much felt.

His Excellency General Doyle, being fully aware of the comparatively small numbers of available local forces, (1,800 Volunteer, 500 Home Guards), of the defective law enabling him to call out the Militia but for one day's muster, and the disadvantages under which the Volunteers served, had it in contemplation to have a scheme for training the Militia, in conjunction with the Volunteers, laid before the Legislature of this Province at the last Session. The details of this scheme were treated of in my Report for 1866, and which, while strengthening the Volunteers as an "Advance Guard," was calculated to furnish a drilled "Support" of the remaining portion of the Active Militia, the Sedentary to form the "Reserve." I regret that (the union of the Provinces intervening) His Excellency was prevented from carrying this scheme into effect, as from the beneficial results which probably would accrue from that scheme if carried out for one year, the Militia generally would now be better prepared to participate in a system on a more extensive scale under the Law of the Dominion, which will doubtless provide a force of well armed and drilled men, in equal proportions from every district, and from all classes of the community, and by which obedience and discipline will be enforced; although a Militia Law must necessarily be stringent, it can be so framed as to be considered a hardship by none, but the duty of each individual serving under it to assist in carrying it out both in letter and As stated in my Report for 1866, it appears to be the law of nations now-a-days that every ablebodied man living within a State, protected by its government, and enjoying its privileges, should by law be compelled to contribute to the military strength of the State.

Your Excellency is well aware of the absolute necessity to place the Militia of this Province on a satisfactory basis, and of the importance of being thoroughly prepared for defence; as, from the vast extent of frontier and seaboard lines, there are many points at which in time of threatened invasion to expect attack, and New Brunswick forms a connecting link between Quebec and Ontario on one side, Nova Scotia on the other. The experience derived from modern warfare shews the advantages which those who act on the defensive possess over the attacking force in a country such as New Brunswick, provided with natural and effective fortifications of dense forests; and, admitting that a Commander may consider retreat for re-union his best course (he should take advantage of every position to retard the enemy, while retreating,) it is still necessary that provision be made for the safety of the frontier and seaboard Towns.

It is my pleasing duty to add, that, a Camp of Instruction having been held for two successive years, (355 Officers and 1089 men attended), a Provincial Rifle Association established, and County Associations formed, and, having from time to time, in my capacity of Adjutant General of Militia and Inspecting Field Officer, witnessed the satisfactory state of efficiency of the Local Forces, having borne testimony to the creditable progress in drill of Militia Officers, who have had but few opportunities of obtaining instruction, and

being aware of the excellent military qualities which New Brunswickers generally possess, as they display much intelligence and aptitude in acquiring a knowledge of drill, I am convinced that, a uniform system of training adopted, the New Brunswick Militia will, at a distant data company favorably with that of the other Braniness of Canada.

no distant date, compare favorably with that of the other Provinces of Canada.

Having now endeavored briefly to consider the Volunteer and Militia from a point of view shewing the progress already made towards sustaining a well drilled Force, though small, and instructing those who may be made available to impart knowledge of drill to others, and having slightly touched upon the probable mode of advantageously applying the means which may be placed at Your Excellency's disposal, I propose to offer some observations upon the several branches of the service in detail.

VOLUNTEERS OR CLASS A OF THE ACTIVE MILITIA.

The Militia is divided into two Classes—Active and Sedentary: the former of these is subdivided into three Classes, termed respectively Class A, B, and C. I shall pursue the usual system, and commence with the Volunteers, or Class A, of the Active Militia.

This body now consists of Cavalry, Artillery, Engineers, and Infantry, and numbers

CAVALRY.

This Force consists of a Regiment of seven Troops (six in King's County, and one at Shediac), commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Saunders.

The Regiment exists under even greater disadvantages than other Volunteers residing in country districts experience, as, in addition to the difficulty in attending drills with regularity, and the impossibility of obtaining commodious drill room accommodation, the care of Cavalry equipments entails increased expense.

Hence it has been found impracticable to maintain the required strength of the Troops, but those members, who in every sense of the word are "effective," should be

valued.

From the central position of the Regimental Head Quarters, and, as the men reside at no great distance from the line of Railway between Saint John and Shediac, should the services of a Troop or detachment be required at any point of rendezvous, say one of the Frontier Towns, it could proceed to that point without delay; and as the men are possessed of good horses, they would be found very useful on active service.

The facts, that a number of prizes were won by the Regiment at the General Competition of the Provincial Rifle Association, and that success attended the Local Rifle

Meeting in King's County, prove that there are excellent marksmen in the Force.

During the past year His Excellency General Doyle obtained permission from the Government for Officers and men to pass free by the European and North American Railway when in uniform and on duty, an important privilege, as drill can be conducted more regularly than heretofore.

ARTILLERY.

Major Jago's Report contains such satisfactory information respecting the New Brunswick Artillery, and the manner in which the summer drill and practice, with guns mounted at the Seaward Batteries at Saint John, has been conducted, it is but necessary that I should, while referring Your Excellency to that Report, bear testimony to the remarkable accuracy with which Detachments, from each Battery at that place, fired at a floating Target at a distance of 1300 yards, during a competition which I witnessed with no small degree of pleasure; and I respectfully recommend that the suggestions which Major Jago offers may be carried into effect. I cannot quite concur with him as to the desirableness of the Artillery altogether abandoning Enfield Rifle drill and practice, when perfecting themselves in the service of Ordnance, as I am opinion that circumstances might arise in which the skilful "marksman" would be equally valued in this branch of the service as in that exclusively composed of "Riflemen"

The New Brunswick Artillery, not only at Saint John, but at the several out-stations, share the disadvantages which other Volunteers suffer from, and, in addition to the arguments which I have urged regarding the need of Drill Seeds for Infantry, Major Jago states that few of the Drill Rooms at present hired by the different Batteries will support the weight of a gun; this is no doubt the cause of the unsatisfactory attendance at winter drills, and it is much to be regretted, as during the winter months Volunteers have more leisure, and can devote a larger portion of their time to drill than at any other season.

ENGINEERS.

This fine Corps, commanded by Major Boyd, still retains the high position amongst the Volunteers of New Brunswick, as regards discipline and general efficiency, for which it has been remarkable. Besides being well drilled, the men, all of whom are mechanics, have attended Lectures on Fortifications, Military Engineering, and other interesting subjects. I gladly report upon the success which has attended the offorts of Captain Parks to instruct the Corps in Musketry; accurate shooting has been the result.

INFANTRY.

I have much pleasure in submitting, with this Report, a Return of the Volunteer Force for the past half-year, which compares favorably, as regards numbers, with a similar Return published in my Report for 1866, and I may state, that during a recent inspection tour, I observed that a higher degree of proficiency had been attained in Volunteer Corps, with but a few exceptions, than I could have anticipated, as, when I inspected these Corps in 1866, several of them were then on service, others but recently disembodied, and the drills in all, at that time, had been conducted with more than the usual regularity, in consequence of the threatened Fenian invasion; for the same reason I expected to find a large decrease in the number of Volunteers in the Province during the past year, as it was assumed that when on service many so called "mercenery soldiers" would have joined the Hence I consider it is extremely creditable that the Volunteers, as a body, have made progress in efficiency. The Inspection Reports of Lieutenant Colonel Otty and Major Willis also point to that conclusion. That this satisfactory state of efficiency should exist is more remarkable, as the many requirements of the Force, so frequently referred to, have not as yet been provided for. But that there is stability in the Military spirit of this Province cannot be denied; in proof of which, as I previously stated, on the service of one Corps having been dispensed with, from, perhaps, some unavoidable cause, another has been speedily organized; and even during the limited period that the Militia of this Province has been under the more immediate control of Your Lordship and the Government of Canada, there have been several offers of service on the part of Officers and men to organize additional Volunteer Corps. It may be the anticipation of greater encouragement under the Dominion Militia Law has been a means of giving fresh stimulous to the praiseworthy enery and perseverance of the Force.

INSPECTION PARADES.

It has not been deemed expedient to enforce the rule "that each Company for which payment of capitation grant is demanded, should parade its full strength at Inspection," as besides making allowances for the absence of any of its members through illness, in consequence of many Inspections having been necessarily held in the day time, at places where the room was made use of for drill purposes did not afford the required space, the employment of many men at remunerative occupations, which they could not leave except at loss to themselves and to their employers, was taken as a reasonable cause of absence, but when circumstances will admit, as a general rule, drill and inspections may be conducted more satisfactorily in the evenings; however, were a spacious Drill Room at all times and places available, Officers commanding should not fail to exercise their Corps occasionally in the open air at skirmishing, forming Advance and Rear Guards, and at other important drills which can there be executed with advantage, and the men can move with the military pace with more freedom and less restraint.

DRILL SHEDS AND ARMORIES.

It is needless again to point out the absolute necessity of providing Government Drill Sheds and Armories, not only in Saint John, Fredericton, and all large Towns, but in every District, and doubtless this important service will be amongst the first executed by the General Government under Your Excellency's direction.

MAGAZINES AND STORE HOUSES.

I may observe that there is not a Government Magazine in the Province. His Excellency Major General Doyle obtained authority from the Imperial Government, to place ammunition, purchased for the Militia, in Carleton Tower, Saint John, as a temporary measure, until a Magazine be erected. There is but one Militia Store in the Province (at Fredericton). Considerable sums are paid as rent for a building in which store Arms, Accourtements, and other Government property, at Saint John.

CLOTHING.

The furnishing of Uniform, Tunics and Forage Caps to "effective" members of Corps at Government expense, has been a large item in the annual expenditure. The term "effective" is, by law, applied to those who perform at least fifteen drills in each month, as none but effective members are provided with Government uniform, another inducement is thus offered Volunteers to attend drill regularly. I can bear testimony to the soldier-like appearance of the men at Inspection parades,—many obtained uniformed trowsers at their own cost. As the supply of uniform for Volunteers is limited, so is the system regarding it at present far from perfect.

TARGET PRACTICE.

The annual Target Practice of Volunteer Corps for 1867, was conducted as satisfactorily as could be expected, when considered that the absence of Iron Targets at many important stations is much felt, and that it is too often forgotten that the mere act of firing away a number of rounds of ammunition, even with care, will not make a marksman, if the necessary Musketry Drill has been neglected; but it appears from the Target Practice Returns received, that the allowance of ammunition (60 rounds per man), has been expended with excellent results. I respectfully recommend that, a high degree of proficiency in Rifle Practice having been attained by a large proportion of the Volunteers, and with a view to the Government allowance of ammunition being expended with increased advantage, additional rules, as to the future system of conducting the practice, be framed, based upon the Musketry Regulations for Imperial Troops, that, instead of all Volunteers firing four consecutive courses at 200, 300, and 400 yards, the first and second periods as per Hythe Regulations be substituted, by which means all those who fail to obtain the required number of points at the short distances, will again practice at those distances, while the successful marksmen will be permitted to fire up to 600 yards. I also recommend that 10 rounds per man be expended at volley firing.

It is assumed that the Local Forces, or at least the "Advance Guard," will ere long be armed with a breach-loading Rifle; those who are intrusted with the care of so valuable a weapon, should bear in mind that the theory regarding its use differs in no particular, except as to its loading properties, from that which the knowledge of, with the

ordinary Enfield Rifle, has proved so great an aid to obtain accurate shooting.

RIFLE RANGES.

It is of much importance that Rifle Ranges be provided at as many necessary points as possible, within easy reach of the members of corps, and that targets be supplied. I am aware of the fact that land in the vicinity of towns and villages is valuable; but 1 apprehend no difficulty in obtaining suitable ranges at a reasonable expense, and at many places no other expenditure would be required than that of erecting butts.

CARE OF ARMS.

In my Report for 1866 I recommended that an Instructor of Musketry and permanent Armourer be appointed. I again urge the latter appointment, as I regret to state, in some cases, the cleaning of arms issued to Volunteer Corps has been indifferently attended to. Much expense is necessarily incurred in restoring these arms to a satisfactory condition, and the services of a temporary armourer perhaps cannot be obtained when most needed.

RIFLE ASSOCIATION.

Scarcely a year has elapsed since the establishment of the Provincial Rifle Association by His Excellency Major General Doyle, which, with the subsequent formation of several County Rifle Matches in connection with the Association, has been a complete success, and surpassed the expectations of the most ardent. I need not enter into details on this point, as the Report of the Association will be laid before Your Lordship; but I cannot refrain from remarking upon the interest which the public in general took in the welfare of the Association, and the ladies in particular who contributed so largely to its funds; lhe zeal and energy displayed by Colonel Thurgar, the worthy President, the Secretary, and those who so ably assisted in furthering the progress of this most important object, cannot be too highly appreciated.

The facts that \$1,867 were offered in prizes to be competed for at the general meeting at Sussex Vale, and \$693 at County competitions, speak volumes for the Association, as yet in its infancy. The contemplated formation of the Dominion Rifle Association, if carried into effect, cannot fail to strengthen our Provincial Association; but we must assiduously endeavour to keep the public interest alive in the matter, to add to the list of subscribers, and with Government aid, we may naturally expect additional success.

CLASS B AND C.

By the provisions of the Militia Act passed on 31st May, 1865, these Classes consist of all the male inhabitants of the Province (except Class A and certain exempts) between the ages of 18 and 45 Class B being unmarried men and widowers without children,—Class C, married men, and widowers with children.

MUSTER PARADES

Your Lordship being well aware that no advantage could accrue from the one day's muster of Battalions, provided for in the existing Law, was pleased to order it to be dispensed with; however, eight Battalions had already mustered when Your Excellency's order was published.

It is creditable to Officers and men that the attendance at Muster Parades has been in any respect satisfactory, as the difficulty, if not impossibility, of enforcing obedience and collecting fines under a defective Law, is such, that in cases of men absenting themselves from Muster, and having escaped punishment by fine, a precedent thus established, it has a tendency to increase the number of absentees, to diminish the power of Commanding Officers, and had an injurious effect as regards discipline.

That the important Classes of which I now treat, composed of young active men, the "bone and sinew" of the community, should be only called upon under such a Law, and such unsatisfactory circumstances, to contribute to the Military strength of this Province,

is indeed to be regretted.

CAMPS OF INSTRUCTION.

It is true that the efforts made to instruct Militia Officers, and to drill a quota from every Battalion at an annual Camp, were accomplished with a view to facilitate a future system of training, and it cannot be doubted that these efforts have been attended with excellent results.

The principles upon which the Camp of Instruction was based were in themselves admirable, and were in general terms—

1. That at least fifteen Companies, consisting of 3 Officers and 60 rank and file each,

should assemble annually for 28 days at a specified time and place.

2. The men to be drawn, by the voluntary system, in equal proportions from every Battalion, or in such proportions as the Commander in Chief should deem expedient.

3. Any Officer commanding a Battalion failing to furnish the required quota, must resort to the draft.

The practical execution of these principles has been attended with many difficulties

amongst others were these:-

1. In consequence of the limited funds placed at the disposal of the Commander in Chief, and the necessarily large sums required for the transport of those men who reside in distant parts of the Province to and from Camp, and for the erection or hire of a building in which to house the assembled Force, either the course of drill had to be curtailed, or a smaller number of men called upon to attend than it was previously considered desir-

able to have at Camp.

2. Although Commanding Officers were requested to select Officers and men for duty at the Camp who were residents in the Province, and whose services would subsequently be available in imparting instruction to their respective Companies, it was found that this selection was in some cases impracticable, as many men of this class failed to attend, the excuse being that absence from their homes and ordinary occupations for a lengthened period would be with inconvenience to themselves; and the vacancies their absence from Camp caused, had necessarily to be filled from the so called "migratory class"; however, the draft was not resorted to in any instance. And it must be admitted that the Camp of Instruction has been the means of diffusing a good practical knowledge of drill throughout the Province, and shewing the system by which the interior economy of a Battalion is conducted to those who otherwise would have no opportunity of obtaining such information.

FUTURE SYSTEM OF TRAINING.

It is probable that in future Militia Training, instead of requiring men to travel long distances to attend a Camp, a quota for service from every Company in the Province, will be drilled in the District in which the men composing it reside, all Battalions and Companies having been previously equalized, as far as possible as regards numerical strength. The most serious difficulties appertaining to the instruction of the Militia en masse, or of those assembled in large numbers at Camps, will thus be obviated:—1. There will be no expenditure for transport of men: 2. A lengthened course of drill can be accomplished without inconvenience to individuals: 3. By encouraging the voluntary system as far as practicable, the class of men, whose services are to be valued, will gladly avail themselves of every means afforded them to become proficient in military duties; and on the first quota of a Company completing its course of instruction, those who have witnessed the progress in drill made by their brethren, will be ready and willing to undertake the duties required of them.

The natural result of these successive courses of service would be that, by selecting officers and men who have obtained the necessary qualifications, and posting them to important positions in Battalion, esprit de corps established, the annual training could be carried out most satisfactorily, and a large and efficient force placed at the disposal of Your

Lordship.

In order to ensure the successful adoption of such a system, the erection of Drill Sheds will be a most essential service, and one of permanent benefit to the Dominion. The fact that in this Province all are engaged in industrial pursuits convinces me of the advantage of having drill conducted with as little inconvenience as possible to the men, and in the evenings when practicable, as the ordinary daily occupation finished, an hour or two of drill is but an agreeable duty. As regards the instruction of residents in sparsely settled districts, men of enterprising character, active, energetic habits, a special arrangement must necessarily be made for them.

MILITARY SCHOOLS.

That the Military School system, so successfully carried out in the Upper Provinces,

be extended to New Brunswick, is much to be desired. In my Report for 1866, I recommended that a School for Adjutants, other officers and Cadets, or non-commissioned officers who may wish to qualify for commissions, be established; that these should undergo a course of instruction, to commence at the first rudiments of drill, terminating with Battalion drill and a brief course of musketry, and that by no means should "mutual instruction" be neglected, as it is most important that officers be enabled to impart the knowledge they acquire to others with confidence in their own abilities.

I suggested that but a limited number should attend at each course, to ensure attention to every individual by Instructors, and that certificates, shewing the qualification of

each, should be furnished on the termination of the course.

By having several courses annually, one officer or more from every Battalion at each course, an increased number of well drilled officers would be distributed throughout the Province.

I cannot too strongly urge the necessity for the better training of Adjutants, and again respectfully refer to my recommendation that they should receive increased salaries when qualified for the position, and when additional duties devolve upon them.

I regret that His Excellency Major General Doyle was prevented from carrying this

School system into effect.

In addition to the Military School system—without which no organization can be complete—it is of great importance that drill be introduced into every College and School, and that it should be considered an essential portion of the daily routine of the young.

There are abundant arguments in favor of instilling military ardour into the mind, as

well as practically impressing it, at an early age.

The instruction of the students of the University in a knowledge of drill—commenced during the past year—has been conducted with regularity. The young men have attained a creditable degree of proficiency, considering the limited time occupied in this duty.

The Sergeant Instructors employed by Government have been ordered to undertake the drilling of school boys, when practicable, and at some stations benefit has already been derived from their services. But it is to be hoped that increased interest may be manifested in this particular.

SEDENTARY MILITIA.

The only remaining Class is the Sedentary Militia, comprising all male inhabitants of the Province, with the same exceptions as Classes B and C, between the ages of forty-five and sixty. They are attached to the Battalions comprising the districts in which they reside, and are not called upon to muster, but should be carefully enrolled as Section 39 of the Act provides. A return of them has been made by the Commanding Officers of most Battalions, but I cannot vouch for the accuracy of their numbers, which, as taken from the Returns, would amount only to 7,193.

As I have already exceeded the usual limits of the Annual Report, I need but add that I have refrained from adverting at any length to the probable new Militia Law for the United Provinces, as it is a point I felt some diffidence in approaching, being well aware that a measure of such vital importance has received the due consideration of Your Excellency, and of those whose experience is much to be valued, and that, not only will the results of previous legislation be embodied in the new Law, but those results of more recent progress in military organization, as far as they may be applicable to the Militia of the Dominion.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S INSPECTION REPORT.

NEW BRUNSWICK YEOMANRY CAVALRY.

No. 4, or Captain Darling's Troop.

The hours of the trains on the European and North American Railway did not admit of assembling the whole Regiment for inspection at any point at one time. I inspected the above named Troop at Ossekeag Station on the 23rd October, and subsequently the Deputy Adjutant General inspected the remaining Troops; his Report is appended.

Deputy Adjutant General inspected the remaining Troops; his Report is appended.

I regret that unavoidable causes, adverted to in another part of my Report, have in some measure, stayed the progress in efficiency of this Regiment; but I must allow that credit is due to Captain Darling, and other zealous officers, for the attention they gave to their military duties, not the least of which, is the important task of instructing those under their command.

The parade I witnessed on the 23rd October was, as far as could be expected, satisfactory, and the Government property in fair order.

NEW BRUNSWICK REGIMENT OF ARTILLERY.

Major Jago, Assistant Adjutant General of Artillery, from personal observation at the weekly parades of the Saint John Batteries, and at the practice which they made with solid shot from 32-pounders, has reported more particularly upon the general state of efficiency of

those Batteries. I therefore propose referring to my inspection of the Artillery at the Frontier Towns.

Captain Osburn's Battery, Saint Andrews.

Accompanied by Major Jago, I inspected this Battery on the 24th October. The attendance was small. Taking into consideration the fact that this Battery was scarcely organized when visited Saint Andrews in November, 1866, a higher degree of proficiency had been since then attained than I could have anticipated. Officers and men displayed an excellent knowledge of gun drill with 6-pounder field pieces.

The men composing this Battery are, I believe, without exception, in the employment of the New Brunswick and Canada Railway Company, of which Captain Osburn is

the Manager.

The arms and other Government property were in excellent condition.

Captain Clewley's Battery, Saint Stephen.

This Battery paraded for Inspection, with Captain Smith's Infantry Company, at Saint Stephen, on the afternoon of the 25th October. Both Corps turned out nearly their complete effective strength, and the parade was of the most satisfactory character. One could not fail to observe the smart and soldier-like appearance of the men; they have recently been furnished with caps and jackets, and they provided uniform trowsers at their own cost. The proficiency in gun drill of the Battery was extremely creditable.

Lieutenant Clark is an excellent drill, and has rendered much assistance to Captain

Clewley in the instruction of this Corps.

The Field Pieces, Enfield Rifles, and other Government property, were in good order.

Captain Edgar's Battery, Woodstock.

I inspected this Battery in the Mechanics' Institute, at Wookstock, on the evening of the 17th October. The attendance was fair. Gun drill was well executed, and from the degree of proficiency displayed in Infantry drill, it was evident that it had not been entirely neglected during the past year.

The Battery consisted solely of recruits when inspected in November, 1866, and to

the zealous energy of Captain Edgar may be attributed the progress attained.

I regret that the difficulty of obtaining the Institute for drill,—as it is frequently used for other purposes—has of late prevented the Battery from assembling as regulary as usual.

NEW BRUNSWICK ENGINEERS.

Major Boyd, Commanding.

I inspected this Corps in the temporary Drill Room at Saint John, on the evening of the 22nd October; forty-five members attended, and the parade was quite satisfactory. It is only necessary to add that this fine Corps still retains the high position amongst the Volunteers of New Brunswick, as regards discipline and general efficiency, for which it has been remarkable.

I have reported upon the success which has attended the efforts of Captain Parks, in

instructing the men in musketry; accurate shooting has been the result.

The arms and accoutrements were in good order.

SAINT JOHN VOLUNTEER BATTALION.

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I inspected this Battalion at Saint John on the afternoon of the 22nd October. The weather proving unfavorable, the parade was held in Merrit's building instead of at the Barrack Square. From the limited space which the temporary drill room afforded, and the consequent unsatisfactory character of the parade, it was difficult to form an adequate opinion as to the state of efficiency of this Corps, and still more difficult would it be to report correctly upon it.

Battalion Drill could not be attempted, and only the manual and platoon exercises and simple movements by Companies executed. Nor was the attendance by any means large, the cause of absence of many of each Company, as reported by the several Captains, being, that the absences were employed at remunerative occupations, from which their

employers would not grant them leave.

Lieutenant Colonel Otty has energetically endeavored to adopt a good Regimental system in this Battalion, and if success has not attended all his efforts in this respect, it may be in a great measure attributed to the absence of a Government Drill Shed, and the necessity of placing the Volunteer Force on a better footing than it has hitherto been.

I have much pleasure in bearing testimony to the excellent knowledge of drill which many Officers of this Battalion possess. The non-commissioned Officers, as a body, are

well instructed in their duties.

The arms and other Government property were in good order.

FIRST BATTALION YORK COUNTY MILITIA.

Captain Hewitson's Company, Fredericton.

I inspected in the Masonic Hall, on the evening of the 4th November. The attend-

ance was very large.

I cannot too highly commend the satisfactory state of efficiency of this Corps. I must admit that it exists under greater advantages than Volunteers generally experience; organized at a time when two Corps at Fredericton failed to keep up the strength required by Law, some of their best drilled members joined this Company, and Captain Hewitson is fully qualified to impart a deeper knowledge of Military duty, according to the attainments of those under his command; the excellent results which attended his instruction were manifested at this inspection. The arms, accoutrements and other Government property were in good order.

Lieutenant Colonel Honorable L. A. Wilmot was present at inspection, having recently returned from Europe, where he has seen many of the English Volunteers under arms, and expressed himself much pleased with the progress this Corps made during his

absence.

There are many skilful marksmen in the Company.

FIRST BATTALION CHARLOTTE COUNTY MILITIA.

Major Stephenson's Company, Saint Andrews.

I inspected in the temporary drill shed on the evening of the 24th October. The attendance was fair. The creditable manner in which drill was executed proves that the Corps has benefited by the instruction of such efficient Officers as Major Stevenson and Captain Polley. The arms, accountrements, and other Government property were in good order.

FOURTH BATTALION CHARLOTTE COUNTY MILITIA.

Captain Smith's Company, Saint Stephen.

Inspected on the afternoon of the 25th October, with Captain Clewley's Battery of Artillery. The attendance was large. This Company has been on more than one occasion deservedly reported as "one of the best Corps in the Province;" nor do I feel justified to refer to it in any other terms in this Report; as the smart and soldier-like appearance of the men at Inspection, and the steadiness and precision of their movements, were highly creditable to Captain Smith and those under his command.

There are some excellent marksmen in this Company. The arms and other Government property were in good condition.

Captain Murchie's Company, Milltown.

Inspected on the evening of the 25th October. The attendance was large, and but for the limited size of the drill room in which to display the efficiency of so strong a Company to advantage, the parade was most satisfactory. The Corps appears to be thoroughly efficient. The arms and other Government property were in good order.

FIRST BATTALION CARLETON COUNTY MILITIA.

Captain Ketchum's Company, Woodstock.

Inspected in the Mechanics' Institute on the evening of the 18th October. The attendance was fair.

The efficiency in drill manifested by the Officers and men of this Corps was equal if not superior to that I had witnessed on several former occasions, and worthy of high commendation.

On the retirement of Captain Strickland from the command of the Company, an Officer has succeeded him fully qualified for the position. Arms and other Government property were in good order.

SECOND BATTALION CARLETON COUNTY MILITIA.

Captain Adams' Company, Steeves' Mills.

Accompanied by Lieut. Colonel Tupper and Captain Edgar, I inspected this Company on the afternoon of the 18th October. The attendance was fair, drill was creditably performed, and the skirmishing deserves special mention.

DEPUTY ADJUTANT GENERAL'S INSPECTION REPORT.

Sin,—I have the honor to submit to you, for the information of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, the following Report upon the Inspection of the several Troops of the New Brunswick Yeomanry Cavalry, and the Volunteer Companies attached to the several Battalions of Infantry, as hereafter enumerated.

NEW BRUNSWICK YEOMANRY CAVALRY.

Troop No. 4 of this Regiment having been inspected by you on the 23rd of October last, I proceeded, in accordance with your instructions, to Shediac, in the County of Westmorland, on the 25th November, to inspect Troop No. 7, commanded by Captain Henderson, and such other portions of the Regiment as had been ordered to parade for Inspection on that day.

Captain Henderson's Troop, No. 7.

Three-fourths of the total strength of this Troop appeared on parade, and were manœuvred very creditably, by the Captain commanding, in the various evolutions they were called upon to perform.

The men in most instances were well mounted, and their equipments were in very

fair order.

They paraded with swords alone, as no mode of adjustment to carry the long Enfield Rifle has yet been provided for this Regiment.

Troops Nos. 1, 2, & 3.

After concluding the inspection of Troop No. 7 in mounted drill, such portions of Troops Nos. 1, 2, and 3 as had been conveyed to Shediac in the Cars of the European and

North American Railway, fell in with No. 7 to be inspected as Infantry.

The attendance from Nos. 1 and 2 was very meagre, but No. 3, commanded by Captain Pearson, turned out nearly its full strength. Although much time has been devoted by the men of these Companies to the acquirement of a knowledge of Infantry drill, they seem to have made but little improvement in that branch of their duties since last inspection.

The Government clothing and accountrements worn by those present were in good condition, but the care of keeping the rifles in a clean and proper state, had in many

instances been sadly neglected.

Lieutenant Colonel Saunders, commanding the Regiment, the Staff Officers, and all the Captains, were present at this Inspection.

Captain Brittain's Troop, No. 6.

On the 26th of November I was at Bellisle Corners, in King's County, to inspect the Troop under command of Captain Brittain. The men comprising this Troop are scattered over the Parishes of Springfield and Kars, some of them residing at a distance of twelve miles from the head quarters of their Company.

As the day on which the inspection was ordered proved to be a very stormy one, and the roads being in an almost impassable condition, but a very small number of this Troop

reported themselves.

It is but justice to state that when the Militia Battalion of that District was reviewed by Lieutenant Colonel Fairweather in July last, the entire strength of this Troop was present at that parade. At their last annual inspection all were reported present except one man on sick leave.

Captain Upham's Troop, No. 5.

I inspected this Troop on the 28th of November at Upham Village, in King's County, and have much pleasure in reporting their good attendance, and the satisfactory examination they passed both in Cavalry and Infantry drill.

Captain Upham's zeal and ability in instructing this Troop, without the aid of a Drill

Instructor, is worthy of every commendation.

The men have all provided themselves with regulation trowsers at their own expense. The Government allowance of clothing was in good order and well preserved. The Cavalry equipments were in fair condition, but greater care is needed in keeping scrupulously clean the Enfield Rifle with which they are armed.

QUEEN'S NEW BRUNSWICK RANGERS.

Captain Rourke's Company.

This Company at their last annual inspection came under the designation of "Home Guards;" since that period, His Excellency Major General Doyle, our late Commander-in-Chief, was pleased to accept their services as a Volunteer Company.

On their inspection on the 17th of October last, but one half the strength of the Company was present. The absentees were reported "engaged in their daily pursuits, as

their employers would not grant them leave to absent themselves from work.

The execution of the manual and platoon exercises, and changes of position from standing pivots, were performed in a satisfactory manner, but their marching, and all formations on the move, were badly executed. The limited space of the drill room occupied by this Company explains the cause of failure in these essential points.

This is the only corps in my tour of Inspection that conformed to the new drill as set forth in the last issue of "The Infantry Field Exercise." The Government clothing issued to this Company (being new) was in good condition, and the arms and accountre-

ments tolerably well kept.

SECOND BATTALION CHARLOTTE COUNTY MILITIA.

Captain Bogue's Company.

This Company was inspected by me at Saint George on the evening of the 26th of October, in a building that had been erected by a few spirited individuals of the place to serve as a drill room, armory, and store house, for the Volunteers of their district. This is under the care of the Officer commanding the Battalion, Lieutenant Colonel Wetmore.

As this was the first occasion upon which the men wore the new uniform, and as the greater part of them were present, the Company presented a fine appearance. After the Inspection the clothing was all returned into store.

Captain Bogue's Company had not assembled for drill for some time previous to this Inspection, consequently all the movements attempted were performed in an unsatisfactory

manner.

The arms and accountrements of this Company are kept in the building above mentioned, they are in good condition, as the Captain has had them periodically cleaned at his own expense.

THIRD BATTALION CHARLOTTE COUNTY MILITIA.

Captains Byron, Lloyd, and Grew's Companies.

I inspected Captain Byron's Company at Welsh Pool, Campo Bello, on the 24th of October, and found but little more than one half of the organized Force present. Captain Byron accounted for the absentees in a satisfactory manner, giving me to understand that at that particular period of the year the men were at sea, engaged in their avocations as fishermen.

Captain Byron's Company has not had the services of a regular Drill Instructor for some time, therefore the minutia of drill was not as well performed by them as by other Companies that I have lately inspected. Being temporarily in command of the Frontier during the time this Company was on actual service, I can bear testimony to the arduous duties performed by them, and to their powers of endurance on many trying occasions.

The arms issued for their use have been served out to each member of the Corps, and are kept in their possession: those present for inspection were in good order, and the

clothing and accoutrements clean and proper.

Lieutenant Colonel Brown, the Commanding Officer of the Battalion, and his Adjutant, Captain Farmer, were present at this inspection, and subsequently accompanied me to Deer Island to witness the inspection of the Volunteers of that place attached to Colonel Brown's command.

I inspected Captain Lloyd's Company at Deer Island, on the 25th of October; they were manœuvred at inspection by Lieutenant Fountain, Captain Lloyd being absent on three months' leave.

The execution of the manual and platoon exercise by this Company was remarkably good, and the steadiness with which they executed the various changes of position shewed that they had kept in practice the instruction they had received.

A new drill room is in course of construction for the use of this Company, the space

afforded by the one now occupied being found entirely too small.

The clothing, arms and accourtements were in good condition, with the exception of a lock of one rifle which I have to report as unserviceable.

After concluding the inspection of the above-named Company, I immediately pro-

ceeded to Lord's Cove, a distance of eight miles, to see Captain Grew's Company.

Captain Grew having been absent on leave from his head quarters for several weeks, his subaltern Officer, Lieutenant Lord, did not receive the order for inspection until the 23rd of October, although this order was sent to Captain Grew's address on the 11th of that month.

In consequence of such short notice being given, there was but a small muster for Inspection. As we did not reach the Cove until late in the afternoon, the Officer in command feared that I had met with detention and would not be there, therefore he deemed it advisable to dismiss those present, which was done but a short time before my arrival.

I am therefore under the necessity of reporting no inspection of this Company, as I had other orders to carry out the following day in a different locality.

MAJOR JAGO'S INSPECTION REPORT.

SAINT JOHN, 1st November, 1867.

SIR,—I have the honor to forward to you my Annual Report on the New Brunswick Regiment of Artillery.

This Regiment consists of about 500 effective members, of which about one-half

belong to the City of Saint John and its suburbs.

The Batteries at other points in the Province are—1 Battery at Saint Andrews, 1 at

Saint Stephen, 1 at Woodstock, and 1 at Chatham.

There is also a Battery belonging to the Second Battalion Charlotte County Militia, at Saint George, but it has no connection with the Regiment.

ARMAMENT.

The Batteries in Saint John and its vicinity, which are five in number, are armed with two 3-pounder guns each. These guns are, for all practical purposes, useless, and are only used for firing salutes.

The other Batteries are armed as follows: - Saint Andrews, Saint Stephen, and Saint George, have had a 6-pounder Battery of the old pattern divided between them in the

proportion of two guns each.

These guns have with them their regular amount of service ammunition.

The Battery at Woodstock has two 6-pounder guns, which I think are almost useless, and have no ammunition.

The Battery at Chatham has two 24-pounders, iron smooth bore guns, which are

mounted in position in that place.

The Batteries at Saint Andrews and Saint George have also two heavy guns each, with side-arms, &c., complete, mounted in position; Saint Andrews has two 32-pounders; Saint George two 24-pounders.

There are also two 32-pounders mounted on Fort Howe in Saint John, the side-arms of which are in charge of one of the Saint John Batteries, and which are used for drill

purposes.

Each Battery has a certain proportion of Enfield rifles served out to it; but I consider. as I have before expressed to you, that these rifles are merely used for the purpose of making "marksmen" of some members, and they would naturally be of no avail in actual service. I have myself always discouraged persistent drill in the use of the rifle, as I consider that the men are in general better employed in perfecting themselves in the service of ordnance.

I wish to bring before you again what I have previously urged, viz., the advantage of arming an Artilleryman with a Revolver. For an Artilleryman there is no weapon comparable to it. Neither the Rifle nor the Carbine can be attached to the man's person, and they must always be absent from him in danger. The Revolver is worn on the man's belt, and does not interfere in the least with the use of his arms. I may also state that its first cost is cheaper than any other breech-loading arm.

DRILL.

The Batteries in Saint John drill regularly during the summer months on the guns

mounted in Battery in this place, which, with the side-arms, &c., have been kindly placed at my disposal by the Officer Commanding Royal Artillery in this Province.

There are now in Saint John, and its suburbs fully 200 men, who are well qualified

to man the guns in position here.

At your inspection of the Saint John Batteries, each Battery had a Detachment present which was able to fire with ease 10 rounds in less than 25 minutes, at a floating

Target, at a distance of 1300 yards, with remarkable accuracy.

The winter drill in this City is carried on under great disadvantage, as you are aware, as few of the drill rooms at present hired by the different Batteries will support the weight of a heavy gun. To render the winter drill effective, a large Government Drill Room is much needed. The out-station Batteries appear to be well drilled in field gun drill, and to be very zealous in all their duties. Notwithstanding this, I beg to repeat what I have often expressed to you as my opinion, that in a country so thickly wooded as New Brunswick, Field Batteries (from the large supports they would always require with them) are more a source of weakness than strength, and that the greatest possible attention should be paid to the formation of a good body of Garrison Artillerymen at all important points on the coast.

MAJOR WILLIS' INSPECTION REPORT.

SIR,—I have the honor to report, for the information of His Excellency the Commander in Chief, that I inspected the Volunteers at Chatham, according to order, on the 25th day of September, 1867.

Captain Gillespie's Battery, N. B. A.

This Battery having been but lately formed, was not far advanced in drill. I was, however, very well pleased with the manner in which all, both officers and men, went through the Infantry drill, as far as they had been instructed. In gun drill they had not practised to any extent.

In the course of a short time, I feel sure this Battery will become very efficient, as

its officers are most zealous and attentive to drill.

Captain Snowball's Company—Infantry.

This Company I inspected immediately after the Battery, and found some few men absent owing to an unavoidable mistake as regarded the time of inspection, and some few from other causes. I found the arms and accountrements in good order. The day being fine, the men paraded in the Square, (as did also the Battery,) and were drilled in turn by Captain Snowball and his Lieutenant.

The Officers showed themselves to be very well grounded in their drill, and the men to be steady and efficient, although from several causes during the summer, on a few

occasions, the attendance at drill was small.

DRESS REGULATIONS.

FREDERICTON, 7th April, 1863.

The following Dress Regulations for the New Brunswick Regiment of Artillery and for the Engineers, are published by direction of His Excellency the Commander in Chief:

NEW BRUNSWICK REGIMENT OF ARTILLERY.

OFFICERS.

Distinction of Rank.

Colonel, crown and star. Lieut. Colonel, Crown. Major, star. Captain, crown and star.

Lieutenants, crown.

Collar laced all round with gold lace inside the gold cord. Chevron of flat gold lace, one inch and a half wide, with three rows of small gold braid outside of chevron, two rows figured and centre one plain, eleven inches deep.

Collar laced round the top with gold lace within the gold cord. Sleeve ornament, Austrian knot of round gold cord, traced in and out with small gold braid, eight inches deep and figured for Captains, seven inches deep and plain for Lieutenants.

The collar badge to be in silver embroidery.

Jacket.—Blue, single breasted, scarlet collar, trimmed according to rank. Gold Russia braid round the Jacket, with figure 8 at each back seam. Royal gold cord all round the collar. Sleeves trimmed according to rank; holes and buttons down front one inch and three quarters apart; two buttons on each sleeve; lining white. Field Officers to wear Tunics of Royal Artillery pattern.

BUTTONS—Gilt ball buttons with three guns and crown.

CAP—Royal Artillery pattern, dark blue cloth, with band of gold lace one inch and seven-tenths wide. A convex gold button and ornament of gold braid on the crown. One inch and three-tenths of cloth to show above the gold band.

TROWSERS-Dark blue cloth, with a scarlet stripe one inch and three quarters wide

down the outward seams. Booted with leather for mounted duties.

Pouch—Black patent leather, six inches and three-quarters long, two inches and three-quarters deep, and one inch and a half wide: outside leaf eight inches deep, six inches and seven-eighths wide at back, and seven inches and three quarters in front, rounded at the ends and wavy; gilt device, gun; buckle, ring, and stud, with leaf at each end.

POUCH BELT-White patent leather, two inches wide.

Sword-Royal Artillery Regulation, with steel scabbard. The sword knot to be a

gold line with an acorn.

SWORD BELT—White patent leather, one inch and seven-tenths wide, with slings and without swivels, to be worn under the jacket. Plate, gilt; device, the Royal Arms encircled with a wreath of the rose, shamrock, and thistle, surmounted by a crown.

STOCK—Black silk.

GLOVES—White leather.

SPURS—Yellow metal, crane neck, two inches long for Field Officers; Steel of same pattern for Adjutants and Field Batteries.

Staff Officers will wear the dress laid down for Regimental Officers of corresponding

rank.

NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND GUNNERS.

JACKET—The same as the undress jacket of the Royal Artillery. The badges of Non-Commissioned Officers will be the same as those upon the Tunic in the Royal Artillery.

TROWSERS—Same as Royal Artillery.

CAP—The same shape as that of Royal Artillery. Blue cloth, with red band one inch and three quarters wide. Red button on the crown. Chin strap, black patent leather, to be worn under the chin. Sergeants will wear a gold band, and cenvex gilt button on the crown.

WAIST AND POUCH BELTS—Buff, pipeclayed. Waist belt to be worn over the jacket. Plate, brass, with same device as previously described for the Officers. Sergeants will wear slings to the waist belt, and sword the same as for Royal Artillery.

Pouch—Black leather, same pattern as for Royal Artillery.

STOCK-Black leather.

The Artillery, being furnished with the Long Enfield Rifle and Infantry accourrements, will, when performing certain duties, be required to wear the latter instead of the Artillery accourrements above described.

It will be optional for Officers to provide themselves with blue undress coat, and with

dress trowsers and belts, according to the Royal Artillery pattern.

ENGINEERS.

OFFICERS.

COAT—Patrol Jacket, similar to that of the Infantry, with blue velvet facings, and edged with blue velvet. Collar edged with yellow silk cord. Sleeve ornament, Austrian knot of round-back yellow silk cord, traced in and out with small silk braid eight inches deep and figured for Captains, seven inches deep and plain for Lieutenants. No shoulder cord.

Buttons—Bronze. Device—a crown, encircled by a garter containing the words "New Brunswick Engineers."

CAP—Same as the Infantry.

TROWSERS—Same as the Artillery.

POUCH—Black patent leather, with Royal Arms in bronze on outside leaf. Box, five inches long, two inches and a half deep, and one inch and a half wide.

POUCH BELT-Russia leather, two inches and a half wide. Buckle, tip, and slide,

bronze and engraved.

SWORD AND SWORD KNOT-Regulation for Royal Engineers.

Sword Belt-Russia leather, one inch and a half wide, to be worn over the coat. Plate, the same as for Infantry.

GLOVES AND STOCK-Same as for Artillery.

NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND SAPPERS.

COAT—Similar to that described for Officers, but with blue cloth edgings round the coat, and no badges. Square yellow worsted cord on edge of collar. Sleeve ornament, knot of square yellow worsted cord, seven inches deep. Shoulder strap, scarlet cloth, with blue cloth edging. Chevrons, yellow silk braid on blue velvet ground, to be worn on both arms.

TROWSERS—Same as Artillery.

CAP—Same as officers. Badge, a bronze grenade.

INFANTRY.

FREDERICTON, 24th February, 1863.

The following Dress Regulations for the Infantry of the New Brunswick Militia, are published by direction of His Excellency the Commander in Chief.

OFFICERS.

COAT—Patrol Jacket, searlet, single breasted, eight buttons in front at equal distances from neck to waist. Collar and cuffs of the Battalion facing—the collar turn over and fastened with hook and eye at neck; the cuffs pointed and five inches in height. The

skirt nine inches deep below the sword belt, and with slits at the side according to the pattern. The coat, collar, and cuffs, edged with white cloth a quarter of an inch wide, and the skirts lined with white. On the left shoulder a crimson silk cord with a button to retain the sash. An outside pocket on the left breast.

The Field Officers to wear the usual badges in *gold* at each end of the collar; and a Colonel and Lieut. Colonel to be distinguished by a *gold* crown, a major by a *gold* star, at the point of each cuff. The other Officers to wear badges in silver upon the collar only.

BUTTONS-Bronze, according to the sealed pattern, that upon the shoulder being

small.

CAP—Black cap without peak, and made according to the approved pattern, which admits of being turned down over the ears as a protection in winter. Red cloth binding, two thirds of an inch deep, and red piping round the crown. The badge in front to be a gold crown for Field Officers, and a silver one for other Officers.

TROWSERS—Dark cloth or homespun, of one uniform colour and material for each

Battalion, with a scarlet welt, quarter inch broad, down the outward seam.

Sash—Regulation crimson silk, the ends of the fringe not to hang below the skirt.— To be worn diagonally over the left shoulder.

Sworp-Infantry Regulation, with steel scabbard; brass scabbard for Field Officers.

The sword knot to be a crimson and gold strap, with acorn head.

SWORD BELT—Regulation, of enamelled white leather, to be worn over the coat.

The clasp to be of bronze according to approved pattern. Both it and the buttons may be procured on application to the Superintendent of Stores, Fredericton.

GLOVES-White leather.

Spurs—Yellow metal, crane neck, two inches long for Field Officers. Steel of same pattern for Adjutants.

Regimental Staff Officers, excepting the Adjutant, will be distinguished by black leather sword belts, and will not wear the sash.

SERGEANTS AND RANK AND FILE.

COAT—Similar to that of the Officers, but without badges and with no white edging upon any part. The edges of the coat and facings will be finished by an inner seam. The shoulder straps (and chevrons for non-commissioned Officers to be similar to those in Her Majesty's Infantry. The Battalion is to be marked by the colour of the facing, the County by a number on the straps.

TROWSERS AND CAP-Similar to those of the Officers, excepting that upon the cap

the badge will be a bronze bugle.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief desires that, from the present date, Officers commanding Battalions and Companies, will not procure any new uniforms, excepting of the above described pattern. In cases, however, where special application may be made, and where it may appear desirable, His Excellency will permit one Company in each Battalion to retain a distinctive uniform.

Should Officers desire cloth of a finer texture for their own uniform, they will adhere

strictly to the above regulations in having it made up.

It will be optional for Officers to provide themselves with an undress uniform. In those cases, the forage cap and blue frock coat, as worn in Her Majesty's Infantry, will be adopted: the buttons, bronze, of the sealed pattern: and the badge for cap, the same as that already described.

REGULATIONS FOR THE DRILL INSTRUCTORS.

FREDERICTON, 13th January, 1863.

I.—To take charge of the Rifles and Accoutrements of the Company or Companies to which they are attached, under the direction of the Officer or Officers commanding those

Companies; to instruct each Member of the Corps minutely how to clean his Rifle and Accountrements, and how to keep them in order; to see that the Rifles always are clean; instantly to report to Head Quarters any damage to or neglect of the Arms, &c., and to send through the Commanding Officer a monthly certificate as to their condition.

II.—To be at the disposition of the Officer or Officers commanding Companies to which they are attached, and of other Officers of the Militia who may wish to acquire a knowledge of Drill, at all reasonable hours, for purpose of instruction: minutely to adhere to the latest edition of the Field Exercise, and on all possible occasions to give Position and Aiming Drill for a few minutes. For this latter purpose small bull's eyes should be painted on the walls of the drill room.

III.—Invariably to dress in a suitable and soldier-like manner. Should it be difficult to adhere to regular uniform during the Winter months, the forage cap at any rate is to be worn, with such addition of covering for the ears, &c., as may be necessary, but on no

account are the Drill Instructors to appear in ordinary civilian's attire.

IV.—At all times to treat Officers with proper respect.

EXTRACTS FROM MILITIA GENERAL ORDERS.

FREDERICTON, 21st October, 1862.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief desires to remind Officers raising Volunteer Companies, that when a Muster Roll is forwarded to the Office of the Adjutant General for approval, it must contain the signatures of three Officers and at least fifty men, with ages annexed.

A Copy of By-Laws should also be enclosed, for which a general guide was published in the Militia Orders of the 4th February, 1862.

1863.

No. 17.

Two Forms of Target Practice Returns will be forwarded to Officers Commanding Volunteer Corps, one of which may be retained by them, the other to be filled in and transmitted to the Adjutant General's Office, on or before the 30th November in each year.

In order to ensure uniformity in the practice, His Excellency desires that of the sixty rounds issued gratuitously for each Volunteer, fifteen may be fired four times over at the three ranges of 200, 300, and 400 yards, the targets and position being strictly according to the Hythe Regulations.

Never less than five rounds should be fired at one practice; otherwise the Return can-

not be properly kept.

Although each Volunteer may not fire more than sixty rounds of the ammunition issued gratuitously, His Excellency considers it by no means necessary or desirable that every man should be required to fire that quantity. Every Commanding Officer should insist upon the members of his Company performing the amount of preliminary position and aiming Drill prescribed in the Musketry Regulations, before they are permitted to fire.

Should this course not be rigidly pursued, a mere waste of ammunition will, in the

majority of cases, be the result.

His Excellency directs that in each year the annual course of Musketry shall not commence before the first of May.

1864.

No. 19.

Ammunition will be issued from the Magazine on the first Thursday in each month; Officers commanding Volunteer Corps requiring the same, are requested to make application to the Adjutant General's Office on or before the first Monday in each month.

No. 30.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief having observed that recommendations for promotions and new Commissions are irregularly made, and also that some doubt exists as to the precedence of Officers, has been pleased to publish the following Rules, based on Her Majesty's Regulations, and desires that they may be strictly adhered to:—

1st. All recommendations for promotions or appointments are to be forwarded through the Commanding Officers of Battalions to the Adjutant General of Militia, with the

regulated fee enclosed.

Should the appointment not be approved of, the fee will, of course, be returned.

2nd. As in the Regular Service, all Commissions will, in ordinary cases, be dated the day they are Gazetted, but when two or more Officers are in the same Gazette, of the same rank, and belong to the same corps, an interval of one day will take place between their Commissions.

3rd. When Corps serve together, the Senior Officer commands the whole. Where Commissions are of the same date, and the Officers belong to different Corps, reference will be made to former Commissions, and in case the former Commissions should also be of the same date, or in the case of Ensigns, where there are none, precedence will be taken according to the seniority of the Corps, as laid down in General Order 15th April, 1863.

4th. Officers who are transferred from one Corps to another, go as the junior of their

rank Regimentally, but retain their seniority in the Militia Force.

No. 32.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to direct that all requisitions made by Militia Officers to the Adjutant General's Office, be sent through the Adjutant of the Battalion to which they belong.

It is impossible for the Adjutant General of Militia to open an account with individuals, and after this date all articles supplied to the Battallion will be debitted to the Ad-

jutant.

This Order does not apply to Officers commanding Volunteer Corps.

No. 33.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief directs that no Drill Instructor be employed except those paid by the Province, without special permission from the Adjutant General; and His Fxcellency wishes it to be understood that the act of drilling a body of men without authority, is punishable by law.

No. 39.

His Excellency has been pleased to remind Officers commanding Battalions of Militia, that the Adjutant General cannot issue the Adjutant's allowance, without a Certificate from them that the Adjutant has done his duty properly.

This Certificate ought to be attached to the Muster Roll, and thereby much delay and

correspondence might be avoided.

Articles supplied to Officers of Militia will be charged to their respective Adjutants, who will recover the amount from individual Officers.

No. 46.

When the Captain of a Volunteer Company retires from the command of it, whether by promotion or resignation, he must give a certificate to his successor stating that no

Debts are due to the Crown by the Company, and that the Arms, Accourrements, &c., are complete and in good order; he will also furnish him with a list of the articles in charge, including Ammunition.

The new Captain will give a receipt for the articles received, and state that he ac-

cepts the whole of the responsibility of the Company.

Duplicates of these receipts will be sent to the Adjutant General's Office.

1865.

No. 15.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to direct, where an Officer is permitted to retire, either with his rank or superior grade, the rank is to be considered honorary merely, and only authorizes the Officer to retain the title and wear the uniform of the rank specified. No Commission is issued for Honorary Rank, but all Officers who may have retained it, may have their names retained in the Militia List, on sending their names, with date of rank and retirement, to the Adjutant General's Office.

No. 25.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to direct, that whenever a Commanding Officer sends in a resignation for acceptance, it must be accompanied by the written application of the Officer wishing to resign.

1866.

No. 72.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to direct that all Correspondents from Officers commanding Battalions and Corps to the Adjutant General, for His Excellency's consideration, should be written on Foolscap paper, in half margin, on the right hand side of the first page and left of the second, and so on, with a view to the Correspondence being pasted into Guard Books.

1867.

No. 1.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief regrets to find, on examining the half-yearly returns of Volunteer Companies, that a large proportion of the enrolled members have failed to attend the prescribed number of Drills to qualify them to become effective. No doubt in many instances good reasons may be given for this apparent neglect, and His Excellency directs that Officers commanding Corps will be pleased to call upon those members, who have been or may be hereafter absent for a longer period than one month, to explain the cause of their absence, and forward to the Adjutant General's Office the names of those who are unable to account satisfactorily for such absence, with a view to their names being struck off the Roll of their Corps, as His Excellency is unwilling that any but those who are bona fide effective members shall derive the benfits that accrue to a qualified Volunteer, such as exemption from rates and taxes, &c.

No. 2.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to direct that the following Certificate—in the hand writing of gentlemen recommended for appointments and promotion, non-combattant Officers excepted,—be transmitted to the Adjutant General of Militia by Officers commanding Corps, with their recommendations.

CERTIFICATE.

SIR,—I do hereby certify that I am between the ages of 18 and 45, and that I am free from any physical infirmity. I also certify that I am willing to avail myself of every means afforded me to become acquainted with drill and other military duties, and I will provide myself with the Regulation uniform.

To the Officer Commanding ______(Signed,)

No. 3.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief has been pleased to direct that recommendations for the appointment of Surgeons or Assistant Surgeons shall be accompanied by diplomas or other documents shewing that the gentlemen recommended have received the necessary Medical education.

No. 9.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief having observed that Correspondence with the Adjutant General's Department is carried on in some instances in an irregular manner, has been pleased to direct that all communications be forwarded through Officers commanding Corps, to the Adjutant General of Militia, except in cases of Officers commanding Volunteer Companies which belong to Battalions of Militia, who may communicate direct to the Adjutant General on subjects connected with the interior arrangement of their Companies, all other Correspondence to be transmitted by the Officers commanding their Battalions.

No. 10.

1. Officers who desire to leave their Company or Battalion Districts for any period exceeding one month, must apply for leave of absence to the Officers commanding their Corps.

2. Officers who are about to leave the Province, to reside elsewhere, will be pleased previous to their departure, to forward the resignation of their Commissions to the Officer commanding their Battalion, for transmission to the Adjutant General; failing to do 80,

their Commissions are liable to be cancelled.—Vide Queen's Regulations.

3. Officers desirous to change their place of residence to another District, will be pleased to apply for a transfer, through the Officer commanding their Battalion, to the Officer commanding the Corps in the District in which they intend to reside.

His Excellency the Commander in Chief directs that the following list of articles be published, which may be obtained on application to the Adjutant General's Office, with such a sum enclosed as will cover the price of the articles applied for:—

RULES TO BE ADOPTED BY VOLUNTEER CORPS.

The following Rules for the internal regulation of Volunteer Companies of Militia, are published as some general guide to those engaged in framing such Rules—uniformity of Regulations being manifestly required to ensure the efficiency of the Force. It is not, hewever, intended that they should be invariably adopted in all their details by every

Volunteer Company, where circumstances may appear to render their modification or relaxation desirable:-

1. The Company having been raised in connexion with the ——— Battalion of Militia, the Members are consequently subject to the provisions of the Militia Act, and to all Regulations consistent therewith, which have been or shall be issued under the authority of the Commander in Chief.

2. The Company shall consist of two classes—(1) Enrolled Members, consisting of Effectives and Non-Effectives, and (2) of Honorary Members; the latter contributing to

the funds of the Company, but not being enrolled for service.

3. All subscriptions shall fall due on the ———— yearly, except as after mentioned, and shall be paid to the Treasurer within ----- from that date.

4. The annual subscriptions of Members of the Company shall be for Effectives and

Non-Effectives, \$---, and for Honorary Members, \$---.

- 5. In the event of the retirement or death of any of the Officers now appointed, it is the duty of the Officer in command to propose to the Officer commanding the Battalion, for transmission to the Commander in Chief, the names of Gentlemen for the vacant Commissions. In the discharge of this duty the responsibility of the recommendation rests with himself, in the same manner that the responsibility of forwarding it does with the Officer commanding the Battalion, should be transmit it to the Commander in Chief.
 - 6. The Non-commissioned Officers shall be appointed by the Officer in command. 7. Each Member must be provided with the uniform of the Provincial Militia.
- 8. Each Member shall be responsible for the due preservation of all articles issued to him which are the property of the Government of the Province, or of the Company, fair wear and tear only excepted.

9. The Commanding Officer shall fix the time and place for Parades, Drills and Rifle Practice, under such penalties for non-attendance as may from time to time be fixed by

the Company.

10. The Senior Officer in command shall have power, subject to the approval of the Commanding Officer, to inflict such fines for irregular conduct on parade, and in the ranks, and for want of punctuality in attendance at the hour fixed for parade, as shall seem proper, but the fine for each offence shall not exceed \$---

11. The following fines shall also be imposed by the Senior Officer in command:—

For loading contrary to orders; for having the Rifle at full cock except when ordered, or shooting out of turp...... \$--

For discharging the Rifle accidentally...... \$--

For pointing the same loaded or unloaded at any person without

The fines for the last two shall be double that of the first.

12. All fines imposed on Members of the Company shall be entered in a Book kept

for that purpose.

13. All fines shall become due on the first day of every month succeeding that in which they have been incurred, and shall be collected by one of the Company Sergeants,

and paid by him to the Treasurer.

14. The property of the Company is placed under the care of the Commanding Officer; but a Committee to transact the general business of the Company, and to aid the Commanding Officer in the management and disposal of the funds of the Company, may be appointed yearly, at an Annual General Meeting of the Members, to be held [the time to be stated]. This Committee shall consist of Commissioned Officers, the Secretary and Treasurer, and [number to be stated] Members of the Company.

15. A Secretary and Treasurer shall be appointed yearly at the Annual General Meeting of the Company above mentioned, who shall be ex-officio a member of the Committee.

16. An Abstract of the Treasurer's Accounts for the preceding year shall be annually prepared for the information of every Member of the Company, and after being audited by the Committee, shall be submitted to the Annual General Meeting to be held as above mentioned.

17. The Secretary shall call a General Meeting of the Members of the Company, on the requisition of any five Members, but no question affecting the discipline of the Company is to be brought under the consideration of such General Meetings. Notice of all General Meetings, stating the object thereof, shall be given at least two days before the Meeting takes place.

18. Honorary Members shall not interfere in any way with the Military duties of the Company, neither shall it be obligatory on them to provide themselves with uniform.

19. Every Officer and Non-Commissioned Officer is recommended to provide himself

with the latest Edition of the Field Exercise and Evolutions of Infantry.

20. The Committee shall have power from time to time to enact such Bye Laws as may seem necessary for the government and management of the Company's affairs, and may impose fines for the breach of such Bye Laws; but no such Bye Laws shall be of any force or validity until sanctioned and approved by the Commander in Chief.

21. The Commanding Officer has a veto on the admission of any Member of the

Company.

22. All Members on joining to express their consent to the Rules.

RULES FOR HOME GUARDS.

I.—To the Members of the "Reserve" Guard, directions as to their conduct, should an alarm be raised, will be given, and the stations to which they will in that event repair, will be pointed out to them, but no service will, under other circumstances, be required

of them.

II.—Any person desirous of becoming a Member of the Guard shall signify the same to the Officer in command, and on receiving his approval, shall subscribe his name to these Rules.

III.—The Members of the Active Guard shall assemble at such time and place as the Officer in command may direct, for the purpose of drilling, at least once in each week.

IV.—The Officer commanding the Guard shall keep a correct list of the Members present and absent at each Drill, and make a return of the same to the Officer commanding the Battalion.

V.—Any Member of the Active Guard who shall, without leave from his Commanding Officer, absent himself from any Drill or Parade for four days in succession, unless such absence be caused by sickness or absence from his place of residence, shall be compelled to return to the Officer commanding, all arms, accountrements, &c., the property of Her Majesty, that may have been entrusted to him.

VI.—Each Member of the Guard shall be personally responsible for any property of the Government that may be entrusted to him, which property shall be presented by him

for inspection once in each month.

VII.—Any Member of the Guard receiving clothing, arms, or accourtements, the property of the Government, will be held responsible for any damage the same may suffer, if caused by neglect while in his hands; and any Member attending drill or parade with his arms or accourtements in a dirty state, or out of repair, shall be subject to be reprimanded, or to expulsion, at the discretion of the Commanding Officer.
