

has, along the whole length, square towers at a distance from each other of about two bowshots' length, so that the enemy might be struck from either of them. It runs down into the sea by two parallel jetties, the incline of which is so slight that persons landing from a boat may easily walk up them. The largest vessels may approach to within two miles of this spot, which is the place where future tourists ought to land .---Unfortunately we were not then aware of this fact. and we came to an anchor at a spot where the landing was not very easy. 




