It was its be-lief that the best interests of the Association depended upon its preserving inact its unsectation de-pended upon its preserving inact its unsectation character, and this belief the section of the suc-ceeding period have effectually confirmed. At the time of the re-organization of the Board, the position of the Association, as will be seen on reference to the annexed report of Mr. W. H. De-

A stremous effort was therefore resolved on. The city was canvassed for new subscribers, and a large proportion of the arrears due the Association collected. Still, much more was necessary. An appeal was made to the public for assistance,—an appeal which was at once and most generously espended to. To those who, in the hour of gloom and trouble, ai led us, the warmest gratitude is due.

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
