Fund of \$500,000 Being Raised for Their Benefit

Richard H. Rees, delegate of the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals of Great Britain, who is originating a campaign on this side to raise \$500,000 for the relief of the sick and wounded horses in the British army, has been invited by Right Rev. Jas. F. Sweeney, lord bishop of Toronto, to address the annual meeting of the Toronto Humane Society some time in January. A similar invitation has come from J. R. Innes of the Montreal society, accompanied by a contribution of \$50 raised by an enter-tainment given by Montreal tele-phone girls. Mr. Rees has accepted both invitations, and is planning to visit other Canadian cities as well, to enlist support for the work, which includes the erection, just ommenced, of a veterinary hospital cost \$60,000, for the animals of the Canadian army.

Saving the Stock.
With the Duke of Portland as chairman and the king and queen and many British notables as patrons the Royal society has saved literally tens of thousands of sick and wounded cavalry mounts, artillery horses and transport mules, which otherwise would have been lost. It is the only volunutary organization that is permitted by the British war office to co-operate with the army veterinary corps at the front. Queen Alexandra and King George, and Queen Mary were among the first subscribers to the fund, which is expended under the supervision of the war office, for the erection at the front of veterinary hospitals with

"wards" and "beds" for the treat-ment of thousands of horses. For the first time in warfare animals virtually receive the same care as that given to sick and wounded men. Motor and horse-drawn ambulances are used in the conveyance of wounded animals, operations are performed under anaesthetics, and the latest and most scientific methods of treatment and nursing are employed. Every effort is made to prevent needless suffering, there having been numerous cases in which humane workers, as well as troopers, have been "potted" be-cause they exposed themselves under fire to end the misery of animals that had been injured. The work of the R. S. P. C. A. at the front has been repeatedly praised in the despatches of commanding officers.
