ST. JOHN LETTER

Captain Matthew Bradley of the schooner Sunbeam, aged 70 years, dropped dead on his vessel in Boston harbor last Wednesday, from heart failure. His family live in the North End of this city.

His body was not discovered until the following day. He was 36 years old and unmarried. He was a sufferer from insomnia and is supposed to have been temporarily insane.

The grocery store of Thomas Powers, at the North End, was entered by burglars last Tuesday night and robbed of goods valued at about \$50.

Two marriages, seven deaths and twenty births were recorded in the city last week.

A prisoner in the Britain street lock up narrowly escaped suffocation from gas escaping from the flue last Wednesday night.

Mrs. Charles Bragdon, at the risk of her life, last Wednesday saved a three year old child from drowning in Long wharf slip.

The cargoes of three steamships that sailed from here a few days ago were valued at about \$300,000.

Five carloads of sheep from the United States are due here today for trans shipment to England.

Some advertisers are using the Inland Revenue Department's recent official report upon baking powders to show the comparative strength and qualities of these articles as they are sold in the Dominion. It is not fair, however, either to the Analysts or to the public in making this use of the official figures that they should be done in some instances.

The following figures are copied from the official report printed by the Canadian Government and show correctly, as per that document, the relative strength value of the baking powders named. The analyses in all cases were made by the Government Analysts:—

Table with 2 columns: Baking powder name and Percentage of available leaving gas. Includes Royal (average of three highest tests) 13.4, Cleveland's (average of two highest tests) 13, Dearborn's (average of three highest tests) 11.7, Imperial (average of two highest tests) 9.9, Magic (contains alum) (average of three highest tests) 7.7.

These tests should set the baking powder question at rest.—Montreal Pharmaceutical Journal.
