The Democratic convention at Baltimore came to a decision on Tuesday when on the forty-sixth ballot Governor Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey, was nominated for president.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section adjacent to his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead of pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to sura homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption right may purchase homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

Increasing Sobriety in British Army.

The changes that a century has wrought in respect to the use of strong liquor were illustrated during the recent meeting in London of the Royal Army Temperance Association, which now has 67,433 members, of whom 38,495 are in the Indian Army. According to the figures presented there are now 88,380 total abstainers in the British Army and 2,795 in the temperance section. Earl Roberts said a great change had come over the majority of the army in India since the days when it was the custom to provide every soldier with a 'tot of arrack' every morning. Earl Curzon recalled that in 1812, when the Peninsular War was in progress, the Duke of Wellington's force was 'drinking if not a drunken army. The idea then was that the hard drinking man was the best fighting man and there was a direct ratio between whiskey consumed and courage displayed. The Duke himself while extolling the bravery of his men deplor- ed their drunkenness and social vices. Nowadays all recognize that the old idea was a ludicrous fallacy. Every general who has commanded troops in the last quarter of a century would say that the best marching army and the best fighting army was a sober army.

REGISTRATION CARD TO PREVENT LOAFING

With the object of preventing or at least checking the spread of idleness and loafing a plan has been suggested by Rev. Father Minahan of Toronto, to have a registration system.
