MRS. MARIETTA MITCHELL







The attention of the public is respectfully called to an Act to amend Chapter 77 of the Revised Statutes • 1923 of "The Load of Vehicles Act", passed the 9th day of April, 1924, A.D.

Be it enacted by the Governor, Council and Assembly, as follows:

TEN THOUSAND HOMELESS IN TOKIO

Two Thousnad Houses Were Destroyed in the Great Conflagration

TOKIO, March 19.—Ten thousand persons were homeless, three hundred injured, twenty missing and 2,000 houses were destroyed in the conflagration that swept over North Eastern Tokio last night, a police check of the situation revealed. A barracks is being constructed to house the homeless and a subscription list headed by the Emperor, is providing immediate relief funds.

Starting in a factory at Nappori Junction, the blaze burned its way like wildfire in a southwesterly direction consuming wooden homes like so much timber. The conflagration was aided by a fierce gale that made fire fighting difficult.

Scenes incident to the major earthquake and fire at Tokio in 1924 were being repeated today when construction of a large barracks to house victims of the fire was begun.

The burned area was made up of small homes, small factories, schools and temples. Victims rendered homeless were generally poor.
