THE CRISIS OF FREEDOM IN THE OLD WORLD AND THE NEW.

[CONTINUED FROM OUR LAST.]

We have now presented the worst of the case in Europe, but it is not the whole of the case. In general, there are no just relations yet established between man and man. There is no just regard to man as man. And there is no fair representation of rights and interests and wants in the present systems of government. While sweeping entails absorb and drink up the substance of some countries. Heavy taxes to support expensive courts and royal families and sinecure places and standing armies, drain the life out of others. Men are environed by unjust limitation and restriction on every side. Their faculties want freedom. They have no fair chance to work out their own wills.

But now, having gone thus far, having presented, according to our honest conviction, the great crisis that has come in the world, and the great and just demand for relief, looking, indeed, upon the present moment in Europe, the instruction of humanity itself against wrong,—we go on to say that we are advocates for gradual rather than sudden relief, for moral reform rather than violence and bloodshed. In short, we prefer the English method to the French method, English reform to French revolutions.

The great question is, How are long established abuses to be remedied? How are governments founded on injustice and entrenched in wrong to be modified? There are those who say, "Only by immediate and utter overthrow." There are those who say, "Let us not be soft-hearted in this matter; let us not believe that we have a solution, let us have blood. Good will come out of it." Now, for our part, we do not agree with them. There is a reasoning about this matter,—stout-hearted or reckless, we hardly know which to call it,—which seems to have been learned from the horrible atrocities of their own Revolution of 1793 as if they were blessed agencies for good, and appear to regard those days of frenzy and blood as if they deserved to be canonized and made saints' days in the calendar of the world's history. We protest, with the amiable and venerable Chateaubriand, against such reasonings, and say with him, "No; no; think of the fast lakes! think of the guillotine! think of that sea of blood and murders and mangled victims! think of the thousands of heads which are being cut off! think of the millions of men, of women, of children, of the old and the young, of the rich and the poor, of the noble and the ignominious, of the virtuous and the vicious, of the good and the bad, of the honest and the dishonest, of the brave and the cowardly, of the pure and the impure, of the innocent and the guilty, of the just and the unjust, of the true and the false, of the wise and the foolish, of the strong and the weak, of the free and the slave, of the rich and the poor, of the noble and the ignominious, of the virtuous and the vicious, of the good and the bad, of the honest and the dishonest, of the brave and the cowardly, of the pure and the impure, of the innocent and the guilty, of the just and the 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the brave and the cowardly, of the pure and the impure, of

THE NEW ELECTION LAW.

It is a fact that mankind are at times as much assisted in their progress of improvement by the errors and misadventures of their predecessors, as they are by their actual attainments in knowledge.

Now both parties are astray, and act equally in ignorance of, and in opposition to the laws of their nature. With reference to the first—if the Creator had intended man as an exclusively religious being, he would have given him no other feelings, faculties, or propensities than Hope, Wonder, and Veneration;—but he has endowed him with powers of perception, which bring him into more immediate intimacy with the wonders and beauties of external creation, and expand his mind by the accumulation of actual knowledge.

There is a very numerous, and, we presume, a very respectable class of men in Canada, who are eligible to serve as Jurors in their respective counties. Their intelligence and integrity are recognized in the fact that Jurors are supposed to be capable of comprehending the reasoning and special pleadings, and technicalities, and cross-questionings, and legal quibblings of the "Learned Council,"—and in the supposition that they are beyond the reach of bribery. We shall, at least, take them in a fair average specimen of human beings; and certainly nobody will affirm that a man who is properly qualified to discharge the deeply important duties of a Juror, and to sit in judgment on the life of his fellow-man, is incompetent to vote for a member of Parliament.

Our object in proposing the petty Jurors of Canada, as the basis of the Elective Franchise, is not merely to obtain an extension of the suffrage. However desirable such an extension may be, there are other considerations which should go far in recommending our suggestion to the attention of the Legislature. The first of these is the prevention of spurious deeds and the facility with which the names of all the electors in the county could be obtained. By referring to the Assessment Roll, the Clerk of the Peace can at once tell who is liable to serve as a petty juror, and were such men eligible to vote for a member of Parliament; the law for regulating elections would be short and simple, and much of the labor, and the difficulty, and the corruption, and the wrangling about causes, and qualifications attend on a general election, would be avoided. We hope to live long enough to see a new Election Law thus simplified.

EDUCATION.

We would suppose that the first thing which would present itself to the human being when he commences the study and cultivation of either himself or other individuals of his own species, would be the fact that the Creator has given him both a physical and a mental constitution, and in consequence of the inseparable connection between them, we would suppose the second fact to be that each of these constitutions required nourishment and cultivation of that description best adapted to its own nature, and least calculated to injure the health or destroy the nature of the other.

It is probable that human nature, even in her wilder form, can be trained and modified and regulated in her action by judicious treatment and cultivation, but it is questionable if either the intention of the Creator, or the well-being of the creature can be promoted by forcible attempt to crush or annihilate even our worst passions or appetites.

The Municipal Council met on Tuesday, but owing to our absence from Town during the first three days of the week, we have been unable to attend the Council Room, further than merely to take a glance at the by-laws of our District Legislature, and to obtain a cordial shake of the hand of friendship.

We see from some of the Montreal papers that the District of Peel is likely to become a reality. We will talk about it next week.

We have also to express, not our gratitude, for that is a kind of beggarly word, but our love to Peter Robertson, Esq., of Belleville, who has done us a great service, by sending us a copy of his "Ayrshire Loner," which would not be true but for his letter; it breathes the pure spirit of Ayrshire loyalty, and familiarity of real friendship; and while we read it, the "Light of other days" came o'er us, and we even thought of the tale of "Raimond Monk's Well." We never like to "live in debt," even though we should be in poverty, and hence Mr. R. must expect to be visited with a "horrid" infliction of nonsense at no very remote period.
