## Interesting Correspondence from

Mr. Robert Ford, barber, of King's Road, had some interesting corres-pondence from his father, mother and brother, Wm. R. Ford, who are down in Baffin Land at work with the Hudon Bay Company, by the S. S. Sol-

way. The first letter is written by his brother and is dated Wolstenholme, September 4th past. In this letter William says that he had arrived aftr a tedious passage though they had fine time after leaving Rigolette. e says his Uncle George is there, and that on the way down they picked him up at Cape Chidley, towing his motor boat to Wolstenholme. He afterwards went through Baffin's Land coasting in her and looking for 'Huskies' to go to work for the company. They did not meet with any as l were gone into the interior deer unting and others were on board whalers working in that section. Later, Mr. Ford was to go up country to establish a post for the company. Mrs. Ford, Robert's mother, writes

in interesting letter, dated Lake Har-or, on board the S. S. Pelican, Sepember 20th. In this missive she says houses for us, and it is by no mea an inviting spot, nothing but rocks and barren hills; the only nice piece of ground being the locality where the houses are. There are two missionaries living here and a Scotchman, a miner, besides Will (her husband) and myself with a boy (evidently a French-Canadian) named Pallisier. Mrs. Ford takes comfort from fact that therefore she and her hus-band are not quite alone and will have the society of at least some kindred folk during the long months of the Arctic winter. She says also that they have been on the move ever sinc they left Rigolette, except for three weeks while they were at Wolstenholme. Her father, she says, will be in charge of Wolstenholme Station for the year. Mr. Parsons, who was in charge, was compelled to go home during the summer, and as there was o person to relieve him her father remained there. Mr. Parsons will go back next year. While they were staying at Wolstenholme the natives killed 7 polar bears quite near the station. She says that there are about 200 Eskimos there and lots more over on the Island (name not given), with more residing around on the Many of the men and women natives came on board the Pelican to see Mrs. Ford. They had never seen a white woman before and she was an object of great curiosity to her dusky sisters and brothers of this portion of the Arctic circle. Her baby came in for special attention from the Eskimo women and they wondered if it could sleep, eat and cry as lustily as

thir little podgy papooses; as to the later the white baby was not long in giving them an illustration of its lung power, and when they saw the chubby little white kid eat under the influence of a healthy appetite intensified by the bracing northern climate which its immature personality und itself, they were delighted, hough the little one balked at the strange and hardly savoury dishes of seal meat, etc., which the kindly natives set before it. Mrs. Ford speaks the Eskimo language fairly well and this immediately endeared her to the native womenfolk. They said that the missionaries and some of the visiting whalers had given them books with pictures of white women and babies them, but they could not bring in reality and thought that their The Tenderfoot Farmer



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

#### The Ecumenical Conference of Methodism.

JOTTINGS BY THE WAY.

It was an unspeakably happy privilege that the writer enjoyed in attending the World Wide Conference of Methodism at Toronto, Canada, held October 3-17. Such a gathering of Bishops, Presidents, Editors, Scholars, Pastors, Preachers, Evangelists and Missionaries from all over the world can only occur once or twice in a generation. The object of the Congress was not legislative but purely for purposes of Conference and prayer and counsel. Great men were there and great deliverances on great Methodist problems. To summarize the results of this

great Conference we note the fol-

ive men of Methodism from the ends 2. It afforded an opportunity of re-

viewing the whole area of Methodisn -its doctrines, its missions, it; activities, its growth. We have nov world, a gain of four millions in 10 years.

3. It placed emphasis upon the showing no disposition to dispense with any of its old-time God-honoured truths and doctrines. 4. It had a federating effect upon

all Methodism. It ties thirty mil lions of people in all parts of the globe to united endeavour for purer govern ment, cleaner and more godly life an activity and consecration. Here after there shall be known through out the world A Methodist Federation which under God shall be a power in the yearly subscription breaking the shackles of iniquity, enorcing law and righteousness and spreading Scriptural Holiness througut these lands. Among the many live wires touched in the great discussions at this International Conference of

Methodism were the Sabbath and Temperance Reforms. Toronto it self is almost a model in these matters. It is a city of 400,000 with only some 150 saloons. Its Sabbaths are as nearly as ideal as possible. No steamers run, no newspapers ar hawked and up to some twenty years ago no street cars were allowed to run. Upon the Sabbath question strong Resolution was passed "urging upon all our people so to order the curse of their lives and so use all their influence that God's Holy Day may be preserved for his proper worship and service, and we appea to the Governments of the Christian States to maintain the sanctity and

authority of the Lord's Day which i o essential to the peace and prosperity of the nation." Ex-Governo Hanly in a strong speech on Temper ance Reform made a call for consecra tion. "I want," said he, "world wide Methodism to become a world wid militant power for the suppression of this traffic. If I could I'd stir the heart of Metholism on this grea question so that every layman woul go back a flaming thorn for the
