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
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(To be continued.) CHAPTER XXV.

If we fall in the smaller social responsibilities which our particular station in life puts upon us, we thereby show our calibre. We have no right to assume that we would be any more just or generous in a position of larger responsibility.

There are many little ways in which the least powerful of us can do our share toward improving social and industrial conditions. We can refrain from making those quasi-public servants whom we indirectly employ work overtime, or at unnatural speed, for our idle convenience; we can show our appreciation of social justice by patronizing the shop or factory which treats its workers well.

We can taboo the establishment where conditions are notoriously bad.

It is always a temptation to fancy that we humble folks have no responsibilities in this direction, but it is the greatest mistake in the world. Of course, we cannot do other people as much harm by our selfishness as the man of wealth and power, but we can do ourselves just as much harm, and we certainly abdicate any right to criticize those whose selfishness differs in its consequences, but not in its character, from our own.

Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram.

LIVERPOOL, Oct. 16. No sign of the bulk of the Volturno was seen by the crew of the "Fossil" as she crossed. She reached here this morning. The captain reported that he had made a circuit round the spot but sighted no wreckage. The Volturno was still afloat on Sunday afternoon, the Campania being in her vicinity at 2:15 p.m. that day. The wreck was then sighted southeast, making a knot an hour. Her hull appeared in good condition and liable to float indefinitely. The search was made for the missing boats, continued by La Lorraine six hours later, but it was unsuccessful.

NEW YORK, Oct. 16. The Red Star liner Kroonland is steaming slowly to this port to-day, delayed by an accident to her shaft. She was expected to reach dock at nightfall and to send ashore Capt. Inch of the lost steamer. Wireless advices from the approaching rescue ship report among the Volturno's passengers aboard several women separated from their families and three little children whose identity is unknown, one a five-year-old boy who speaks German, and the others two girls of 3 or 4, either Russian or Poles. The Kroonland passengers raised \$14 for both rescued and rescuers. A wireless from C. W. McClure, a Kroonland passenger reports a tragic incident, which viewed from the Kroonland's deck appeared to be the carrying out of a tied couple. The man and woman were seen to take each other's hand and jump together into the ocean. The rescuer says they were from France. There were 80 or 90 passengers trapped in compartment No. 1, who must have perished at once. This news is brought by the Governor Kurffur, which brought 105 survivors, and came from Waldron Diselman, the third officer of the Volturno, who attributes the fire to an explosion of a drum containing chemicals or oil in the forward part of the vessel.

MONTREAL, Oct. 16. The crew of the Mount Temple refused to sail in her, without a bonus or month's pay, declaring the steamer was unseaworthy. They were arrested on a charge of mutiny. The C.P.R. intend making a test case to ascertain how far Section 225 of the Merchant Shipping Act covers actions such as those taken by the striking seamen.

2-3-6 'Can't Lose!' Successful Meeting of West End Liberal Trio.

The West End Liberal candidates, Messrs. Ellis, Cowan and Scott, held a meeting at the Ropewalk last night and from every standpoint it was considered the best yet. The exceptional hearing and the applause given the speakers as they scored the marvellous Government is ample testimony that this section of the District is entirely Liberal. Moreover, the loyal greeting and magnificent reception accorded the visitors proved such a complete overthrow to the Tories that the strongest Morrisite jaws will now admit that the Big Chief's seat is in jeopardy.

The school-room in which the meeting was held was filled with voters, many of whom walked several miles to attend. Mr. John Duff, of the Ropewalk, presided and introduced the candidates.

Mr. Ellis was first to address the gathering. The Mayor made a lucid and comprehensive review of the Colony's affairs. He said the time was near at hand when electors were to do their duty as citizens and he exhorted every man to vote for the party which will be a safeguard for our Island Home. Continuing, he pointed out how all our principal and most successful industries were inaugurated under the Bond Administration; besides, Sir Robert Bond helped to encourage and foster our industries and was always actively interested in the development of our resources. The Mayor then referred to the hard times this Colony experienced under Tory rule, notably in 1898 when Sir Robert Bond was sent to England to borrow money and demonstrated his patriotism and statesmanship by pledging his own fortune as a guarantee that the interest on the loan would be paid, thereby saving this Colony from an apparent irretrievable financial ruin. When Sir Robert Bond came into power in 1900 his first act was to remove the obnoxious ten per cent. that was placed on all dutiable goods entering the country, but notwithstanding the surplus revenue increased every year while in power. After being three years in power Sir Robert established a reserve to inspire confidence abroad if we ever wanted to raise money, and from 1905 to 1908 the sum of a half million dollars was placed in the Reserve Fund. Was that money intact today?

Sir Robert Bond is a man of wealth, honour and title and is unscrupulously entering political life in response to a call from an alarmed people to save the country from destruction, which it is now bordering on, caused by the recklessness of our present Government. The Tory Party in an endeavour to fool the people are spreading scare catch-cries. If they get back for another term of office they will put this Colony's finances in such a condition that they will never

We Must Have Honesty in Public Life.

Outside the questions of policy which the people of this country are to-day asked to consider and to give their verdict upon, there is one very grave question which has not been placed before them as strongly and forcibly as its importance deserves. It is a question which every man who has any influence upon the electorate should ponder over carefully and thoughtfully. No man is without influence and the greater his influence the greater his responsibility. The responsibility we speak of in this case is not merely a responsibility to the people of this country and to our fellowman generally, but to a Higher Power. The question is a great moral question and one upon which there can be no two opinions. The question is, can any honest man vote for or encourage others to vote for a party which has amongst its leaders men connected with such scandals as the case of Gibbons against Piccott and Crosbie, and the Bay de Verde Iron Prospectus of 1911. Charges have been made against them to which they have offered no defence or excuse. What inference can be drawn from such conduct but that they are true. If they are true can these men be honest? On many great moral questions good men have held opposite and diverse views and their opinions have been respected even by those who differed from them. No man's honor need be besmirched by taking side pro or con.

But that is not so in the cases quoted above, viz. the Piccott case and the Bay de Verde Prospectus. Not merely is it his duty as a citizen and a leader amongst the people, if he be such, not to support such a party, but he is only doing his duty when he fights tooth and nail to put such things down and serves notice upon our rulers that they may be, that such things shall not be tolerated. What can be said for the man that votes or encourages others to vote for a man that he knows is not honest, or for a party which has amongst its leaders men of that stamp? We do not say that a man should accept rumours of wrong doing; we do not say that a man may not have his fallings and yet be an honourable man, and one that any right thinking man could honestly vote for. It is often a man's very humanity that appeals to us and makes for his ability to read his brother man and minister best to his wants. We cannot expect a legislature of paragons, we do not expect paragons, but we are not extravagant in our demands when we say that ordinary common honesty should be a prerequisite to election to our House of Assembly. In the light of the Crosbie, Piccott, Gibbons case and the Bay de Verde Iron Scandal, can any man with knowledge of the facts and of the connection of the Morris ministers and members with them, support the Morris Party and yet be true to his God, his Country, or himself? HONESTY.

Shouting to Keep Their Courage Up.

McGrath is at his usual game of shouting "Victory," in an endeavor to keep heart in the disconsolate hearts of the Tories. He ignored Coaker's offer to publish the signatures of all telegraph messages "from the front," for if rumour is to be believed, he would have to put his own name to many of them, as they bear the stamp of "home manufacture" very plainly. That the North is going to return Bond candidates is a sore point for Patsy, and that Morris is meeting his Waterloo in the West End is a fact that is so apparent that consternation is written deep on the faces of the Big Chief and his colleagues. I am sorry for the Tory trio of the East End—they are gradually growing to such a state of self-inflated certainty that November 1st will be a most unpleasant day for them. It has been whispered time after time that they are prepared to finance the party to a large extent on the possibility of Morris and his worthless getting the reins of Government. 
