



The operations at Garnish had to be abandoned after taking out 390 tons, owing to the na-

The Dredge Priestman went into commission and began dredging on August 5th, 1912, so that the work represents about seventeen months' work. Much better work may be expected as experience is gained. Considerable time was lost in moving from place to place, obtaining coal supplies, mending buckets after dredging away rock and boulder formafor dredging certain places.
